AUSTIN, March 12.—The fight over prison relocation, which seemingly had been settled by agreement of committees from the house and senate, was renewed today when an attempt was made to get the house to agree to the compromise. An effort to force a vote at noon failed.

### RUINS FROM STOCK SHOW FIRE CLEARED

FORT WORTH, March 12.—Workers were clearing up rain-soaked ruins today after a fire which burned two exhibit buildings and took one life yesterday at the Pat Stock show. A body found in the ruins late yesterday was identified as that of W. R. James, 41, harness salesman, who became separated from two companions in heavy smoke and perished in the flames.

### Commercial State Bank of Ranger Successful Bidder for Depository for County Funds at 2 1-2 Per Cent

WASHINGTON, March 12.—President Hoover today appointed Ernest L. Jahnke of New Orleans to be assistant secretary of the navy. He succeeds Theodore Douglas Robinson of New York. Patrick J. Hurley of Tulsa, Okla., was appointed assistant secretary of war. He succeeds Colonel C. C. Robinson of Iowa.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Troops from Port Huachuca have been ordered to Naco, Ariz., on the Mexican border, to protect that town and the water supply of Bisbee, the war department announced today.

### STARVED TO DEATH CHICAGO, March 12.—Living on 67 cents a day interest from \$7,000 scattered in 35 different savings banks, Harry Kline, 61, collapsed of starvation and died, owing an impoverished landlady several months rent. Kline collapsed after making his monthly round to collect his interest from banks scattered from Evanston to South Chicago. He had no faith in any one financial institution.

MEXICO CITY, March 12.—Mexican federal troops advancing westward from Monterey were ordered this morning to launch an immediate offensive against rebel centers in the state of Coahuila, with Saltillo as the first objective. Gen. Juan Almazan was in command of the federal column which Minister of War Calles ordered to attack Saltillo, which presumably has been recaptured by insurgents under Gen. J. Gonzalez Escobar. The government previously had announced that Escobar had evacuated Saltillo and retired to Torreon.

### SMUGGLING ACTIVITIES ARE FOUND

EL PASO, March 12.—First smuggling of arms across the Rio Grande was revealed today by H. A. Horsley, chief of the United States border patrol. Two patrolmen, investigating an island in the river, were fired on from ambush last night by smugglers who escaped.

MADISON Wis., March 12.—Two bandits robbed state employees of \$125,000 in state bonds within a block of the capitol building today. Only \$3,000 of the amount was in cash. The robbery occurred in front of the automobile license division, housed in a separate building a hundred yards from the capitol square. The funds represented the week end receipts for automobile licenses from all parts of Wisconsin.

CHICAGO, March 12.—The federal government today started proceedings under the Sherman anti-trust law against the Linderoth Celadon Co. charging that the concern had obtained a monopoly on 90 per cent of the tile roofing business east of the Rocky mountains.

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### POT SHOTS —AT— POLITICS —By— Col. Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald AUSTIN

Those who read the daily newspapers are aware that what is known as the Wirtz bill passed the house of the 41st and the senate on the governor's table. They are not aware that a woman legislator piloted the bill through the house. It is a fact notwithstanding. Rep. Laura Burleson of San Antonio, member of the House county delegation, demonstrated that there are women legislators who are leaders in the legislative game, and are very influential when it comes to winning over to their cause through the sheer force of brain power, tactful ways and the charm of personality.

Rep. Negley is the daughter of former Postmaster Gen. A. S. Burleson. She has been complimentary on all sides for her leadership. Like her father, she is a Republican, she believes that a party platform is as sacred as any other kind of a pledge and that those who refuse to support the nominee after active participation in primary elections, should not be given places of honor until they have shown contrition and repented for their pledge breaking act.

As for the Wirtz bill it is not a Republican measure. It merely provides that the state executive committee of a political party shall have the power to prescribe the qualifications of participants in primary elections, applicants for place on official ballots for primary candidates and provide the penalty attached for rank violation of the above made at the primary ballot box. It is a general law. It is for Republicans as well as Democrats. It is for the prohibition party voters as well as the union party voters. It is for every other organization desirous of placing names of candidates on the official primary ballot and depending on their principles and their standard bearers at the primary as well as the regular elections.

A political party has a right to name the qualifications of voters as well as the qualifications required of candidates whose names go on the official ballot. If the chairman and executive committee of the party go down in defeat it is their funeral. If they win the election it is their victory.

Representative Negley is the daughter of one of the most successful Texans who has ever made a name for himself in the political battles of the nation and of the higher councils of the party as well as a name in state politics and leadership. He was active from early manhood until he withdrew from politics after Woodrow Wilson, his idol, had returned to private life. It is said that blood still tell. It is certainly telling, at least in this instance, in the daughter of the house of Burleson. On all sides she is being acclaimed as a woman lawmaker who knows the science of politics and the legislative game.

### EFFORTS FOR SANATORIUM TO CONTINUE

# Campaign for Randolph College Gathering Impetus; Importance of School to Cisco Is Emphasized

With \$10,000 so far raised, and with no effort on the part of the drive committee, the campaign for Randolph college is moving into a definite channel of progress. A meeting last night, in the presence of very inclement weather, resulted in the appointment of a special committee which, under the leadership of Mayor J. M. Williamson, will have the direction of the campaign in hand in the hope that the entire drive will have been completed by the end of the week. The committee is composed of P. Wright, W. W. Wallace, P. P. Shepard and E. P. Crawford.

At a luncheon at the Savoy Cafe the final details of the drive were worked out. In the meantime contributions continue to come in and the subscription total is climbing steadily. One subscription is payable over a period of 10 years in equal installments. The death of a donor leaves his estate from further liability for any part of the note that does not die at the time of his death. The notes are non-negotiable and the disbursement of the money and thereby must be approved by the machinery of the chamber of commerce. Thus 15 thoroughly representative men will govern the expenditure of the funds, having in mind the interest of Randolph college as well as the interest of the community.

"This matter," said Mayor Williamson last night, "has been dragged along long enough. We have discussed it periodically for the past several years. The reasons why we could not see this money leaving out of conversation the reasons why we can't have it at the point where it must terminate to get through with this matter. The result of the meeting was to apply that the chamber of commerce must forget the reasons advanced against the success of the campaign and start again with a clean slate, taking hold of the problem with one purpose in mind—of raising the \$50,000 quota. Some of the consensus of opinion is that Randolph college should be put in a new effort and a new termination.

I agreed to go among the churches and ascertain whether or not the sentiment of those leaders was shared by the churches as a whole. I am glad to report that I have been in more than 60 churches in the west and of the entire number only three have been found that are not enthusiastic about the program.

# Loboes Return From State Basket Ball Meet With Reputation for Being "Fightingest" Team There

The Big Dam Lobo basketball team and their coach, "Crip" Golightly returned from the state basketball meet held at A & M college last Friday and Saturday, with a beautiful trophy presented to them by the University Interscholastic league as winners of third place in the state championship tournament. Monday morning in chapel at Cisco high school, George Van Horn, captain of the Lobo basketball team and guard and captain of the all-state team as picked by the committee of southwestern conference coaches and officials, presented the trophy won by the Loboes to the students of Cisco high school. Each member of the team was presented with bronze basketballs also given by the University Interscholastic league. The Loboes receiving these were George Van Horn, captain; Wendell Whitehead, Ollie Little, "Chuck" Van Horn, "Cotton" Pippen, O. C. Ray, Owen Price, Coborn Yeager, "Curly" Kellogg and Garth Daniel.

The Loboes returned from A. & M. with the reputation of being the "fightingest" team in the tournament. Sport writers of the state who picked the leading teams before the meet, were almost unanimous in the opinion that the Loboes would be eliminated in their first game with Main Avenue high school of San Antonio. The Loboes, however, upset the dope and went into the semi-finals to be eliminated by the powerful Athens aggregation that won the championship. The Loboes made as good a showing against any team in the tournament. Percy Anderson of the Athens News says that "The Cisco Loboes placed third in the state high school tournament, much to our surprise, and we think to the surprise of most others. Third place is the best ranking a West Texas team since the Dallas team of 1924 or was it the Canyon team of 1926?"

Congratulations are in order to Coach Golightly and his Loboes therefore. They are due extra credit because they reached third place in state standings not with a group of talented basketball players, but on their fight and determination. The Loboes were handicapped by lack of size, and Pippen and Van Horn were the only smooth performers on the club.

The lack of size of which Percy refers was very evident on the part of the Loboes in all their games in the meet. All teams that the Loboes played had at least one tall man. Main Avenue had a center who was six feet and six inches in

height. Athens had the prize for height. On their squad are seven men who stand over six feet. Tompkins, their four-state forward, is six feet and four and one-half inches tall. Against such teams as this Coach Golightly had only two boys who even approached six feet in height, but what the Loboes lacked in this respect they made up for in determination, fight and hustle.

The feature of the tournament was the brilliant all-round work of George Van Horn, captain of the Loboes. Van Horn was the unanimous choice of the committee of southwestern conference coaches and officials that picked the all-state team, as a guard and captain of the mythical team, and the most valuable man in the tournament. This honor was won by brilliant, accurate passing, a fighting spirit that never gave up, and the greatest asset, the ability to think quickly and really when things were going the worst for his team. O. C. Ray, guard along with Van Horn for the Loboes, was placed on the second all-state team. "Cotton" Pippen, forward for the Loboes was given honorable mention.

In their first game of the tournament the Loboes were doped to lose. They met Main Avenue led by their six foot six inch center, Ollie, and for the first three quarters the Loboes were behind. The score at the end of the first quarter was 6 to 2. At the half the Loboes trailed by the score of 13 to 7. The Loboes settled down and at the end of the third quarter they were only one point behind with the score 17 to 16. In the last quarter the Loboes took the lead and won after a hard fight by the score of 27 to 23. Friday night the Loboes met Denison high school who had defeated El Paso in the first round. The Loboes were again doped to lose. Denison led 1 to 9 at the half and at the end of the third quarter the Loboes appeared to be certain losers with the score 23 to 14 against them. In the fourth quarter, George Van Horn displayed the great nerve, ability and fighting spirit that won him the position of all-state guard when he very coolly and deliberately shot three beautiful long field goals within two minutes time to put the Loboes back in the running. The fighting come-back of the Loboes, tied the score and the game ended 25 all. In the three minute overtime period the Loboes scored seven points in one for Denison and won by the score of 32 to 29. Saturday morning the Loboes met the skyscraper Athens team in the semi-finals. The

Loboes put up a game battle but were outclassed and lost to the team that won the state championship by the score of 31 to 17. Saturday night the Loboes played Estelina for the third place honors. Estelina was the favorite chiefly because they had in Baccus' brilliant shooting, led by Baccus' brilliant shooting, took the lead in the first quarter on the Loboes by the score of 9 to 2. At the half the score stood 11 to 3 with Estelina leading. In the third quarter the Loboes got busy and were leading 16 to 13 at the end of the period due largely to the fact that George Van Horn made a basket and was fouled in the act of shooting and made both of the free shots, giving the Loboes four points in a hurry. In the fourth quarter Estelina battled furiously to overtake the Loboes and came very close to it. "Cotton" Pippen of the Loboes was forced to leave the game because of four personal fouls. Owen Price went in for him. In the last four minutes Price made six points to clinch the game for the Loboes. This game gave the Loboes third place in the meet.

The season just finished is the third that Coach "Crip" Golightly

has coached the Loboes. During each of these years the Loboes have won the district and bi-district championships and gone to the state meet. In 1927 the Loboes drew a bye in the first round and lost to Athens, who won the championship that year. In 1928 the Loboes won from Labbock in the first round and lost by one point to Forest Avenue in the second round. This year the Loboes were not even picked to win the district flag. They were lacking in height. Height is a great asset when in a game of basketball. In spite of this handicap Golightly put out one of the best teams in the state, a team that was in splendid condition and well trained. The officials of the state meet credited the Loboes with having the best conditioned and best trained team in the meet. This accounted for their great ability to "come-back" after being beaten in the first part of several different games. The Loboes might have done even better if they had not been handicapped by having to practice at home on a small playing floor and then play in the championship meet on a maximum size court. 

DENIES KNOWLEDGE. COLUMBUS, O., March 12.—In his first specific public statement since his removal from the Harding cabinet, former Attorney General Harry M. Daugherty today denied knowing anything about the "little green house on K street" in Washington, which figured in his retirement from the cabinet.
