Shop Local Promotion Continues

Local shoppers are reminded that Friona's Christmas "Shop Locally" celebration continues, with \$700 in Friona cash awaiting six lucky shoppers.

Nineteen local merchants are participating in the promotion. A shopper's card is stamped once for each \$5 spent with participating merchants. Filled cards are then turned in to the Chamber of Commerce office.

The drawing will be held on December 22. The grand prize is \$200 in Friona cash, and second prize is \$150. Two prizes of \$100 will be given, and two of \$75.00.

New Texas Atlas Now Available

Starting Monday, "The Roads of Texas" atlas will be on sale at The Friona Star office. This 168-page atlas of the Lone Star State contains maps that show just about every city and community, county and local roads, lakes, streams, dams, historic sites, golf courses, cemeteries, and of course, all the highways in the state.

The staff members of the Texas A&M Cartographics Laboratory produced the maps which were then published in atlas form by Shearer Publishing of Fredericksburg. The atlas provides a birds-eye view of about 1,750 square miles of the state on each page. But that's not all.

You can learn about "Ghost Towns of Texas," "Texas Forts and Missions," "Famous Native Texans," "50 Texans Who Made A Difference," plus several other categories of state information.

The Friona Post Office window will be open on Saturday mornings, December 10 and December 17. The window will be open from 9-10 a.m.

The Postal Service reminds you to heed the ABC's of package wrapping this holiday:

"A"--address clearly both sender and recipient including zip code--using indelible ink.

"B"--box appropriately: fiberboard boxes, reinforced bags, tubes, 20 pounds or less need a box rated at 125 pounds strength; 40 pound parcels get a box rated at 175 pounds strength; 65 pound parcels need a box rated at 200 pounds strength.

"C"--cushioning distributes and absorbs shocks and vibrations--suitable types include shredded paper, polystyrene, bubble plastic or popcorn.

Wintry Blast Leaves Three Inch Snowfall

The first major snowstorm of the season hit the area Wednesday night, bringing cold temperatures and blizzard-like conditions to the area.

A total of three inches of snow was measured in Friona, and the moisture content came to .41 inches. This is the first moisture received during the month of December, and the most moisture since September.

The measurement brought the year's total moisture in Friona to 19.79 inches.

Residents awoke to a two-inch snowfall which had drifted badly on Thursday morning, and city streets and area highways were slick.

A woman had her vehicle turn over near Black, and was brought to Parmer County Community Hospital by Friona Ambulance Service.

Santos Gonzales, 54, of Friona, was hospitalized overnight. X-rays determined that she sustained no broken bones from her accident, which was a single-car rollover.

Jim Bishop and Craig Hunt of the Texas DPS investigated the accident.

In another mishap, two trucks slid together near the Allsup's store on East Highway 60, but very little damage was noted.

Friona Police Chief Lloyd Niece said that his department also worked a "fender bender" on the Friona High School parking lot.

"Overall, we were pretty lucky, and drivers apparently drove carefully," Niece said.

A Friona school bus had to be pulled out of a drift after becoming stuck, and was late on Thursday. The bus route was in the Black vicinity.

The Friona area was hit by one of the coldest December cold spells in its history last week, when the temperature fell to an official low of nine degrees below zero on Saturday. It was the first time in the 17 years that records have been kept by the City of Friona for the reading to fall below zero during December.

Seven arrests were made--four out-of-town warrants; one trespass (Santa Fe); one burglary; and one for no insurance.

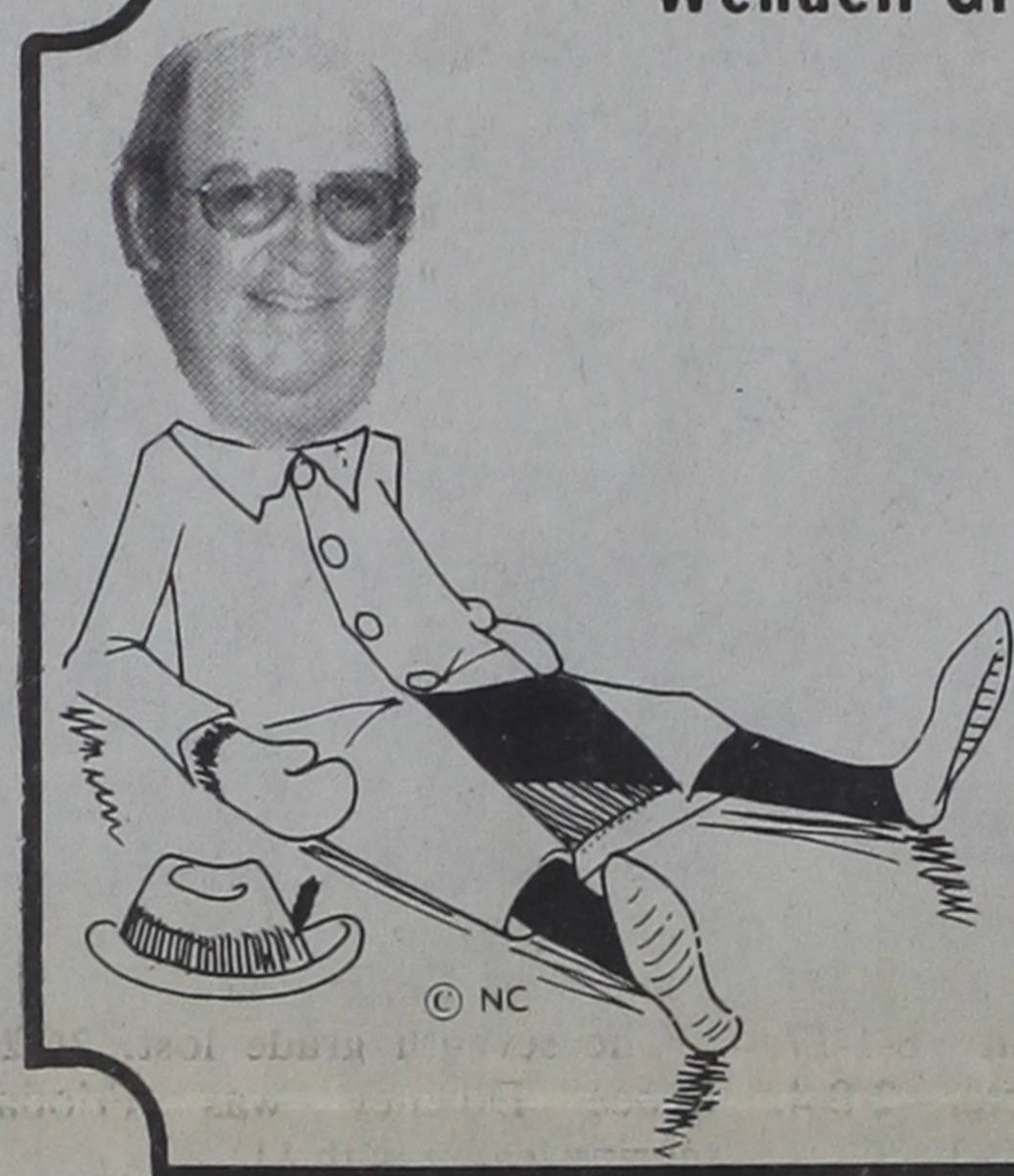
Seven man nights were spent in

Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.

Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.

Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.

Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.

Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.

If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).

Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.

Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.

Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.

Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.

Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.

When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.

Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.

Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

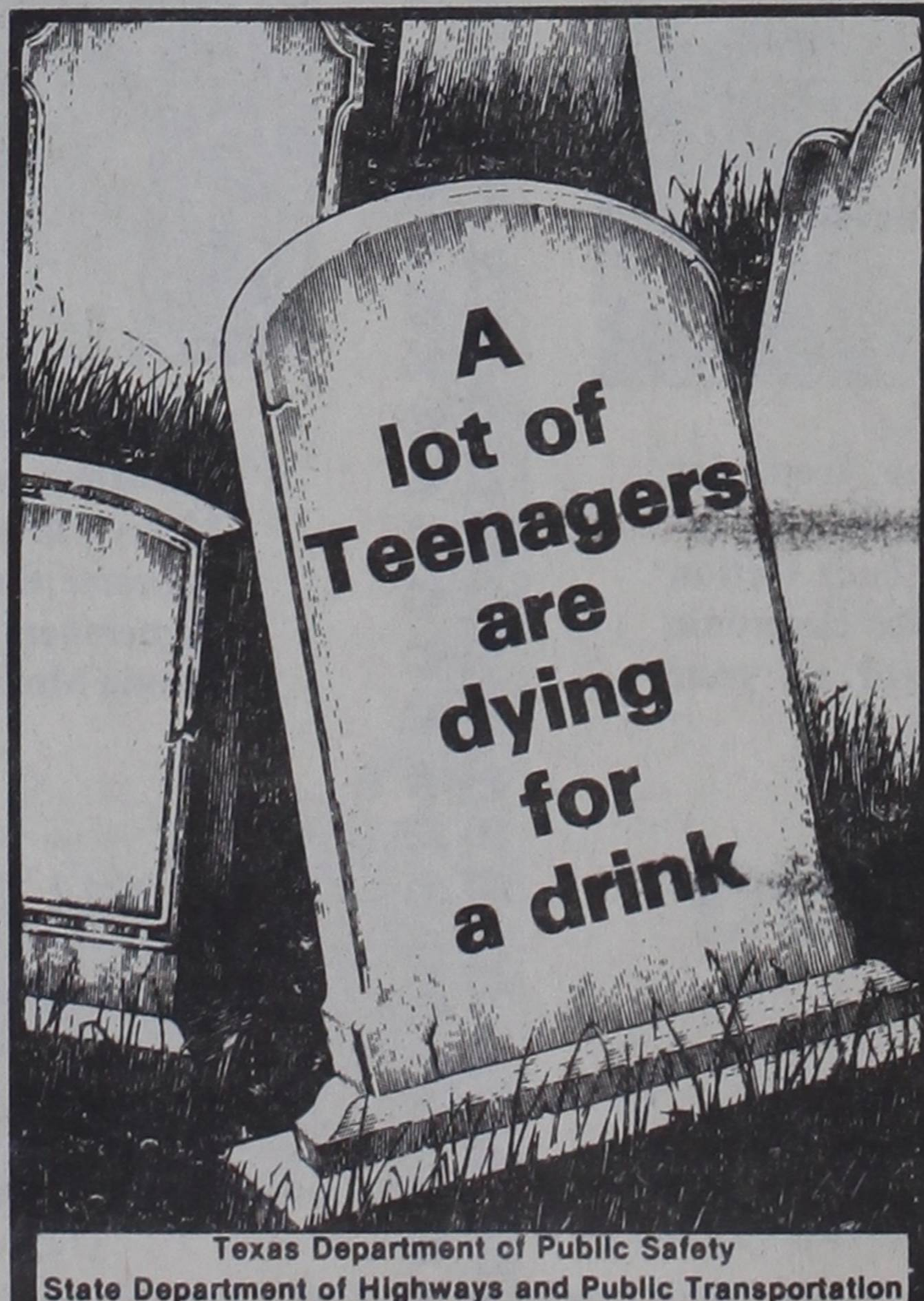
**Check Safety To Make
 The Holidays Bright**



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

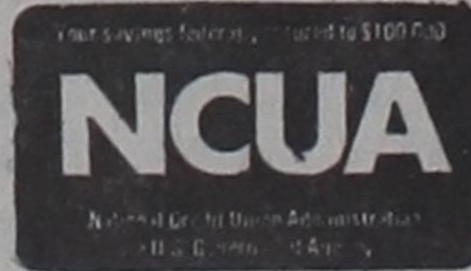

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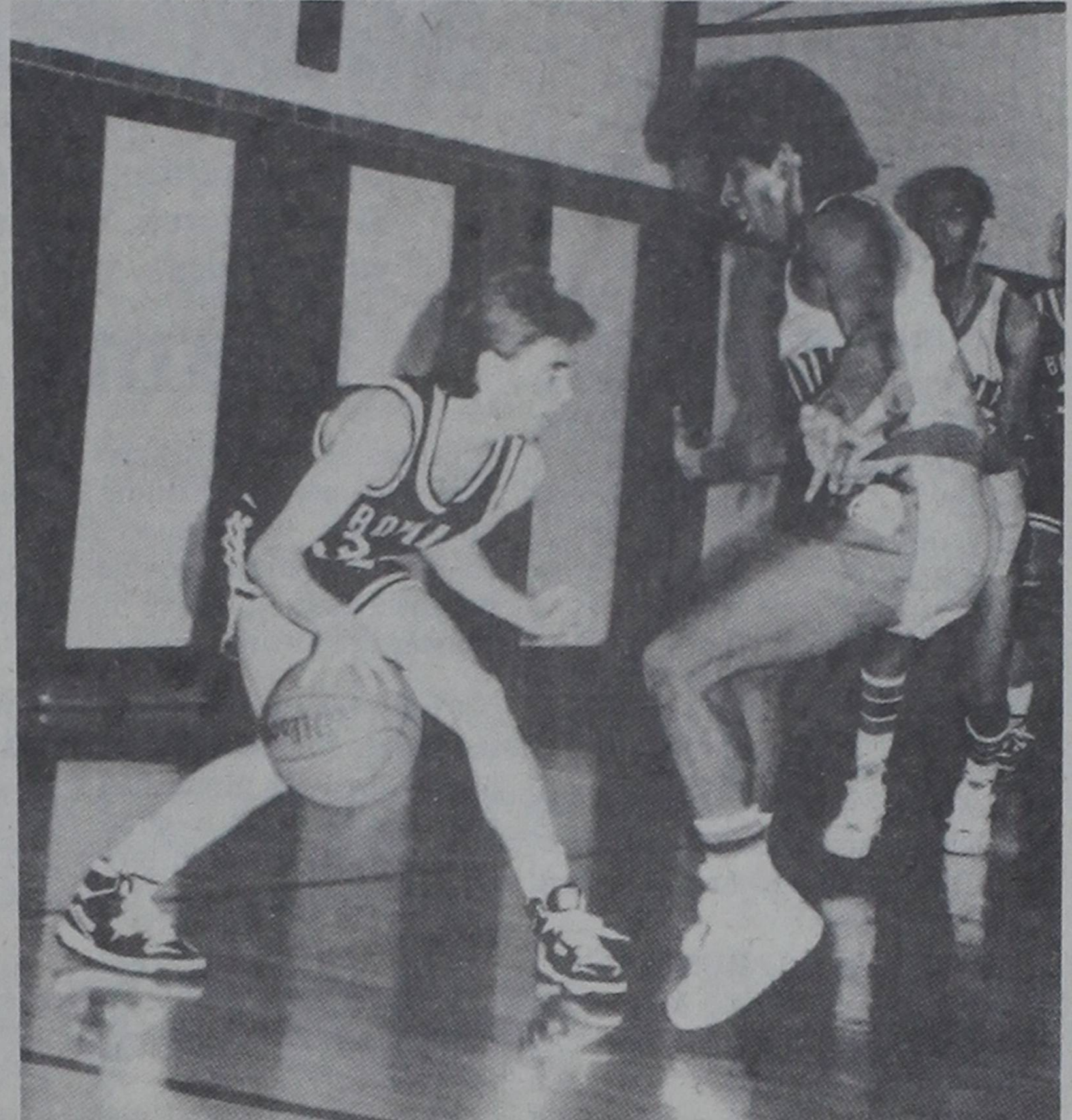

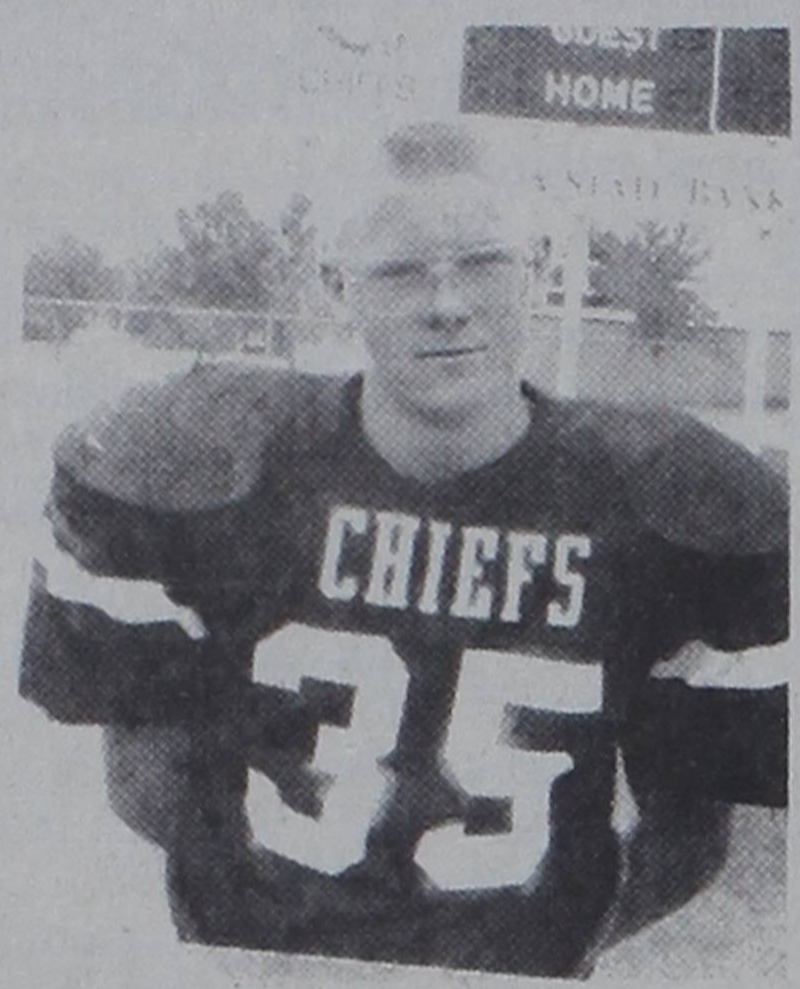
Osborn Leads FHS Offensive Stats

Senior Ben Osborn led the Chieftain football team in two offensive categories, according to season statistics compiled this week.

Osborn led the team in yards rushing with 1,006, and in scoring with 42 points. Osborn, who had gained 947 yards as a junior, became the fifth Chieftain to top the 1,000-yard mark in a season since 1981.

Osborn had scored 54 points in 1987, and his 96 total points rank him eighth on the all-time scoring list for FHS since such records are available.

Osborn also was the total offense leader for the team, edging quarterback Cody Burney, who had 961 yards. Burney passed for 557 yards and rushed for another 404.

The Lafuente twins, Jacky and Jerry, hooked up on a scoring pass play against Muleshoe, but the TD was called back by a penalty.

Punter Andre Duran had individual bests of 62 yards against

Canyon and 64 yards against Brownfield.

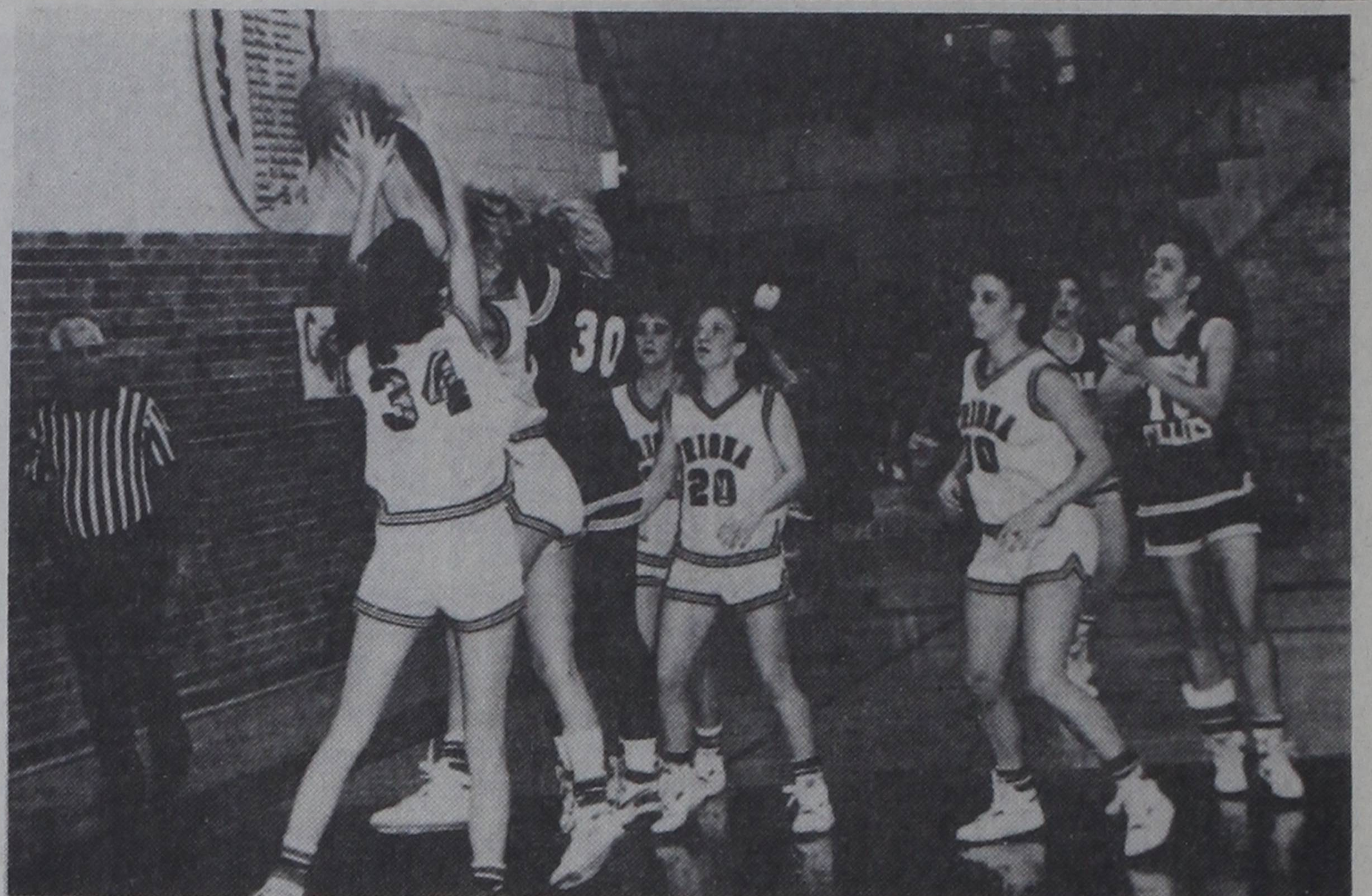

Teams Split With Bovina

Friona's varsity teams split a pair of games with visiting Bovina on Tuesday. The Squaws scored a 53-14 win over the Bovina Fillies, but the Chieftains fell to the potent Mustangs by 91-68.

Cindy Ureste was zeroed in on the basket for the Squaws Tuesday night. The FHS junior had a good first quarter and a good fourth quarter, and it added up to a 20-point performance, her best of the season.

In fact, Miss Ureste outscored the entire Bovina team in Friona's 53-14 win.

Miss Ureste scored eight first-quarter points and Susie Preston added six as Friona bolted to a 16-0 lead. The Squaws' full-court pressure caused Bovina a lot of problems.

With reserves taking over, Bovina had their only decent quarter, scoring within a point of the Squaws in the second quarter, 11-10, for a 27-10 halftime score.

Friona led 37-12 entering the final quarter, when Miss Ureste hit four baskets and was two for two at the line to complete her 20-point night.

The Squaws got most of their points on high-percentage shots, and also hit 15 of 20 from the line, their second straight good performance there.

Donna Griggs led Bovina

scoring with six.

The Chiefs had their brief winning streak snapped by the Mustangs, who were fresh from winning the Vega tournament. Friona managed to stay fairly close to the hot-shooting visitors until their run-and-gun tactics finally opened up a 22-point lead in the third quarter.

Darran Procter scored on a layup to give Friona its only lead at 2-0. Bovina countered with three baskets in the next minute of clock time to grab a 6-2 lead, and were never to be headed again.

T.J. Sanchez connected on a jump shot for a 6-4 score with 5:35 left in the opening quarter. But Bovina's Denver Riddle clicked on two straight jumpers for a 10-4 Mustang lead.

Cody Burney's layup made it 10-6, but Bovina countered for a 14-6 lead and hiked that to 19-12 with a layup at the buzzer.

Procter's two free throws to open the second quarter made the score 19-14, but free throws by Bovina hiked their lead to 23-14 with 6:47 left in the quarter.

Bret Bronniman's three-pointer gave Friona fans hope at the 6:20 mark, for a 23-17 deficit, but Bovina went on a tear, outscoring the Chieftains, 9-2 to take a 34-19 lead.

John Edd Duke came off the bench and scored four straight

baskets to break Friona's scoring drought, but Bovina had a 47-30 halftime lead.

Bovina's Riddle again started hot in the second half, and his layup at the 6:30 mark gave Bovina a 53-32 lead. Burney made a pair of layups for a 57-39 deficit, but Bovina countered for a 65-43 lead.

The Chiefs managed to stay fairly close in the third quarter to Bovina's scoring, as the visitors outscored them only 20-18 and 24-20 in the fourth. But the visitors' 28-18 edge in the second quarter was too much to overcome.

Burney, who sat out four minutes of the second period with foul trouble, scored 11 third-quarter points and led all scorers with 27 points. Bovina's Riddle had 25.

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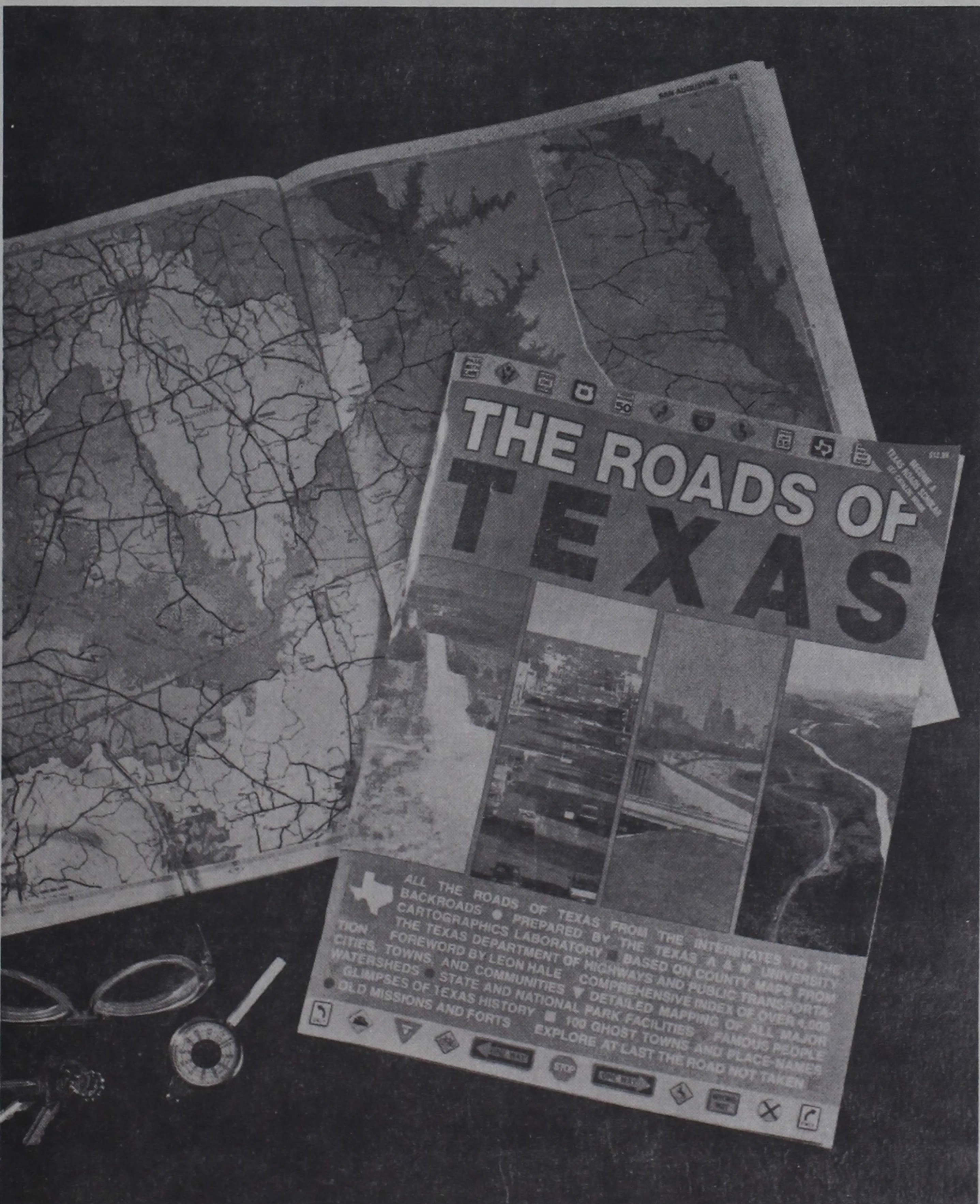
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Cargill Increases Scholarships

Cargill is increasing from 150 to 200 the number of \$1,000 scholarships it will provide to high school seniors from U.S. farm families planning post-secondary study next fall.

This year's awards will place increased emphasis on need-based criteria as a means of better targeting the scholarships, according to Calvin Anderson, executive director of the sponsoring Cargill Foundation. The foundation is a philanthropic arm of Cargill, a Minneapolis-based, agribusiness company.

When the Cargill Scholarship Program for Rural America was established in 1986, it provided \$100,000 in scholarship funds. The fund rose to \$150,000 last year and was increased to \$200,000 in an effort to offer more students an opportunity to further their educations.

The program is designed to recognize and encourage academic achievement, accomplishments and talents of young people from U.S. farm families and help them get started with their post-secondary educations.

To qualify, students must have plans for full-time enrollment next fall at an accredited two or four-year college, university or vocational-technical school. An independent national scholarship service organization manages the selection process, which is based—in addition to need—on several criteria including academic records, leadership and extracurricular accomplishments.

Resort Ranch Caters To Adults With Special Needs

A recent edition of the El Paso Times carried an article concerning the Washington Ranch southwest of Carlsbad, N.M. The article held more than passing interest for Dean Hall of Friona.

Earlier this year, Hall took his son Jerry to enroll at the ranch, which is an extension of Carlsbad mayor Bob Forrest's interest in adults with mental retardation. The ranch opened this year as a residential and work program for mentally retarded adults, expanding from a farm operation north of Carlsbad, which Forrest helped start in 1973.

Sixteen people have moved into two new group homes on the ranch, and more homes are planned. Residents of the ranch are paid for their work, such as picking up and shelling pecans. Some work in a craft shop, building wooden swings and other items that are sold to the public.

Two new greenhouses, financed by a recent \$52,000 private grant, are being constructed and residents will grow plants for sale.

Ranch manager Peggy Burton said of the residents, "They get excited about new things going on. They enjoy picking up pecans, cracking them and cleaning them to be sold. We try to let them feel like the ranch is theirs. They take great pride in it, just like we do."

The ranch was previously operated as a resort, and was purchased for \$1 in 1987 by the non-profit Carlsbad Assn. for Retarded Citizens.

It is planned to once again open the ranch as a resort retreat to the public, to help raise money for the ranch's operation.

Dean Hall said he had been fortunate to learn of the ranch, and felt that his son Jerry was thoroughly enjoying being a part of the ranch activities.

"He still gets to participate in the Special Olympics, but now they go into Albuquerque," Hall said.

The ranch's residential programs have a waiting list of approximately 40. About half of the residents are from the Carlsbad area. The others come from

throughout Southeastern New Mexico and West Texas.

The programs were inspired by Forrest's family. His son, 25-year-old Gary Forrest, was born with Down's Syndrome. He shunned the advice of doctors who said he should put his child in an institution.

In 1973, Bob Forrest and his twin brother, Dick, bought the abandoned state bird farm north of Carlsbad under the auspices of the Carlsbad Assn. for Retarded Citizens.

The idea was to give people with mental disabilities a place where they could acquire work skills, become productive, and have a feeling of self-worth and belonging to society.

The Panhandle Plains Historical Museum plans to conduct an Art Show in the fall which will feature art submitted by the Amateur Artists Association members. WTSU Art personnel and Museum Art personnel will be working closely with the groups to discover and encourage emerging artists in this area.

An amateur artist is considered to be one who does not depend upon their art for any portion of

their livelihood, such as sales of paintings, teaching art or workshops, etc.

Area artists are urged to contact Mr. Wied in the next few days, as the TSAAA organization promises to be an inspiration and a support to all who are interested in art.

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
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
