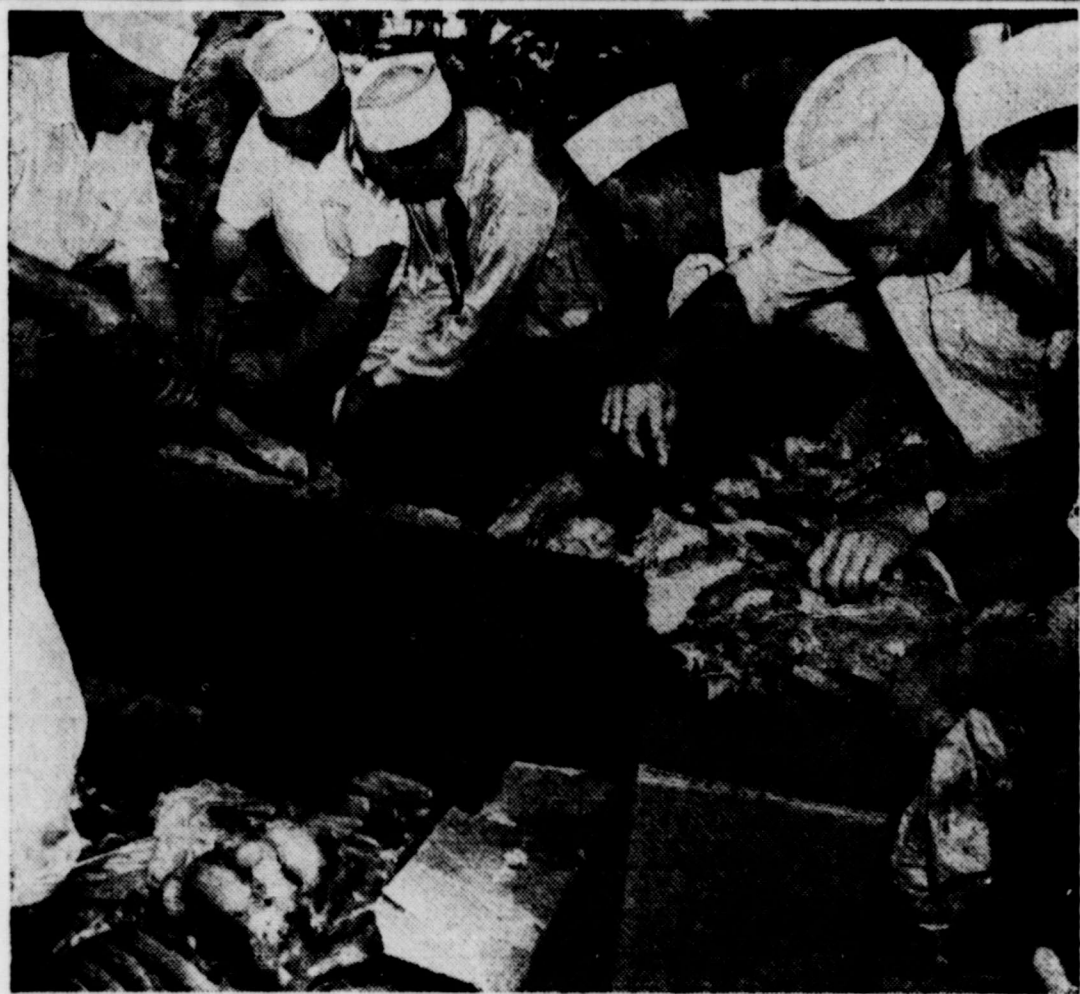

Gain Reported In School Population

The enrollment figure for the Cisco public schools, after the first three weeks of school, showed a slight increase over the beginning figure, Superintendent Arlin Bint said Tuesday.

At the end of the first week of school the enrollment stood at 1,137 and at the end of the first three weeks the figure stood at 1,139.

Mr. Bint said that a few students had dropped out, but that the number of new students moving into town had more than offset the loss. The figure was about 80 more than at the same time last year.

The high school enrollment began with 305 and was the same at the end of three weeks. The gain, he said, is in the lower grades.

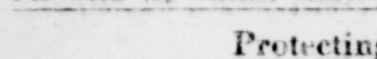
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Protecting Child Life

"We protect wild life. What about child life?" Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, president of the Texas Safety Association, asked this question today as he spoke in behalf of the child traffic safety program being sponsored in Texas this month by the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council.

The rules of good sportsmanship protect our wild birds and animals," he said, "but too often the rules of safety are neglected when it comes to protecting our children on the streets and highways of the nation."

Col. Tilley pointed out that 4,400 children under 15 years of age were killed in traffic last year, and another 225,000 were injured.

"The Texas Safety Association is solidly behind this September traffic safety program," he said. "We want to do everything we can to help educate people to their responsibilities for the safety of youngsters."

Col. Tilley listed eight rules for adults — parents and motorists — to follow to safeguard children in traffic.

Parents should: 1. Set children a good example by crossing streets only at intersections, waiting for the signal, looking both ways and for turning traffic before crossing.

2. Find out what traffic safety education your children are receiving at school and coordinate your own instruction with it.

3. Impress upon children the danger of playing in the street or near moving traffic. See that they play only in approved play areas.

4. See that children are skilled in using outdoor toys such as roller skates, bicycles, scooters, tricycles and wagons, and that the youngsters practice safety rules when using the toys.

Motorists should: 1. Keep a constant look-out for children. Even when children

2. Near school areas be constantly alert for signs, signals, traffic police, school patrols and for children themselves.

3. Decrease speed and increase vigilance when driving near playgrounds and residential areas and other places where children are likely to be found.

4. Don't compete with bike riders. Be ready always to give them the right of way.

Legal Notice

AN ORDINANCE ORDERING AN ELECTION TO DETERMINE WHETHER A COMMISSION SHALL BE CHOSEN TO FRAME A NEW CHARTER, PROVIDING FOR THE ELECTION OF A COMMISSION TO FRAME SUCH CHARTER AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Cisco in Eastland County, Texas, as follows:

(a) That an election be held at the City Hall in the City of Cisco, on the 25th day of September, 1936, to be participated in by the qualified voters of said city, for the purpose of submitting to said qualified voters the question "Shall a Commission be chosen to frame a new charter?" and electing a Commission of fifteen persons to frame such charter, should the majority of the qualified voters voting on said question vote in the affirmative and appointing George Davis judge of said election with authority to appoint such assistants and clerks to assist in holding the same as he may deem necessary.

(b) That said election be held as provided for by the charter of the City of Cisco and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

(c) That the ballot to be used in said election shall be substantially as hereinafter set out:

You may vote for the proposition "Shall a Commission be chosen to frame a new charter?" by writing an X in the box by the word "Yes," or you may vote against the proposition by writing an X in the box by the word "No" as follows:

"SHALL A COMMISSION BE CHOSEN TO FRAME A NEW CHARTER?" () "Yes" () "No"

Regardless of whether you have voted for or against the proposition: "Shall a Commission be chosen to frame a new charter?" vote for a Commission to frame such charter in the event a majority of the voters voting at such election vote in favor of choosing a Commission to frame this charter.

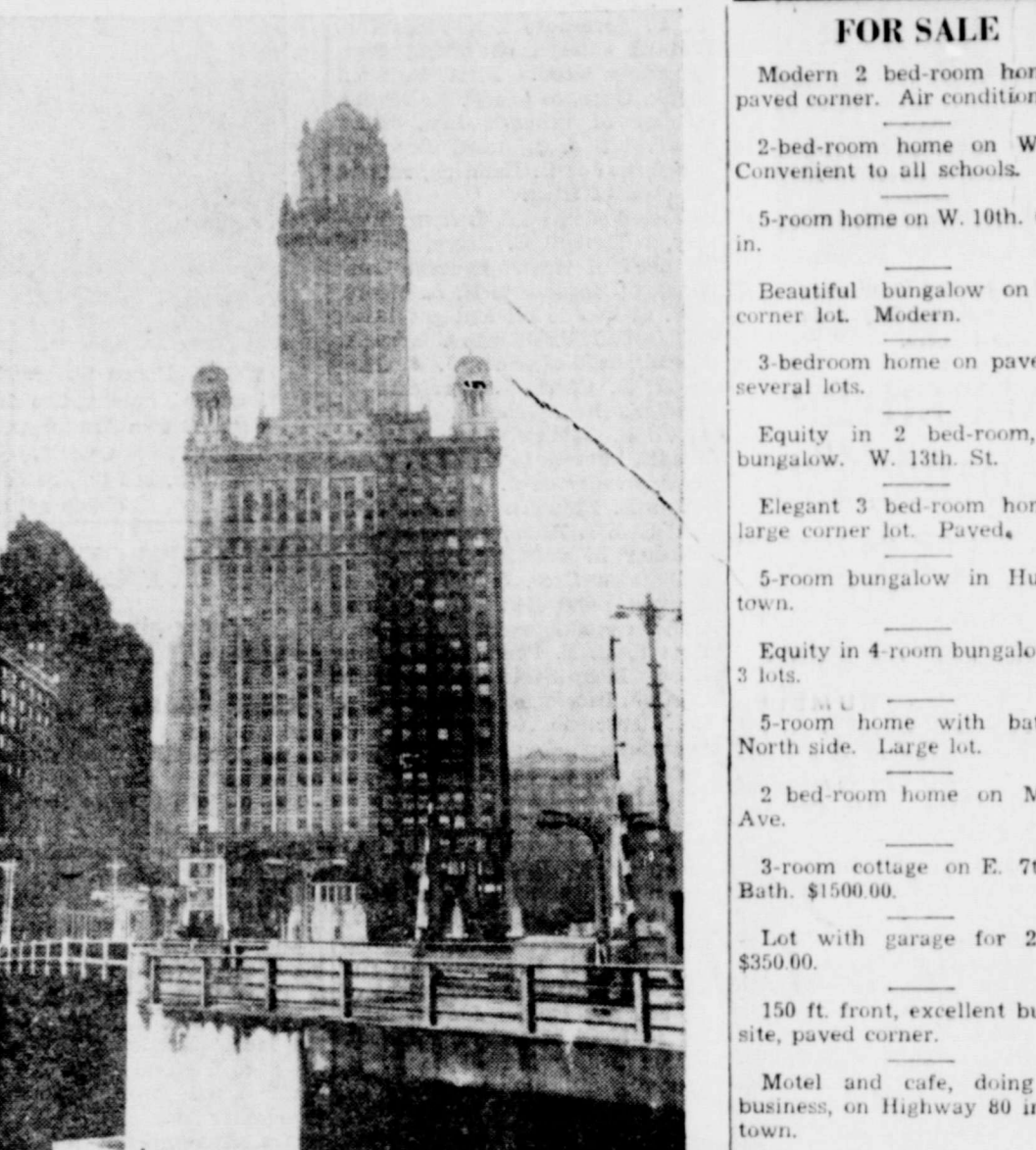
The fifteen persons whose names appear below were selected by the City Commission to serve as a Charter Commission. You may vote for those persons by writing an X in the box by their names or you may vote for other persons by writing their names on the lines opposite the names of the persons selected by the City Commission and drawing a line through the names of the persons you do not wish to vote for; but do not vote for more than fifteen persons. Those selected by the City Commission to frame a new charter in the event a majority of the voters voting at said election vote in favor of choosing a Commission to frame a new charter, are as follows:

(d) That should a majority of the qualified voters voting at said election vote in the affirmative on the question "Shall a Commission be chosen to frame a new charter?" then, after the Charter Commission has completed its work and submitted the new charter a second election shall be held at

the date designated by the Commission chosen to frame the new charter in conformity with the laws governing such election, to determine whether the new charter shall be adopted.

(e) That notice of this election shall be given by publication of a copy of this ordinance signed by the Mayor and attested by the Secretary of the City of Cisco, Texas in each issue of some daily or weekly paper published in the City of Cisco, Texas, for not less than 20 days immediately preceding the date of such election; and the posting of a copy of said ordinance at the City Hall in Cisco and two other public places in said city for not less than 20 days preceding such election.

(f) That the fact the present charter of said City of Cisco is inadequate and the importance of the proposed ordinance creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity for the suspension of the rules requiring ordinances to be read on more than one day and for the immediate taking effect of this ordinance such rules are hereby suspended and it is ordered that this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval.

After said motion was made and seconded the ordinance was read in full and thoroughly discussed by the City Commission. Therefore the Mayor called for a vote upon said motion and Morrison, Cluek, Britain and Hansen Commissioners and Sitton Mayor Protem voted for said motion and 0-0 voted against it. State Capital NEWS

Press Conference

AUSTIN — With the state Democratic convention out of the way, Texans interested in government and politics now turn their attention to the next regular session of the Legislature, coming up in January.

As the lawmakers convene, their principal problem is likely to be raising new taxes, in the amount of \$10 million to \$15 million per year.

Governor Shivers has advocated spending \$5 million more annually for mental and tubercular hospitals.

He also has recommended more spending to continue improvements in the state prison system.

And he favors a state water conservation program.

Money will also be called for to enlarge the highway patrol and to continue paying teacher salaries at the current rate.

In his first press conference since the run-off primary, the governor said that his re-election constituted a re-statement of Texas independence.

To please Texas, the South and Southwest, the national Democratic Party must get back to the middle of the road, Shivers said.

Specifically, he recommended replacement of Stephen Mitchell, national Democratic committee chairman, with a "good, strong, middle of the road man."

It's Not Over

Not ended by the recent gubernatorial election is the long fight between the conservative and the liberal-loyalist Democrats of Texas.

Already preparations are being made for another struggle in 1956, when, as in 1952, the rival candidates in Texas may clash over issues in the presidential campaign.

In Austin as well as in many another city, the conservative forces are setting up a permanent organization to work between elections.

Letters will go out to workers at the precinct level, thanking them for their efforts.

Files will be kept for use as reference when the campaign begins next time.

Labor organizations are also active in the interest of elections two years hence.

Sent out by the UAW-CIO headquarters to all local union leaders in the state was a letter saying "We must, of necessity, prepare ourselves to be able to present our candidate and the issues to each and every voter next time."

Expressed in the letter was regret that Ralph Yarborough, opposing Shivers for the chief executive's job, was defeated.

Campaign Planned

For many years, the continuous political work done by the CIO has been recognized.

Union people work at politics the year round, whereas Texas conservatives have been, in the past, inclined to relax from the political wars between elections.

A significant development is the indication that the conservatives now plan to alter their strategy and try to insure another victory next time by keeping right on the job from now right through the 1956 primaries.

One national columnist, commenting on the Texas election, remarked that the conservatives of this state have finally realized "that a political party cannot be captured by frontal assault. It must be captured by patient, quiet work at the precinct level."

Expenses Reported

Finally reported by both candidates were their expenses for the campaign.

Governor Shivers revealed a total cost of \$285,121, with \$242,087 in donations and no debts or loans outstanding.

Judge Yarborough reported that his campaign expenditures were \$279,722, with \$245,394 in gifts and \$35,258 in debts outstanding.

Donors to Yarborough's campaign put in amounts ranging up to \$10,000, while no individual contributor to Shivers' race gave more than \$500, according to the reports.

Agency Reorganized

Re-organization in the Texas Education Agency's high officialdom came about as the result of the resignation of L. P. Sturgeon, associate commissioner of education, who will become public relations director for the Texas State Teachers Association.

Moving up in the agency will be Warren Hitt, who becomes deputy commissioner of education; Bascom Hayes, who will be assistant commissioner for instruction; and M. A. Browning, who becomes assistant commissioner for vocational education.

Dr. J. W. Edgar, commissioner of education, recommended the changes.

Also selected was a new superintendent for the Austin School for the Deaf, John F. Grace, who had been principal of Gallaudet School for the Deaf in St. Louis. Grace succeeds Roy M. Steele, who moved to Colorado.

Revenue Increased

In the fiscal year ended August 31, the State government took in \$790,556,058, or nearly \$55 million more than the total for the previous 12 months.

Biggest items in the state's budget are schools (about \$255 million, up \$26 million); welfare (about \$158 million, up \$20 mil-

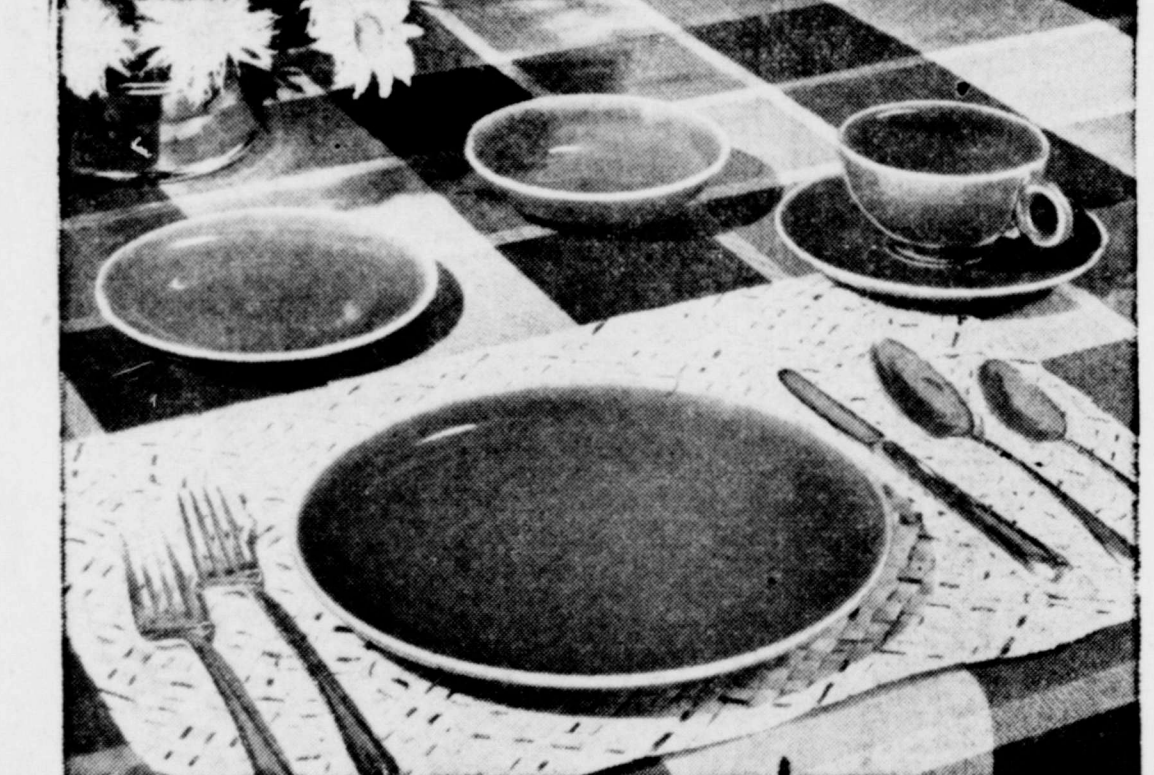

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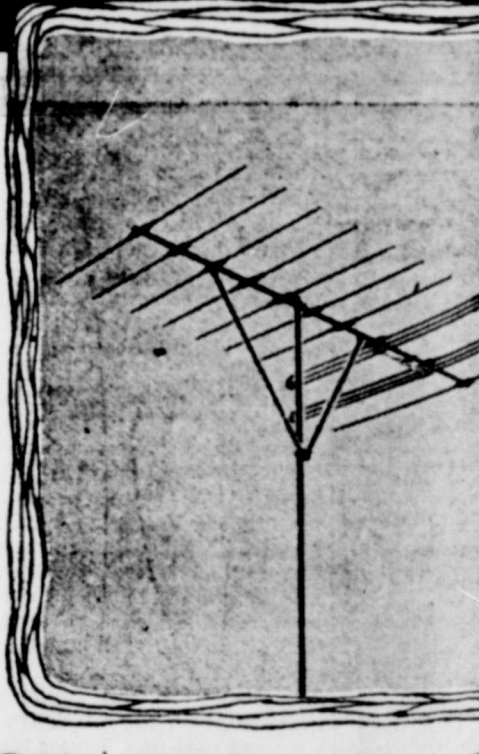
