#### Judge Winfree Chosen Head of Confederate Home at Austin

Austin, Texas, Feb. 15 .- The ppointment of E. Winfree, member of the last legislature from Houston county, to the superinendent of the Confederate home, was made Saturday by the State board of cotrol, filling the vacancy caused by the recent resignation of Dr. J. C. Loggins. Winfree's selection was made from a list of 25 applicants from various parts of Texas.






