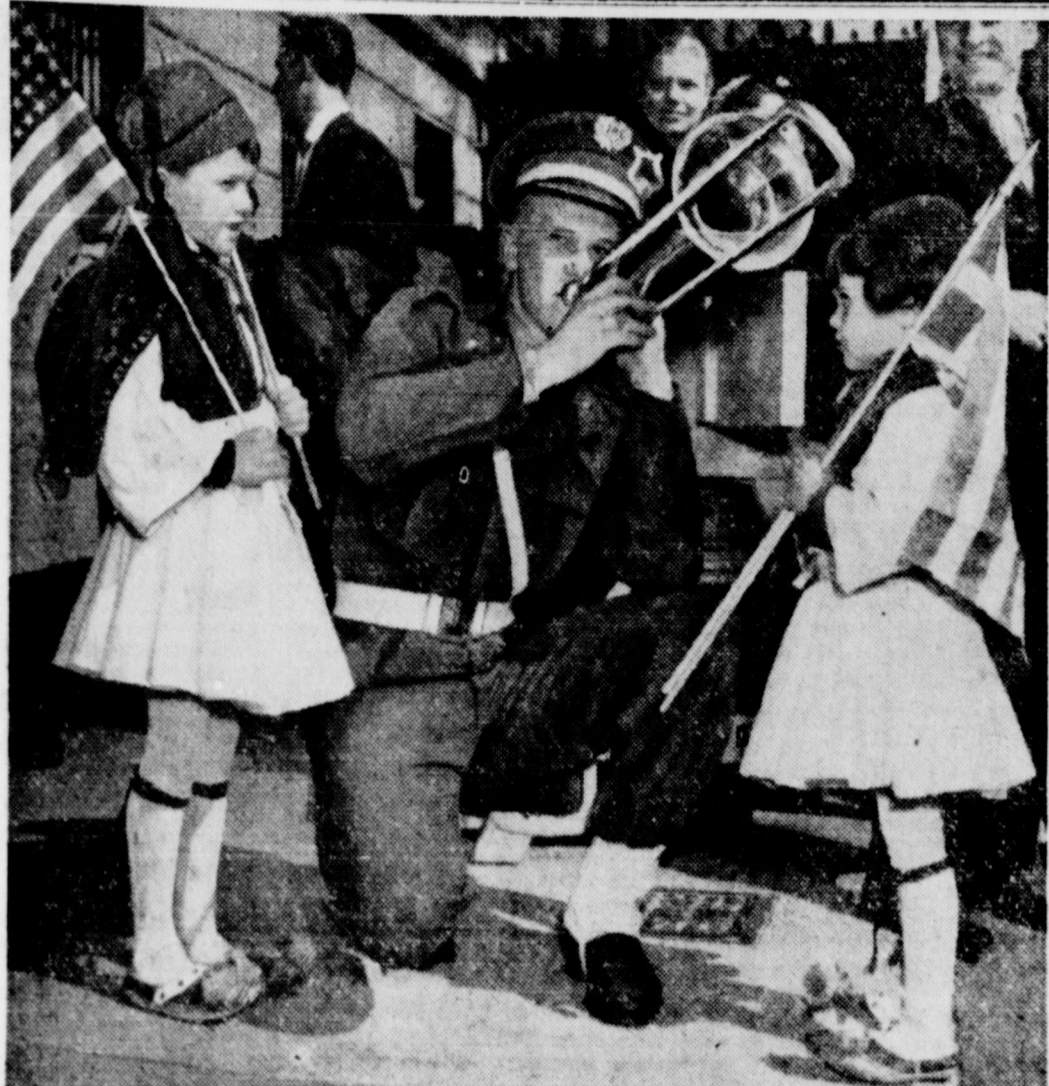

Lind Is Drilling Second Oil Test On Kimmell Land

J. R. Lind, Cisco, was drilling at 2,560 feet Saturday in an offset to gas production in a discovery well on the Sam Kimmell land northwest of Cisco, according to reports here. The new Lind test is his No. 2 Sam Kimmell. Location is due south of the Lake sand gas well, which still was awaiting a pipeline connection.

The No. 1 Kimmell made substantial gas in tests. It was carried to the Ellenberger. It was understood that Lind's plans called for an Ellenberger test in the No. 2 Kimmell.

Three miles southwest of Cisco, the Trumpeter Petroleum Co. No. 1 J. H. Hyatt has set pipe at about 1,500 feet and was expected to begin completion tests soon. Reports indicated good prospects for oil at about 1,430 feet.

A new project for the area is the F. Kirk Johnson, Fort Worth, No. 1 Albert A. Hansen in the gas field area some 15 miles southwest of Cisco. Location is in the A. Winfrey Survey. Plans call for a 3,200 feet to test the Caddo lime. There are several capped gas wells in that general area.

Jack Hailey of Cisco has made location for his No. 5 Dunn as a regular field project two and a half miles northwest of Rising Star. Location is in Section 39, Block 2, ETRR Survey.

Hailey's No. 4 Dunn, completed recently in the same area, pumped 48 barrels of 33 gravity oil from 45 perforations at 1,100-10 feet in potential tests.

O. M. Evans of Fort Worth has made five new locations in the field one mile south of Rising Star. The wells will go to 1,100 feet on the Della Bender lease in the northwest quarter of Section 27, Block 3, BBB&C Survey.

Several projects have been announced for the shallow pool south and east of Eastland.

Farm Bureau To Sponsor Contest To Select Queen

WACO, April 24.—The Texas Farm Bureau will sponsor a statewide queen contest, again this year, according to J. Walter Hammond, president of the state farm organization.

Purpose of the contest is to give recognition to the beauty, charm and vivaciousness of Texas farm and ranch girls. Contestants will be judged on three main points: (1) appearance, (2) poise, and (3) personality.

Finals of the state-wide queen contest will be held the night of Nov. 8 at the 21st annual convention of the Texas Farm Bureau in Galveston. The girl chosen Texas Farm Bureau Queen will receive \$500 for herself and a matron escort to attend the 36th annual convention of the American Farm Bureau Federation in December in New York.

Only daughters or sisters of Farm Bureau members are eligible for the contest. To enter the contest, girls must be 16 by Sept. 1, 1954, and not over 22 years of age on that date. Daughters of employees, officers, or directors of either the state or county Farm Bureau organizations are not eligible. Neither are previous state winners.

County Farm Bureaus over the state will begin holding eliminations in July. County winners will compete in 13 district contests to be held Sept. 13-25. District winners and their matron escorts will receive expense-paid trips to the Galveston convention. In addition, the contestants will receive beautiful wrist watches.

HALLIBURTON COMPANY TO HAVE NEW CAMP AND BUILDING HERE

Construction work was ready to begin Saturday on new quarters for the Halliburton Oil Well Cementing Company's Cisco camp, according to an announcement here. The new camp building and yard will be located on Highway 80 at the west edge of town.

Superintendent Mike Cunningham of the Cisco camp expected to have the new quarters available to the company in about six weeks. The camp is being built by Taylor and West of Albany for lease to the Halliburton company. Ground for the camp was sold to the Albany firm by H. N. Thompson of Cisco. The E. P. Crawford Agency handled the deal.

A plot of ground, 200 x 300 ft., will be enclosed to form the yard. A large building will be erected to serve as offices, warehouse and shop for the company. The firm

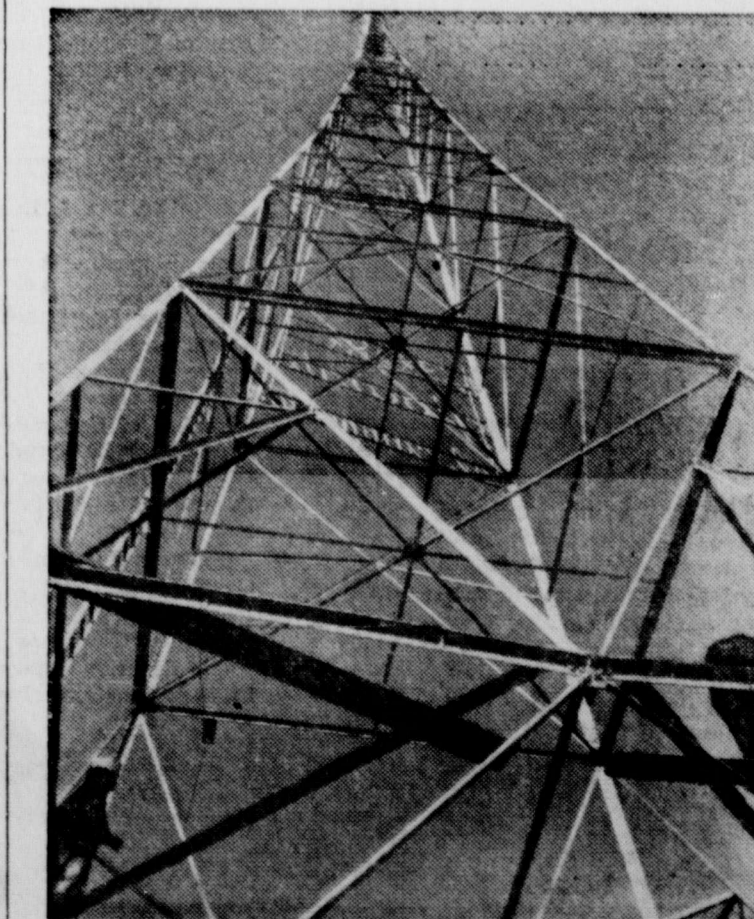
will move from quarters in southeast Cisco to the new location.

The Halliburton company presently employs 26 men in its Cisco camp. Their payroll runs in excess of \$100,000 annually here. Seven huge pump trucks and other equipment are kept at the local camp for oil field work throughout this area.

to prevent his client from acting improperly toward the court or jury, or in his duties as a citizen. These and many other restrictions are voluntarily accepted by the lawyer because the acts forbidden are felt to be unworthy of the high standards of the profession. It is rare that one finds a lawyer who willingly and knowingly departs from the ideals of the code of ethics. It is more strict that the law itself, and many acts which are lawful are frowned upon by the code as improper conduct for attorneys. A lawyer may find himself criticized severely by his fellow lawyers and the courts, or even called before one of the Texas Bar's 31 grievance committees, because he has done something which, though lawful, is contrary to the Canons.

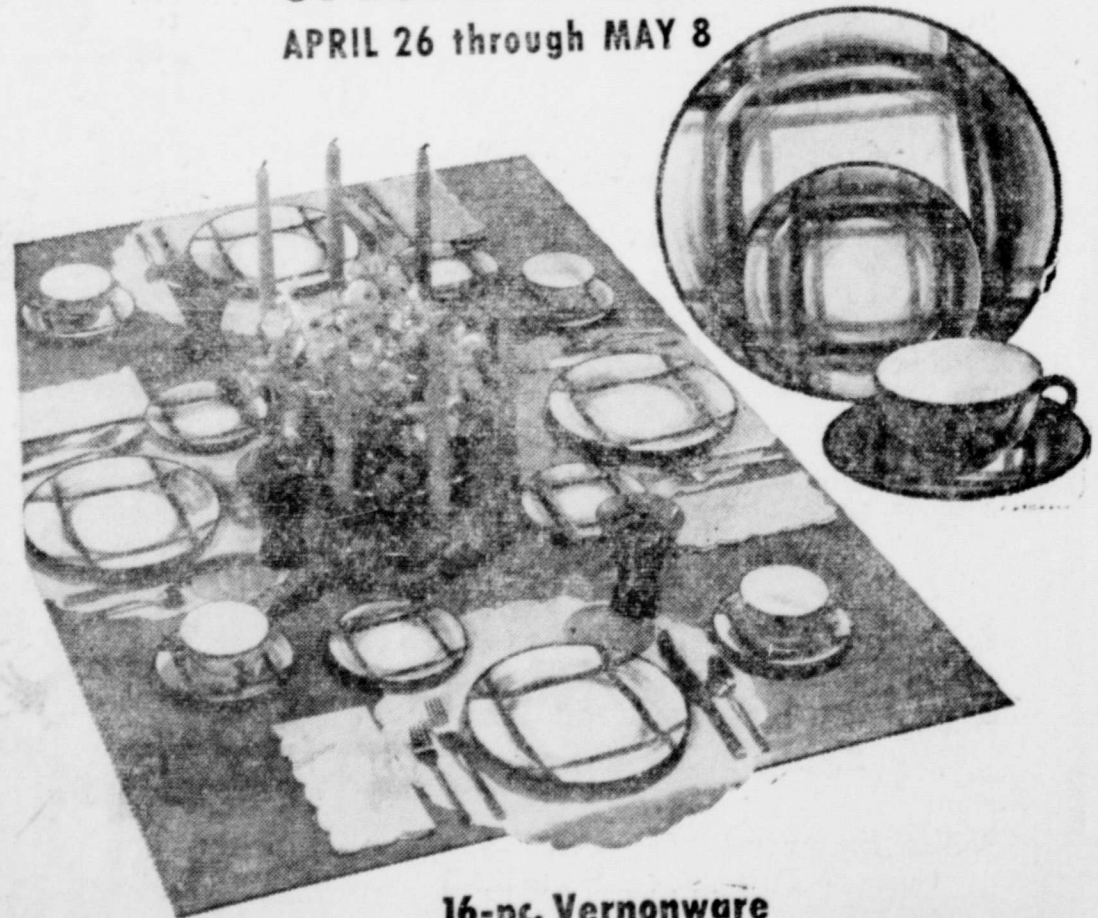

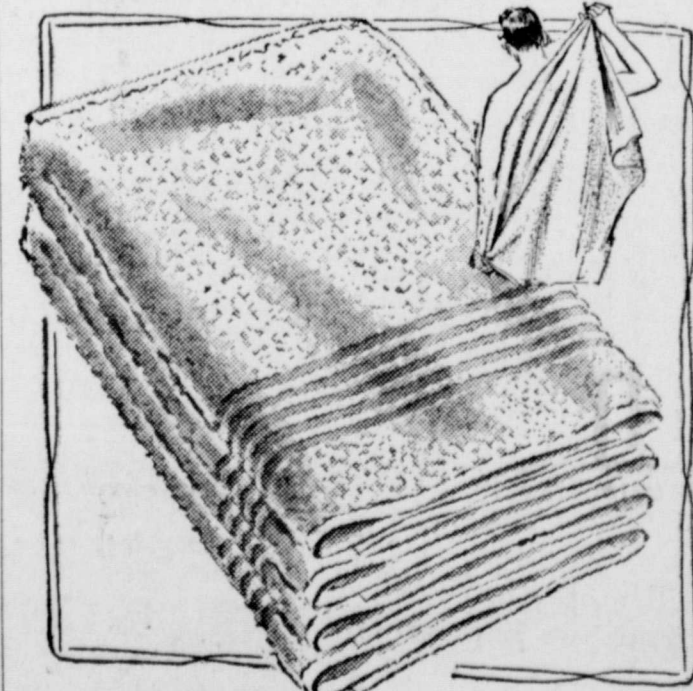
