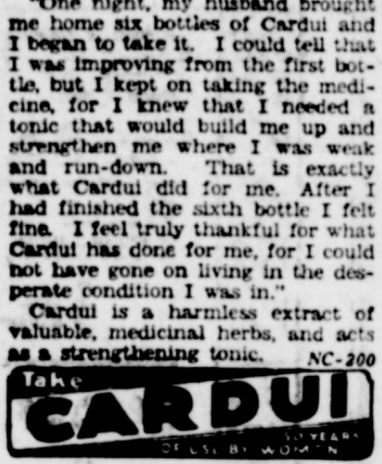

OIL NEWS OF SOUTHWEST

SEMINOLE, Okla., March 1.—

Total production in the greater Seminole and St. Louis areas, where some of the world's highest gravity crude oil is produced, Wednesday was 410,611 barrels from 197 wells, a decline of 7,516 barrels from the production of 418,127 barrels Tuesday.

Activity in the Little pool amounted to the completion of three new wells and the abandonment of two old ones. The Mission field started yesterday when it produced 49,717 barrels from 71 wells. The Maud pool with its 78 wells produced 36,988 barrels.

The report by pools: Little river \$1,118 barrels; Bow legs 36,249; Eastboro 60,346; Seminole City 34,279; Seacright 9,283; Maud 36,988; Mission 49,717; St. Louis pool 100,768; Pearson pool 1,800.

HOUSTON, March 1.—Gulf Production company completed four producers in the Bruner or east Luling field Wednesday. No. 5-Tiller et al pumping 500 barrels at 2730 feet; No. 2 pumping 600 barrels at 2750 feet; No. 4-Carter flowing 600 barrels from 2660 feet and No. 3-Alien and Tiller (swabbing) 150 barrels at 2725 feet.

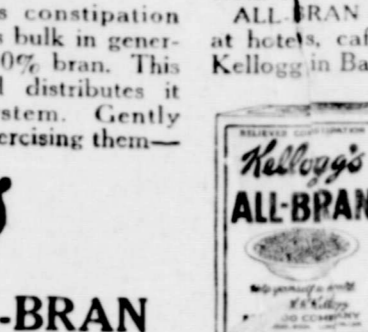
