"FATHER CHRISTMAS" is a title which should be given to Charles Dickens who, in 1843, penned A Christmas Carol, the story which has become so much a part of the celebration of Christ's birth that the Reader's Digest calls it "The Second Greatest Christmas Story Ever Told."

Charles Dickens (1812-1870) grew up in poverty, one of eight children, whose father spent much of his time in debtor's prison. Charles had to go to work at a very young age, at a time when children worked 12 hours a day in the factories. In fact, only two days were allowed "off" during the year, Good Friday and Christmas.

His love of books led him to spend his spare time in libraries. This mostly self-educated man became a newspaper reporter at the young age of 18 and a few years later he began submitting freelance articles to various newspapers under the pen name of Boz.

It was the custom in those days to have narrative stories published as a serial in the newspapers. The first serial published under Dickens' own name was Pickwick Papers, followed by Nicholas Nickelby. Around 1839 he became editor of a magazine and began publishing his own serial novels.

He was captivated by the American author Washington Irving and read every word that Irving wrote. He was priviledged to meet Irving while on a trip to the United States in 1842.

The Spirit of Christmas was one of his favorite themes running throughout many of his stories. He carried a child's excitement of Christmas with him into adulthood perhaps because his own childhood years had been so dreary.

Traditional festivities of the Yuletide had been banned in England in 1652 because the Puritans felt the celebration was excessive and had pagan origins. But Christmas was still being celebrated in the English countryside and was becoming popular once again during Dickens' childhood years.

The very first Christmas Card was published in 1843, the same year that Dickens wrote A Christmas Carol. His epic story describing Scrooge's confrontation with the ghosts of Christmases Past, Present and Yet to Come, was an immediate popular success but was a financial failure for Dickens because of production costs. He was, by then, a married man with four children (he was eventually to father seven little Dickenses).

In addition to his popular writings, Dickens was in demand as an entertainer. He was an amateur magician and enjoyed putting on shows which included readings of his stories. He would play all the characters in the story, using different vocal inflections for each.

By the late 1860s his writing began to suffer because he found that he could make more money by touring as an actor doing his readings. In 1867, at the height of his fame, he earned about \$140,000 during a five-month tour of America. Shortly afther that, his health began to fail and he was forced to give up his beloved readings. At his final public appearance in 1870 he told his audience that it was with "considerable pain and regret" that he must close that episode of his life. He died three months later at age 58.

Through the power of the written word, Dickens was able, in his lifetime, to bring to light many of the social evils and injustices of the time, such as the debtor's prison and child labor. But he is best rememberd for his wonderful stories which surround the Christmas festivities of Merry Old England.

His daughter Mamie once said that "Christmas, to my father, was a time dearer than any other part of the year." The title of "Father Christmas" would be a fitting tribute to Charles Dickens, the man who bequeathed us all so much Christmas cheer through his writings.



FmHA Loans To Be Streamlined, State Official Says Here

loans will be streamlined under the new system, Ellis said. considerably beginning January 1, 1994, making for much quicker important. In the past, farmers approval or disapproval of loan often went ahead with buying seed applications, according to an announcement in Friona Wednesday by a state FmHA chief.

George Ellis, state director for the Farmers Home Administration, said that the bulk of the application work would be done at the county level, and a reduction of the paperwork and time involved in the loan applications was expected.

"In former years, farmers had to wait six months, a year, or two years to get a loan approved or disapproved," Ellis said during a press conference Wednesday afternoon at the old Santa Fe Depot in downtown Friona.

"Timeliness of the loans is very or other supplies, only to have their loan applications turned down. This hurts those businesses who may have extended credit to the farmer seeking the loan," the FmHA official said.

Ellis did not speculate how long the loan applications would take in the future, only that they should be considerably expedited.

The native of Southland in Garza county stated that a main part of his agenda for rural Texas would be to improve the value-added industry in this area, such as in the feeding industry.

"We have 5.5 million head of

this area, yet we are not getting the value-added money, through the tanning industry and manufacturing of leather goods, that we could. We need to start finishing more of our products ourselves," Ellis said.

Ellis also said that wind and solar energy need to be an important industry for this area. He said he was working with the Lower Colorado River Authority and others to help form an energy company in the Davis Mountains.

"This area could provide 10 per cent of the nation's energy needs,, with its wide-open spaces and its high level of solar days. The profits from this type of industry goes to the landowners, just as in mineral rights," the FmHA official said.

Testimony Ends In Local Assault Trial

Testimony ended Thursday in Farwell in the Donna Hall trial in 287th District Court. Mrs. Hall is accused of aggravated assault, accused of pouring sulfuric acid over her ex-husband, Kevin Hall,

If convicted of the third-degree felony, Mrs. Hall could be sentenced to a maximum of 10 years in state prison, District Attorney Johnny Actkinson said.

Donna Hall's attorney, Floyd Holder of Lubbock, said that the actions of his client last February 13 in dousing her husband was prompted by physical, emotional and sexual abuse at the hands of Kevin Hall.

During the two-day trial, Holder attempted to show that what happened the night of February 13 was not totally unprovoked.

"They had had problems off and on for a year. We will show that her husband was having an affair prior to this, and their relationship consisted of a prior abusive cycle by Kevin toward Donna," Holder said in his opening remarks.

The defense attorney said that Mrs. Hall poured the acid on her exhusband in an effort to protect herself, and because she merely wanted him to get out of the house.

But Kevin Hall, whose head and chest were doused with sulfuric acid, testified that he heard his wife say she was going to kill him.

"I told her I didn't come home to argue, and I wasn't going to argue. Then she left the room," Hall said during the first day of testimony.

Mrs. Hall was accused of kneeling over her husband as he lay naked in bed and dumping a jug of acid on him.

Hall suffered third-degree burns over most of his upper torso during the attack, and spent about two months in Lubbock's University Medical Center.

The Halls had been in the process of separating when the incident occurred. They divorced in August after 11 years of marriage.

Mrs. Hall's son, Rick Perkins, committed suicide four months prior to the acid incident. Details of the suicide were discussed in Thursday's testimony.

Donna Hall's daughter, Christina Gibbins, testified as a defense witness. She said that Kevin treated Rick "like trash. He would tell

"What did she say when she left Rick he was worthless and no good," Christina said.

It was pointed out that Rick Perkins left a suicide note saying "Mother, please don't look for me. Have Kevin do it. Forgive everybody. It's nobody's fault," the note was quoted.

Dr. John Griswald of Lubbock testified about the extent of Kevin Hall's burns, saying that he has required seven surgeries. It was lifethreatening, and the costs have exceded \$300,000, Dr. Griswald

During her re-examination period on Thursday, Donna Hall said she thought about using a gun, but decided against it. She also thought about using a baseball bat.

"I thought that if I threw the acid on him, he wouldn't be able to hurt me," she

Also on Thursday, Suzanne Foley of Lubbock, a counselor, testified that in her opinion, Donna Hall was "a battered woman."

SWCD Gives Ideas For Quail Habitat

Good quail habitat consists of a piece of ground capable of providing at least one covey with all its needs, season after season. Quail must have a year-round adequate supply of food and 79452. protection.

Quail inhabit idle fields, abandoned farmsteads, crop fields with weedy edges, pasture and rangeland. Nesting, loafing, escape and protective cover near feeding areas are necessary.

Loafing or resting cover is used during the middle of the day between feeding periods. Low growing woody plants provide loafing cover. In situations where native cover is inadequate or has been destroyed, cover should be planned to front the maximum feeding area. This can be brush piles or plantings of some desirable species. Desirable species include eastern red cedar, russian olive, plum, skunkbush sumac and nanking cherry.

Nesting, roosting and brood rearing habitat generally should be no more than two feet tall at maturity. Blue grama, sideoats grama and plains bluestem provide good herbaceous cover.

Water requirements are generally met from the food consumed, dew or surface water.

Windbreak trees and wildlife packets containing russian olive, plum, skunkbush sumac and nanking cherry are available from the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Add half of the flour, the sugar, molasses, egg, vinegar, baking powder, ginger, baking soda, cinnamon and cloves. Beat until thoroughly combined. Beat in the remaining flour. Cover and chill for 3 hours or until the dough is easy to handle. Divide the dough in half. On a lightly floured surface, roll half of the dough to 1/4-inch thick. Cut with peopleshaped cookie cutters. Carefully place the cut-outs 1 inch apart on a greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 degrees for 6 to 8 minutes or until the edges are lightly browned. Decorate with icing and candies. Makes 12 to 18 gingerbread people.



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

She was born in Haskell, Texas, June 27, 1909 and moved to Friona in 1932 from Childress


She married Charles Veazey in 1922. He preceded her in death in October of 1948. She married Richard Talley in 1951 in Clovis, N.M. He passed away April 18,





Par Value, Stated Value And Market Value Are Not Related

Look closely at almost any stock certificate, and you will see a stated par value printed on it. Par value has no relation to the market value of the stock, so what is it, and why is it there?

Par value is an assigned amount (typically \$1) used to compute the accounting value of the common shares on a company's balance sheet. At one time, par value represented the original investment behind each share of stock. That investment could be cash, goods or services. Today, par value has little significance--it's there because, for many years, laws have required that common stock state its par value.

Originally, par value represented the limit of a shareholder's liability. In an effort to make owning stock more attractive, corporations gradually reduced the par value to insignificant amounts. Why not eliminate it completely? Some states tax "no-par' stock. By reducing par value, it becomes inconsequential yet still evades the

The difference between the par value of a stock and its market value is generally inscribed on the corporate books as a separate account designated "paid in surplus." As long as the stock sells for more than the stated par, it is regarded as "fully paid and nonassessable." This is declared on the stock certificate.

This "nonassessable" clause was designed to prevent fraud where stockholders could be liable for the difference between par value and what they paid for the stock. Such fraudulent stock came to be known as watered stock, named for the common fraud of selling Florida land that was under water.

"no-par value stock." In these cases, the stock is assigned a "stated value" for accounting purposes. For example, a company that states its value at \$1 a share and has ten million shares outstanding would have a stated value of \$10 million. This is credited to the capital stock account and is the legal capital of the corporation.

Stated value offers stockholders a measure of protection against loss of value because state laws generally prohibit a corporation from paying dividends or repurchasing shares when doing so would impair its legal capital.

Stated value and par value are similar in that neither has any relation to market value. For the most part, you can disregard both values in your investment planning. On the other hand, if you decide to curl up one late summer evening to read your stock certificates, you now understand the language.



More Light To See By

There's a physical reason why folks need more light to see by as they age. The pupil gets smaller, limiting the amount of light striking the retina. In some people, the

problem is compounded from a developing cataract, which also blocks light.

One solution is more light: intensify room lighting, or move lamps closer to one's visual task. To avoid glare and shadows from a pen or pencil, place light over the left shoulder of a right-handed person, over the right shoulder of a lefty. A flashlight helps in low-lit areas, especially at night.

A more basic way to improve senior sight, though, is to schedule regular optometric exams and move to a stronger eyeglass prescription when appropriate. Some folks get a more powerful pair of glasses for safer night-time driving.
