Capacity is Yet Unknown of Michigan-Texas Well

Palestine, Texas, Dec. 11 .-Excitement was created here today by the reports that the Michigan-Texas Oil Company, drilling near Jarvis, had a 100barrel well, and there is a good showing of oil and gas, the capacity of the well is as yet unknown. There is water above the oil sand, and the drillers are preparing to set casing and shut off the water. They have only drilled in a few inches. However, it looks good for a well. This is the third showing encountered. The well is about 700 feet deep.

Eastern Texas Railroad Will Be Abandoned

The people of Ratcliff and Kennard, in the southeastern part of the county, have lost their fight to keep the Eastern Texas Railroad from abandoning its line from Kennard to Lufkin. The following news item was carried by the press from Washington, D. C., under date of December 6:

"The Eastern Texas Railroad company today was authorized by the Interstate Commerce Commission to abandon its line between Lufkin and Kennard, Texas. The commission attributed the order to lack of traffic.






