

She has an honorary mem bership in Texas Association of Future Homemakers of America, Area I State Association of Young Homemakers of Texas.



The history of the Hansford County Extension Program dates from July 1938 when a group of women got together and petitioned the Commissioners court to start HD work

Miss Pearl Locke was the first agent. Mrs. Rosa Yates was the first president. Mrs. Elmo McClellan of Gruver was the original Council

From 1938 the organization has weathered the depression droughts, prosperity, two wars and many other county elements. Each period was met by the County Extension work to help the county as a whole, thus strengthening the Extension program locally.

Early work charter members like to remember and discuss include a score or more projects: the cutting and canning of meat, vegetable gardening. hot beds, balanced meals, dressmaking, cutting a foundation pattern, mattress mak- Service and Agriculture, Staing and landscaping.

Many of the members laughingly recall "beating mattresses" as well as enjoy-ing the taste of fresh vegetables from frame gardens in

At that time almost everyone milked cows and kept chickens. Cheese making and poultry culling drew a lot of interest. There were very few trees

or shrubs in the county when the project of landscaping was begun. A number of club members went to Childress and brought back the first evergreen cuttings, obrained from the government shelter belt program. A seed bed of the evergreen cuttings was started in the B. J. Garnett back yard and scores of windbreaks were started around homes and on farms.

Miss Mary Jo Brown was the next agent. She took up the landscape work and expanded it, along with other projects.

Miss Charlotte Thompkins followed her and introduced upholstery and reconditioning of furniture, basket weaving. Under her tutelage a number of members became experts at weaving cane bottom chairs. Miss Vivian Vance was the

next agent. She introduced adjusting patterns and continued landscape work. The major project one year was care of clothing. Miss June Gibbs, 5th agent,

expanded a number of these projects and introduced scores of new ones. Sewing advanced tailoring, cooking, use of dairy products, advanced upholstery and storage space were demonstrated. Handicrafts included picture framing, lamps and lampshades, leather craft, glass etching, copper work, flower arrangement, corsages, aluminum etching and hat making were among the many projects she introduced. Perhaps the most important of her projects was the introduction of a county wide nutrition program which was very interesting and beneficial.

Barbara Fain, next agent for the county, conducted studies in county-wide driver's education, accessories, basic dressmaking, landscaping and pruning, quick meals, saving time and energy in the kitchen, recreation, or-ganization of the Time-For-Fun parties for Spearman's senior citizens, charm school. Under the next agent,

Linda Webb, HD women learned to buy, select and prepare meats, newest freezing and canning methods, period furniture and accessories, the study of city government, color in the home, use and care of electrical equipment

Under Miss Webb's leader ship some \$10,000.00 was raised for the remodeling of the club room making the building more useful to the citizens of Hansford County. A large modern kitchen was added along with a nursery room, two bathrooms and enlargement of the main meeting room. The building project was completed and paid for during her term of office. 
Incumbents Lloyd Buzzard and Ray Moore stepped aside in the school board race, leaving only Marvin Jones of the present officeholders


