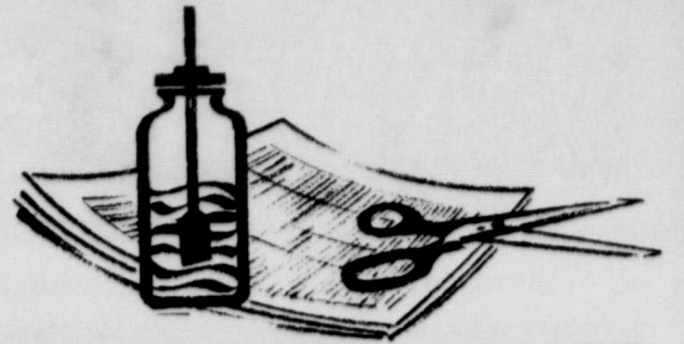

## Hazelwood Graduates

Robert Paul Hazelwood, Assistant Vice-President of First State Bank of Spearman, was among the one-hundred and thirty-five bankers who graduated this year in Class of the Southwestern Graduate School of Banking, which celebrated its annual two-week session on July 26, on the campus of Southern Methodist University.

Commencement was held at 8:00 p. m. Friday, July 26, in the Farlin Auditorium on the SMU campus. The 500 bankers in the best body, the distinguished faculty of the school, and other guests, heard the commencement address given by Mr. Chester A. Rude, former Vice Chairman of the Board, Security First National Bank, Los Angeles, California.

Cosponsored by the Dallas, Fort Worth, and Houston Banking Houses, the Texas Bankers Association, and the Oklahoma Bankers Association, and SMU, the school is under the direction of Dr. Michael B. Johnson, professor of Economics at SMU and director of "The Assemblies of Bank Directors." Mr. B. Harry Vinson, president of the First National Bank of Little Rock, Arkansas, is dean for Bankers.

To qualify for a certificate of graduation from the school, graduates must attend three two-week resident sessions, submit solutions to extension problems, write a thesis on a topic pertaining to banking and pass an oral examination.

## July Busy Month

If you think it has been a busy July, it was hotter last year. According to Charles Gilliam, Mgr. Community Public Service, Spearman citizens used 1,338,076 Kilowatt hours during the month of July as compared to 1,430,000 in July, 1967. Gilliam also said the utility company had four more customer users in July than they had this time one year ago.

This is a good indication of the city's growth, although the town shows signs of slackening off as to building, it is still building its own population. In fact things have been or less held their own throughout the past year. The month of July has been the busiest in the history of the Community Public Service company. Gilliam said there had been lots of activity within the city; 24 families moved from one home to another and asked for meters to be installed. There were 60 new connections and 57 disconnections.

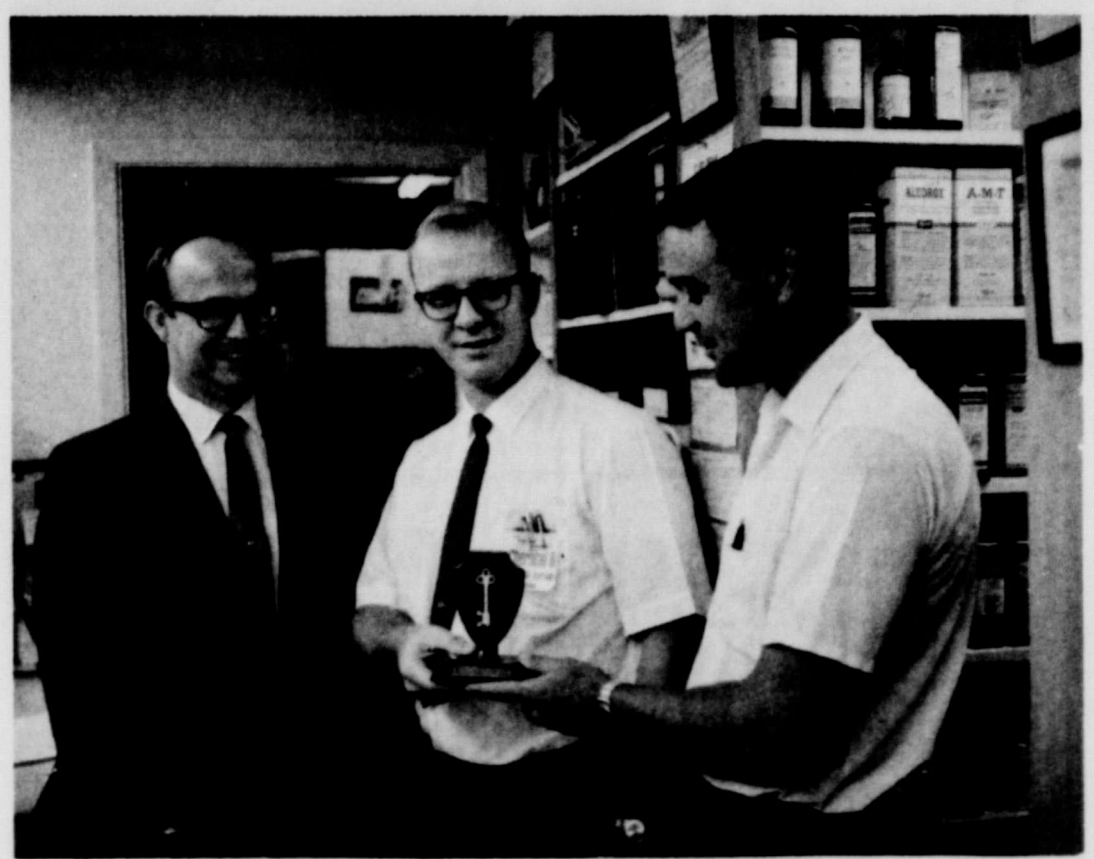
**SATURDAY POSTAL SERVICE RESTORED**

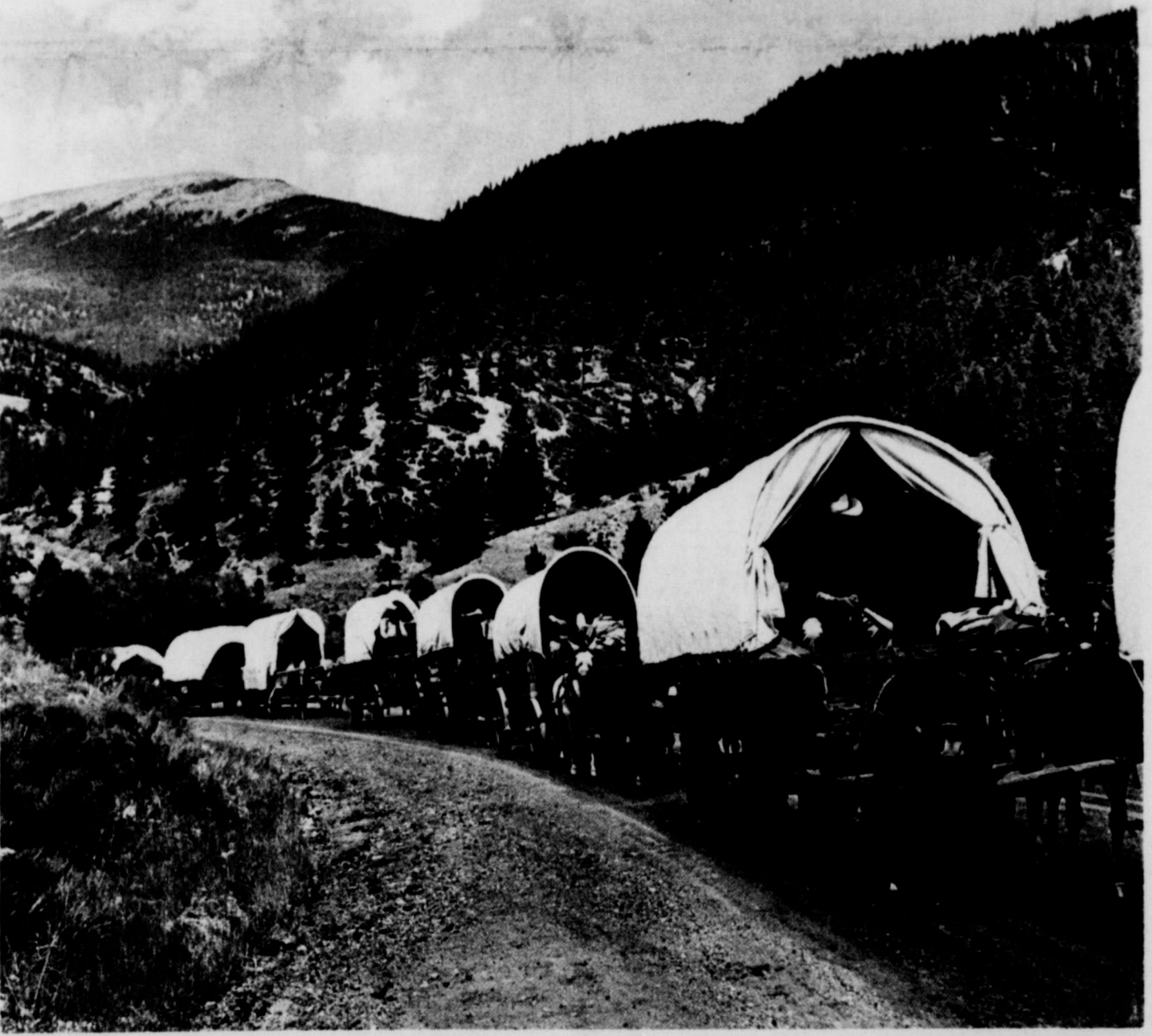
## Local Pilots Make SCSA Convention

## Gruver Loan Approved

A loan of \$315,000 has been approved by the Small Business Administration for the Gruver Industrial Development Commission to use in developing a cattle feeding business in Gruver.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough announced the approval of the loan Monday in Washington, D. C.

The federal funds will be combined with \$142,089 from the Gruver commission and \$35,000 in a loan from the Gruver State Bank to make a total of \$492,089 available for the project.

The funds will be used for land purchase, building construction and new fixtures. The plant is expected to employ about 25 persons.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR49)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 21 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows: Section 21. All stationery and printing, except proclamations and such printing as may be done at the Texas School for the Deaf, and paper, except that for the Judicial Department, shall be furnished under contract, to be given to the lowest and best bidder under regulations as shall be prescribed by law. No member of any department of the government shall be interested in such contract.

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-j to read as follows: "Section 1-j. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this article, the Legislature may provide for the refund of the tax paid on the first sale of cigars and tobacco products in this state which are subsequently sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas, as contiguous to Texarkana."

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR60)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to add Section 64 to read as follows: "Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within El Paso or Tarrant Counties. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR20)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors."

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

"3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2c) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied."

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR1)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amended Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System, providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for its proclamation and publication thereof. Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state shall be equal to the amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age of fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund. "Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR11)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, so as to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services for: (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; (2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixtieth (60th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps; (3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years; (4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States and who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and to the caretakers of such children. "The Legislature may define

persons; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). "Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

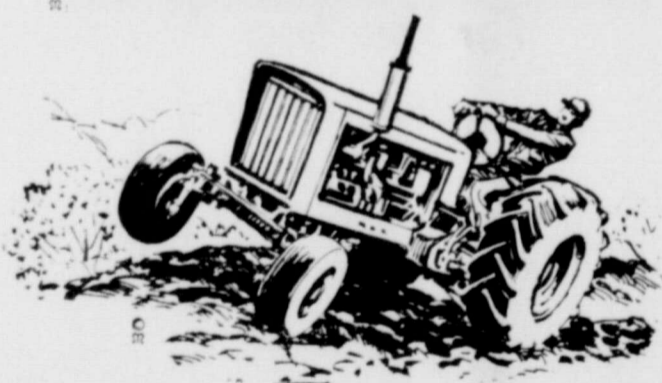

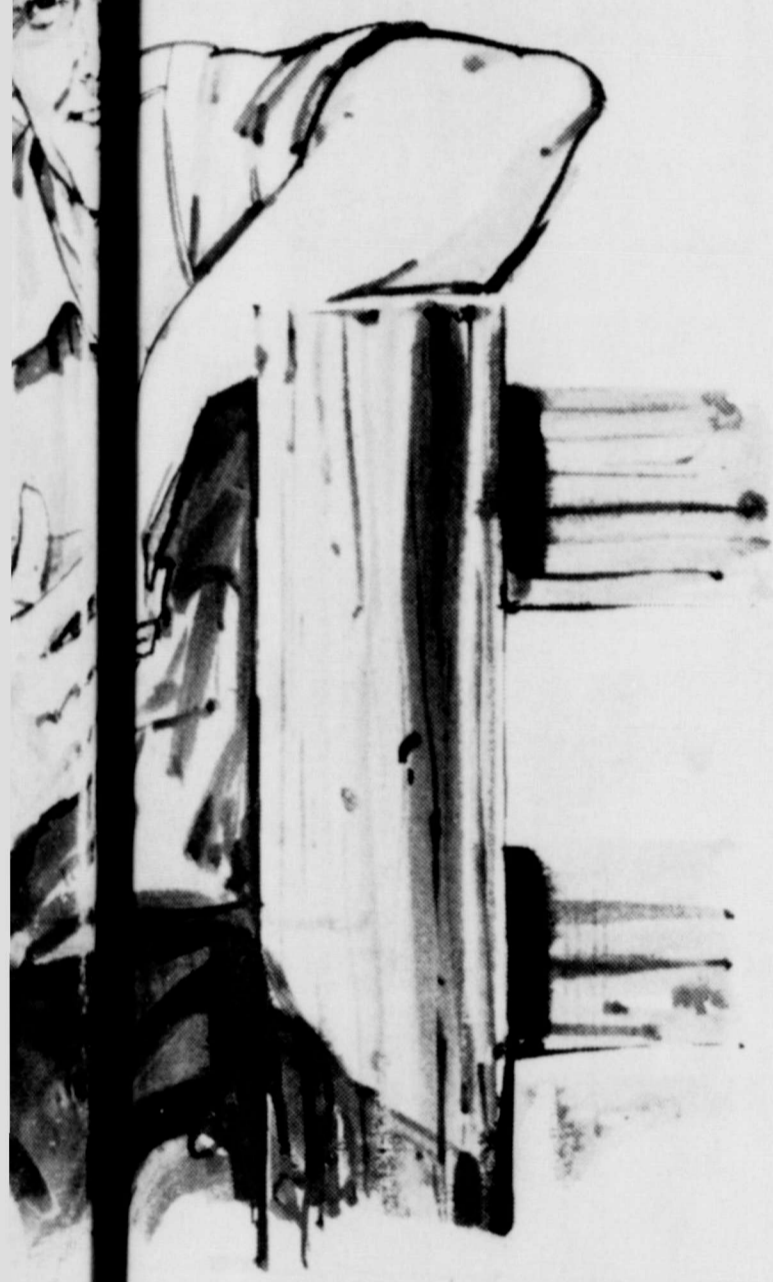

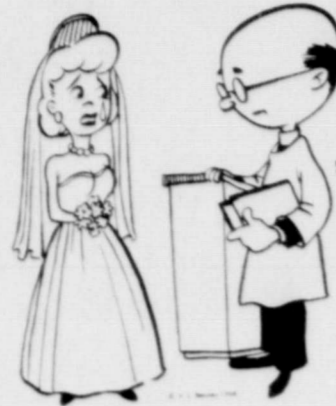

These were the dumbest bunch of newspaper people I ever saw... not one could tell you ANYTHING about any other part of the plant. The classified ad make-up men didn't know where the typesetters were... the copy writers couldn't tell you where the ad department was... the lay-out men didn't know where the dark room was, nor who was in charge of what. I asked three people to show me the typesetters before I found one who even KNEW what they were. The woman in the lobby at the switch-board couldn't tell us where ANY department was... nor how many people worked there. So modern... every type of machine conceivable efficiently clicking away at its own particular job of getting a newspaper out on time. Big color presses pounding out 30,000 papers per hour, sending them down long conveyor belts to where tractors with giant hoists scooped them up in piles and gently laid the stacks down in FRONT OF 36 BOYS who were HAND INSPECTING section after section.

With a sight of relief at seeing manual labor, I felt right at home as I stood and watched these young men get printers ink from head to toe. They laughed and joked while they worked and I felt a little sad at the sight of so many machines which had robbed so many workers of jobs so badly needed. It's a changing world. Yet THEY make mistakes too! Except theirs are more costly. The color man showed us a color grocery section they had to do over. After printing 125,000 of these, they noticed T-Bone steak at \$3.09 per lb. instead of \$1.09. Over \$1,000 in colored ink, plus all those sections went down the grinder. That hurts!

On our way to Okla. City, we stopped at a new antique shop near Watonga. The Idle Article Shoppe was opened in May, by Mrs. Hall. She has a grand place. Notice her ad in this paper and stop in and see her if you are up that way. Her husband, Dist. Attorney for 5 counties, gave her the building on 5 acres of land and she is doing a real good business. I found two of the cutest old, old samplers you ever saw. Paid \$2.00 each for them, gladly!

We enjoyed our drive east (this time for 5 whole hours). We take the byways instead of the highways as a rule, but this time since it was to be a quick business trip, we took 66. I have never seen so many pickup campers filled with so many kids & dogs in my life.

I think everyone and their dogs took a vacation via highway 66 this year. I wonder how many cars there are in this nation? You'll meet half of them on that road I am sure.

We didn't come back THAT way... we took the byways to enjoy the scenery & coolness of the green, shady countryside... minus all that hustle, bustle traffic.

One more stop made my 12-hour trip complete. A screeching halt at a roadside watermelon stand.

PC met us at the door Saturday midnight howling her discontent at having been shut up all day alone. It was good to be home. 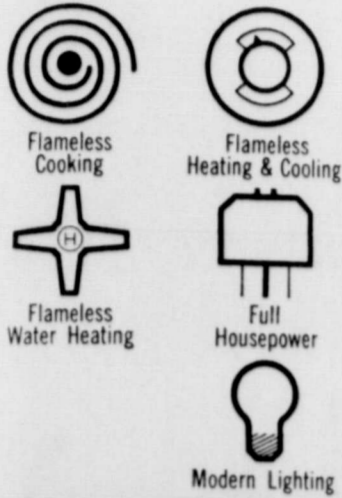

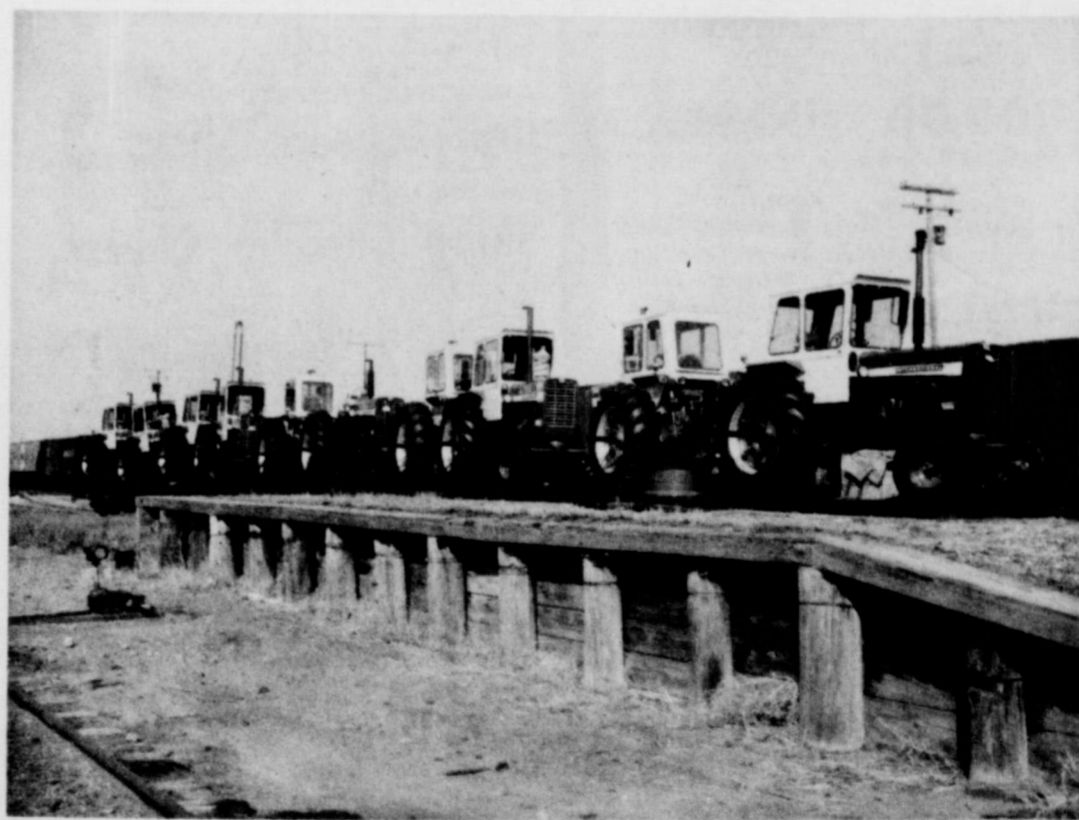
