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A BREATHING SPELL

It would be foolish to deny that considerable concern is being felt about the business and employment situation now. In some circles, the fear is openly expressed that we may be heading into really hard times. And it is certainly true that only the extremely optimistic expect 1954 to measure up to 1953, when all kinds of high records were established.

An excellent feature article on what is happening and what may be expected appeared in the February 1 issue of Newsweek. It started out with a \$64 question — "just what is a depression, anyway?" It's a safe bet that very few people could give anything resembling a clear answer to that — too many imponderables are involved, and there are too many varying measures of comparison. Any depression will differ from others in degree. It is often said that we will be in a real depression if unemployment reaches 10,000,000. Yet, to scrape a bottom comparable to that of 1933, our unemployment rolls would have to total close to 16,000,000.

Newsweek said, "... a depression is a broad set of conditions which defies pin-pointing. In general, it's a sharp, steady, and prolonged drop in production. It's a steady growth in unemployment. And, as much as anything else, a depression is a state of mind... fears mount... It's a snowballing effect."

The magazine then presented the ideas of two economists. One is a British expert, who has been a close observer of American affairs, Colin Clark. Mr. Clark takes a pretty dark view. He thinks — with certain qualifications — that a depression is coming event though it may be a short one. This opinion is based, in part, on what he considers a relatively low money supply, abnormally high business inventories, and not enough new construction.

An opposed case is offered by Professor E. S. Woytinsky of Johns Hopkins, an economist of international reputation whose forecasts have often been remarkably accurate in the past. He contradicts Mr. Clark on every score, and writes: "There is no indication that depression conditions could develop. The bullish attitude of the consumers, the optimism of investment banks, the high level of construction activities, the active interest in business development shown by the government, the cut in taxes... all these factors exclude the possibility of a major depression."

He adds that we are now in a comparatively minor recession which soon will end, with the low reached before the muddle of the year. Newsweek also provided a forecast, based on a canvas of a large number of economists and businessmen. And it is certainly not a discouraging one, even though some people are due to be hurt and unemployment will probably average 3,000,000 for the year.

The magazine said: "... it adds up to a time of appraisal, a breathing spell in which business can take time but, clear away the confusion, reset its sights. So how about the scare talk that is worrying so many Americans? The answer: a sliding off from the super-boom, yes. A bust, no — very far from it. The biggest problem: scare talk itself. And the facts make it clear such talk isn't justified."

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Peter Rabbit is coming into quite some prominence. The U. S. Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics, has recently issued Home and Garden Bulletin No. 35. Its title, "Ways to Cook Rabbit."

This is a sixteen-page booklet for sale by the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C., for the price of ten cents per copy. It is, no doubt, intended to appeal to all nationalities, since it contains twenty recipes, among which we find Rabbit Chop Suey, Creole Rabbit, Curried Rabbit, and Hassenpfeffer, not to mention the old American standbys of Rabbit Pie, Rabbit Hash, plain Stewed or Fried Rabbit, with or without dumplings. It not only gives pointers on cooking, but also on buying and thawing rabbits. I was somewhat amazed, because the researcher who prepared the booklet overlooked the main item. They should have at least had a paragraph on "How to Catch a Rabbit." I have eaten a lot of rabbit in my day under quite a few aliases. Most cookbooks carry a pretty good run of recipes for preparing the animal after it is caught. I never experienced any trouble in the cooking. It was always the catching that seemed to be the most trouble.
