Hail Cuts Swath Through County Wed.

Although the immediate Friona area was spared damage in Wednesday's weather system that moved through the county starting at about 12 noon, a violent cloud brought considerable hail damage in the southeastern section of the county.

The storm which was first spotted in the Progress community in Bailey County, cut a southwest to northeast path across the county, and wiped out hundreds of acres of cotton.

"We had a lot of cotton damaged, but it could have been a lot worse," said Jerry Butman, manager of Friona Farmers Co-op Gin.

The storm cloud that moved across Parmer County spawned at least one funnel, spotted in the Progress area, and dumped golfball-sized hail in that area.

The hail that fell to the south and east of Hub was about pea-sized, was soft in nature, and was not accompanied by any high wind, a factor in that lessened the damage.

The hail stacked up three to four inches deep in the worst-hit area, and was enough that the Texas Highway Department ran a snow plow from Hub south to Clay's Corner, clearing Highway 214, and also east of Hub on Highway 86.

Clarence Monroe said that he

and his son Alan lost approximately 300 acres of cotton in the hailstorm, but that coming when it did, they would be able to replant.

With the weather clearing and warming up, the Monroes were hoping to be able to get back into their fields and begin replanting by Monday.

Monroe said they also have some corn, which was battered by the hailstones, but was hopeful that the corn would overcome the damage.

He said that a total of 2.3 inches of rain was received along with the hail, and that the moisture would prove beneficial.

Rick Rector, who farms a piece of ground adjoining the Monroes, also indicated that he had considerable crop damage. His crops were corn and wheat.

"The tops of the beds look pretty slick. We're just hoping that it doesn't blow away before we can get into the fields," said Rector, who indicated that he had spent Thursday getting tractors and equipment ready to roll as soon as the fields were dry enough.

Rector said he would take a "wait and see" attitude on his corn, and was hoping it could be salvaged. He said that he received

Pena Is Convicted For Murder

Francisco E. Pena was convicted on a capital murder charge in District Court in Farwell this week.

Pena was arrested following a late-night brawl the weekend of October 22, 1988 in Friona that left Michael Diaz dead from a gunshot wound.

Although Pena was not thought to be the trigger-man in the shooting, he was tried under new proceedings that allows participants in a murder to be tried.

Pena was found guilty of first degree murder, and was sentenced to 15 years in the penitentiary plus a \$7,000 fine.

Ramon Ramirez was identified as the suspect doing the actual shooting in the incident, and has been sought since the October shooting. He is thought to have fled to Mexico after the shooting.

A group of uninvited guests were alleged to have crashed a party on the night in question at 808 Jackson, where the hosts had been planning a baptismal party.

A fight developed, and Michael Diaz, Jr. was shot.

Pena, the man convicted this week in district court, was the one who wrestled with Friona police officer Jim Davis for a gun after being arrested, causing the gun to discharge and blow a hole in the door of the patrol car, and slightly injuring the officer.

Lon Outland is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hank Outland, and has attended local schools since kindergarten.

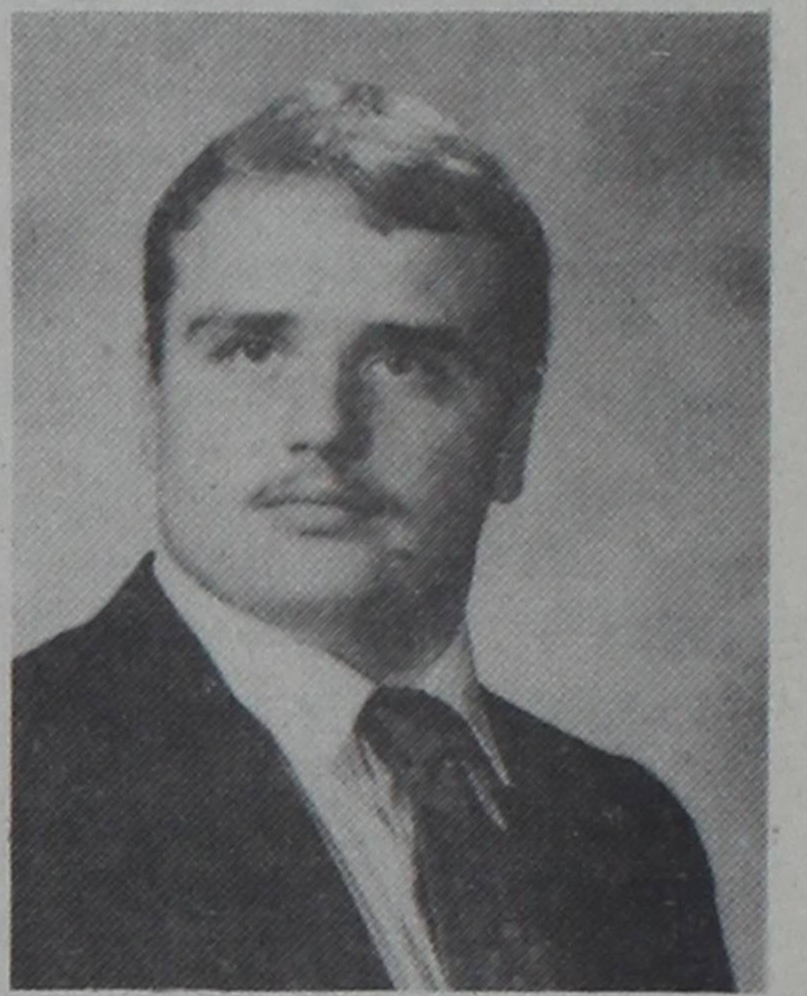
He participated in football, band, Thespians and Forensics four years each. He was in the NHS, Student Council and contest play three years apiece, was in track twice and golf one year.

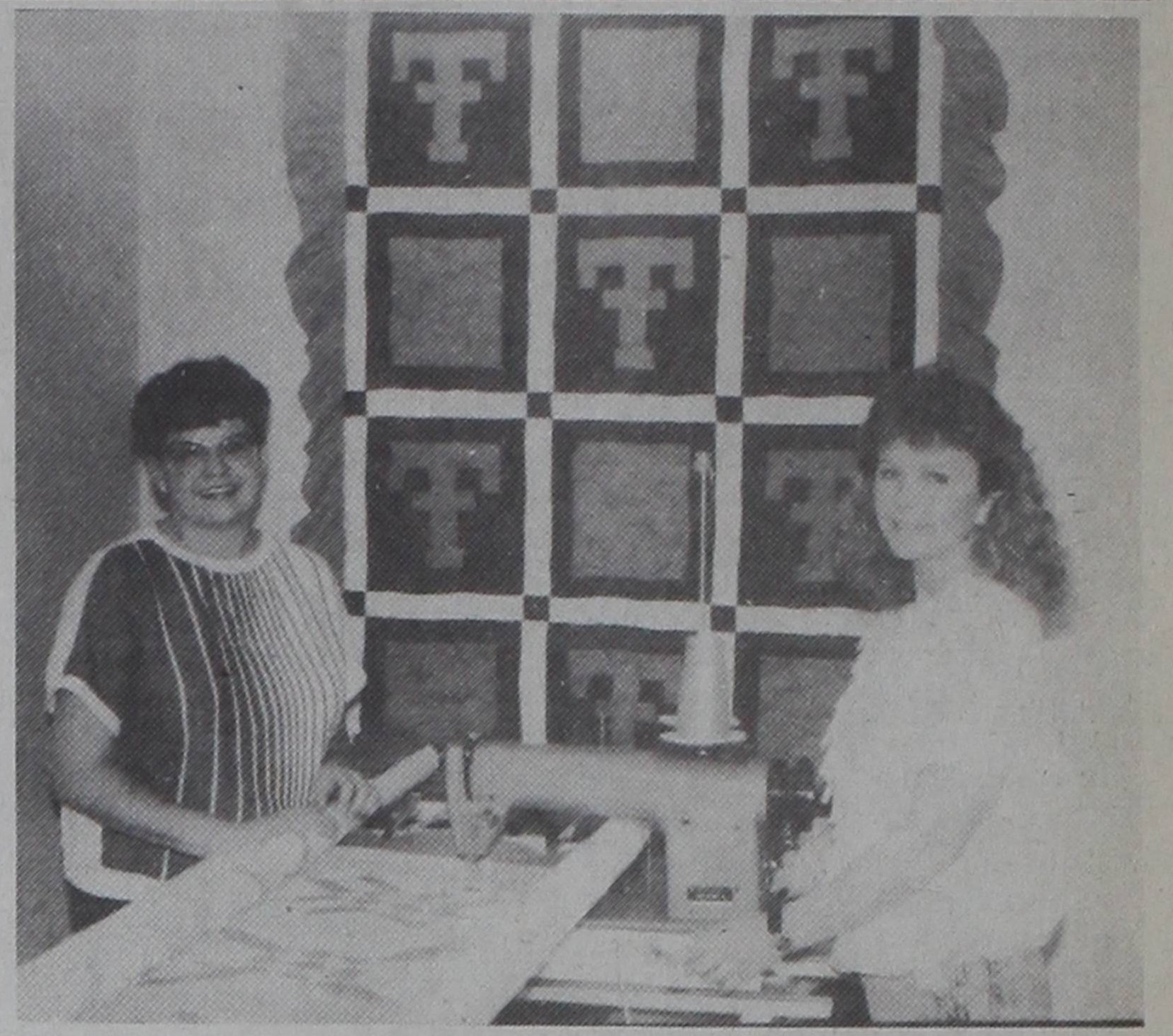

3.4 inches of rain along with the hail.

"I dumped out three inches of water on the level, after the brunt of the storm, and checked the gauge later and had received another .4 inches," Rector said.

Other farmers who sustained crop damage included Nick Collier, who was said to have possibly lost a field of sugar beets; Clyde Woodard and Kenneth Hall, whose corn was beat up, and Buddy Wiseman.

Butman said that there was some cotton which had been planted and had not come up at the time of the storm, and there was a good possibility that this cotton would still come up, although it may have to be "scratched."

In Friona, just a light rain was received. Three separate showers left .45 inch of rain. This fell during the afternoon on Wednesday when .32 was measured, with another .13 inch coming in the early morning hours of Thursday.

Accidents Investigated

One man was treated and released from Parmer County Community Hospital Wednesday after a two-truck accident on the Western edge of Friona where the Fifth Street loop intersects Highway 60.

Investigating officers said that William Patrick Rushing, 39, of Crockett, Texas, was driving a truck-tractor rig that was attempting to make a left turn onto the loop, headed west on Highway 60.

A truck belonging to the Pepsi Cola Company, driven by Vincent Saiz, 19, of Clovis, was also headed west. Saiz tried to brake his truck, and it hydroplaned on the wet highway and slid partially into the truck, then into the barrow ditch.

Saiz was taken to the hospital for treatment, with minor injuries.

Late Thursday night, DPS Patrolman Jim Bishop investigated an accident near the Bootleg community in which a produce truck overturned. The driver sustained an injured arm, cuts and scrapes in the one-vehicle wreck.

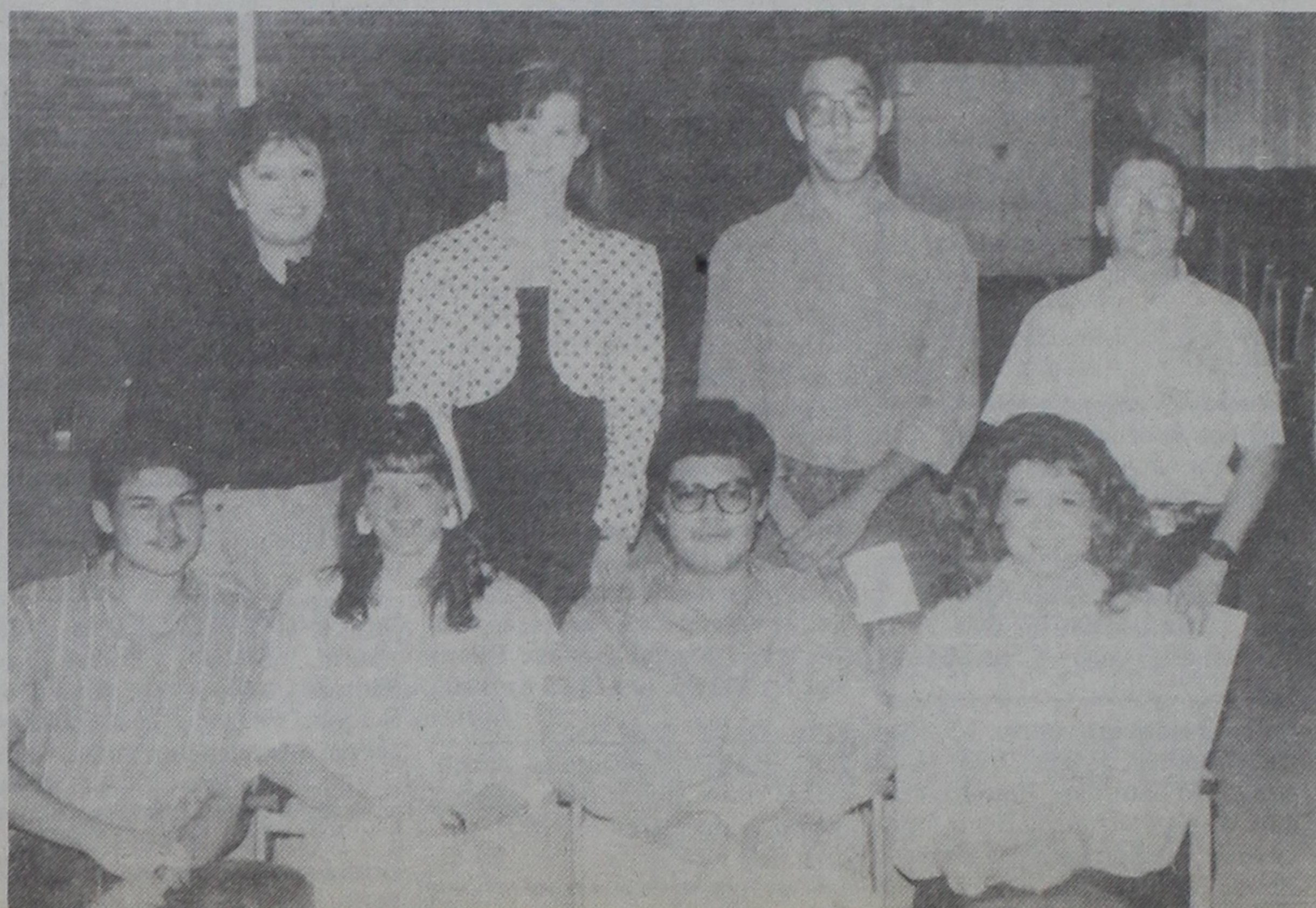

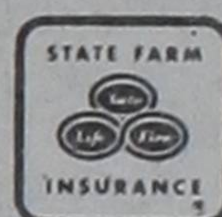

Breast-Screen Clinic Coming

The Breast Cancer Screening Project of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and the High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics in Friona.

The next clinic is scheduled for Monday, June 21 from 1-5 p.m. at Parmer County Community Hospital. The project is designed to educate our community about the importance of early detection of breast cancer.

The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam, individualized breast self-examination instruction and a mammogram. The clinic is staffed by professionals specially trained in breast cancer detection.

The average American woman has one chance in ten of developing breast cancer during her lifetime. All women over the age of 35 should know and follow the guidelines of mammography screening.

Currently there are three groups of women known to be at a higher than average risk of getting breast cancer. These include women age 50 or more because two-thirds of all breast cancer occur among older women. The second group are women whose mothers or sisters have had breast cancer. The third group includes women who have already had cancer in one breast.

WASHINGTON - Obesity may be controlled naturally with a new type of pill, discovered by accident, a research scientist confirmed recently.

In studies, scientists noted an unusual side effect. Patients receiving an ingredient in what is now being called FS-1 all lost weight, while body weight in control groups remained constant.

Scientists say the mechanism behind the weight reduction is not clear, but suggest it is partially due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calorie-rich dietary fats. Although scientists for some time have known of substances with the capability of producing this effect, the dramatic impact on weight reduction was not known until recently.

The director of research and development at National Dietary Research, an organization committed to the investigation and research of nutritional solutions to world-wide health problems, stated, "The mechanism by which FS-1 works to decrease body weight is actually a more complex and sophisticated process called nutri-bonding. When chewed and swallowed immediately before meals, FS-1 releases nutrients with low calorie content into the body, while high-calorie fats are eliminated, thus providing optimum nutrition and a minimum number of calories."

Studies with FS-1 indicate weight loss results clearly superior to products currently available for the treatment of obesity. In a comparative study by NDR, whose research topics have been the subject of articles published in recent medical and nutritional journals, FS-1 was found to be the most effective treatment for obesity and the most acceptable to patients.

The discovery comes as welcome news to thousands of obesity sufferers waiting years for this type of breakthrough. According to a spokesperson at NDR, "FS-1 can be made available to the public immediately, because it is not a drug and contains only natural ingredients recognized as safe. A drug with essentially the same weight loss capabilities might take as long as eight years to be available, due to lengthy delays encountered in the approval process. FS-1 is currently available on a limited basis through physicians and pharmacies. An instruction sheet for proper use and optimum results is provided with each bottle of 100 tablets."

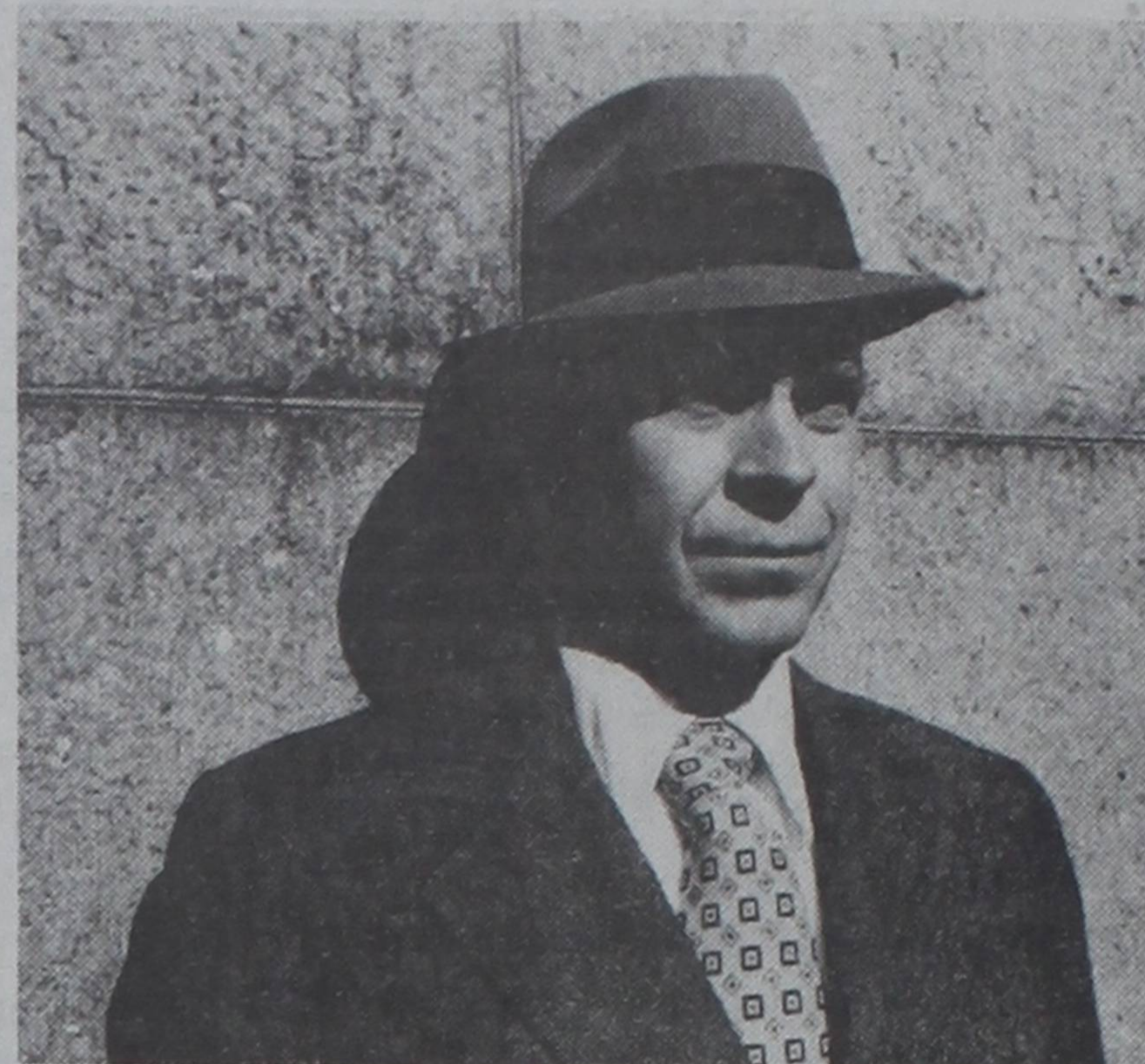
Salesman Confesses

Claims newspaper is best salesman

On Monday, Jules Wintner, owner of a local retail establishment, confessed his job as a salesman was obsolete due to the impact of newspaper advertising. Wintner, in an exclusive interview, said sales were made in the local paper instead of in the store.

"Sure, we get a chance for additional sales," Wintner commented, "but the newspaper has become our best salesman." Wintner reported that consumers name the local newspaper as their usual source of "Best Buy" information, 10 times more than radio or television. This conforms with a recent Consumer Data Service report that indicated 60% of the consumers seek "Best Buy" information from the newspaper versus only 6% for radio and 7% for television.

Wintner later remarked that because the newspaper is read by all Texans, regardless of income, his business was able to sell both upper end products as well as value priced items. "No matter what we're selling, we get good response in the newspaper," he said. "In fact, the more expensive the product, the better our response seems to be." This fact is substantiated in a survey by the Texas Newspaper Advertising Bureau that documented readership of the newspaper increases as income increases. In the survey, almost 75% of Texans with incomes exceeding \$50,000 a year read

"My job has become redundant," Wintner admitted. "Used to be I had to really sell each customer, but now I'm just an order taker." Asked what he intended to do now that the newspaper was doing most of the selling, he replied, "Spend more in newspaper advertising than last year."

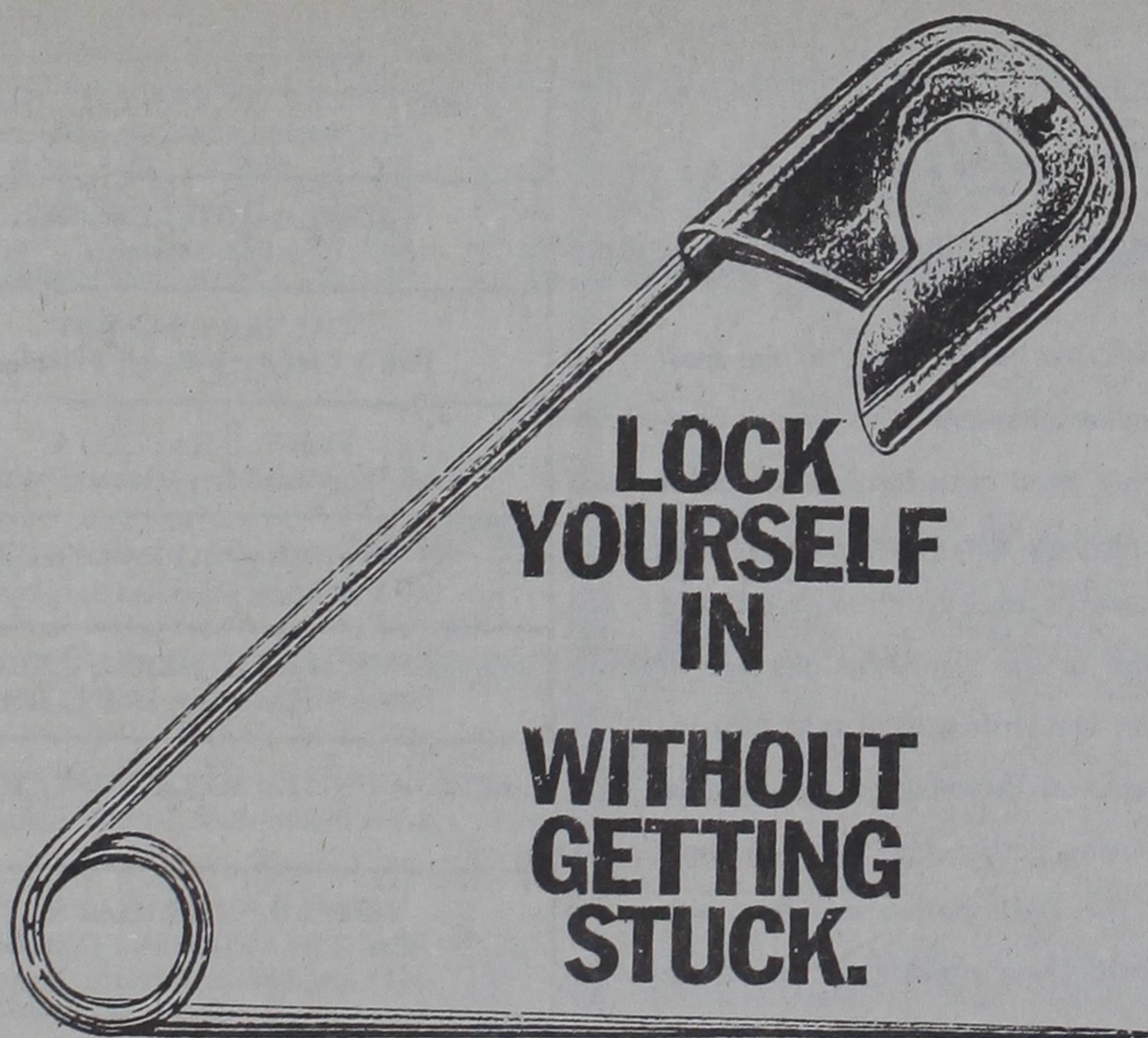
