

### Ford Dealers To All Officers Are Re-elected Show New Models In Nov. 12 Event At Ranchers' Annual Meeting Dallas, Nov. 6.- A completely

new body which required changing 570 major welding fixtures in Ford Division's assembly plants across the country, will make its appearance on the 1955 Ford passenger cars to be introduced Friday, November 12.

Ford Division revealed that more than 18 months ago Ford manufacturing engineers began the design of new fixtures for its 1955 bodies. The cars will feature a new full-vision wraparound windshield. Windshield side pillars have been moved back to provide drivers with a 96 degree arc of forward vision --nine degrees more than this year's models.

The new body styling, inspired by Ford's famous Thunderbird personal car, has the lowest overall height ever offered in Ford sedan. Crown Victorias will be only 4 feet, 10.2 inches high. Sedans are 1.3 inches lower than last year with no loss of headroom. An entirely new chassis also was designed to make the reduced height possible. In 1955, Ford will offer 16 body

styles, two more than in its 1954 line and more than any other car in its price range. Besides completely new bodies,

the 1955 Fords will offer improved ball-joint suspension which Ford introduced in its 1954 models, and an advancement in t s Foardomatic transmission which will provide exceptionally fast getaway.
