

Revenue Increased In the fiscal year ended August 31, the State government took in \$790,556,058, or nearly \$55 million more than the total for the previous 12 months. Biggest items in the state's budget are schools (about \$255 million, up \$26 million); welfare about \$158 million, up \$20 mil-
