FOOD CROPS FIRST

Secretary Hoover, Red Cross leaders and federal agricultural and health officials are already at work on rehabilitation plans for the flooded areas. It has been decided that "sustenance crops" should be planted first. Distribution of \$300,000 worth of vegetable seed has already begun. It is too late to think of raising staple crops such as sugar cane, rice and cotton for this season. Planting has progressed as far south in Arkansas as Little Rock, and as fast as land appears above the receding waters, it will be cultivated and seeded. The reconstruction of homes and re-establishment of farms and communities on a normal basis will take many weeks and months of work, the expenditure of much money and the extension of large and generous credit. Food will be needed in the future months as well as now, and it is good that food crops are being planned for now by planting as promptly as possible.

THE SCHOOL DOWNTOWN

The city of Cleveland has outgrown its school headquarters. The circumstances make an interesting section of American civic history. Proud indeed was the small town when the red brick building called Rockwell School went up. Very large it seemed, with its eight rooms or so, with its lawn, trees and playground. The children of the "best families" went to Rockwell School. The city grew. The old settlers moved. Children of tenement dwellings crowded, overcrowded Rockwell. They, too, moved elsewhere as the big buildings, public and business, went up around it. The Rockwell group dwindled until it was no longer worth while holding school in that locality. There were many schools by that time, kindergartens, academic and technical high schools, trades and continuation schools, and schools for the blind and deaf and half a dozen other special groups. The central school offices moved into the Rockwell building. They, in turn, grew and made additions to the building. The former playground is now parking place for cars of school officials. The city takes another step. It develops a group plan of public buildings. Old stuff must be tern down. Rockwell is in the path of progress. Shall there be a great new building for school headquarters? The superintendent says no. He wants, instead, as part of the group plan, a school for adults, with classes day and night. There will be offices for the few who must have the central location, but the supervisory staff will be decentralized. The adult who works by day can go to school at night, down town. The night worker can go to school by day. Space for 1,000 adult students is in the plan. Doubtless by the time the school is built, twice that number of students will be clamoring at its doors.
