LOCAL GIRL GOES TO HOSPITAL AS YEAR'S FIRST POLIO CASE

Polio struck for the first time this year in Cisco this week when five-year old Laura Lee Thames was admitted to the polio ward at the Hendricks Memorial Hospital in Abilene after it was determined that she was suffering from the disease.

Preliminary examination showed that the child, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Thames, 1605 Avenue D, had infantile paralysis in a comparatively light form. She became ill Wednesday and was examined by Cisco physicians who diagnosed the case as polio and referred her to the Abilene polio center for further examination. Specialists in Abilene confirmed the original diagnosis, and she was admitted to the polio ward.

Attending specialists said that it would be some two weeks before a comprehensive estimate of the damage could be made, but that prompt diagnosis and treatment, they believed, would arrest further damage. Laura Lee is a sister of Carrol

Large Crowd Due At Chesley Field For Ranger Game

A capacity crowd is expected at Chesley Field at 8 p. m. Friday (tonight) as the Loboes of Cisco High School open the 1954 district AA-high conference campaign in a football game with the Bulldogs of Ranger High School.

A half-time highlight of the game will be the coronation of the Lobo football queen and the Lobo Band sweetheart. Identity of the football queen and the band sweetheart will not be known until the ceremonies. The bands of both Cisco and Ranger schools will have a part in the half-time program.

The football queen was named in balloting held this week by members of the Lobo squad, and the band sweetheart was elected by popular vote of band members. Director Harold Thomas and the band have been practicing all week for special half-time activities.

Co-Captains Arzell Hale and Marcus Gallegos will present the football queen and a band member will be selected to escort the band sweetheart. Both girls will be members of the senior class.

A large crowd of students and fans turned out Thursday night for a bonfire and pep rally at the Community Gym. Enthusiasm aplenty was generated for the game. A final student-led pep rally was planned for 3 p. m. today.

Although the Ranger Bulldogs have been given a slight edge in pre-game forecasts, a hard fought game is expected all the way. Both teams have won three and lost two games this season. The Bulldogs, who won the state class A title last year, hold a slight weight advantage over the Lobo eleven.

Ranger is expected to bring a large delegation of fans to Cisco for the contest.

The two teams did not play last year. In 1952, Ranger won a 28-14 victory. The Bulldogs beat Cisco 20 to 7 in 1951 and 14 to 0 in 1950, leaving the Loboes with a lot of avenging to do.

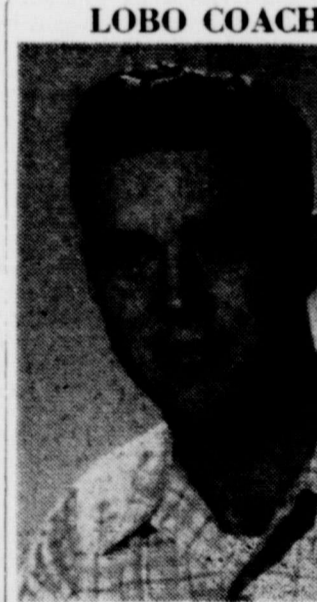

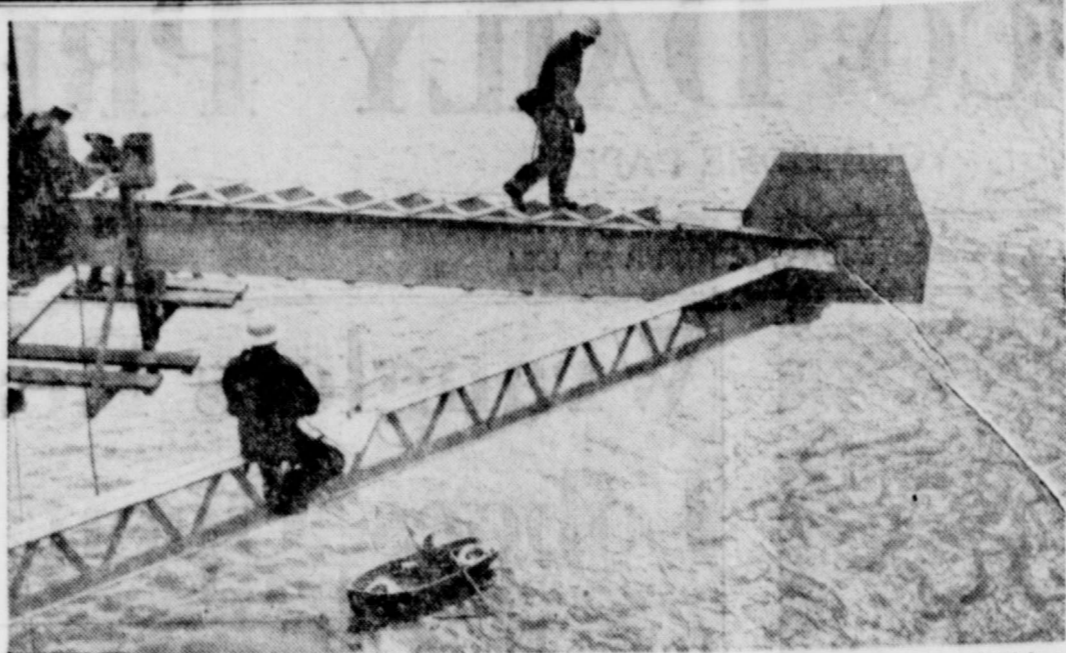

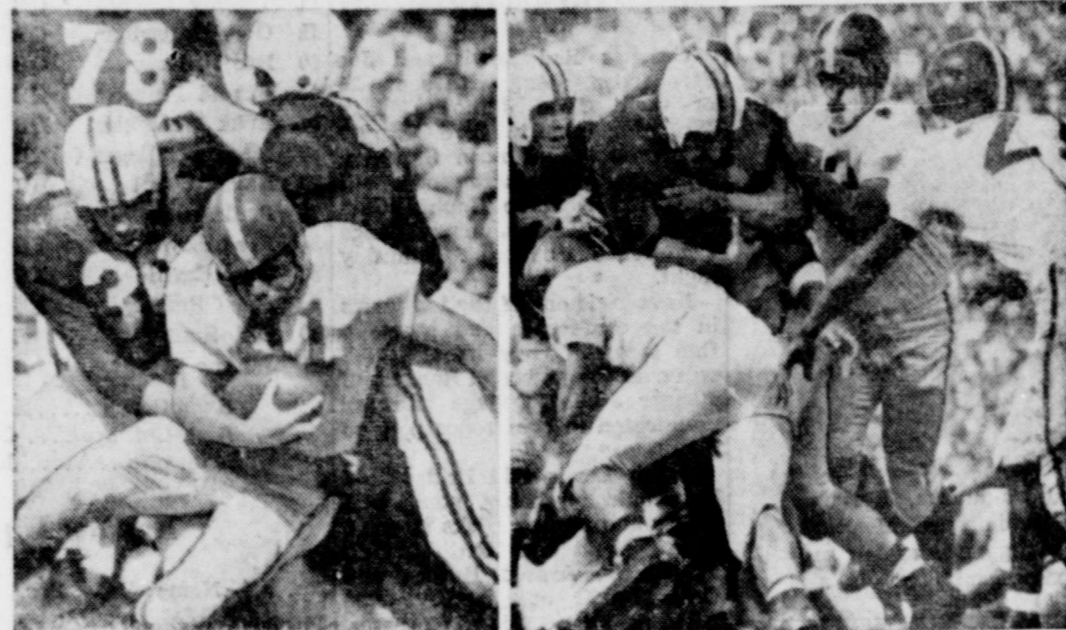

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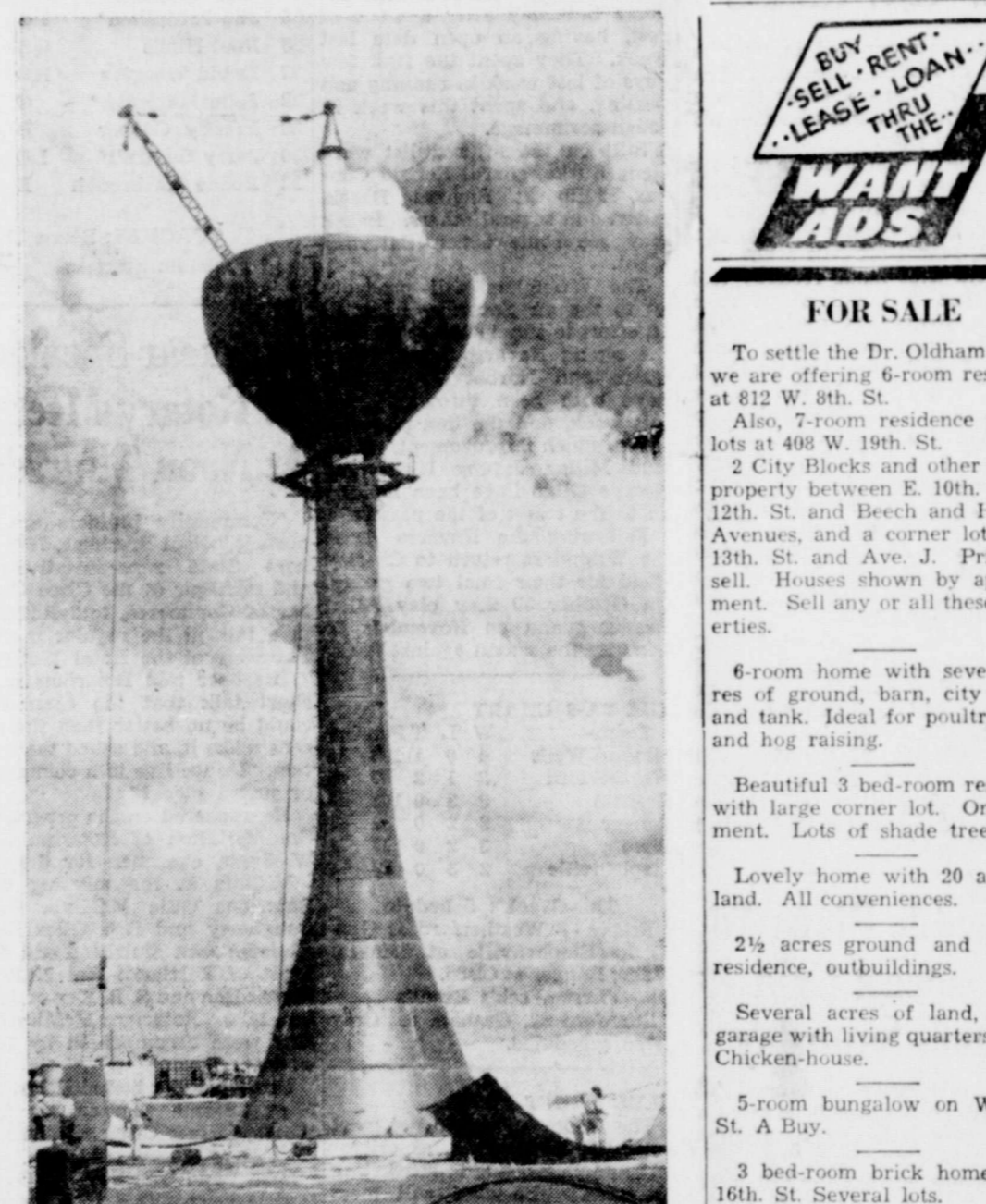

Legume Planting Work Near Peak In Most Sections

AUSTIN, Oct. 22. — Wheat, oats, barley and winter legume planting was near a peak this week as farmers rushed planting before the scant moisture got away. Unseasonably hot weather with many stations reporting 90 to 95 degree temperatures early in the week stimulated plant growth but also rapidly dissipated the already short surface moisture over much of the State.

Temperatures dropped abruptly at the end of the week as the first cold front of the season

swept down-State further drying surface soils. Lows of 32 degrees were recorded at a few high plains points with light frost in scattered localities but winds prevented frost over much of that area.

Wheat planting on the high plains was nearing completion. Acreage dry planted prior to early October showers was up and that acreage which came up in early September was making fair to good growth but needs additional moisture. On the west side of the low rolling plains, most wheat is planted in earlier up to a fair stand but on the east side of the low plains and west Cross Timbers counties, moisture was urgently needed.

In the northern blacklands wheat planting was in full swing

with ample moisture to assure germination and early growth. Oat planting was active over the eastern half of the state. Acreage dusted in prior to the early October showers was generally up to fair to good stands. In some central, southern and southeastern counties, however, army worms were moving in.

Cotton harvest was in full swing throughout the northwest and in the Trans-Pecos. In central, east and north Texas, good progress was made in winding up harvest of this crop. Grain sorghum combining continued active in northwest areas. In a few high plains counties harvest is about half or more completed and is nearing completion in the low rolling plains.

Fall sorghums in southern counties and scattered late forage crops elsewhere were showing improvement after recent rains. Sweetpotatoes in east Texas also were making some response to improved moisture. Late peanuts were helped in northern commercial areas. Harvest of the short pecan crop was becoming general.

Fall range and pasture grass made rapid development in northern blacklands, northeastern and extreme southern counties where

moisture from early October rains was ample and the summertime temperatures early in the week stimulated growth. In most other areas, these high temperatures took much of the scant moisture before grass had time to make appreciable development.

A very large oats acreage for pasture has been planted over the eastern half of the State and some is up but rain is needed to keep it coming along. Some early planted high plains wheat will soon be ready for light grazing. Stalk fields on the high plains were being grazed. Contracted calves carrying a mid-October delivery date were moving in volume to Corn Belt feeders.

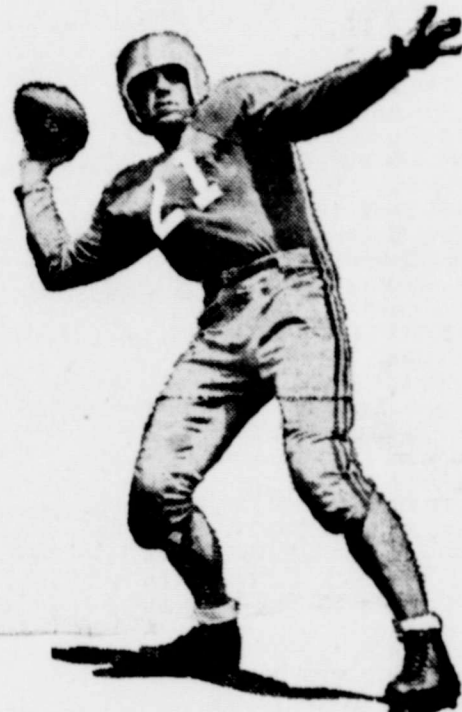
