## Important Amend-

ment That Should Carry By Voters

House Joint Resolution 30,
passed by the Thirty-fourth Leg. islature, submits an amendment to the State Constitution to be voted on by the people at the
general election to be held in November, 1916, providing that
the Legislature may enact a law permitting common and indepen dent school districts to levy a
local school tax not to exceed one dollar on the one hundred dollars assessed property val
uation by a majority vote of the qualified taxpaying voters of the district, and also permitting tax of fifty cents on the one hun dred dollars of assessed proper ty valuation to supplement the county school funds if a majority of the qualified property taxpay ing voters
to do so.
ment does not, therefore, im
pose a tax upon anyone, but removes the constitutional handicap, which forbids many local. hes, having efticient schools, districts and counties where hey desire to do so to provide dequate financial support from heir own funds for the proper maintenance of their own schools In many sections of the State the schools are suffering serious $y$ on account of insufficient unds. The people of such sec tions desire better schools for heir child ren but the constituion stands in the way. Is this
tight? If you do not need the amendment in your county or
istrict, will you not help your ellow citizen in some other se tion who does need it?
The adoption of this amend ment does not impose a tax upon anyone, but insures a better school system for those who need the tax and vote it upon
