HANSFORD COUNTY CELEBRATION JUNE 8

Festivities Will Begin Friday Eve

Saturday June 8 is the big day and events will get underway at 8:30 a. m. when citizens register for the Old Timer's Reunion at the Joe Traylor Ford building. This has always been one of the highlights of the celebration.

At 9 a. m. Saturday will be the judging of the beard contest. This will take place in the center of main street. Lloyd Gilley is chairman.

Dick Countiss, parade chairman, will get floats, bands and exhibits rolling about 10:30 a. m. As usual the parade will assemble at the junior high school and march to the downtown area via Barkley street. "Americanism 1968" is the theme for parade floats.

Dr. H. B. Rinker is head of the barbecue committee. Serving will begin at 11:30 in front of the courthouse. Tickets are \$1.50 for adults, \$1.00 for children.

Something new has been added to the celebration schedule this year; one which will prove to be very interesting to county citizens; at 2 p. m. Saturday there will be a guided bus tour which will take residents to some eight county historical markers plus the old Ft. Zulu Stockade. Marking these historical sites in Hansford County. A guide will be present to explain each historical spot.

Following the tour, a Fiddler's contest will be staged at 4 p. m. on the courthouse steps. All fiddlers in the county are urged to participate in this contest which offers \$200.00 in cash prizes.

Saturday night at 9 p. m. the western dance will be held in the community building. Music will be provided by Eloy Gonzales and his Troubadours. This band from Clayton, New Mexico comes highly recommended as one of the nation's top western dance bands.

The celebration committee has found it impossible to stage a rodeo at this time. However, work is underway on repairing the arena and current plans call for a rodeo later in the summer.

Mr. Herman Boone and several members of the Spearman chapter Future Farmers of America attended the Area FFA awards contest held Saturday in Lubbock. Over 100 schools are involved in this annual contest.

Jock Lee was one of the 10 nominees for scholarship. He will be interviewed for the Tennessee scholarship award at the State FFA meeting in Lubbock July 17-19.

Other nominees are: Jock Lee, Carl McClellan, Carl Kunsel and Kenneth Banks applied for their State Farmer degree. They all qualified.

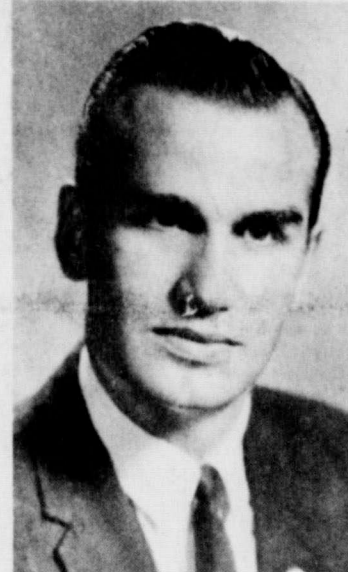
Both students won the expense paid trips by being selected and rated as best in Regional Science Fairs.

Missing Helicopter Pilot Declared Dead In Vietnam

Mr. and Mrs. Joe A. Reeves of Morse were notified Tuesday by US Army officials that their son Chief Warrant Officer Bobby R. Williams had been killed in action in Vietnam.

They had been notified last week that their son was declared missing after he had participated in an assault mission somewhere in Vietnam. Confirmation came Tuesday that the young soldier had

crashed and burned with his plane.

The soldier's death is the first casualty among Hansford County service men during the Vietnam war.

Williams, 24, is the husband of Monet Washington Williams of Spearman.

Bobby had been in service two years and had been in Vietnam for the past six months. He was a helicopter pilot serving with the 335th Assault Company.

Mrs. Williams is awaiting word from Washington as to date of arrival of her husband's body. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Besides the wife and 14-month old son and his parents, Williams is survived by a sister Judy Reeves, a student in Morse schools, a sister Mrs. Vera Morris of Goodwell, Okla., and a brother Davis Williams who is in the Navy.

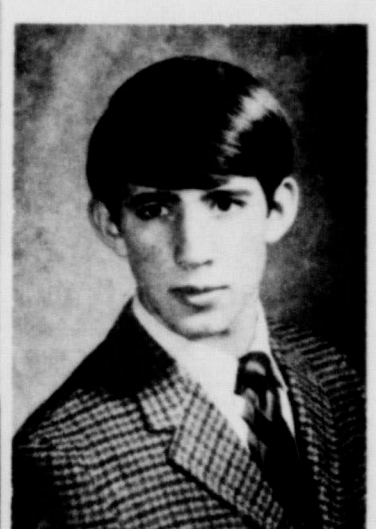
Mr. Turner was born in Severeance, Kansas and had been a resident of Gruver area since 1929. He was a farmer and rancher.

Gentle Falling Rains Benefit Crops Here

With a range from 1 to 4 inches rainfall in the Hansford county area from May 6 through 14th the community has been afforded a great boost in agriculture prospects.

As dry as it has been, (Hansford county has been way below normal for the year) the eight days of cloudy weather and slow rainfall has given citizens and crops a shot in the arm.

Recent figures released from the wheat harvest control office show that Hansford county

has 231,293 acres of wheat, the largest acreage in the state. In addition to this, the county shows to have 1,000 each of barley and rye and 500 acres of oats. Most of this is irrigated land. The majority of dry land wheat has long been abandoned. Recent moisture will greatly assist irrigated wheat but will prove most beneficial to sorghum crops which will be planted soon.

May is National Senior Citizens' Month. Let's make the whole month a safe time as well as a year round activity. We might change an old adage and say "Safety is as safety does"! Accident's don't just happen. We cause them.

Just think, over 4,000,000 people had serious injuries in the home last year. This means disabling injuries and nearly 28,000 died from them. Falls caused nearly half the deaths. The old sayings, "Count three before you do" or "Look before you leap" could have another added to it. "Think before you move". Remember Ladderless Liz who stood on a box, on a rocking chair on a bed, on a rocking chair on a bed to do a job, is not around now to tell about it.

Make a New Year's resolution now and help celebrate National Senior Citizen

Month. Resolve to be more safety conscious. Read labels on medicine before taking it. Check at least three times. Too many serious accident's occur from taking the wrong "pill".

Simple little doings often prevent one big accident. Like; test hot water from the faucet before using it. Keep hands away from working parts of electrical appliances while they are in use. Turn pot handles away from the edge of the stove. Watch the placing of electric cords to prevent a stumble or fall. Turn the light on if its difficult to see. Discard the throw rug if it's not secure. Become safety-minded and you'll watch for all these little doings.

Retirement years can be a joy if home accidents don't needlessly mar the picture. Accidents don't just happen -they are caused. Long, loose sleeves, loose cords,

ribbons and bows can be a safety hazard around the kitchen stove. Loose garments can catch on fire quickly and should not be worn while cooking.



Cancer Society Makes Survey

The American Cancer Society announced today it had received 66,864 replies to the Cancer Education Survey recently conducted in conjunction with its annual residential crusade.

Dr. Kleeberger of the Hansford county Unit of the Society, said the survey card consists of 6 questions for women and 5 for men. The questions concern specific health practices that, when observed, could substantially reduce the number of cancer deaths in the country.

Dr. Kleeberger said, "Last year a similar survey revealed that many people are having proctoscopic examinations, a diagnostic test to determine the presence of cancer of the colon and rectum." He continued that more women are having the Pap test and are practicing breast self examination. Still another part of the 1967 survey, devoted to questions about cigarette smoking, showed that 58% of the men and 71% of the women do not smoke, and of those who once smoked, more men than women stopped smoking.

County Republicans Adopt Resolutions

1. 4. OIL AND GAS-As it has in the past, the Republican Party will continue to encourage the exploration for new oil and gas reserves in the interest of a healthy domestic economy and national defense, by support of the incentive generating depletion allowance, and by favoring a minimum of industry debilitating price fixing.

Is every problem a Federal problem to be attacked by Federal money?

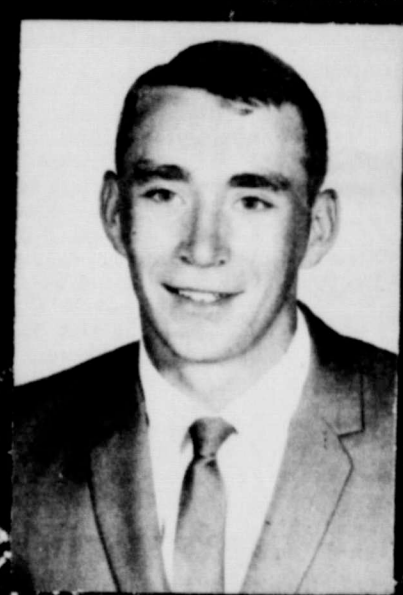

Drownings High Early In Year

Austin--Drownings in Texas have already reached this year according to Mauer mann, deputy director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. "Our unofficial total for this year was 317, and we have way over a third of that with the major portion of the water recreation season ahead of us," Mauer mann said. According to Mauer mann, many of the accidents involving boats are due to a violation of the Texas Water Safety Act, specifically, failure to have one Coast Guard approved life saving device aboard the boat for each per-

"The law says that there must be one of the devices on board for each person, but if they are not worn or readily accessible, their purpose is defeated."

The second single biggest cause of drownings, says Mauer mann, is children being left unattended near water.

Twenty-five children, ages 10 and under, have drowned this year in drainage ditches, farm ponds, fish ponds, and private swimming pools.

"Any body of water is an attraction to a child. We compile statistics in line with our enforcement of the Texas Water Safety Act, but in our research we can't help but take notice of the re-occurring tragedy of small children drowning," said Mauer mann.

"So," said the personnel director, "suppose you tell me what previous experience you have had."

"I spent five years as an executive secretary," replied the applicant. "All I had to do was look like a girl, think like a man, act like a lady, and work like a dog."

After 10 year of operation, the Great Plains conservation program is producing benefits far beyond the boundaries of individual participating farms and ranches. In the extremely dry early spring of 1967, dust storm damages were significantly reduced in areas where 25 to 40 percent of the agricultural land was under Great Plains program contract. Approximately 138,000 acres of cropland was converted to grassland in fiscal 1967.

Ten eligible counties were added to the list designated to participate in the program in 1967, bring the number to 412. In 1967, 4,069 new contract covering 5,795,204 acres were signed, bringing the total participation to 27,872 contracts operating 51,185,968 acres.
