Oil Industry Pays Huge Tax Bill In State, Bass Says

ABILENE, Feb. 25. — Their \$160,000,000 a year state tax bill is one of the biggest headaches facing Texas oil and gas producers, Harry W. Bass, Dallas, president, Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, declared in a speech here this week.

At a meeting of West Central Texas oil and gas producers, Bass likened the state levies to a 150,000 barrel a day "override" on the Texas petroleum industry. (An override is a share in production without sharing in costs).

Bass spoke at the second in a series of Association regional meetings. Bass said the state taxes on oil and gas producers account for 68 per cent of all the levies made at the state level on business and property in Texas.

"We take pride in the fact that we have stimulated the industrialization of Texas through the discovery and development of oil and gas resources; but it seems hardly fair to have to pay for most of the added costs which come from increased populations," Bass said.

"In the past, when Texas was wholly a farming and ranching state, all economic and political thinking was pointed toward promoting the agricultural side of our life. Times have changed. We must think in terms of new Texas needs," Bass said.

Bass said Texas citizens should adopt a strong, positive, constructive philosophy regarding this new development in Texas economic history. He asked why oil and gas producers should be penalized through excessive taxation for their contribution to the economic welfare of the Texas region.

Ranked alongside tax problems, Bass said issues involved in possible federal control of field prices of natural gas were of paramount importance to the industry.

"Under present interpretation of the law (the Natural Gas Act), every gas-using group in America is given the machinery for taking Texas gas at their own price," Bass said.

DAIRYMAN TELLS ADVANTAGE OF TRENCH SILO FEEDING METHOD

"I have 8 or 10 cows still milking that would have been dry several months ago if they had not been eating silage," said D. F. Williamson, Morton Valley dairyman, recently when commenting on his trench silo.

"Like it? — Sure I like it. It is my first silo but my feed bill without it would have been at least \$125.00 per week whereas with the silage it only cost me about \$40.00 per week," he commented.

Feeding the begari and cane silage was started on November 25. There was no trouble in getting the cows eating it. None have been bloated. Although some good quality Johnson grass hay is fed to the animals daily they usually root it off and go back to eating the silage if they can, said Williamson.

It only takes about an hour a day to back the trailer into the trench, load, haul and unload it. There is enough left in the trench to feed several months more even if no more was put in it.

Both the milk cows and the dry animals on the farm are in good condition say people who have seen them. The Hegarty cut with a lot of head on it.

"I would not today be in the dairy business if it had not been for my silo. I think that it will mean the difference of staying in and going out of the dairy business," Williamson said.

A bulletin on making and using silage is free and is available at the county agent's office in Eastland either by calling or writing.

Miss Smith was thrown from a car shortly before midnight Wednesday when it went out of control after hitting loose gravel and turned over. The accident occurred some three miles south of Breckenridge on Highway 183.

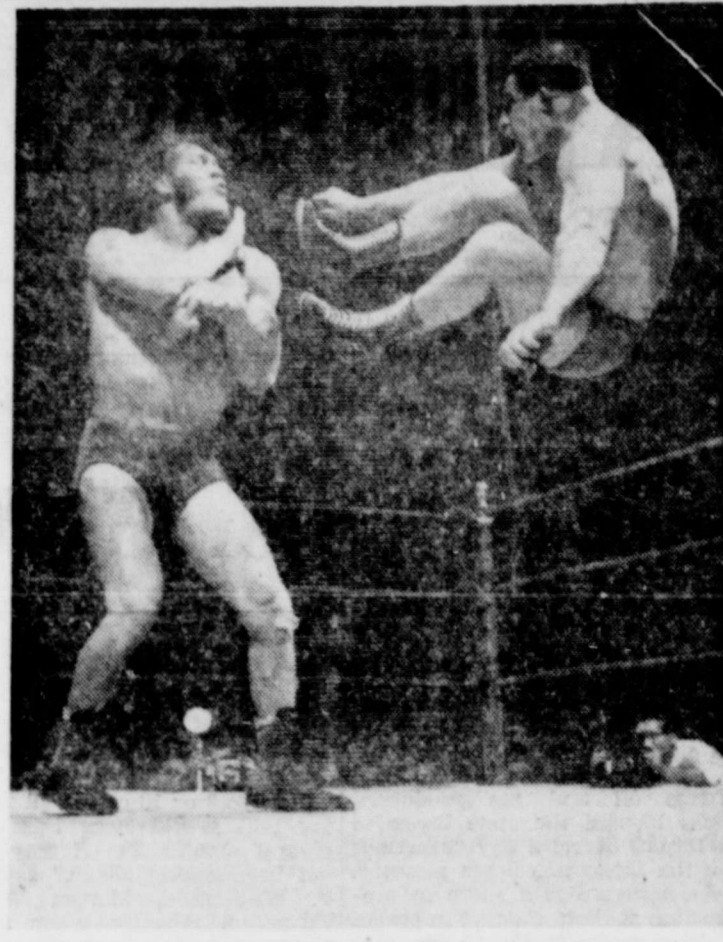
There were a few welcome surprises. Taxi service was good and the hotels were comfortable. His baggage was not searched and he was not followed by police.

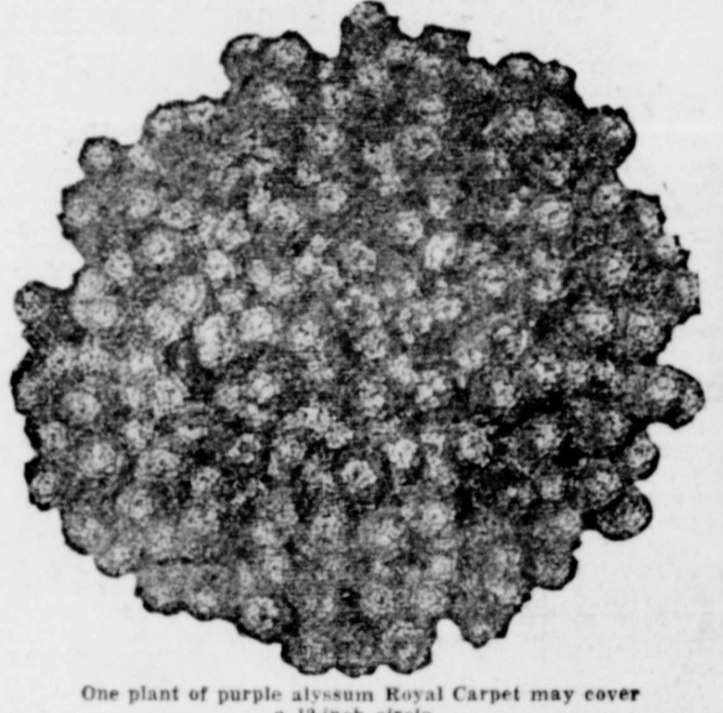

Mother Rescues Small Boy From Bottom of Well

Calm, heroic action by a Stephenson county ranch mother, saved her three-year old son from drowning Wednesday when he fell into a well on the place near Woodson, information received here Saturday revealed.

Mrs. Jack Robertson was busy in the kitchen and her children, Sterling and Sallie, were playing in the yard near a well that was covered with metal. Mrs. Robertson said she heard the lid of the well go down "and the little girl exclaim—Oh, Sterling."

Mrs. Robertson dashed out into the yard to the well which she said was about fifteen feet deep and had water in it about six feet deep. "When I first looked in I could not see him," Mrs. Robertson said. Then she saw him "floating on top of the water with his eyes wide open and paddling his arms."

There was a bucket in the well attached to a chain that connected with a pulley. Mrs. Robertson told the 29-pound boy to catch hold of the bucket and hold on. Twice she started pulling him up, and twice he fell back into the water. Mrs. Robertson said "I just kept talking to him as I was drawing him up and after he fell back." To make the situation worse "during the commotion" the chain got tangled up

and Mrs. Robertson had to straighten that out, which called for more talk.

When she finally got the boy to safety the first thing he said was that he had lost one of his boots. The next thing was that he saw some pink fish in the water.

Mrs. Robertson said she does not think there are any fish in the well. The only way she could account for the boy not being strangled was that he held his breath while under water. He had been told after falling in water once before, to always hold his breath when he went under.

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — I'm going to night school under the World War Two GI Bill. I'll have to stop training for a while because my employer wants me to make an emergency two-month trip to another city. This is the first time I've had to travel on the job. Will I be allowed to continue with my GI Bill schooling after I return?
A — Yes, provided you resume

Q — No. So long as you already were in training when your disability was rated as non-compensable, you will be permitted to go ahead with your Public Law 16 training until you attain your objective.

Q — I'm in college under the World War Two GI Bill, and I'm running out of GI entitlement. I've been figuring out the number of days I lost because of regular school holidays, illness and other absences from class. Could I refund my subsistence pay to VA for those days, and thereby add on to my entitlement?
A — No. Subsistence paid during regular absences may not be "bought back" for the purpose of adding to your entitlement. End-of-term extensions of training, on the other hand, may be repurchased.

Q — I'm taking a correspondence course under the World War Two GI Bill, and my entitlement will expire when I'm only two-thirds of the way through. Will I be permitted to continue the course anyhow?
A — So long as you've completed a major number of lessons at the time your entitlement expires, you will be allowed to finish the correspondence course. However, this extension is limited

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your course within 30 days after you return, or at the first time enrollment is permitted, whichever is later.
Q — I'm a disabled Korean veteran in training under Public Law 16. VA recently gave me a physical examination and reduced by service-connected disability rating to zero — which means I no longer will draw compensation pay. What about my Public Law 16 training? Will I have to quit that, too?
