# PAPER PAYS TRIBUTE TO FORMER RESIDENT OF THIS SECTION

The Riesel, McLennan County, Rustler last week paid tribute to James T. White, long-time resident of Moran and this section, who was buried last January 4 in the cemetery at Moran. The article is reprintd as follows:

Dad died Saturday, Jan. 2. He was Dad to all who loved him in addition to his five children, 19 grandchildren and 12 greatgrandchildren.

Dad was sort of a fabulous person. He was one of the last of the true Texans, raised on the open range and never quite getting used to fences. Born March 26, 1875, on Rocky Creek in Burnet county, his family moved the next year because the county was getting crowded.

(There is not a house in sight of the rock home they had on Rocky to this day.) They hauled their belongings and drove their stock across country to Shackelford county near Moran.







