BEN WANTED MEMBERS WHO HAD MONEY

ST. JOSEPH, Mich., May 27.—Mrs. Esther Johnson Hannaford Hanford, 36, king Benjamin Purnell's erstwhile chief girl lieutenant, today testified how as a girl of 14 she went to England and induced a woman with \$100,000 to turn over her fortune to the House of David and become a member of the colony. Testifying as the state's star witness in the state's suit to dissolve the house, she declared King Ben, while posing as Jehovah, cast devils out of her when she was six and later assaulted her when she was 14, under the guise of the rites of the covenant. During her testimony, "Queen Mary" Purnell, wife of the aged leader of the cult, sat back of the defense lawyer's table, glaring angrily at the witness. Mrs. Hanford testified Ben told her when she went to England to weed out those applicants seeking entrance to the cult and concentrate on Mrs. Lizzie Tomlinson who had \$100,000. "I did and I brought Mrs. Tomlinson back to America with a bank draft for the \$100,000," said Mrs. Hanford.

ANTI-SPEED TRAP LAW WILL BE CHANGED

AUSTIN, May 27.—Declaring that he would make a "workable" law out of the anti-speed trap bill passed by the last legislature and now in effect, Senator W. D. McFarlane of Wichita Falls introduced a bill removing restrictions in regard to the color of uniform and kind of badge which must be worn by officers making speed arrests. The present law requires the officers to wear a uniform of dark gray color and a diamond-shaped badge. McFarlane said the present law is impractical and he would have speed officers to wear a uniform and badge clearly distinguishing him from a civilian.

These are to be sold on the streets by high school girls and others for any amount from 10 cents up. Proceeds will go into the American Legion treasury.

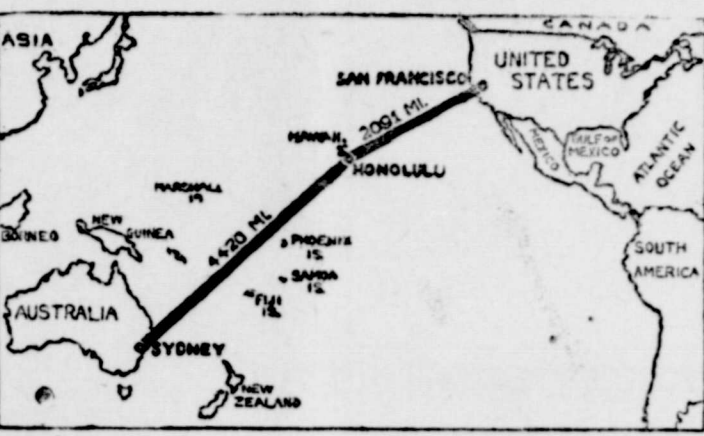

Claim of Recovery of Road Machines Missed Since Ferguson Regime Stirs Senator to Demand Names and Dates

AUSTIN, May 27.—The senate ordered the highway commission to give names to the senate which would verify a recent statement given out by Commissioner Cone Johnson, in which he declared that three highway engineers had recovered certain equipment which had been missing since the Ferguson administration and that the commission would likely bring suit to recover damages to the equipment.

The senate wants to know who recovered the machinery, what its value was, in whose possession it was, and against whom it is contemplated bringing suit. "I want the general public to know the truth about these purported 'recoveries,'" said Senator L. D. Fairchild of Lufkin, friend of former governor James E. Ferguson, who introduced the resolution. Commissioner Cone Johnson refused to comment on the action of the senate. "You may quote me as having nothing to say," he said.

LARGE BUTCHER KNIFE SENT TO PRUNE STATE EXPENSE

AUSTIN, May 27.—A large rusty butcher knife was received by Senator Tom Pollard with a note admonishing him to use it in "paring down" appropriations bills. The knife was wrapped with a Ferguson Forum which carried a front page editorial on the amount of appropriations recommended by the committee from the house and senate. "The house has not been able to use this knife on the appropriation bills, and the senate needs it for the good of the people," the note, signed by Representative Swain of Honey Grove, declared. The note accompanying the butcher knife was offered as a resolution and ordered printed in the senate journal.

AUTOMOBILE INSURANCE MEN TO HOLD MEET

AUSTIN, May 27.—A meeting of representatives of all companies writing automobile insurance in this state will be held in Dallas at the Adolphus hotel on Wednesday, June 8, at 10 o'clock, according to R. L. Daniel, chairman of the state fire insurance commission. "A discussion will be held regarding the ways in which senate bill No. 242, passed by the regular session of the legislature, can be put into effect," Commissioner Daniel said. This law regulates the writing of automobile insurance.

BIDS ON 1,100,000 AUTO PLATES FOR 1928 OPENED

AUSTIN, May 27.—Bids on 1,100,000 automobile license plates for 1928 have been opened by the state board of control, but contracts will not be awarded for several days, since the bids were turned over to the highway commission for study before a final decision is made. The bids, according to H. H. Harrington, chairman of the board of control, were generally much lower than the price of 9 cents paid for the 1927 plates.

BOWERS IN FIGHT UPON PARK BOARD

AUSTIN, May 27.—"I'll bust Love's pipe dream," said Senator Bowers in the senate today in opposing a bill by Senator Love of Dallas, which would appropriate \$100,000 out of the state highway fund to be used in making a survey of the feasibility of constructing a state highway. The bill passed to engrossment by a vote of 14 to 7.

"Let's improve our roads so that farmers can haul their cotton to town before building a road a mile and a half high for Love and his Dallas pleasure seekers." Senator Berkley of El Paso spoke in favor of the bill. It is Senator Love's intention to name this proposed road the Davis Mountains State Park highway. It would be in the form of a letter O, about 80 miles in length and would start at Fort Davis in Jeff Davis county.

Carrying out recommendations of the governor, the house today passed finally a senate bill adding a saving clause to the act passed by the regular session abolishing manslaughter from the criminal code.

BLAST DRIVES RESCUERS OUT OF COAL MINE

WILKES BARRE, Pa., May 27.—A third explosion today following two hours after a blast which rocked the Woodward colliery of the Glen Alden Coal company at Kingston, near here, drove rescue crews from the mine month in fear of still other blasts. The second blast wrecked the sand house, burying two men beneath it and is believed to have snuffed out lives of five men missing after a blast yesterday at noon which killed two others.

Texas Boy Drowns Despite Pal's Efforts

PARIS, Texas, May 27.—Franklin Sargent, 8 son of Ben Sargent of Clarksville was drowned late last night at the country club there while swimming with school mates while attending a picnic. Heroic effort to save the boy was made by Pat O'Donnell, an 8-year-old playmate.

MANY NEW LIBRARIES ESTABLISHED IN TEXAS

AUSTIN, May 27.—Texas Library and Historical commission's state library report just completed shows new libraries opened in six Texas towns during the past two years, and seven subscription and club libraries started. Lubbock, Beaumont, Electra, Kingsville, Uvalde and Harlingen have new libraries and Texarkana, Alpine, Austin, Bonham, Clarendon, Del Rio and Hico have established subscription and club libraries, according to Miss Octavia Regan, state librarian. New library buildings have been completed or now under construction in Beaumont, Denton (College of Industrial Arts library), Fort Worth (Texas Christian University library), Goose Creek, Houston (three buildings) and Texarkana.

HOUSE PASSES LAST MAJOR MONEY BILL

AUSTIN, May 27.—The house this afternoon completed consideration of the educational appropriation bill and passed it to engrossment and third reading. It will come up for passage this afternoon, and will complete passage of the major appropriation bills. The educational bill as passed provides a net increase of \$70,000 over that carried in the bill as it was presented, and \$39,000 less than the senate bill. The bill will be referred to a free conference committee.

Lindbergh Happy as He Loops and Zooms Over Paris; Prepares for Hop to Brussels and Then London

PARIS, May 27.—Griming with satisfaction, Capt. Charles A. Lindbergh came to earth here today full of excitement over the beauty of Paris having spent an hour and a half in flight over the city this morning—his first flight since he turned off the motor in the "Spirit of St. Louis" at the end of his flight across the ocean.

HAWAII GETS READY FOR NEXT BIG FLIGHT

HONOLULU, May 27.—A committee of aviation enthusiasts and army and navy flyers in Hawaii will soon be named to work out details for the \$25,000 flight from the Pacific coast to Honolulu, Clarence H. Cooke of the local national aeronautical association announced today.

FIRST ENTRY ANNOUNCED FOR HONOLULU FLIGHT

ATLANTA, Ga., May 27.—P. A. Roofers, aviator of Savannah, Ga., today announced he will compete for the \$25,000 prize offered for a non-stop flight from San Francisco to Honolulu. He is believed to be the first aviator formally to enter the lists.

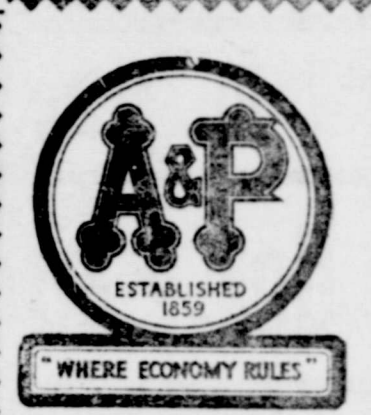

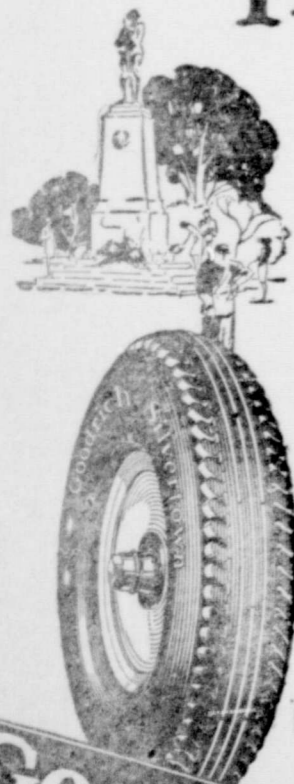
