# Suggest Code Changes

(Editor's note: The following is the draft of suggestions which the five-man committee drew up for action by the city commission. Members are Chairman R. L. Fleming, Glen C. Stevick, Kenyth Cass, Dan Lacewell, and Weldon Dickson. The city commission voted Monday night to put the suggestions into effect.)

The committee appointed by the mayor to study the needs of codes, permits, etc., for the City of Friona submits the following suggestions:

That the City of Friona has no need for a code pertaining to foundations and types of materials used in the construction of dwellings. If dwellings should be built in restricted areas, then dwellings shall be built to comply with the restric-

There shall be no permits or inspections required for the maintenance of one's residence or commercial building.

Electrical code shall be left as is now written. Inspections on electrical wiring shall be made when all wiring is finished and fixtures are hung. If wiring does not conform to the code and additional inspections are required the fee shall be \$10 for each additional inspection until wiring meets code requirements. This pertains to residence and commercial buildings

Plumbing code shall be revised on the water test to read "four feet above floor level" instead of full length stack. Balance of code to be left as now written. Plumbing inspections shall be left as are now required. Sewer tap shall be \$20 and contractor shall use riser on sewer line if one is in the alley adjacent to the property. If contractor refuses to use available riser he shall pay cost of tap.
