

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

To find these tractors at night, when they are running, is an experience. You can't hear them because the cotton gin is running and because of a hazy skyline, you don't see any image in the field, so you go the opposite direction of the movement of the tractor hoping to run into it. Of course, if it died along the way, you could have a long trip finding it.

I never watched a cotton gin and couldn't think that a bale of cotton would have a personality. Watching the gin process and the forcing of cotton into a bale was a real treat. Sort of portrays the personality of Southwest! If it is unrestricted, free of all its pressures, it is relaxed, pleasant, interesting, but if you begin to force this 'live quality' into a confinement, you have a fight on your hands.

### Not Wrong To Make A Profit

For a number of years, it has been customary for business, both big and little, to speak rather apologetically of making profits -- as if making a profit was somehow something not to be discussed too loudly.

Businessmen have had a point, to some extent. There are some in Perryton who are extremely cautious about showing signs of prosperity, lest their customers suddenly desert them because they are waxing too fat.

e heard a grocer say one time that the biggest mistake a grocer could make was to display signs of prosperity in the form of a new store, new home, big car, long trips, etc. Said his customers naturally resent a grocer making money.

We doubt that this is the case, although there certainly may be a grain of truth in it. Actually, the businessman who shows a profit in these days of short, margins and high

taxes is to be singled out and commended, although none of us would actually do it.

Too many businessmen have allowed themselves to be pushed, by a particularly loud segment of public opinion, into a defensive attitude toward the earning of profits. Walter Reuther, the AFL president, for example, has the idea that profits in the automotive industry should be split with labor. He has long damned 'excessive profits' as the cause of high automobile prices.

What too many people fail to realize is that the profit motive is the driving force in our free enterprise system and our economic system is what makes us different today from the other nations on this globe. There are other nations with as many and more natural resources -- but none who enjoy the standard of living that we enjoy because men like to make a profit .--- OCHILTREE COUNTY






