CONTRACT FOR MARFA ROAD ARE AWARDED

AUSTIN, March 20.—The state highway commission has agreed to assist in the construction of an improved road from Fort Davis to Marfa and a bridge over Arroyo Alamito in Presidio county, the counties traversed by the road paying half the expense.

Contracts awarded yesterday were: Highway 9 in Coke and Tom Green counties, to Cage and Ruby of Bastrop on a bid of \$38,739; large drainage structures on same highway to Purvis and Bertram of Fort Worth at \$80,840.

Highway two in LaSalle county, Standifer Brothers of Big Wells, \$96,796; large drainage structures on same highway, L. Sanders of San Antonio, \$78,079.

Highway 35 in San Jacinto county, Russ, Mitchell, Houston, \$283,981. This work was held up awaiting right of way.

Highway 72 in DeWitt county, Standifer Brothers, \$38,750; large drainage structures, Austin Bridge company, Dallas, \$46,983.

Earth approaches to Capital Hill bridge over Brazos river, Martin Brothers, Beaumont, \$18,119.

Highway 79 in Wichita county, Carl C. Madsen, Paducah, \$17,096.

Highway 98 in Matagorda county, Harton, Houston, \$33,336.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., March 20.—Three adventuresome young men who recently completed a rapid 14,000 mile tour into the heart of the Transjordan, Arabia, and Syria returned with shattering opinions about romantic illusions of the desert.

The travelers—Robert P. Brown of Moorestown, N. J.; Richard A. Tausig and Chester P. McCreery, both of Germantown, Pa.—were entertained by three kings of the Near East. They met the world-famous figure, Emir Faisal, king of Basra; his brother, Abdullah, emir of Transjordan; and their father, Hussein, now living under the protection of the British government in the Island of Cyprus.

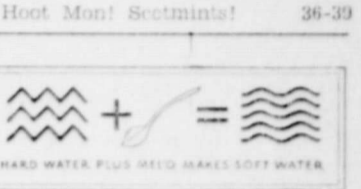
ELLIOTT DRUG TO HANDLE AIR TICKETS

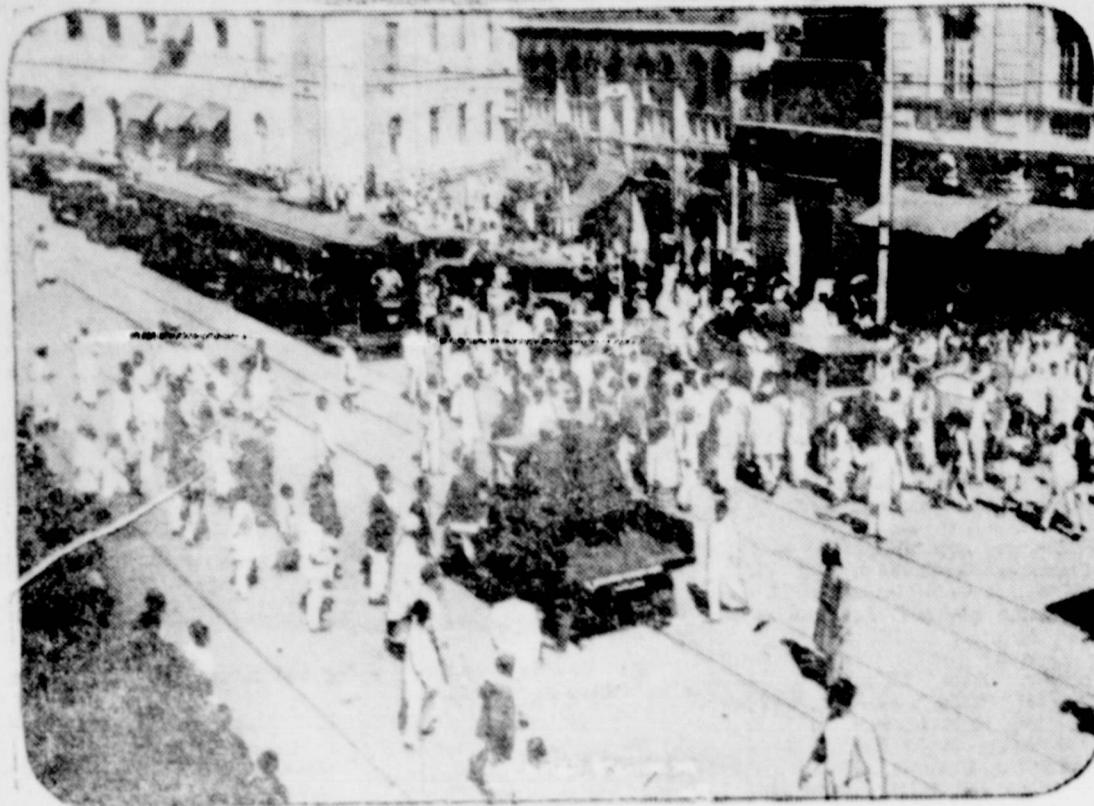

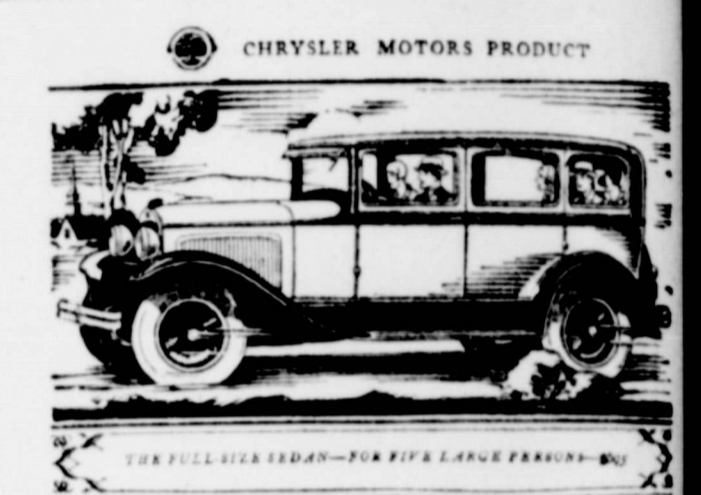

COLUMBIA, Mo., March 20.—While a eavesdropper co-ed sat on a window sill passing information to a crowd of students below, the board of curators of the University of Missouri met last night to question faculty members involved in the sex questionnaire controversy.

AMERICAN KIDNAPPED

MEXICO CITY, March 20.—The American embassy will make representations to the Mexican foreign office today in connection with the kidnapping of T. L. Proponents of Birth Control Are Waging Losing Fight in State Legislatures All Over Country

CHICAGO, March 20.—Proponents of birth control are waging a losing fight in state legislatures throughout the country.

Results of a United Press survey announced today disclose that law-making bodies of states are making bodies still believe on the whole that such legislation is ill-advised.

Texas—A bill providing for the sterilization of inmates of insane asylums was killed in the senate after passing the house.

New York—The Remer Birth Control bill which would require physicians to give contraceptive advice to married persons, was killed in the codes committee. Opposition to the proposal was led by a large group of Catholics.

North Carolina—Present legislation almost unanimously passed a bill providing for the sterilization of certain inmates of feeble-minded schools and insane asylums. The bills says that the operation must be recommended first by medical and welfare workers and that it cannot be performed without the consent of the inmate's relatives or guardian.

Minnesota—Several previous bills having failed, no birth control legislation was introduced in the legislature this year.

Connecticut—For the fourth straight session the general assembly this month rejected a birth control proposal when the judiciary committee reported against it, but without comment in the senate.

Colorado—A birth control bill has been introduced in the senate but there is little chance of its reaching the floor. The house passed the measure by three women workers members who sponsored it. A hearing on the bill

revealed overwhelming opposition. Ohio—The house health committee reported favorably on a bill providing for the use of mental detectives and habitual criminals.

Illinois—Bill for sterilization of incurably insane is now pending in committee.

New York—The state senate by a vote of 55 to 27 passed a measure providing for sterilization of habitual criminals and insane and feeble minded persons when and if examination given upon charge or parole reveals traits may be transmitted to their offspring.

California—This state has the sterilization laws. One pertains to feeble-minded and incompetent of rape or crimes against children. The state does not permit the dissemination of birth control information.
