MR. B. A. BUTLER of the C of C tells us they're having a difficult time locating enough houses to supply the demand.

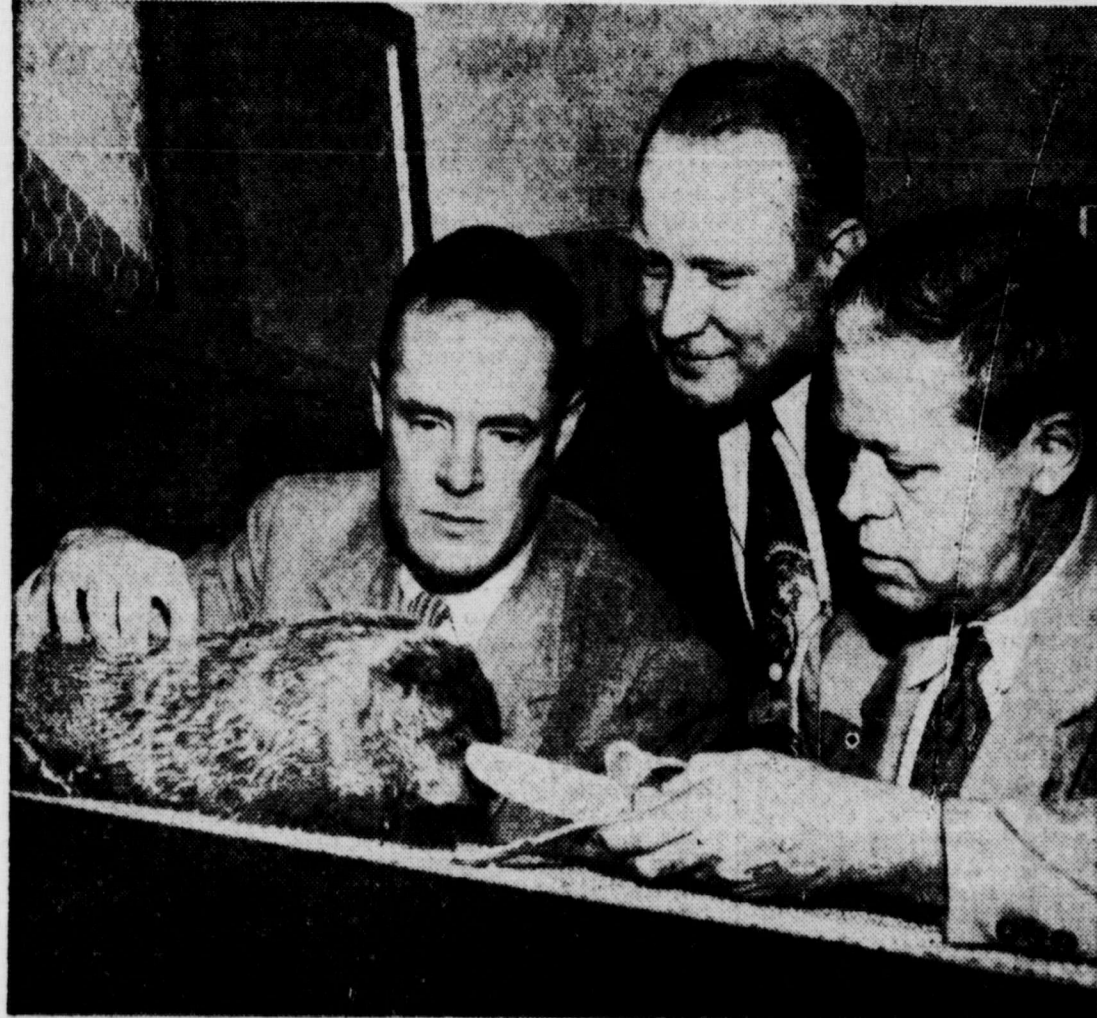

50 Stockmen File For Help Monday

The federal government's relief program for drought stricken ranchers and farmers was underway in Eastland County today as the Production and Marketing Administrator E. E. Powell of the PMA office reported that his instructions to begin taking applications from those who desire to buy government feed stocks at reduced prices arrived over the weekend.

The PMA will supervise the program in the same manner that it handled last year's drought relief hay program. The feed will be shipped in carload lots to the PMA for distribution to ranchers and farmers.

The emergency program offers ranchers and farmers feed for dairy and beef cattle and sheep and goats at a low cost. The program is only for those in need of assistance now, Mr. Powell said.

Instructions to PMA offices read, in part, as follows: "It is not the intention to provide feed to those who have feed or for those whom farming or ranching is only a sideline or for commercial feeders.

AUSTIN — Texas needed another good, soaking rain.

Thousands of the devout, and perhaps some of the not-so-devout, prayed for it Sunday in response to a plea from Governor Allan Shivers.

The governor urged ministers of all faiths and their congregations to "turn to the One who is the source of all help."

At the same time, Shivers telegraphed President Eisenhower to thank him and other officials of the administration for their speedy aid to drouth-stricken Texas.

From the White House had word that the President would allocate \$8 million for emergency drouth relief in 152 Texas and 40 Oklahoma counties.

The plan was to furnish feed at low prices, permit the railroads to grant lower rates on feed and cattle, and extend credit to ranchmen and farmers.

Simultaneously the Department of Agriculture announced that it would buy 200 million pounds of beef from cattlemen in the dry Southwest.

Secretary of Agriculture Benson hoped that this purchasing would remedy the "ruinously low prices" for cattle.

Good rains had fallen over a good deal of the state, but the precipitation was not enough, generally, to put the drouth out of the picture.

From Washington came a long-range weather forecast that held out hope for the eastern part of the state, with "substantial" moisture from Central Texas eastward.

The outlook for West Texas was dry.

There was more and more activity in the political field.

Not any time recently has there been so much political maneuvering so early.

The elections are a year away, but three factions are already preparing for the struggle, and individual candidates are going through the usual routine of speechmaking and handshaking.

Paying a visit to the state was Stephen A. Mitchell, Democratic National Chairman, who said he would invite Adlai Stevenson to come here later.

Mitchell asked party members who supported Eisenhower to return to the Democratic fold, and predicted Democratic victories next year.

He forecast that "Sam Rayburn will return to the speakership of the House, and Lyndon Johnson will be majority leader, not minority leader."

But there was evidence that the rift between Eisenhower and Stevenson Democrats was still there.

When the Texas Federation of Labor convened at El Paso, delegates booed when a speaker charged that Governor Shivers of Texas, Thornton of Colorado, and Mechem of New Mexico were "state's righters last year when it was a matter of dough in the pocket, but this year, when it's a matter of drouth relief, they're quite willing to be Americans and accept relief from the central government."

Shivers led the Democratic revolt that gave the state to Eisenhower last year. Labor leadership generally was for Stevenson.

Could Mitchell and the other party leaders pull Texas back into line? It was obvious that they were going to work hard to reach that goal.

party members of the Democrats who voted for Eisenhower, and they planned to put up candidates for every elective office.

It was easy to make one prediction: the Texas political battles of next year are going to be big and bitter.

If Governor Shivers had party politics on his mind he didn't say so in his speech to the state bar convention in Fort Worth.

His remarks concerned liberty on the national and international level.

Americans, he said, "are the best in the world at selling soap and television sets, and we've got to sell liberty like we sell soap."

Shivers added: "We haven't sold liberty at home or abroad. We tried to buy it abroad, but this hasn't worked and it never will."

The political experts were bound to make their interpretations of the speech.

Did it mean that Shivers would run for a national office next year?

The governor has said that he might make the race for a third term as the state's chief executive.

But then, again, he might not. Your guess is as good as any: if Shivers has decided what he is going to do, he has confided in no one.

And if we can judge by past performance, he won't say a word about his intentions until the deadline gets here.

There was a bit shuffling around as a result of one of the governor's appointments.

Weldon Hart, one of Shivers' executive assistants, is now chairman and executive director of the Texas Employment Commission, one of the state's biggest departments.

Hart, a former newspaperman of wide experience, served as secretary of the State Democratic Executive Committee. He had a prominent part in sending an uninstruced delegation to the national Democratic convention.

Later he was active in the Democratic for Eisenhower campaign.

In his new office, Hart succeeds Harry Benge Crozier, a former newspaperman who announced that he would go into the public relations business with Joe Hitchcock and Hugh Williamson in Austin.

Hart's old job as executive assistant to the governor will be filled by Earl Braley, Austin public relations man who worked for the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

Both the state and federal governments get a lot of money from taxes on alcoholic beverages.

Coke R. Stevenson Jr., administrator of the Texas Liquor Control Board, reported that a new high in receipts was registered for May of this year: \$1,391,589.

The state's revenues from taxes on alcoholic beverages will run above \$19 million for this calendar year.

And the federal government's excise taxes on alcoholic beverages are higher than the state's.

Old age assistance checks started going out on schedule, although it looked for a while as though there might be a delay.

The federal part of the fund was in doubt, but Congress quickly passed a resolution extending the old appropriation until a new one could be passed.

**SHORT SNORTS:** The Texas draft quota for the next 12 months will be 16,000 men. That's 12,000 less than were called during the past year. . . . It was a hot job for men of the 36th Division, Texas National Guard, who were marching with full packs at Fort Hood. . . . R. Dean Moorhead of Austin told the State Bar convention that Texas' probate laws are of the "horse and buggy" character. The Bar is sponsoring a new probate code. . . . A Houston Negro American Legion Post complained to Governor Shivers that students at Texas Southern University were receiving un-American indoctrination, and directors of the school for Negroes ordered a full-dress investigation.

**As Harvest Nears Give Garden an Extra Feeding**



The placement method of applying plant food is efficient on summer sowings.

As garden plants near their harvest period, vegetables, flowers and lawn will benefit by extra feeding, which will add size and color to the flowers, heavier yield and quality to the vegetables, and a thicker turf and deeper color to the lawn.

Introduction of high analysis soluble plant foods and proof that when these are sprayed on plant leaves they are absorbed quickly and take rapid effect, afford a convenient method of giving border plants, especially, needed nourishment with the least trouble.

For the amateur, a siphon which can be inserted into the hose line, to lift soluble plant food from the container in which it has been prepared, and mix it in the hose water, is a practical device. Careful attention must be given to the strength of the solution, to guard against all danger of burning green foliage. Manufacturer's instructions should be carefully observed to prevent this.

The best time to apply soluble plant food is when the temperature is less than 90 degrees, and on a cloudy day rather than in the brightest sun. The addition of a wetting agent to the solution is helpful, if it has not been added by the manufacturer. Plant food may also be added to insecticide

sprays. Experience has shown that more frequent applications of small quantities give the best results, so there is never reason for taking any risk in using too strong a solution.

When summer sowings are made in the vegetable garden to follow early vegetables which have been cleared off, it is just as important that plant food be provided as in the spring.

The placement method of application, by spreading plant food in shallow trenches on both sides of the row where seed are sown, will give maximum efficiency. Apply two to four pounds to 100 feet of row.

Make the plant food trenches about four inches deep at least two inches away from the seed drill. Pour in the plant food evenly, and cover with soil. Then proceed with the seed sowing.

Long season crops, such as tomatoes, peppers, egg plant and others which grow and bear throughout the summer, will be benefited by extra feeding as harvest approaches. Those which bear fruit should be fed after the first fruits set. Pour liquid fertilizer on the soil around each plant or use a tablespoonful of plant food worked into the top soil near the base of each plant, and well watered.

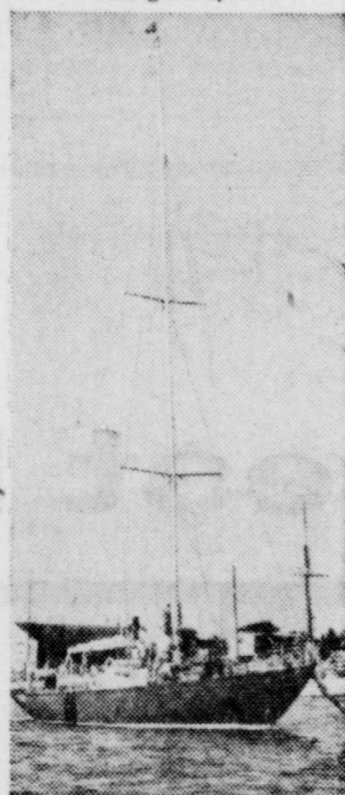

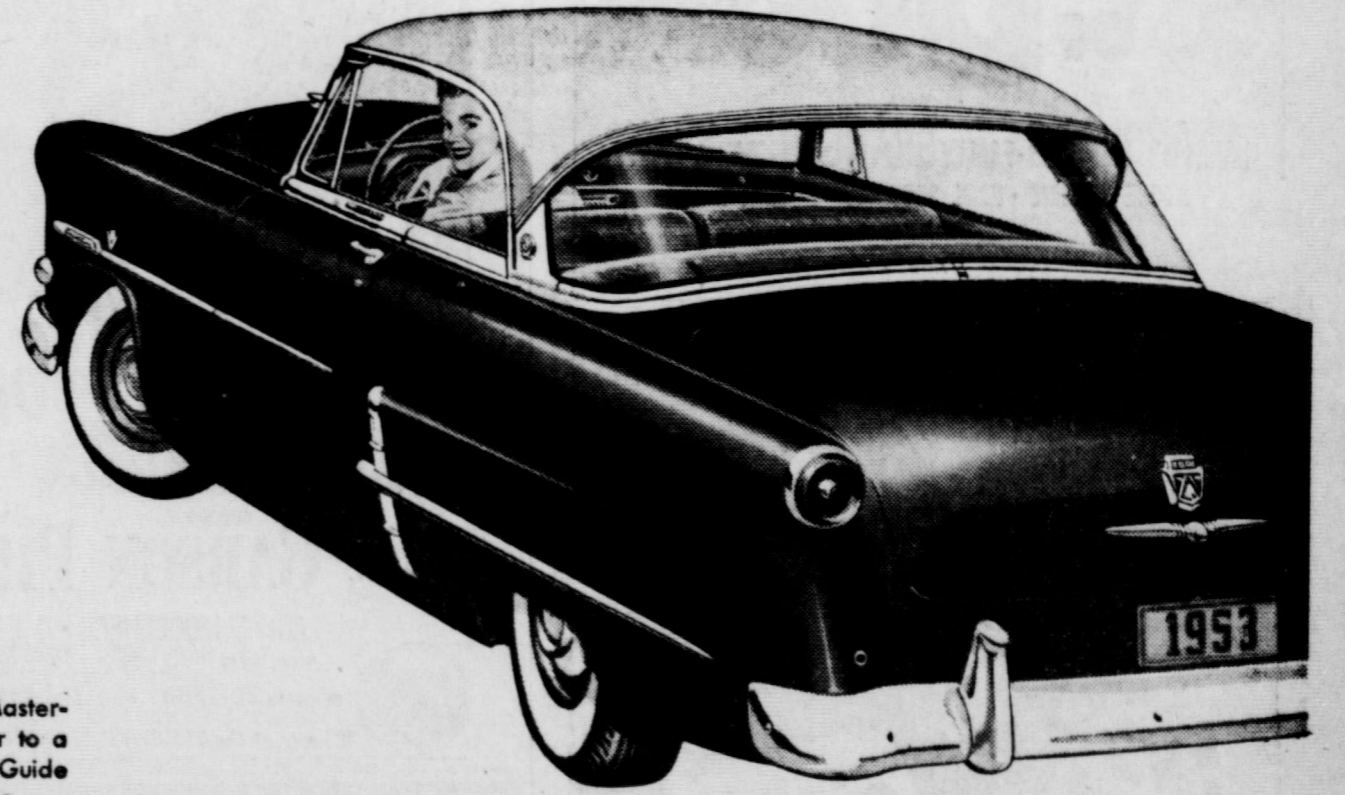

## Walleyed Pike Register Growth

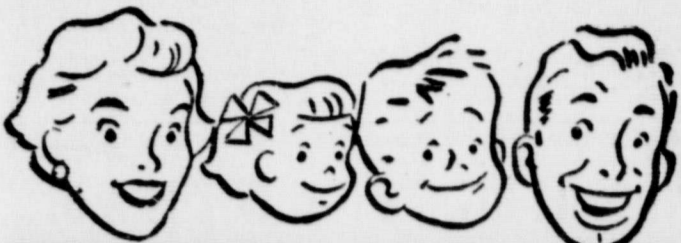
AUSTIN, July 4. — A handfull of baby walleyed pike that got into a sunfish pond has given the Game and Fish Commission its first check on their growth since being introduced into Texas.

Aquatic Biologist Bill Brown of San Marcos reported to the Chief Aquatic Biologist that the walleyes in six weeks time had grown from one quarter of an inch to an average of more than three inches in length.

Brown said Superintendent Fred Richan of San Marcos Federal Fish Hatchery, observed that the baby walleyes which were hatched there, got through a trough in with the sunfish and thus were not sent out for planting along with the other fingerlings.

The Chief Aquatic Biologist said he considered this "good growth." He added that a check of the walleyes' status in Travis and Devils Lake where they were planted will be made during July.

The walleyes have been introduced into Texas waters for the joint purpose of providing some new sport fishing and also to permit these predacious fish to help curb the surplus of stunted small species.

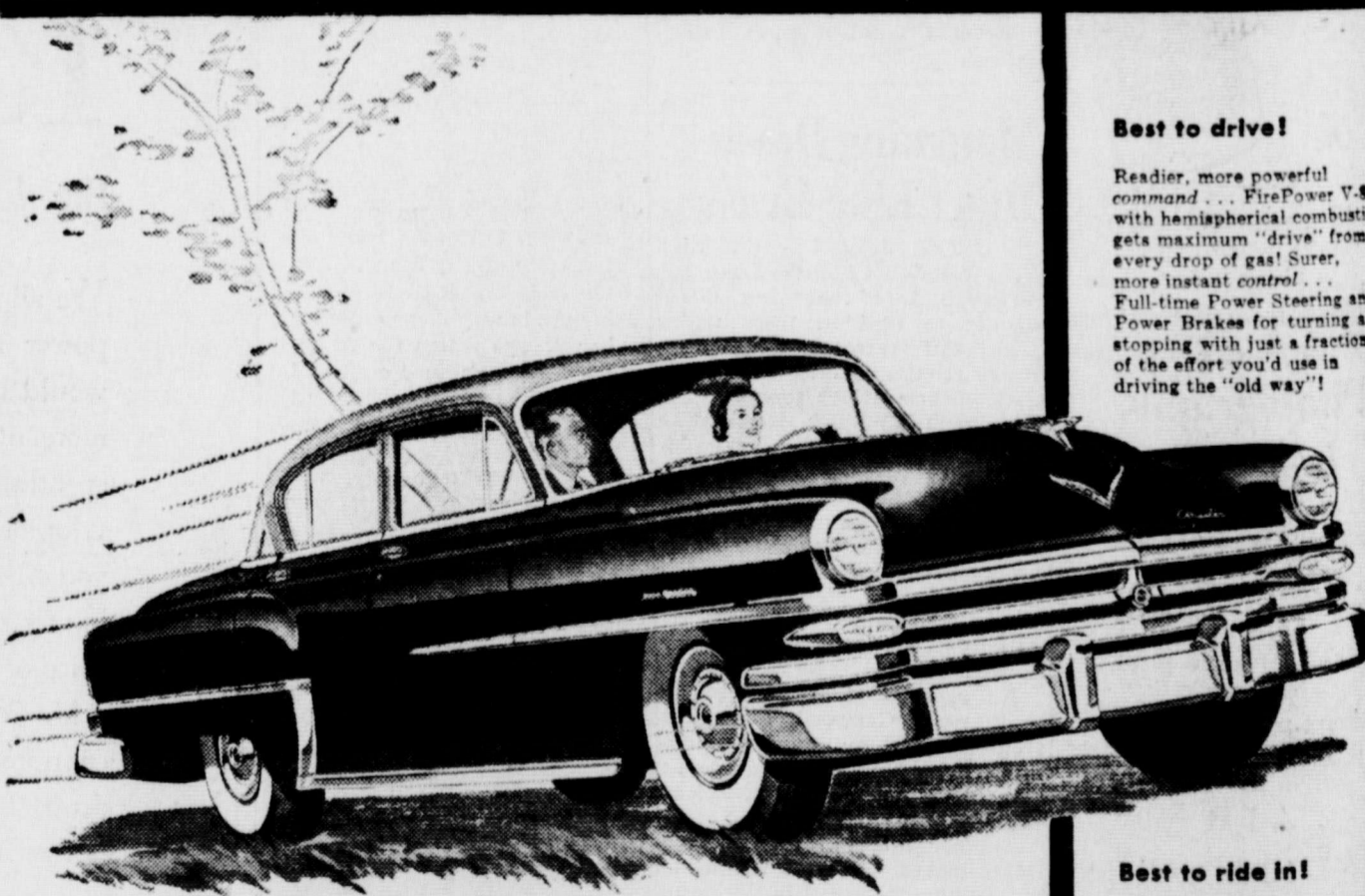
