Civil Service To Fill Vacancies In Federal Agencies

The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced that persons are urgently needed for filling physical science and engineering aid positions in various agencies ranging from \$2,950 to \$4,205 a year offer qualified applicants excellent opportunity for immediate employment.

The optional fields for physical science aid positions include chemistry, geology, physics, mathematics, metallurgy, and other branches of physical sciences except meteorology. The engineering aid positions include the following options: aeronautical, architectural, civil, electrical, mechanical, radio, structural, and general.

No written test is required. Applicants may qualify on the basis of appropriate education or experience, or a combination of education and experience.

Persons interested in these positions may get further information and application forms from the Cisco Post Office or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. Applications will be accepted until further notice by the Commission's Washington office.

Hunters Sending Hides To Hospital

AUSTIN, Dec. 13.—Deer hunters are asked to throw a handful of common table salt on the hides they send TB hospital patients.

The request came today from the man who ought to know, L. M. Rathbone, Austin taxidermist, who is receiving the hides for the patients.

Mr. Rathbone says the hides coming in at the rate of 10 to 15 a day are of excellent quality and most are arriving in good shape. But he says the salt will insure against spoilage.

The Volunteer Advisory Council for Texas TB Hospitals will pay for the tanning. Mr. Rath-

bone is handling the hides free of charge.

Mrs. Helen Smith of Austin, council chairman, asks that the hides be marked "Charity," addressed to Mr. Rathbone at 2708 South Lamar, Austin, and shipped by motor freight.

She says where this procedure is followed all of the major freight lines are hauling the hides free of charge.

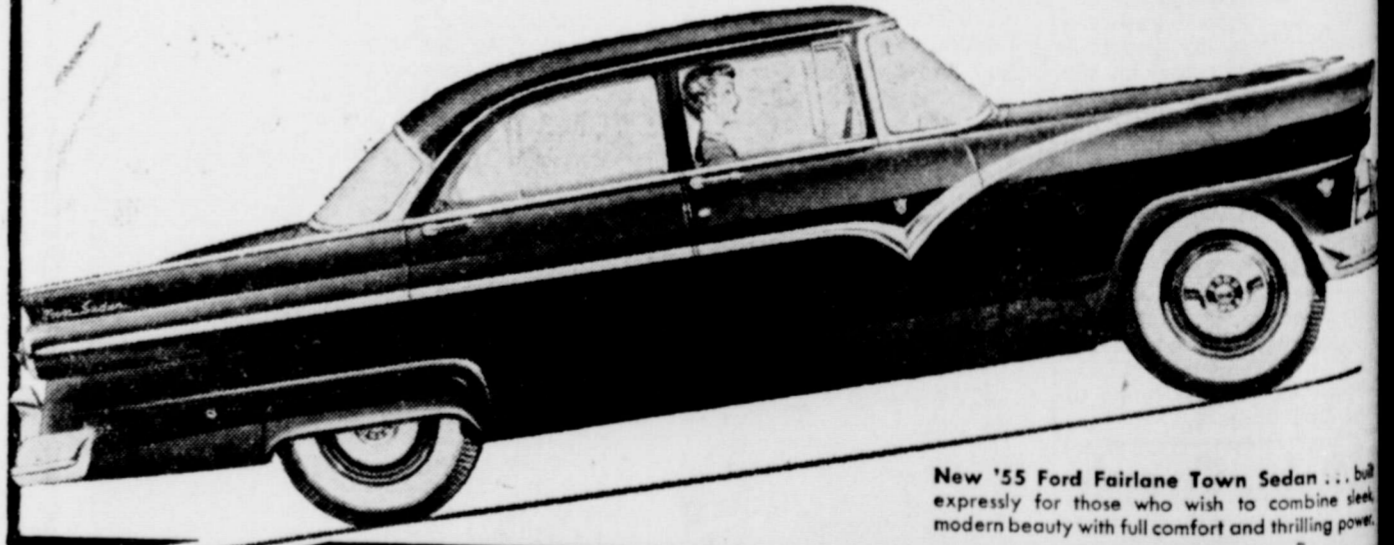
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
