

The second single biggest cause of drownings, says Mauermann, is children being left unattended near

Twenty-five children, ages 10 and under, have drowned this year in drainage ditches, farm ponds, fish ponds, and private swimming pools.

"Any body of water is an attraction to a child. We compile statistics in line with our enforcement of the Texas Water Safety Act, but in our research we can't help but take notice of the re-occurring tragedy of small children drowning," said Mauermann.

After 10 year of operation, the Great Plains conservation profgram is producing benefits far beyond the boundaries of individual particpating farms and ranches. In the extremely dry early spring of 1967, dust storm damages were significantly reduced in areas where 25 to 40 percent of the agricultural land was under Great Plains program contract. Approximately 138,000 acres of cropland was converted to grassland in fiscal 1967.

Ten eligible counties were added to the list designated to participate in the program in 1967, bring the number to 412. In 1967, 4,069 new contract covering 5,795,204 acres were signed, bringing the total participation to 27,872 contracts operating 51,185,968 acres.





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
