On Charles Lindbergh's day of glory in New York the metropolitan newspaper reporters, in force, surrounded the boy's mother and tried to draw her out. It was a rare opportunity for any woman. She was raised to a pinnacle along with her famous son. Any word from her would go around the world and be read by tens of millions. And a little self-exploitation, might well be pardoned in any woman at such a moment. The press account of that interview is illuminating and eloquent in its testimony of what Mrs. Lindbergh did not say. She smiled, and gently parried the reporters' eager questions. Would she like to fly with her son? Well, she had flown with him—but not across the Atlantic. Could she pilot a plane? Yes—but not very well. Had she approved when Charles turned aviator? They had better ask him. Did she want to fly with him to San Diego? She hadn't been invited. Did he bring her anything from Europe? She didn't know. "Will your son's success have any effect on your teaching plans?" There was much involved in that question. It went to the heart of things. It involved a test of character. "I have signed my contract," replied the mother quietly. So she goes back to her job. A young hero's mother, whom the world suspects of being considerable of a hero herself, had the world's ear turned to her, and did not speak. No self-exploitation there! All the glory was for her son. But then, mothers are like that. And nothing can be done about it.

BASIS OF GOOD GOVERNMENT

Primaries as a means of nominating candidates for public offices have come in for a good deal of criticism lately. They were expected to counteract the evils of the convention system. They have proved to be very expensive and not very useful simply because voters stay away from the primaries in even greater numbers than they stay away from the polls on election day. Disappointment in this matter might be useful if it was made clear that even the most perfect system of nomination and election would be fruitless so long as there was little popular concern about candidates for office. Any system of government and any machinery for running it must be dependent upon the genuine interest of the people being governed. An absolute monarchy is overthrown when its subjects become sufficiently aroused against it to do something. And the most ideal democratic government ever tried or proposed must be only partially successful if it is only partially supported by intelligent citizens.

lic schools of Australia and New Zealand. It is considered of educational importance as well as an excellent and healthful exercise and sport. Swimming really seems to be coming into deserved popularity these days. In this country swimming is a year-round pastime. Points Continued Prosperity Throughout United States

The steel industry is experiencing nothing like the usual curtailment normal for this time of the year. Moreover, requirements of steel-using industries are due to expand in the next few months. A large rehabilitation program will be financed in the flood zones during the remainder of the year.

Tire Makers Rushed
The situation in the automobile industry is plainly indicated by the activity in the tire plants. The Akron rubber factories are at a high rate of production and earnings are showing a better ratio to sales, owing to the lower prices of crude rubber. The three Goodyear

plants, one in Akron, one in California and one in Canada, are at peak production for the first time in history.

The automobile situation admittedly is spotty, but the leaders are working on high schedules and introduction of new models soon to appear is counted on to spur sales for the next three months.

There has been little change in the actual volume of new construction contracts let, but the new permits have slipped in number.

Actual work, however, has been at a high level. Most building materials are firm except iron pipe

and fir timbers. Brick is flowing in steadily from abroad. Sales of lead and zinc have been very good, and some buyers of the former seem to think the bottom has been reached. New business in lumber has been restricted, but unfilled orders have increased.

The actual volume of crude oil production has not shown a material decline, but a better sentiment now agitates the industry and this is being reflected in strength of some of the oil stocks on the big markets. Coal production is moving along in its narrow groove.

Commercial aviation has received what has probably been its greatest spurt in the last few weeks. Further impetus may come from the insurance companies which are considering extension of the all-risk policies and accident and travel policies to cover accidents incident to air travel.

Aviation interests
Aviation also has turned the attention of inventors, engineers and their experiments are not only
