## Contracts Made For Work On New Lake At Eastland

Construction work will begin about January 1, 1953, on a Leon River dam to provide a lake water supply for the Cities of Eastland and Ranger, according to action taken last week by the directors of the Eastland County Water Supply District. Contracts were awarded to three firms for work on the lake project. McVostain Construction Co. of Fort Worth was the low bidder for a contract to build the Leon River dam. The bid was \$396,392.

Ernest Lloyd of Fort Worth was low bidder, with a bid of \$12,160, for a contract to clear the area to be covered by the lake. E. E. Farrow of Dallas was awarded a contract for constructing water supply lines to Eastland and Ranger on a bid of \$477,186.

The project is expected to cost about \$1,500,000. A contract still must be let for a purifying plant and pumping stations.

Engineers have estimated that the dam will form a lake with a capacity of 28,000 acre feet of water. The lake will be about two miles wide and five miles long with a depth of 85 feet in places. About two years will be required to complete the project.

The water situation improved in Eastland last week as that city's small lake caught about two feet of water as a total of 2.5 inches of rain fell.

Texas is the largest state; Rhode Island the smallest.

## Quail Season To Open With Fair Shooting Outlook

AUSTIN, Nov. 29. — The annual quail season, opening December 1 under the General State Law, climaxes a pretty good fall wildlife harvest, according to the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. He said prospects are for a generally average shoot although some sections will find quail scarce because of the prolonged drought.

But Texas which often numbers its quail population to as high as 15,000,000 will again provide many exciting hours of hunting this, the king of the small game crop.

One promising phase this year concerns the moisture which, for the first time in many seasons, will permit successful use of the indispensable bird dog. Recent seasons have been too dry to permit successful scent.

This is the sport in which the man and his dog come into their element, said the Executive Secretary. This is the time when the farm boy and Old Tige and the city man with his carefully groomed pointer or setter strike their stride.

The reliable bobwhite is the mainstay of the quail population in most of the state although some areas have the scaled quail or the blue quail almost exclusively.

The General Law Season runs from December 1 through January 16, with shooting hours from one half hour before sunrise to one half hour after sunset and with a bag limit of twelve per day and not more than thirty-six per week or in possession.

But there are special seasons by areas or by counties. The 28-county Panhandle group has a twelve bird per day bag limit with a possession limit of twenty-four. Shooting hours there are from sunrise to sunset.

## Social Security Man Is Due Here

A representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration will be at the Chamber of Commerce in Cisco on Thursday, December 4, at 2 p. m. Persons wishing assistance in connection with retirement or death claims under the Social Security Act should call at that time. This announcement was made today by Ralph T. Fisher, Manager of the Abilene office, who stated that the next visit will be at the same time and place on December 18.

Fisher called attention to the fact that students, housewives, and others who expect to work during the Christmas holidays will need social security account numbers. Persons who are self employed should also see that their social security cards are available, as they will be needed when income tax returns are filed after the first of the year.

Any person needing a social security card can get an application blank at his local Post Office. The blank should be completed and mailed to the Social Security Administration, Abilene, Texas. In cases where the card has been lost, this same application form may be used to apply for a duplicate card.

CHRISTMAS SAVINGS PLAN

The National Safety Council has announced a nationwide Christmas savings plan to stop accidents. "If every American will join this savings plan before the Christmas holidays, a real yuletide bonus — human life — will be paid," said Ned H. Dearborn, Council president.

The campaign has been joined by more than 160 national organizations, and by city and state public officials and civic leaders. They will unite in creating an awareness of the special holiday hazards, and will enlist voluntary cooperation from every American to hold accidents to a minimum this Christmas.

The year-end holiday season is the most dangerous period of the year, Mr. Dearborn said, and accidents annually mar the celebration in thousands of homes. Traffic accident deaths on both Christmas eve and Christmas day are about twice as high as the annual daily average.

This year, with the holiday consisting of four days for many persons, the toll could be even higher than the 351 traffic deaths reported during the four-day Christmas weekend last year, Mr. Dearborn warned.

"Travel is especially heavy over long holidays, which encourage traditional family get-togethers even when the members must drive considerable distance," he said. "The festive spirit of the season, plus the normal winter hazards of bad weather, slippery roads and longer periods of darkness create added danger."

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For a safe and merry Christmas, the National Safety Council suggests these precautions:

- 1. Driving or walking, put the Christmas spirit of "good will toward men" into practical use by being extra courteous to others. And take your time!
2. If streets are icy or slippery, keep your speed down and your caution up.
3. If you imbibe Christmas spirit in liquid form, stay away from the steering wheel of a car.
4. Avoid home hazards, too. Don't use candles, be sure tree lights and wiring are in good condition and keep gift wrappings away from the fireplace or other source of heat.

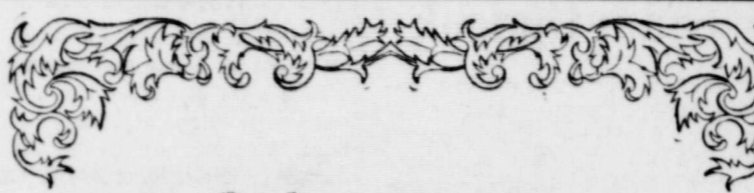

## Twentieth Century Club Has Meeting

The Twentieth Century Club met Friday, November 28, in regular session in the club rooms.

Mrs. J. E. Crawford, in talking on the subject, "United Nations at Community Level," stated that through education in the schools and movies "we can put United Nations at community level. We must study, think, act, and achieve in order to coordinate the good forces of the community. If we are to adopt any of the principles of U. N., they will have to be altered to fit the individual needs of the community; in other words, set up a facsimile of the assembly with the existing organizations of the community."

Mrs. Crawford quoted from a speech made by Frank E. Holman, past president of the American Bar Association, given at Seattle, Washington, March 8, 1952, as follows: "Our country's unparalleled growth and development was made possible because under our form of government we have a free and independent nation of free and independent citizens, but as a result of World War II our leaders began to value our national and individual freedom and independence less and less and to involve us more and more in international commitments and entanglements. We became enthusiastic about running the affairs of the peoples of the world by and through an international organization which we called the United Nations."

Mr. Holman further stated that "this universal acclaim of the charter was only exceeded by the universal ignorance of its provisions on the part of most Americans and the equal ignorance of many Americans, both of world affairs and of the differences in political, economic, social, and racial, of the various peoples of the world, and ignorance of the stubborn fact that these differences cannot be resolved and controlled by pious declarations."

"Until recently only the American Bar Association had the courage to point out the menace to American rights and the American form of government involved in various of the United Nations proposals," according to Mr. Holman. "For example, the Human Rights program, largely sponsored by Mrs. Roosevelt, directly and adversely affects the rights and liberties of every American."

"Since Article Six of our constitution provides that 'All treaties shall be the supreme law of the land,' the United Nations Commission of Human Rights proposes to change domestic law everywhere," Mrs. Crawford quoted.

In conclusion, Mrs. Crawford says, "we deliberately voted away some of our freedom unthoughtedly. It behooves us all to study the principals and actions of the United Nations more thoroughly."

## HEALTH TALKS

Prepared by the Texas Medical Association

If a child is totally deaf, it is generally agreed he will get a better education in special classes or a school for the deaf. If he has only a partial deafness, however, it probably is better for him to remain in regular classes.

It is important to discover deafness as soon as possible, because the time to treat deafness is in its earliest stages. Doctors can offer little hope when deafness is almost complete.

After treatment is of no further help, perhaps the hearing may be brought up to normal or near normal with a hearing aid. Children as young as 18 months of age have been successfully fitted. The years before a child goes to school are very important in the whole picture of learning. If through bad hearing he is allowed to form poor hearing and speech habits, later his education must break those habits and substitute good ones. A hearing aid fitted early will help him develop the right ones.

The hard of hearing child who cannot wear a hearing aid or who even with one has difficulty hearing should be placed toward the center of the classroom, where he can easily see the blackboard and the teacher. If he has good hearing in one ear, he should be placed so that in turning the good ear toward the source of the sound he will be able to see. Correct lighting on the blackboard, the teacher's face, and other points around the room where activities occur is important to let the hard of hearing child take full advantage of seeing.

Lip reading and speech training should be started early. Knowing only the sign language handicaps the child badly in his education. Also, learning to speak as correctly as possible means that he will not be made fun of by classmates for bad speech habits.

As he grows older, the child should be encouraged to pick a course of study leading to a career which will not be closed to him if his deafness becomes worse or which by its nature will not increase his deafness. He should be trained to the highest possible skill in his chosen occupation.

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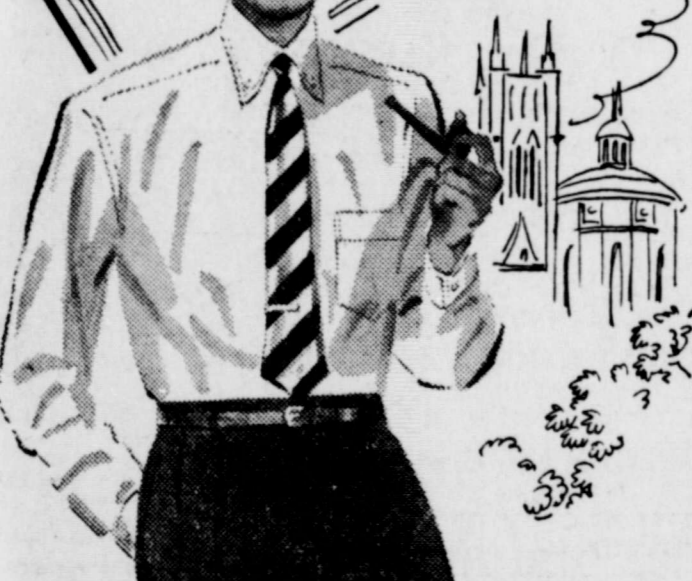
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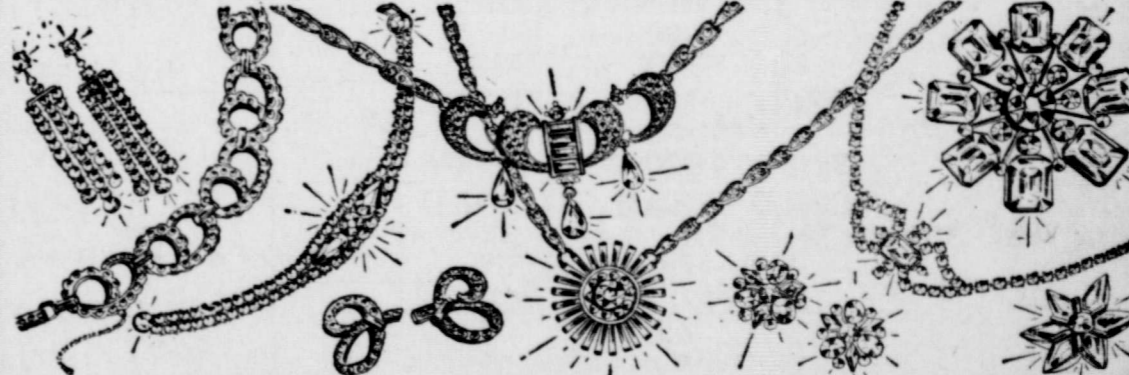

# BEHIND THE WALLS OF TEXAS STATE HOSPITALS



**Note: This is the third in a series of articles on our State Hospital System, prepared under the supervision of Dr. George W. Jackson, Medical Director of the Board for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools, and sponsored by the Hogg Foundation for Mental Hygiene, University of Texas.**

Wanda B. took off one white shoe, sat on the floor and rubbed her feet. She knew her uniform would be smudged when she stood up, but for once she was too weary to care.

Helen came in, humming and tying the sash of her chenille robe. Her face was shiny from the shower, and the ends of her hair were damp. She went over to the dresser, pushed aside the clutter of cold cream jars, perfume bottles, lipstick and ink and began methodically laying out bobby pins and rolling up her hair.

Suddenly she stopped humming and looked down at Wanda. "What in the heck ails you, Wanda? You should be showered and pin-curling and in bed by now. How are you going to manage your eight hours sleep?" Wanda massaged her big toe. "I'm getting up the energy to have a nervous breakdown."

Helen pulled two bobby pins out from between her teeth and yanked her roommate to her feet. "You'd better be getting up energy for a big day tomorrow. Remember you're on Ward 10, and sister, they're going to keep you busy."

Wanda stretched. "And to think they were begging for waitresses at the Purple Cow Cafe back home." She took her gown and robe from the closet door and went down the hall to the bathroom.

The quick sting of the shower brought back some of her energy, and standing there alone, away from the girls, the teachers and the patients, she was able to let down her flip mask and to recall the worrisome days before she decided to go into nurses' technician training at the State hospital.

High school graduation had been big doings for most of the girls but not for Wanda. When your mother was dead and your dad tired all the time and the house old and money scarce, there wasn't much fun in anything.

It had looked like a job in the dime store or a cafe. And to Wanda, who had always wanted to be a nurse, it had looked like the end of life's dream.

But when she heard about the nurse technician training program at the State Hospital, Wanda had been the first girl in school to sign up.

She turned off the water in the shower, rubbed herself briskly with a towel. She was still tired, but lots of the tension was gone.

She was glad Helen was asleep when she got back to the room. Sometimes it was good to be alone and to have time to think about things. She turned off the light and crawled into bed, watching the square patch of moonlight on the freshly painted ceiling.

Junior Colleges of Texas. Another 250 students began training in September 1952.

A resident training program in psychiatry for staff members has been instituted at the Austin State Hospital and will soon be begun at Terrell State Hospital. One year internships in clinical psychology have been instigated, with a three month affiliate training program in psychiatric nursing for student nurses established at the San Antonio State Hospital and the Austin State Hospital. Classrooms suitable for the training of professional personnel have been developed at all units.

And this is only the beginning. Future plans call for expansion of all the training programs, for training of advanced psychiatric nurses, for on-the-job training for occupational therapists, for a two year technician program for occupational-recreational workers and hospital dietary personnel, for in-service training for all classes of auxiliary hospital personnel.

Texas laws do not go so far as the Biblical admonition that you love your neighbor, but they do have something to say about how you may treat him and his property.

Adjoining landowners have many mutual rights and obligations, and your rights to the use of your own property may sometimes be limited by the effect of the intended use on your immediate neighbors. Such limitations are in addition to those imposed by municipal zoning ordinances, building codes and other restrictions designed to protect the interests of an entire subdivision or city, or the public generally.

For example, say you have just bought the vacant lot next to Mr. Smith's property out on Main Street. Smith has a fine, big tree on his property but it juts over onto your lot and those overhanging branches will interfere with the plans you have for building your house.

You can't go over to Smith's lot and cut down his tree even though the branches will make your proposed living room as dark as the catacombs at midnight. On the other hand, neither does Smith have a right to let the tree on his land extend over your property, especially when

it is going to interfere with your use of that property, so you do have the right to get rid of the offending branches.

However, before you start sawing you had better consider whether the removal of the branches will damage the tree. It is still Smith's tree and you don't want to cause it to die. The best thing to do is have a talk with Smith and see if you can arrange to have the limb cut off by someone who knows how to do so without harming the tree.

Of course, a boundary tree — where the trunk is on both sides of the boundary line — can be cut only by consent of both the owners.

Another possible problem: Let's say you want to cut down the front of your lot below the level of Smith's yard. The soil is pretty loose and you are sure that when you lower the grade, Smith's yard will slide all along the cut. However, you figure that it is up to Smith to do whatever is necessary to keep his land from sliding over on yours. He can put up a retaining wall or something.

The law says you had better slow up a bit in this instance. The way things stand, Smith's yard is not currently in any danger of sliding. If you change that condition by cutting your land down, then it is your obligation to see that it doesn't cause damage to his property. It is up to you to put up the retaining wall if one is necessary to keep the adjoining land from sliding.

Suppose you and Smith build a driveway together so you can both save the biggest possible space for your lawn. You get along fine with Smith, but he

later sells his house to a new owner who wants to take up part of the driveway and plant petunias there. He can probably do it if you did not have a definite, written agreement with Smith by which the subsequent owner is bound.

Probably the best way to handle such a situation would be to have a written agreement with Smith and record it with the County Clerk before the driveway is built. Anyone buying the property later would thereby have notice of the agreement and be bound by it.
