WEALTH IN FARM WASTE

A remarkable opportunity for agriculture, involving a revolution in American industry, was opened up in a recent address by Prof. O. R. Sweeney of Iowa State College. He points to farm waste as the greatest unused resource of this continent, and urges new, rational ways of using it. Energy comes from the sun. The Corn Belt, he says, is a great sponge for absorbing solar heat and storing it in a form suitable for human use. There is no such "energy trap" anywhere on earth, he declares, where white men can live and thrive. In this he repeats the doctrine long taught by Columbus Austin Bowsher of Philadelphia, the "Philosopher of Americanism." But he goes further, pointing out a practical application. It is in the mid-west, with its prolific production of farm crops and immense present waste of useful products, he says, that American industrialism should be located. Factories today are in cities because the men building them live there. The eastern seaboard is over-populated, far from the source of raw materials, and subject to unnecessarily expensive living conditions. Industry is overcentralized and geographically lop-sided. He would spread industry around the country, especially through the great farming sections. Hundreds of millions of tons of industrial raw materials go to waste every year in the Corn Belt. Altogether, in corn stocks, corn cobs, oat chaff, straw, cottonseed hulls, peanut hulls and other farm waste full of precious cellulose, from which chemistry already can make 30,000 known industrial products, there is a yearly output of 1,000,000,000 tons of unused raw stuffs, equal to twice our total tonnage of soft coal. From it can be made whatever can be made from coal, and many thousands of products besides. If all this is true—and evidently it is—American industrialists have something to think about, and a future awaits American agriculture which will bring it the riches now poured into the cities. Farming will come into its own, as the great feeder of industry—feeding alike factory workers and factories. And if this is true, farm values are going only in one direction, which is up.

TREATY RESULTS.

If the American treaty "for the renunciation of war as an instrument of national policy" is signed by all the important nations, as is expected, and is ratified by the United States senate, as also expected, what then? Will it make any difference? Whether

Two results are expected to follow soon from this treaty. The other is "a change in methods of world diplomacy." Diplomacy could stand quite a little changing in the direction of friendliness and frankness, which work for peace.


