

Handling the Dry Cows

The dry cows, especially if dry during the winter, as many of them are, are looked upon as expensive boarders. The dry cow is regarded as a bill of expense and often gets rather hard fare. But the milk cow that is only dry four to eight weeks should not be looked upon as entitled to little feed and no care. It is probably not her fault that she is dry in the winter, when feed is scarce and high price, and if she has milked well the other ten or eleven months of the year she is

intitled to a rest on fair treatment. But apart from this, the way she is kept during the month or two she is dry will have an influence on her production during her next milking period. A good dairy cow will lose flesh while giving her largest flow of milk. In other words, if she puts on a little flesh while dry she is merely storing it up for future use and will give it back in increased milk flow when she comes fresh.-The Progressive Farmer.





WHAT TO HAVE FOR DINNER.

A foreign pie, which is most savory, is one which will be often used after the first trial; it is

French Meat Pie.

Cut up fresh pork in small pieces and the same amount of veal, brown in a little hot fat and turn into a lined pastry shell. Cover as for ordinary pie with a top crust and bake slowly in a moderate oven. Of course the seasonings are added during the browning.

Roast Veal au Jus.

Season a fillet of veal with salt, pepper and put in a pan with a piece of butter, a carrot, bay leaf and a clove. Put into a double roaster and bake in a moderate oven two and onehalf hours. Remove the ment to a platter. Put a little water in the pan and simmer for five minutes. Strain and pour the gravy, unthickened, around the meat.

Cincinnati Chicken,

Split lengthwise, a pork tenderloid, leaving the halves joined. Pound the meat of each side until about one-half inch thick. Spread with the following stuffing: One cupful of bread crumbs, one-quarter of a teaspoonful of salt, one-eighth of a teaspoonful of pepper, a slice of onion chopped, one teaspoonful each of chopped parsley, pickles, capers and lemon juice, and one tablespoonful of minced olives. Mix into this one-fourth of a cupful of melted butter and one beaten egg. Arrange the stuffing so that it will keep the center and sew or tie the edges together so that it will resemble a plump bird. Bake with careful basting, until well browned.

Macaroon Pudding.

Soak one-dozen macaroons in onefourth of a cupful of currant jelly and two tablespoonfuls of lemon juice; set over hot water. Make a soft custard of one pint of milk, one-fourth of a cupful of sugar, the beaten yolks of two eggs and one whole egg beaten. Flavor with almond extract. Add to the custard four more macaroons, heated in the oven until crisp, then rolled into crumbs. Pour this mixture into the serving dish, add the macaroons and jelly. Pile over them a meringue, made from the two egg whites and powdered sugar. Decorate with cubes of jelly and brown in the
