



ARGUMENTS FOR:

The proposed amenment does not make an appropriation but rather allows the legislature greater discretion in meeting the needs of all four classes of welfare recipients (needy aged, needy disabled, needy blind, needy children) in the state by raising the ceiling on the use of state ships resulting from unemploy - funds for this purpose. Texas consistently has been in the lowest percentiles of the nation with respect to welfare, ranking 50th in administra tive cost per recipient for old age assistance, 44th in percent receiving old age assist ance, 49th in assistance in aid to dependent children, and 45th in assistance in aid to permanently and totally disabled. Because aid for dependent children allotments are based on a family of four, the higher ceiling provided by the proposed amendment would make it possible for the legislature to have greater discretion in giving budgetary consideration to larger families. Further, the proposed amendment would permit consideration to be given to last year's 4 percent rise in the ost of living in budgeting for all four classes of recipients. ARGUMENTS AGAINST:

The large overall expenditure of state funds which thisamendment would authorize would increase each recipient's income only a few dollars a month but would require \$15,000,000 in new funds at a time when the state is already hard pressed to meet existing financial obligations. Instead of en-couraging dependency on public welfare, the state should begin to draw a line in combatting growing socialism and the welfare state.

The blistering Vietnam heat is evident in the sales of sodas and refrigerators in the post exchange

In May alone, the Task Force X-Ray, 1st Marine Division PX has sold more than one million cans of various soda pops.

The exchange received a shipment of 36 refrigerators and the entire supply was sold in less than 45 minutes. The increased sales were expected however, with the mercury climbing over the 100 degree mark.

Actually, with the weather being so hot, we could have sold much more," explained Gunnery Sgt. CharlesM. Stain, 34, Al-bany, Ga., exchange manager. "We have a limited stock, however, and are forced to ration the items out, especially the sodas. That way, every one gets his fair share." "Other items that sell fast are fans and ice chests," added

Sgt. David P. McNulty, 24, Maywood, Ill., exchange operations chief.

"All of the 40 fans we put on the shelf one day last week,

were sold within 25 minutes," he continued. Other fast selling items, though not the result of the heat, in-clude canned foods and snacks, from potato chips to sardines. Camera equipment, stereo components and electrical supplies

are also fast selling commodities. Cigarette sales are as high as 12,000 cartons a week. The

sales of books and magazines average more than 1,000 each daily. The PX at the Phu Bai combat base closes only on Christmas

and two days every four months for inventory. Stein also arrang es mobile exchanges that truck requested supplies out to the infantry units in the field. Stein is also in charge of numerous Vietnamese concession stands, made up on camers, tailor and jewelry shops.

He has more than 36 people under his control, including 22 Vietnamese employees who work as sales clerks and laborers

Plans of expansion are completed and shortly the exchange will double its size and its available stock.



Last in a series on Home Freezing -- FREEZING PRE-PARED FOODS

During hot summer months, it is easier to open the freezer door for baked goodies or casseroles than to spend hours in the kitchen. Freezing is the only method to preserve many of these baked or cooked goods. Mrss Frances Reasonover, Extension foods and nutrition

specialist, says to cook most breads, cakes and pies before freezing. Cool them and wrap in moisture -vapor proof material.

Use standard recipes for breads and cakes. For quick breads use double-action baking powder. Biscuits and muffins are better frozen uncooked. Bran muffins, fruit and nut breads are better if baked before freezing. You may freeze bread and

rolls baked or unbaked. Use a recipe with a fairly large amount of fat and sugar.

Baked products may be stored

as long as 9-12 months. you want to freeze dough allow it to rise until double in bulk. Doughs shaped be fore freezing may be inferior, even when stored only two weeks.

Pre-baked cakes containing fat may dry out slightly after two months, and after four months, flavor changes may be expected. Use pure ex-tracts as imitations may produce off-flavors. Angel food, yellow sponge, chiffon and fruit cakes baked before freezing will keep up to a year. Uncooked confectioners sugar frostings freeze best. Boiled and other soft frostings containing egg whites and cream fillings are not suitable for freezing. Fruit, vegetable and chiffon pies freeze successfully. Fruit pies may be frozen either before or after baking. Crust is more tender and flaky and flavor fresher when the pies are frozen before baking. The specialist ad vises against freezing lattice top pies. Don't cut steam vents in top crusts of frozen unbaked pies until they have been removed from the freezer.
