Champions Are Named In Junior Livestock Show

Hansford County FFA and 4-H youngsters exhibited 161 head of animals in the annual junior livestock show held here Monday.

One hundred and twenty animals were sold in the auction Monday evening to local buyers for a total of \$31,637.35.

Judge of the show this year was Don Penny, Professor of Animal Husbandry, Oklahoma State University. Penny said animals exhibited Monday were the best he had ever judged.

He named an Angus steer exhibited by Kenneth Banks, Spearman FFA as the Grand Champion; a Hampshire barrow shown by Phil Sanders, Spearman FFA, as the Grand Champion, Grand Champion Lamb was shown by Raymond Walker, Gruver FFA. His brother, Milton, Gruver 4-H, showed the Reserve Champion Lamb.

Larry Walker, Gruver FFA, exhibited the Reserve Champion Barrow. Jock Lee, Spearman FFA showed the Reserve Champion steer, a Hereford.

In the sale of the animals, barrows averaged 69¢ per pound, lambs average \$1.14 and steers averaged 66¢.

Hansford Implement Company bought the grand champion steer for \$1,000 per pound for \$940.00. First State Bank paid the same pound price for the reserve champion steer for \$884.00.

R. L. McClellan paid \$1,200 for the grand champion barrow for a total of \$246.00. Gruver State Bank bought the reserve champion for 90¢ per pound and \$189.90.

The grand champion lamb sold to Ed Rafferty, Dick Doyle and Dayton Barkley for \$153.00, \$1.50 per pound. Cut Rate Grocery bought the reserve champion lamb for \$117.60, \$1.20 per pound.

Korean Speaks To Lions Club

Guests at the Lions Club meeting Tuesday were Mr. and Mrs. Yoon Kwon Chae and their daughter Jung Hae of Seoul, Korea. They were guests of Orville Brummett. The Brummetts and their CYF group of the First Christian Church have been sending money to Korea for several years to help with the work of the Kwon Chae's. The guests are in this country on a speaking tour. They visited Oregon, Washington and Colorado in February.

Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas, Texas in March; and will go to Iowa, Missouri, Illinois in April, and to Indiana, Kentucky and back in May. They represent the Korea Christian College, Geon Christian Children's Home, Korea Bible Correspondence School, and the "Whan Won" Christian Publishing House. Mr. Kwon Chae related the story of his life and ministry at the meeting. He was born in Seoul, Korea in 1932. His father was the first Christian

church minister in Korea. All his life poverty and persecution were his companions. At first they were under the domination of the Japanese and then in 1950 the Communists invaded South Korea and began to arrest Christian ministers one by one. Both Kwon Chae and his father were arrested. He was young enough to make an escape but his father was not.

When the war was over, he began to search for his father. At one place he found a number of Christian leaders who had been shot and burned. He looked into all these faces to see if his father was there. He could not identify him. The families of the deceased began to gather and sing that beautiful song "In the Sweet By and By". They sang and sang, more than 50 times. He looked around the gathering and saw that no one was crying; they were all looking up to heaven where members of their families were having a wonderful time with Jesus Christ. There was no more crying. This was when he dedicated his life to the ministry of Jesus Christ. He has been preaching ever since.

He came to the United States to study. He attended San Jose Bible College and Lincoln Christian College. He returned to Korea in 1961 and started his first church in 1962. Another was begun in 1964 and in 1965 the Central Christian Church was begun.

From these churches stemmed the Korea Christian College. The Korean people who had suffered so much sorrow in their past were hungry for the gospel.

The orphanage which is named after Kwon Chae's wife Geon was not planned, but what do you do when you see children who have lost their parents in fire, flood or by starvation, roaming the streets half-naked, kneeling on the frozen street, begging. They began to pick these children up and soon found themselves running an orphanage. They now have 43 children in the home.

Plans are now underway to start a new church in Korea. Also the Christian Day School has received government recognition. The children will be taught the Bible as well as vocational skills.

Korea had a severe famine last fall. There was no rain for 108 days and the sun burnt all the crops of the year.

April Draft Call For 14 Local Men Exhausts Immediate Supply

A spokesman from local draft board number 99 said Tuesday that the call for 14 men for induction in April will pretty well exhaust the supply of eligible single men who have been examined and are acceptable for the draft.

The local board received a call for 14 men for induction

and 25 for pre-induction physicals. Names will be printed in next week's edition of this paper.

This April 9th quota is the largest number of men to be called since November of 1966 when 20 were drafted from this 4-county area.

The local board has not yet had to dip into the "married men" classifications to meet draft or physical exam quotas. Draft quotas have been met with men who have been examined during the month prior to the draft call. April's draft call is being filled with men examined in March.

Texas draft boards are being called upon to furnish 2,376 men for the Army and Marines in April. This compares to a quota of 1,948 for the Army in March and is the largest monthly call for draft boards since October 1966.
