WHILE DRIVING down a country highway a few days ago, we saw a lady out beside her rural mailbox with a broom in hand. She had driven down from her house, a quarter mile or so up the road, to sweep off the dirt which had accumulated around her mailbox.

I imagined what life would be like at this lady's house. She would probably take a horse-whip to that poor old car if it should dare to drip something nasty onto her pristine garage floor. Somehow I believe that I have gotten more out of life than the lady who was sweeping the side of the highway around her mailbox. But I'm thinking about putting a stack of those paper gowns on the front hall table so my guests won't get dirt and dog hair on their clothing when they come over for a visit.

Poe is no stranger to small towns, as he graduated from Wortham High School, where he was class salutatorian. He is in Who's Who Among Junior and Community College Students; is a member of the Texas Educational Theatre Ass., Phi Theta Kappa and the Young Republicans.

Poe began his college career at McLennan Community College in Waco. While there he was a member of the MCC Mime Troupe and garnered the following acting credits:

"The Curious Savage," "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat," "The Diviners," "Gypsy," "Grease," and "Thieves' Carnival." Travis received his BFA from the University of Texas. His acting credits there include "The Music Man" and "No Pass, No Play."

Poe has taught for four years, and has had two state-qualifying plays, one area qualifier, and one regional qualifier.

His directing credits include: "The Shadow Box," "The Diviners," "And They Danced Real Slow in Jackson," "Medea," "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown," "A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum," "The Foreigner," "Addict," and "The History of Tom Jones."

Travis says "I'm excited about coming to Friona!"

Tal Lostracco will once again be involved in the summer theatre production at Amarillo College at the same time he is directing here. Tal will be playing the role of

Malvolio in Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night."

Lostracco has chosen to direct "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" for the grade school students. He has directed "Sleeping Beauty" and "Guess Again" here previously.

Tal is a 1977 graduate of Katy High School. During his high school career, he participated a number of times at the state meet. He received his degree from Southwestern University in Georgetown and has also attended West Texas State University, Texas Tech and Prairie View A&M.

Among Lostracco's directing credits are "The Small World of Millie McIvor," "Livin' de Life," "Dope," "The Prime of Miss Jean

Brodie," "What I Did Last Summer," "A Company of Wayward Saints," "Peer Gent," "Mother Courage and Her Children," "Twelfth Night," "Alice in Wonderland," and "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown." He has taught at Canadian and Dumas High Schools.

Assisting Lostracco and once again directing the junior high school students will be Michael Griffin, a junior at Wayland Baptist University.

Last year, Michael had a great time directing a melodrama, "The Shaky Tale of Dr. Jaky." This year he has chosen "Story Theatre," a collection of tales based on the fables of the Brothers Grimm and Aesop.

This show has been called a "musical delight" by some critics, so it should be fun for all.

U.S. Senator Phil Gramm will be in Friona on Thursday, June 29 to attend a drug briefing at the Driver's License office at the Friona Police Department.


Senator Gramm is scheduled to speak at 8 p.m.

'Vial Of Life' Is Sponsored Locally

The Friona Volunteer Fire Department has instigated a "Vial of Life" program, which it hopes

will be a help in case of an emergency involving individuals who live alone or might be alone for a certain period of time, and might not be able to communicate when the need arises.

The "Vial of Life" is an identification for emergency need for use by a rescue squad team, should their services ever be needed.


Here's how the program works:

The Fire Department is handing out the plastic "pill vials" to those who are interested. Inside the plastic tube is a sheet on which the participant is asked to list pertinent medical information, such as allergies and other information which might prove helpful in case of an emergency.

Those participating are asked to attach the plastic tube under the upper right hand shelf inside the refrigerator door. There is a bright red sticker which they are asked to attach to the outside of the door, indicating that the medical information is stored inside the refrigerator.

One of the tubes with its information can also be placed in a person's glove compartment if they desire. "This would be double protection, if an emergency worker cannot locate the person's billfold," said Ralph Shirley.

Summer Or Winter? Residents Can't Tell

Friona residents felt like they had gone from summertime back to winter this week, as the high temperature on consecutive days dropped from 97 degrees to 53 degrees.

The cold front which invaded the area did bring some beneficial moisture, with a total of .70 inches measured in Friona on Wednesday and Thursday.

When the front blew in Wednesday just after 5 p.m., the temperature had been 97 degrees. In a matter of minutes, the mercury had dropped to 67 degrees and some rain began to fall.

The city received .25 inch of rain in that initial shower Wednesday

afternoon between 5:45 and 6:15 p.m. Later, in the early-morning hours of Thursday, another .41 inch was registered, bringing the official total as of 8 a.m. Thursday to .66 inch.

The mercury had dropped to a low of 49 degrees early Thursday for the overnight low, and the highest it reached during the day on Thursday was 53 degrees, for a range of only three degrees, and a drop of 44 degrees from the previous day's high.

In fact, the high reading of 53 degrees was lower than the minimum temperature which had been registered on 13 days earlier this month.

If such local records were available, Thursday's maximum temperature of 53 degrees would no doubt be an all-time low for the date. Amarillo broke their record maximum for the date with a high reading of 61, and the old record had been 76 degrees in 1927.

Farmers were welcoming the moisture, especially after the long dry spell of the late fall and winter.

Jane Dixon, who lives in the Rhea community, said the latest rain was not that much at the Dixon place, but that they had received 2.5 to three inches of rain earlier this month, and that the young maize in the area was looking good.

The June rainfall has hopes rising for a good maize crop in the dryland area, following a virtual crop failure for wheat.

Ann Carthel said Thursday morning they had received only .3 inch during the latest shower, but that the reading was heavier to the east, and that Gene Welch had reported a half-inch of moisture.

The storm that hit the area the night of June 12 has caused considerable damage to certain crops, especially cotton. It was

reported that some of the farmers have replanted their cotton to soybeans or sunflowers, and some to maize.

There was also some corn that was molested by the wind and hail, but the corn and sugarbeets were not expected to have been seriously damaged.

Meantime, one farmer was said to have reported a 50-bushel wheat yield, which is certainly outstanding even for irrigated wheat, given the adversity this crop has faced in 1989.

Diquat Is Approved For Wheat

A combination of thin wheat and late spring rains has led to a severe weed problem in much of the area wheat. TDA has recently issued a crisis exemption for the use of Diquat as a harvest aid in wheat.

Diquat use is authorized to begin on June 19, 1989. This crisis exemption expires 15 days later on July 3, 1989.

The product may be applied to wheat after it reaches the soft dough stage. The labeled rate is 1-2 pts per acre. A nonionic surfactant should also be included at 16 oz. per 100 gallons of water.

This contact herbicide will be more effective when applied in a high volume of water to insure good coverage. Diquat should not be applied within seven days of harvest.

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
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Remember When...

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

Art Group's Meeting Set For July 2


The Art Association meeting which was to be held in June has been postponed until Sunday, July 2 at 2:30 p.m. in the Depot Building in the City Park.

Around The House In Parmer County

By ROCHELLE WHITE, C.H.E. Parmer County Extension Agent Home Economics

The new USDA guidelines for canning have recently been released. Last week general rules were given for safe canning. This week the most common home-canned products will be highlighted.

JELLIED PRODUCTS

In jellied products, the use of paraffin is no longer recommended. Some strains of molds have been found to grow in the paraffin and get into the jelly. These molds were once thought to be harmless, but recent studies have shown otherwise.

All jellied products should be processed in a boiling water canner (previously referred to as the waterbath canner). In general, jellies should be hot-packed in half pint jars and processed for ten minutes (for our altitude) in the boiling water canner. Specific times for various jellied products are available at the Extension Office.

For those who need to watch their sugar intake, but still enjoy a fruity topping on their toast or biscuits in the morning, the guidelines give instructions and recipes for reduced-sugar fruit spreads. It includes information for using a variety of fruits, how to process them and some new products on the market which make this process possible.

PICKLES
Some pickle products may be

processed by the low-temperature pasteurization process where the canned pickles are simmered instead of boiled. This gives pickles a better flavor. These directions are available in these new guidelines. Pickling lime is now acknowledged as an acceptable firming agent for pickles. The pickling lime used should be packaged for sell in the grocery stores and not the type found at the hardware store.

OTHER CANNED GOODS

Processing times are given for fruits and tomato products in a pressure canner. Although fruit and tomato products may be processed in a boiling water canner, use of a pressure canner will result in higher quality canned tomato products. The varieties of tomatoes grown today have a slightly higher pH making them less acid, so now the USDA classifies them with vegetables instead with the higher acid fruits.

Also included in the information are recipes for a variety of tomato products including spaghetti sauce, chile salsa, country western ketchup, Mexican tomato sauce and more.

Old Tradition Has New Twist Locally

Many American traditions have been passed down from one generation to the next. Baseball, farming and cooking—just to name a few.

One tradition, however, has experienced a new "twist" as two Friona women can attest. Varla Wilcox and Beth Fleming are trying their hands at the new art of quilting by machine.

"We've always enjoyed sewing and we love quilts," said Mrs. Wilcox. After completing Vuthel Loafman's sewing classes last fall, the two became interested in making quilts. It was not until Christmas, though, that they decided to look into the use of machinery along with their hobby.

Lunie Fleming, grandmother of Beth's husband, Charlie, had quilts made as Christmas gifts for her grandchildren by a woman in Bowie, Texas, who used the quilting machine.

Mrs. Wilcox and Mrs. Fleming admired the work, became interested in getting their own machine, and flew to Bowie to find out more about it. After discovering the details of the quilting machine, the two contacted a company in Missouri and purchased a machine.

The quilting machine is a 12 foot by two foot table which holds a mobile sewing machine. Fifteen different quilting patterns can be traced with the machine as it is manually guided by the user. The machine saves time, increases

productivity, and cuts down on the number of errors made during the quilting process.

The "giant table" is housed in the basement of the Wilcox home, 1304 West Sixth. "The Quiltin' Block," as the new business is called, not only does professional machine quilting and piecing, but also makes bedspreads, bed ruffles, pillow shams, and bubble and balloon curtains.

Mrs. Wilcox and Mrs. Fleming have had the machine for a little over a month, and in that time, they have sewn approximately 20 quilts. They've had business not just in Friona, but also in Clovis, Spearman and other area communities.

They will make complete quilts, quilt old tops or re-quilt any items that need it. They do a great deal of custom work, and they have many quilts for sale of all sizes. "Our response has been great," said Mrs. Fleming.

In October, the two will participate in arts and crafts shows in Red River and Ruidoso, N.M., and they will have quilts on sale during the annual Friona "Christmas In November" Bazaar. "This gave us a way to make money and still be at home with our children," said Mrs. Wilcox.


Considering that there are seven children between the two families, this would be an important factor.





Mammogram Clinic Scheduled June 30

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, Texas, which serves the local area has received the certification of the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an X-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for the early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accreditation must be renewed every three years.

The accreditation program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, other national medical organizations, and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that dedicated mammographic equipment be used. The American College of Radiology received an American Cancer Society Control Grant which was used to pilot test the Accreditation Program.

Stores point finger at newspaper

Today saw one of the largest consumer responses of the week to offers made by local grocery stores for discounted prices. Across the city, shoppers were redeeming coupons cut from the local paper in record numbers.

John Duke Attends Science Symposium

John Duke, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Duke of Friona, joined more than 400 outstanding high school science students and teachers at the 29th annual Texas Energy Science Symposium in Austin June 12-15. Duke attends Friona High School.

Duke was among 40 students and teachers, representing schools throughout the Panhandle and South Plains, sponsored by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

The symposium, at the University of Texas campus, is an annual event sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation (TAERF). The

foundation is composed of ten electric utilities in Texas, including SPS. Although SPS does not own or operate a nuclear power plant, the company's membership in TAERF reflects its commitment to many kinds of energy research.

The four day symposium, featuring a keynote address by NASA astronaut Kathryn Sullivan, was packed with tours and presentations on such subjects as fusion, a form of nuclear power, and the "greenhouse effect," a term that refers to heat becoming trapped in the earth's atmosphere.

A highlight of the symposium was a tour of the university's Fusion Research Center and its tokamak, a machine that uses magnetic fields to attempt to confine the fusion reaction. The tour was especially noteworthy in light of recent experiments in so-called "cold fusion," a process that purportedly uses room temperature liquids to create fusion. Prior to these experiments, whose results have yet to be verified, fusion was believed possible only at temperatures near those of the sun.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Appointments may be made by calling (806) 238-1116. The mobile breast cancer detection units will

be in Bovina at City Hall, 205 North St., on Friday, June 30, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and the American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

1. 35 - 40 years of age - one baseline mammogram.
2. 40 - 50 years of age - a mammogram every 1 - 2 years, depending on breast type and risk factor.
3. 50 years of age and over - an annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
4. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk

factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

5. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find every early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The unit accepts cash, check, Visa, MasterCard and American Express.
