Procedure 10-x-8.
Where it can be proved that an employee is being held up by a desk or typewriter, or any other support which is the property of the Company, a 90-day period of grace will be granted.
The following procedure will be strictly adhered to:
If, after several hours, it is noticed that any employee has not moved, or changed position, the department head will investigate. Because of the highly sensitive nature of our employees and the close resemblance between death and their natural working attitude, the investigation will be made quietly so as to prevent waking the employee if he or she is asleep. If some doubt exists as to the true condition, extending a pay check should be used as a final test. If the employee does not reach for it, it may be reasonable to assume that death has occurred.

In all cases a sworn statement by the dead person must be filed on a special form provided for this purpose. Fifteen copies will be required. Three copies will be promptly forwarded to your immediate superior and two to the deceased. Three copies are to be sent to your insurance company and the other seven sent by air mail, special delivery to the office, 3109 Ill. where they will be promptly misplaced in our files.
