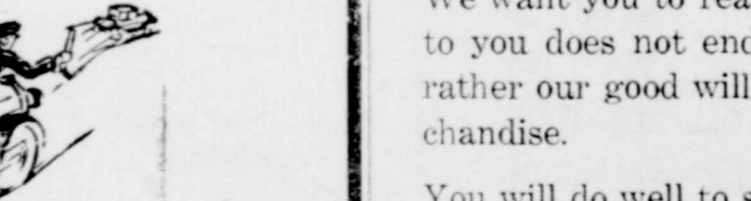

TYLER, June 27.—During the past four months ten carloads of eggs and a dozen carloads of poultry have been shipped from Tyler, involving expenditures of approximately \$45,000. One large produce house, with offices here, is endeavoring to ship one car of eggs and a half a car of poultry weekly, and this company has frequent-

ly paid out more than \$1500 for poultry and eggs in a single day. A carload of eggs is valued at \$3000 and poultry at \$3800.

Doctors Exiled From Mexico Take Exams. AUSTIN, June 27.—Examination of 112 applicants for license to practice medicine, which has been in progress here for several days, before the State Board of Medical Examiners, of which board Dr. H. B. Cummings of Hearne

is chairman, has been completed. Of the 112 applicants, 10 are Mexicans; five women, of whom one was a negress, and two negroes and an Italian were among those taking the examination. The Mexicans are all doctors who were exiled from Mexico.

The medical board of examiners will meet at Dallas within the next 30 days, when announcements will be made of those who passed the examination, and licenses will be awarded.
