LAKE CISCO MAY BE SITE FOR MEETING

A conference will be held here Saturday looking toward establishment of a permanent summer encampment at Cisco for Districts 1, 2 and 3 of the Christian church, according to a letter received Friday by C. R. West. The letter came from J. M. Rieger, Breckenridge attorney, who is chairman of a committee named at a recent conference held at Stamford, the chairman and the president of the convention to name the other two members. The letter named Mr. West as a member of the committee which will have the task of selecting a site for the encampment.

The letter says, in this regard: "It was suggested at the convention that we consider Cisco for the encampment, out at the lake. The location is central and easily accessible; the ground almost ideal, the lack of shade trees being about the only serious objection. Again, the location is near Randolph college and will give an opportunity to see the plant and keep it before the brotherhood. Many other reasons and matters of detail were mentioned, matters to be worked out after a decision to hold it has been made."

"At the suggestion of the president, I am suggesting your name. First, I want to know that you would accept, and I would like to have some idea of the feasibility of the proposition. Could we get the ground? Would the people at interest, the management of the lake, the City of Cisco, the chamber of commerce, the Cisco church—would they all favor the proposition and do the things needed to make it a success. We should have to have a meeting place, tabernacle or something of the kind, and some help about a campaign of advertising. We could depend on the encampment caring for the other expenses. I saw Dr. Caton in Eastland today, and he was very favorable to the project and spoke very highly of you as the local man to work on the district committee. The time suggested has been the last half of August, probably later so as to run a week into September."

"If preliminaries can be arranged satisfactorily, I am very anxious to have the meeting. It will be a great boon to the church in this section, to Cisco and to Randolph. We can get such an array of ability there as will give us the greatest advance we have ever had in this section of the state."

WORD TO MARS MAY BE SENT OVER RADIO

THORNBERGH International News Service Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON, June 24.—Proceeding on the theory that geometrical truths are known to any intelligent enough to receive a radio or light message, and that interplanetary communication is not yet beyond the range of possibility, Dr. Alfred N. Goldsmith, chief broadcast engineer of the Radio Corporation of America, is planning a series of attempted communications with Mars.

Once the apparatus is set up—either a huge bank of searchlights for a light message, or a beam transmitter of thousands of kilowatts power for a radio signal, Dr. Goldsmith's program will be this: Telegraphic Dots First will be transmitted a sequence of telegraphic dots—followed by another sequence of dots. This is calculated to attract the attention of the inhabitants of Mars. The signals sent from the terrestrial station should be such that if received on another planet the idea of regular contact would be conveyed.

"This should be carried on for a long time," Dr. Goldsmith said, "never waiting with receiving apparatus for the answering signal. My first message would be based on the assumption that geometrical truths are universal and known to anyone intelligent enough to get a light or radio message. The right angle triangle is the most simple of the geometrical truths."

CONVICTS IN TEN DEMANDS TO OFFICIALS

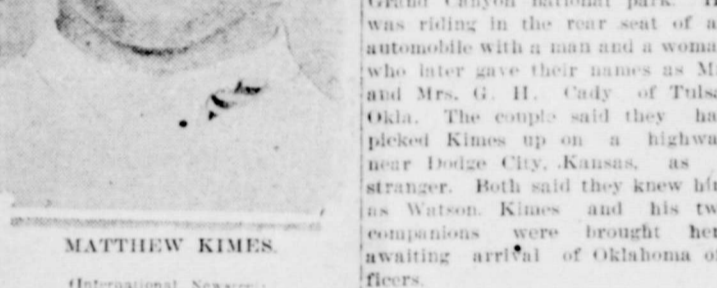

HUNTSVILLE, June 24.—The alleged ring leader of 35 convicts who late Thursday night escaped from the state prison farm in Madison county, was believed captured when Ed Crowder, Houston bank robber serving a 40-year term, was caught by a farmer today. Crowder is reported to have made attempts to bribe the farmer to allow him to escape. Price Washover, serving a sentence from Galveston county, also is reported to have been captured by a negro farmer. It is reported the farmer had to shoot Washover before he surrendered.

SECOND LUSE TEST SOON TO BE DRILLING

The derrick has been skidded 200 feet west of Luse Estate No. 1, and is now being rigged up for a second test of the area just northwest of Cisco, it was announced Friday by Jim Flournoy, representing the Associated Petroleum Co. of Fort Worth, drillers of the tests. The new well is expected to be drilled by July 1. The No. 1 well could not be cleaned out, following a heavy shot, and was abandoned, leaving much casing in the hole. The test was reported to have had an excellent showing of oil, leading to the decision to drill the second test. The City of Cisco owns land adjoining the Luse estate, and should a big produce be brought in in that territory, the city would stand in a good way to receive much revenue from oil.

GENEVA, June 24.—Great Britain has refused to withdraw or at least modify the proposals which it has made to the tripartite naval conference here regarding reduction of the size and life of capital ships. Hugh Gibson, chief American delegate, suggested to Hon. W. C. Bridgeman, chief British delegate, that the proposals be withdrawn, but Bridgeman declined. He did agree to give the American delegates a complete memorandum of the British idea on reduction of cruiser construction. Bridgeman even went so far as to threaten to demand a plenary session of the conference Tuesday in order to force Gibson to state publicly the American attitude toward capital ships. The British appear annoyed at the reception given their proposals by the Americans and Japanese.

LAKE CISCO BATHING POOL DAM GOES OUT

Those Ciscoans who did not go swimming at the Lake Cisco Bathing Beach Thursday will have to wait at least another week before taking a plunge. OFFICIAL WASHINGTON SETTLED OVER EVENTS

WASHINGTON, June 24.—Officialdom in Washington has been nettled over Great Britain's attitude toward further naval disarmament. In the six years that have elapsed since Great Britain "joyously accepted" naval equality with the U. S., one of the naval experts cynically stated today that British views on naval affairs have undergone radical change.

The contract between Washington and Geneva conference is so marked, that it is the almost sole topic for discussion in diplomatic circles here. Instead of supporting each other's views as at Washington, the American and British delegates have clashed on almost every point, and utter failure of the Geneva conference is already envisioned here.

Administration officials have met the new British position with the stand that there will be no sacrifice of the 5-5-3 ratio at Geneva. The U. S. is still the richest nation on earth and still could outbid the nations of the world in cruisers and destroyers, just as she was outbidding the rest of the world in capital ships a few years ago.

NATURAL BORN SCRAPPERS

"What is the use of two great national political parties?" asked an inquisitive person the other day. "Why don't we have just one party? Why do we have to be split up into two contending political forces?"

Because, our friend, the human being is so constituted that he must have opposition. The human creature is a scrappy creature. He simply must fight. Peace is not of his nature.

If there were only one political party, there would be no party at all, because everybody in the party would be fighting everybody else in it. There would be no unity, no fellowship, no team play, there would be nothing to hold the voters together.

"The Democrats are about to get us," shout the Republicans; then all the Republicans get into mass formation and put up with each other's foolishness and forget the difficulties among themselves, and turn their eyes toward the enemy.

"The Republicans are about to get us," yell the Democratic leaders; but often the Democratic leaders cannot yell that loudly enough to be heard above the noise of combat going on within their own ranks.

There is a basic reason for more scrapping among Democrats than among Republicans. It is this way. There are certain states in the United States that are almost solidly Democratic. In such states, there being no formidable Republican party to fight, the Democrats fight each other. On the other hand, there is no state in the union that is solidly Republican. Consequently, the Republican party in every state has a Democratic party to line up against; that keeps the Republicans more or less united.

New Dance Steps For Brides Are Reno Hop and California Hobble

(By Clem Whitaker) SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 22.—Two new steps for prospective brides and grooms, the Reno-hop and the California-hobble, promise to add variety to marriage rehearsals in the not far distant future. It was revealed today by state officials.

Whether the state's marital records would be newly needed to hop to marriage altars at Reno and way points to doing the three-day hobble in California is an important matter too. At least, it's important to California's "marrying persons." Justices of the peace, et al., not to mention hotel keepers intent on keeping their bridal suites occupied.

Although the new law requiring would-be newlyweds to apply for their license three days before the ceremony will not become effective until July 29, rumor has it that young couples in every section of the state are already chanting "Shall we hop, or shall we hobble, each delay means another squabble."

Half "Gin Marriages" The new state law, introduced by Assemblyman George Rochester of Los Angeles, was proposed to halt "gin marriages," and force young couples to Stop, Look and Listen three days before taking the matrimonial hop.

By requiring three days' notice before a marriage license is issued it effectively bars elopements—at least in California. State officials, however, are inclined to believe that you can't stop the course of true love, and some that isn't true, by statute. They also fear that the marriage business, somewhat of a leading industry, will be picked up by adjoining states.

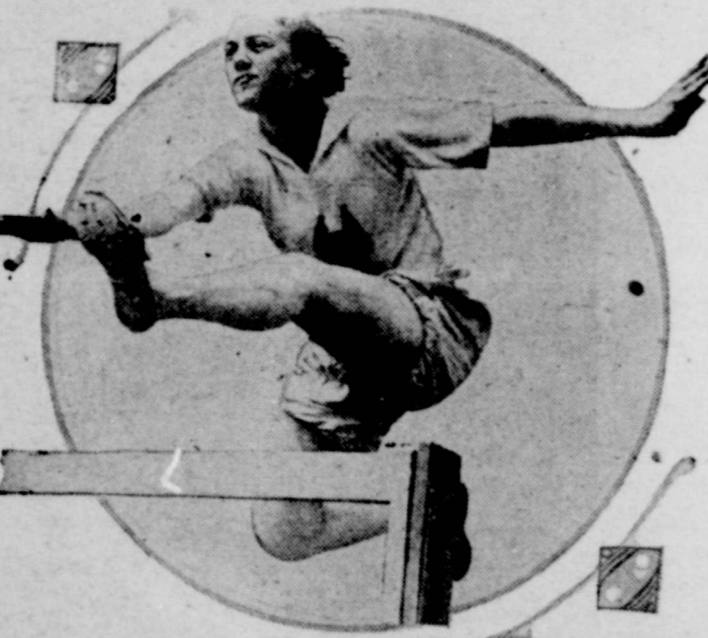

## Texas Opens War on Loan Shark; Lenders Make Up to 1,000 Per Cent

FORT WORTH, June 24.—The state of Texas has declared war on the "loan shark." Considerable time during the recent special session of the legislature was given to the matter of curbing the activities of the money lenders, and a legislative committee is now investigating charges of usury.

Some complaints have reached members of the committee of cases where interest rates of from 120 to 1,000 per cent per annum have been charged by money lenders who make loans on salaries and household goods. These complaints, however, are few because the victims of the "loan sharks" as a rule, are reticent about airing their troubles to others.

# "Defeat Judiciary Amendment," Press Committee Says

## Legislature Contemptuously Killed Bill Submitted by Editors and Put Up Another Advocating Opposite

Defeat of the judiciary reform amendment as proposed for adoption by the people of Texas in an election to be held in August is urged by a resolution adopted by the Texas Press Association at its recent meeting in El Paso. A copy of the resolution has just been received here, and is as follows:

1. In pursuance of the instructions contained in the resolution by which it was created, it cooperated with a similar committee appointed by the State Bar Association in pressing before the legislature several remedial bills prepared by that committee. They got little consideration, and all of them were promptly killed by the legislature.

2. It joined in bringing to Texas to address the people at the last state fair held in Dallas, Judge Marcus Kavanaugh of Chicago, one of the outstanding figures in the national movement for court reform. His address was widely circulated and made a lasting impression upon the people of this state.

3. It submitted to the legislature but one bill and this was proposed by Judge Kavanaugh as the most important of all judicial reforms. It provided that all rules of procedure should be directory instead of mandatory. The purpose was to acquire the appellate courts to decide all cases on their merits, and to put an end to the scandalous system of exalting procedure above right and justice. This bill was contemptuously killed by the legislature.

4. It has, through the press, brought this subject to the attention of all the people of Texas and it is in the public mind the most important and the most urgent question which now calls for the attention of the legislature.

5. One of the proposals submitted by the bar association committee looked to the abolishment of the court of civil appeals and the enlargement of the supreme court, to the end that the law may, in all cases, be declared by one supreme court. This is so manifestly demanded by common sense and by the lessons of experience

that your committee gave this proposal its earnest support. The legislature not only defeated this measure but substituted for it a proposal to perpetuate the courts of civil appeals. We earnestly recommend that the press of Texas shall urge the voters to defeat the proposed judiciary amendment of the constitution to be voted on in August for the following reasons:

(a) The confusion, uncertainty, delay and burdensome expense of litigation which have become intolerable to the people of this state are mainly the result of this system of multiplicity of courts of civil appeal, now eleven in number, each of which is, in the matter of procedure, almost a supreme law unto itself. Law as declared by the final judgment of an appellate court is largely a creation of the temperament, discretion and morality of the judge who makes the pronouncement. Under the existing system we have thirty-three final law-givers for the state, each virtually supreme within his sphere, and each exercising jurisdiction over the entire state by reason of the precedents he may establish and by reason of the system of transfer of cases from one district to another. These judges differ as men, and particularly lawyers, usually differ. The result is that Jacob's coat of many colors was not more veritable than is the law of Texas as declared in our legal reports. Lawyers of experience hesitate to interpret it with assurance, and the litigant can only unravel the mystery at the end of a long and costly lawsuit. The final result often depends upon what court of civil appeals will catch the case under the reassignment which the supreme court must make to equalize the dockets of the several courts of civil appeal.

(b) Under the present system the masses of the people do not have access to the supreme court, but it is reserved for the exclusive use of litigants whose cases involve amounts in excess of \$1,000, except in a small number of

cases which involve peculiar issues. To the little man his little case may be of greater importance to him than \$50,000 may be to the big man or the big corporation. Yet the law now says to the little man that he is not of enough consequence to be entitled to a hearing at the hands of the supreme court. This is fundamentally wrong and when it shall be fully understood by the people, they may

be relied on to express their condemnation. The civil rights of the citizen can not be measured in dollars and cents. Every citizen, high or low, is entitled to equal consideration in the courts of the land.

(c) To perpetuate a multiplicity of appellate courts will inevitably perpetuate the present intolerable system of court procedure which called these courts into existence. The people demand a simple, common sense and inexpensive judicial system. They can never get it with twelve supreme appellate courts (as proposed by the amendment to be voted on in August), each grinding out new law and new procedure every week, much of which would necessarily be conflicting. With a simplified system of procedure, such as that which exists in Arkansas, the business of the courts could be promptly handled by one-half the number of trial courts we now have, and one supreme court could dispose of the appeals more easily than one supreme court of the United States now handles all of the appeals which reach it from the several states and districts of the republic. Under a simplified system a lawsuit which now takes ten days to reach a final result would take but one day to try and one year to reach a conclusion on appeal. It is said by lawyers of experience that under the present system the total cost of litigation, including the personal as well as the court costs, equals, if it does not exceed, the total product of litigation. It is certainly true that the cost is so excessive that the demand of the people for relief can no longer be ignored.

(d) The present system, which

is mainly the product of the courts of civil appeal, has been fully tried and has been found wanting. The proposed judiciary amendment would fix it upon the people in perpetuity. They demand a change which will give relief, not an

amendment to the constitution which will put it beyond the power of the legislature to give relief. It would be as illogical and as harmful to operate twelve separate legislatures for Texas as to operate twelve separate and virtually independent supreme appellate courts. In the law, at least, let us have one Lord, one faith, one baptism.

(e) For these and other good reasons we recommend that the press of Texas shall urge that all voters shall go to the polls next August and help kill the proposed judiciary amendment. If it shall be defeated by a large majority the attempt to foist the present intolerable system of procedure upon the people of Texas forever will probably be abandoned.

6. We further recommend that the association shall at this time issue an invitation to the people of Texas to join in with it in a great mass meeting to be held in Dallas during the next state fair, and that steps shall be taken at this meeting to inaugurate a constructive movement for court reform, both civil and criminal.

7. We suggest that the press of Texas shall direct the attention of the people to the urgent need for the election of legislators of sound judgment and tested experience. The greatest danger which now confronts this country is the tendency to centralize all power in the federal government. This is the inevitable result of a failure upon the part of the state to function in accordance with the design of the founders of the government. One of the highest official duties is to legislate for the people. That duty cannot be safely entrusted to the young man who

employs it as a stepping stone to professional success or to a lobbyist who enters upon it as an adjunct of his private engagements. We earnestly recommend that all of the right thinking people of the state shall unite next year in the election of a legislature which will measure up to the importance of the task before it.

8. We recommend that a committee of five be appointed by the president of this association which shall be styled a committee on court reform and which shall be charged with the duty of carrying on the movement and to execute the plans here outlined, and vested with such powers as may be necessary to that end.
