



Alfalfa, red clover, Ladino clover, timothy, orchardgrass, bromegrass and perhaps a few others are all important in dividually, though some when in short supply can be replaced in

Only one, timothy, based on production plus carry-over, is in short supply for 1954. The prospective imports of 7 to 8 million pounds or more of timothy seed from Canada may make up a large part of this deficit. So the

over-all picture is good.

The 1953 crop of alfalfa seed
was 22% smaller than the very
large crop of 1952, but was 70% above the 10-year average. The acreage was 27% smaller, and the acre-yield 7% larger than 1952. Because of a record carryover, three times as large as 1952, the total supply for 1954 is 5% more than last year and nearly 2% times the 10-year average. The applications for certification acreage were 14% be

The production of red clover 1953 was 12% below 1952 and 4% below average, but a larger carry-over brings the total % above average and only 6% below 1952.
