Funeral services for Larry Lee Cline, 31, of Gruver, were conducted Sunday at 3 p.m. from the First Methodist Church in Gruver. The Rev. Leland Spurrier, pastor, was officiant. Burial was in Gruver cemetery by Boxwell's of Spearman.

Cline was killed Friday morning 6 miles east of Spearman on Highway 15 when the pickup he was driving was hit by a trailer loaded with drill bits that came loose from a vehicle driven by Bill West, 34, of Spearman. The small two-wheel metal trailer crashed into the driver's side of the pickup.

Cline, who was along in the pickup, was pronounced dead at the scene.

Cline was born March 6, 1937 at Gruver. He was an employe of Shamrock Oil & Gas Corp., and was a member of the First 'Methodist Church in Gruver.

ZULU STOCKADE--built in 1875 by Jim & Bob Cator, was the first building constructed north of the Canadian River. For years it was a trading post for buffalo hunters and a stage coach stop. In 1880 it was established a Post Office, the first in the county and the only one serving then a 44-county area. This site will be one of 8 such to be visited on a guided tour during Hansford County celebration June 8.

Guided Tour To Include tablished in 1886 and named for John V. Farwell, a surveyor. The rocks at the mark-County Historical Sites

added to the Hansford County celebration schedule this year; an event which will prove to be very interesting to county citizens.

This will be the guided tour which will take you to some eight County historical markers plus the old Ft. Zulu Stockade.

Marking historical sites in Hansford County has been the job of the County Historical Survey Committee. This committee was appointed by the state to mark and preserve for posterity various sites throughout the communty -- each of which has played an important role in the development and early settling of Hansford County. A guide will be present to explain

each marker. The Jaycees organization hopes to be able provide buses for the tour; if not, there will be plenty of cars, The tour is scheduled for 2

p.m. Saturday June 8, with stops to be made at the following marker sites: DODGE CITY - TASCOSA TRAIL (Marker at Old Hansford) This road was surveyed during Civil War to haul military supplies to Ft. Bascom, New Mexico territory. Then came the buffalo hunters using the trail to haul hides and buy supplies. Tascosa became a town in early 1880. Ox teams and mule teams hauled freight for the Cowboy Capital of the Panhandle and ranches that ran to hundreds of thousands of dollars annually. Herds from all over the Panhandle trailed into Dodge over this route for a number of years. Stage coaches ran weekly, carrying mail and passengers over the 242 mile stretch. Brick for the courthouse at nearby ghost town of Hansford was hauled from Dodge along this route. Later freight came over this trail from Liberal. Ranchers

At this time there was a railroad boom in the county known as the EO &W. Many people were moving into the area. The Hotel filled a real need for the little town of Hansford.

The Hotel had many different managers: C.R. Thomas (the first) Mrs. Bessie White, Dave Foley, Patty Doyle, W. H. Morney, and was finally sold to Ira F. Davus. He was the owner at the time the hotel was moved to Spearman in

Mr. Dacus managed the hotel until it was sold to H. M. Wiley in 1924. Mr. Wiley sold it to J.C. Lee Feb. 22, 1930-Lee sold to R. H. Cooke Feb. 21, 1933 and R. H. Cooke et al sold to Sid Beck, deceased, husband of the pre-sent owner Mrs. Sid Beck.

ROBERT E. (BOB) MARTIN 1868-1911

First sheriff of Hansford to be killed in the line of duty, Mr. Martin was killed while assisting a US Marshall .makline dispute in the northwest part of the County. He was a cowboy-farmer, chosen for office out of regard for his standing as a good citizen. Mr. Martin came to Hansford County in 1906, bought a section of land. Eager to see the area develop, he ran a livery stable at old Hansford, which provided transportation for prospective land buyers. Married Sophia Snowden, father of 10 children. Sheriff from 1908 until his death in

OLD HANSFORD COURTHOUSE This Courthouse was built in 1891 constructed from red brick brought overland by wagons from Dodge City, Kansas. It was the first courthouse in the County.

Hansford County, surveyed in 1876 and organized in 1889, was named for John M. Hansford, a Texas Congressman and Judge.

The town of Farwell, located some 3 miles east of the present town of Gruver, was the first town in the County. Originally it was intended to be the first County Seat of Hansford County but by a majority vote the town of Hansford was designated as the county seat. Farwell was es-

er site are the original ones used to case a 200 foot handdug well to supply water for the town.

HANSFORD CEMETERY Site on east side of Palo Duro Creek. First burial plot in county. Mrs. Alfie P. Mc-Gee wife of Hansford County's first sheriff marks the first grave, January 7, 1890.

Two brick masons -- Pete Winsell and a Mr. Williamson, working on the new court house, were killed in a tornado. They were the next to be buried here, in 1891.

Founded 1917, Incorporated in 1921. Named for Thomas G. Spearman, a vice-president and head of the land department of Santa Fe RR. The Santa Fe line was completed to Spearman in 1920, making this the first railroad shipping

point in the county. in 1876 and organized in 1889, relocated its county seat here in 1929. The court-house was built in 1931. Streets paved with brick make city distinctive.

ZULU STOCKADE In 1872. Jim & Bob Cator coming from Hull, England to the United States and taking up buffalo hunting as a means of livelihood established themselves in a dugout beside the Palo Duro Creek in Hansford County, Texas where there was protection from the weather and plenty of wood and water. They were but forty miles from Adobe Walls.

In 1875 the Cators erected a building of cottonwood tim bers and logs hauled from Moore's Creek---in what is now Hutchinson County. They put in a stock of merchandise and called the place "Zulu Stockade." The purpose of the Zulu Stockade was a trading post for the buffalo hunters. It was the first building constructed north of the Canadian River. The next year the Fort Dodge and Fort Bascom road opened and for ten years Zulu Stockade continued to be the only trading center north of the Canadian River.

The first Post Office on the

North Plains was at Zulu in Hansford County. Robert (Bob) Cator was appointed Postmaster December 20, 1880. It was the only post office established in the forty-four county area that year. The office at Zulu was discontinued Feb. 28, 1895; but it was re-established with Mary E. Tyler as Postmistress. The office was finally discontinued on January 31, 1918 with the mail going to Hansford. Mrs. Clara L. McCrea took the position of Postmistress in December, The name "Zulu" was used

because of an English War which was in progress at the time the building was under

construction. Zulu also served as the last stage stop in the County for the Dodge City-Tascosa Trail. The stage stop had stables for

the teams to change. The beaten, trodden path of this famed trail remains along the Palo Duro creek.

The marker location is placed on the original site of the stockade on the P.F. Hawkins property --- Sec. Blk. 5T, T&NO RR, located 7 miles south of Gruver on State Highway 136 and intersection of FM road 520, thence west 1 mile, one quarter mile north from P. F. Hawkins cattle guard, . 7 mile on caliche road.

Anything new on TV would be a rarity. We enjoy most of all the commercial on "discover America, rent a Hertz car." We didn't rent a Hertz, but we got the roaming bug about noon Saturday and were gone in 5 minutes....back in 11 hours.

A two hour drive east of Spearman puts you in another world, literally. We drove along (never over 60 MPH) over rolling hills covered with beautiful green wheat ... dry land if you please. Lush green pasture land...calm placid ponds...grazing dairy herds...winding streams. Big beautiful shade trees line the highway in some places thick as woods. Oaks, walnut, elm, cottonwood and lacy locusts were in abundance. The roadside and meadows covered with clover in bloom filled the air with its most delicious aroma. We passed hundreds of bee hives and stopped at a friends home and watched the bees at work.

Saturday afternoon in this part of Oklahoma is so peacefully lazy. We drove for miles upon miles in this beautiful country and did not pass ONE automobile. Everyone goes to town on Saturday. Each small village had sidewalks lined with people. . . . store benches where the men spit-and-whittled away the afternoon. We couldn't resist the small cafes which still serve real beef in chicken fried steaks, country fried chicken and home baked pies and cobblers like you never tasted. Men in their starched and ironed overalls, women in their clean prints...all very curious about 'strangers

in town.' I envied them all the kind of life they live.

I didn't envy the little old Mr. Seba who publishes the eedy newspaper, but I cerainly did enjoy going through is ancient little shop. Covered in printers ink, he pecks away at his linotype, casts his mats in a warped casting box, and prints his paper on an old, old hand fed Babcock press. All this I understand, and don't even mind. What I minded (for him) was the fact that his electrical wiring had all been condemned and there was no electrician ANYWHERE in the area. You should have seen the (lights?) he had strung. He brushed his wispy gray hair from his eyes and apologized for the "looks of my shop". Before leaving, he seated himself at his warped wooden desk, and took our names. You can bet there will be a local in next Thursday's edition....brings back old memories....and a few regrets I might add.

I enjoyed watching the onehour special on the ABC Network Monday night IN THE NAME OF GOD. It stirred a lot of often-thought-of questions in my mind concerning missionaries. This program dealt with modern missionaries whose goals are secular as well as spiritual. OILING HERBICIDES GIVE BETTER WEED KILL

Field tests on the Texas High Plains show that nontoxic oils used as oil-water emulsion carriers enhance the performance of herbicides for better weed kill.

These tests have been underway since 1964 under the direction of Dr. Allen F. Wiese, agronomist in charge of weed control at the USDA Southwestern Great Plains Research Center here.

Wiese's tests have been primarily with atrazine applied post-emergence on grain sorghum although herbicidal studies have also been conducted with such crops as soybeans, cotton and sugar-

1968 Recommendations Listed

The researcher suggests oil-water emulsion sprays for applying atrazine to grain sorghum this season. On small weeds one to two pounds of atrazine in one to two gallons of a non-toxic oil should give good weed control. The oil should contain an adequate amount of emulsifier for 20 to 40 gallons of total carrier per acre. If weeds are large and the sorghum is more than six inches tall, higher rates of water, oil and atrazine should be used.

For aerial spraying, Wiese advocates use of 5 to 10 percent of a non-toxic oil with sufficient emulsifier and one to two pounds of atrazine per acre. If the spray drop size is in the range of 200 to 400 microns, application can be made with as little as two gallons of carrier per acre.

Early Field Studies Cited In 1964, field tests first indicated that oil emulsions improved the effectiveness of atrazine, the researcher points out. Four-inch pigweed growing in 6-inch sorghum was controlled better with atrazine applied in an oil-water emulsion than with water and surfactant. A year later, good control of 6inch pigweed was obtained with atrazine at one pound per acre applied in an oil-

water emulsion. Results in 1966 again proved the effectiveness of oilwater emulsions, this time by aerial applications, notes Wiese. One pound of atrazine per acre with an oil-water emulsion of only two and one-half gallons of total carrier per acre eliminated six-inch pigweed growing in a field.

In one replication of this study, atrazine at two pounds per acre in five gallons of oil-water emulsion carrier was the only treatment that gave some control of barnyard-grass, the researcher points out.

Weed Size Important Trials during the past year were conducted to determine the proper amounts of oil to apply per acre in oil-water emulsions for both ground and air applications, says Wiese. Tests showed that the amount of oil total carrier and rate of atrazine should be regula ted to the sorghum and weed

.Large weeds were best controlled with ground applications with a mixture of three gallons of oil, 40 gallons of total carrier and two pounds of atrazine per acre. Small weeds were controlled with a pound of atrazine in one gallon of oil and 10 gallons of total carrier. High rates of oil and atrazine injured small sorghum but can be applied safetly if both the sorghum and weeds are large.

According to Wiese, the amount of emulsifier was also checked in oil-water mixtures. Tests showed that enough of this material should be present to completely emulsify the oil with the water and atrazine. Results indicated that two percent of an emulsifier gave optimum weed control. Improper emulsification caused a heavy precipitate which was difficult to remove from sprayers.

Potential Usage Results were outstanding last year with atrazine applied in an oil-water emulsion spray carrier on sorghum, points out Wieses. Some farmers are considering changing to this treatment instead of pre-emergence spraying with propazine.

As a result, one-half to one million acres of sorghum on the High Plains will likely be treated with the oilwater-atrazine emulsion spray within the next few years. Prospects are also good for using oil-water emulsion spray carriers with post-emergence herbicides on soybeans, cotton
