Mrs. Durr is a member of the Kerrick Home Demonstration Club in Dallam County. Mr. and Mrs. Durr live on a farm and ranch 10 miles west of Kerrick. They are active in community and county activities. They support the local and county 4-H club program.

An estimated 300 delegates representing home demonstration clubs in district one of the Texas Home Demonstration Association, are expected in Spearman today for the annual spring meeting to be held in the high school auditorium.

Registration and coffee will begin at 9 a. m., and the first general assembly at 10 a. m. Mrs. Charles Durr, District One director, will give the call to order.

Cynthia Hutchison and Tony Delozier will present the flag.

Mrs. Larry Hays, Hansford county council chairman, will give the greeting and County Judge Johnnie C. Lee will welcome the guests. Mrs. J. P. Purcal will give the response.

Special entertainment will be furnished by the Spearman Music Club choral group.

Mrs. Sue Farris, District One HD Agent will be in charge of introductions. Rebecca Hutchison, outstanding county 4-H club girl, will speak on her experiences at National 4-H Congress in Chicago.

Mrs. Tom Box, THDA secretary and state representative, will bring greetings from the State Board.

At 11 a. m. the convention will be addressed by Dr. Willa V. Tinsley, Dean of Home Economics, Texas Tech. Dr. Tinsley's topic will be "Where Have You Been?"

Convention delegates and guests will be entertained with a style show. Garments modeled will be those made by members of the advanced sewing class conducted by Hansford HD Agent Vivian Warminski.

The afternoon general assembly will convene at 1:15 with a group singing session, followed by an address on "THDA In Action" by Mrs. H. R. Cramer.

A memorial service honoring the life and memory of the late Cotton John Smith, and the business session will close the convention.

Dr. Willa Vaughn Tinsley, Dean, school of Home Economics, Texas Tech College, will address delegates and guests at the THDA District One convention in the high school auditorium at 11 a. m.

Dr. Tinsley, a dynamic personality, has chosen to speak on "Where Have You Been?"

Dean Tinsley received a B. S. from Texas Woman's U., Deton in 1928; M. S. Colorado State U. 1936; did advanced study at the University of Texas and received a Ph. D. from the University of Minnesota in 1947.

Her experiences in teaching include homemaking teacher at Wharton, Freeport and San Marcos; Nutritionist, school lunch supervisor and supervisory homemaking teacher, San Marcos, Tex. Director Inter-American Teacher education projects, US Office of Education 2 years; Head of the dept. of Home Economics, Southwest Texas State Teachers College, San Marcos and is presently Dean of the School of Home Economics, Texas Tech (since 1953.)

Her professional services has included co-director Nutrition education workshop in Minnesota; Professor, graduate home economics education, Colorado University; Director of training programs for school lunch personnel since 1947, Homemaking curriculum consultant for United States Indian Service; member of regional and national committee on criteria for approving home economics teacher education.

She is affiliated with and is a member of State & American Home Ec. Association, Vocational Assoc., School Food Service and Dietetic, Academy of Political and Social Science. She has been recognized by state vocational association for outstanding contribution to vocational education and is the recipient of annual spur clip award for support of 4-H club activities.

She has an honorary membership in Texas Association of Future Homemakers of America, Area I State Association of Young Homemakers of Texas.

Dr. Tinsley is listed in Who's Who in America, Vols. 30-33; Who's Who in American Education, Vols. 16-21; Who Knows-and What Among Authorities, Experts and Specially Informed; Who's Who In Trustees, Presidents and Deans of American Colleges and Universities 1958-59, 1960-61 and 1962-63; as well as Who's Who in the South, Who's Who of American Women and the Dictionary of International Biography.

She is author of many bulletins on Nutrition, Health and Physical education for students from the college level to the elementary grades; and of numerous professional articles for the Journal of Home Economics and other magazines. She has written numerous evaluation instruments in nutrition education which were published by General Mills Inc.

Miss Warminski has launched several county-wide sewing course. She has conducted a county resource survey, presented a study on venereal diseases and taught first aid in the home. A project which proved of much interest to women throughout the county was the art of refinishing furniture.

During the past 30 years of Extension work in Hansford County, the two county agents have brought a multiplicity of diversified demonstrations to many groups. Extension work in correlated in a matter which is beneficial to many organizations: 4-H club work, Chamber of Commerce, Future Homemakers of America, Future Farmers of America, Parent-Teachers Association, Community groups, Farmers Home Administration, County Achievement Programs, Special Interest groups, Soil Conservation Service and Agriculture, Stabilization & Conservation.

Outstanding programs accomplished and still improving include: Home Improvement and Management, Nutrition and Food Preparation, Family Life and Clothing, Wheat Improvement, Beef Cattle Improvement, 4-H judging teams, Irrigation and feed crops.



Miss Mary Jo Brown was the next agent. She took up the landscape work and expanded it, along with other projects.

Miss Charlotte Thompkins followed her and introduced upholstery and reconditioning of furniture, basket weaving. Under her tutelage a number of members became experts at weaving cane bottom chairs.

Miss Vivian Vance was the next agent. She introduced adjusting patterns and continuing landscape work. The major project one year was care of clothing.

Miss June Gibbs, 5th agent, expanded a number of these projects and introduced scores of new ones. Sewing advanced tailoring, cooking, use of dairy products, advanced upholstery and storage space were demonstrated. Handicrafts included picture framing, lamps and lampshades, leather craft, glass etching, copper work, flower arrangement, corsages, aluminum etching and hat making were among the many projects she introduced. Perhaps the most important of her projects was the introduction of a county wide nutrition program which was very interesting and beneficial.

Barbara Fain, next agent for the county, conducted studies in county-wide driver's education, accessories, basic dressmaking, landscaping and pruning, quick meals, saving time and energy in the kitchen, recreation, organization of the Time-For-Fun parties for Spearman's senior citizens, charm school.

Under the next agent, Linda Webb, HD women learned to buy, select and prepare meats, newest freezing and canning methods, period furniture and accessories, the study of city government, color in the home, use and care of electrical equipment.

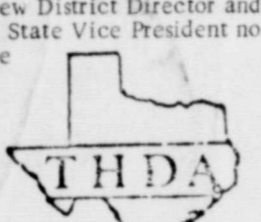

A large modern kitchen was added along with a nursery room, two bathrooms and enlargement of the main meeting room. The building project was completed and paid for during her term of office.

There has been a renewed interest in HD work and 4-H work under her supervision during the past year.

Wesley Jenkins, and Joe Hutchison broke on a record. Bob Smith broke the record for the 440 dash and Robert Archer set a new school mark in the 330 intermediate hurdles.

This meet will be both the high school and junior high district meet.

This is one of the finest track teams Spearman has ever had and everyone with the exception of Roy Russell, is either a junior, sophomore or a freshman.

The Spearman High School speech department scored a near sweep in the University Interscholastic League meet held last Saturday in Forger.

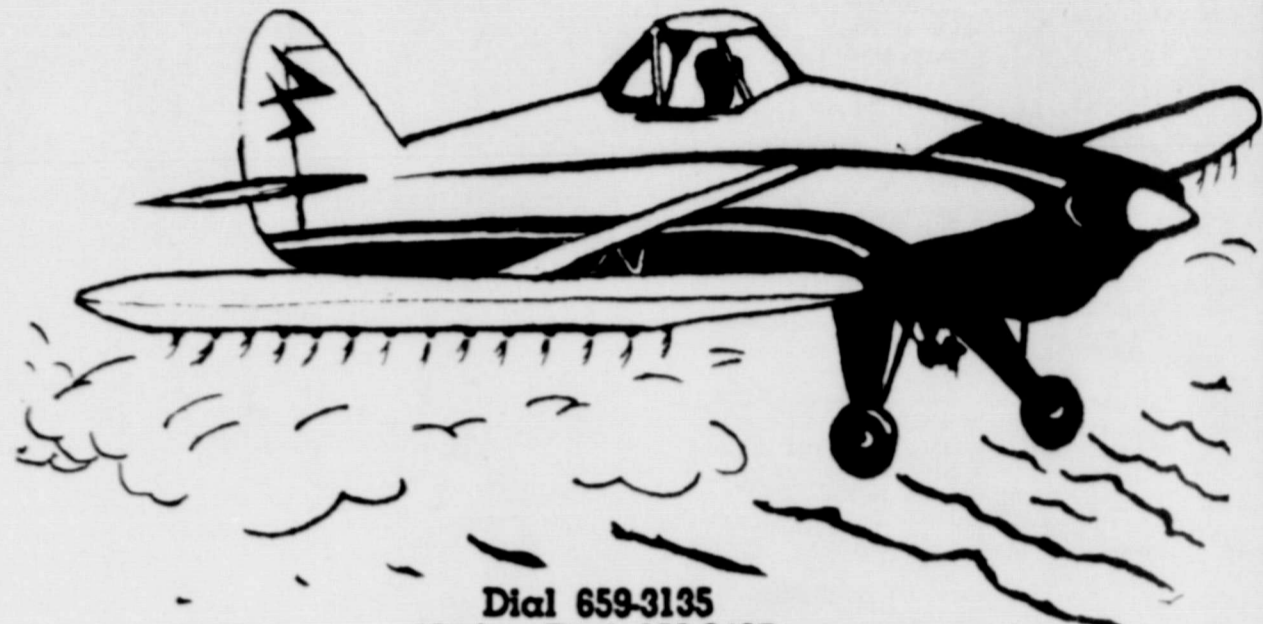
For the 5th straight year speech students led the high school to its sweepstakes trophy in the literary events.

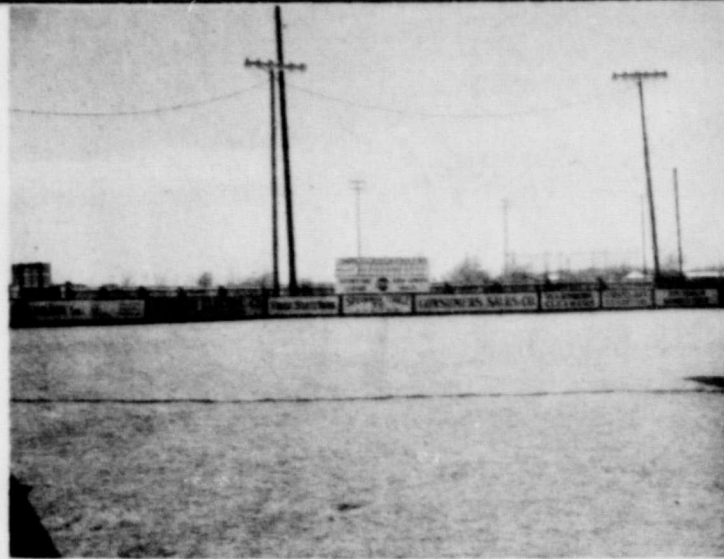
Incumbents Lloyd Buzzard and Ray Moore stepped aside in the school board race, leaving only Marvin Jones of the present officeholders running.
