








Game Laboratory Begins Study Of Hunt Specimen

AUSTIN, Jan. 12. — The action scene has shifted from the field to the laboratory as the main fall hunting season ended in Texas.

Now, according to the Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission, technicians already have begun study of the speciments gathered during the harvest season.

A — No. VA benefits payments are not taxable. In fact, they need not even be reported as income, for tax purposes.
