

The Amendments

Amendment No. 3-- Providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System in certain types of securities within the "prudent man rule." This proposed amendment broadens the base of the authority of the Board of Regents of the Texas University investing the Permanent University Fund. ARGUMENTS FOR

The erosion in the value of the dollar, which has been under way for many years, and which seems to be accelerating, requires that changes be made in the basic format of the Permanent University Fund. Only by investing a greater portion of the fund in corporate stocks can the value of the fund and the income produced thereby be maintained, or increased.
On August 31, 1967, the
value of the U.S. Government
bonds owned by the fund had
declined 18.7 percent from
their cost. The corporate stocks owned had increased 32.9 percent and were producing income at a rate of 28% in excess of the rate produced by the U.S. bonds. The elimination of the 50% restriction on the ownership of corporate securities is neces-

sary to safeguard the Permanent University Fund and its income in terms of the continually diminishing purchasing power of the dollar. Clearly, the current restrictions on the operation of the Permanent University Fund are not in keeping with investment policies widely accepted and practiced by the more successful college and university endowment funds. The elimination of the % restriction on the ownership of corporate securities is a necessary step to the modernization of the operation of the Permanent University

Fund. ARGUMENTS AGAINST Fluctuations in the stockmarket affect the day-to-day value of the Permanent University Fund. The maintenance of present investment policies can reduce the impact of these fluctuations on the fund. For that reason, the 50% restriction on the amount of the fund allotted for investment in common stocks should be retained. The present restriction guarantees that at least half the endowment for The University of Texas System and Texas A&M University System is not subject to the posibility of capital loss, if such se-

curities are held to maturity. During the last few years, the stocks of many rapidgrowth corporations have fluctuated because of unsettled conditions. This situation gives added support to maintaining present investment of a major portion of this fund could result in insufficient funds to meet bonded indebtedness for the extensive building programs undertaken by institutions participating in the fund.





First Time To School

AUSTIN -- Here it is back-toschool time, but for many children and parents it's "first time to school." Occasionally, the first-time experience can be nervewracking, but it is always important. So says the Texas State Teachers Association (TSTA), which points out that the first few hours, days, and weeks are vital to a child's future in school.

TSTA provides the following series of tips and information to help ease the firsttime school experience, and make it more productive.

REGISTRATION PROCEDURE Any child who is 6 years old on or before September 1 of the school year may be admitted to school. The child's birth certificate must be presented at the time of enroll-

Some schools, in the interest of good health, require the child to be vaccinated against smallpox before enrollment. Also required may be immunization against diptheria, whooping cough, and tetanus.

Other information which may be needed is the name of the father, his occupation, where he works, and his phone number. The name and telephone number of the family doctor and hospital used may also be requested. Also helpful can be the address and telephone numbers where parents can be reached in an emergency.

But such details are only part of the picture, and the parents form an important partnership with teachers in getting the child off to a good

HOW PARENTS CAN HELP It will help if the child has opportunities to be away from his mother for short periods before he starts to school.

The child should be taught the safest way home from school. Also teach him to go directly home from school without loitering on the wayand remind him not to go with strangers. Children should learn that policemen are their friends, and can

give them help when needed. A child should have definite duties to perform at home, and it will be helpful if he can learn good listening hab-



Remember that your attitude toward the school will be observed -- and copied -by the child. Do not criticize school or teacher in the presence of the child. If there is a difficulty -- conflict with another child, a difficult activity, a school rule the child does not understand -- take the time to help solve the problem instead of just criticizing the situation.

To get a child ready for school, begin broadening his horizons even before that first day. Reading good books to him will help, as will taking him to places such as the zoo, park and library.

Personal belongings of the child should be labelled. TEACHERS AS THE PARENT'S PARTNERS

Teachers will help your child experience opportunities f r group work and play. They will help him grow in thinking for himself, and becoming interested in the world around him. At school he learns democratic living, and teachers will work to make him feel at ease in his school environment, Early days and weeks help build the foundation for future learning experiences.

Teachers want to learn as much as possible about each child. They are interested in his academic progress, relations with others, self-control. ability to concentrate, and response to suggestions.

The child's readiness for learning is directly related to varying rates of growth -- physical, mental, social, and emotional. The teacher attempts to understand these factors for each child by observing his behavior in the classroom and on the playground. But the parent can also help by supplying teachers with this kind of informa-

Teachers help develop the child's respect for people and property, self-reliance, dependability, effort, and cooperation. They are interested in his health.

The interest of school teachers and administration in your child is a continuing thing. A child with a cold, sore throat, fever, skin rash, or a sick stomach is better off at home than at school. But a written excuse may be needed when your child returns from an absence.

Also, if a child cannot take part in outdoor play, a note should be given the teacher. When problem of any kind arise, the parent should feel free to discuss them with the child's teacher. But arrange-

ments should be made in advance. PARENTS ARE WELCOME AT SCHOOL

As key partners in building e child's future, parents are always welcome at school. It's better to stop by the administrative office first. where the principal will be pleased with a visit. You may also want to meet the teachers and the superintendent.

When it is necessary to bring a child's lunch or other supplies to school, they can be left with instructions at the school office. Classes should not be interrupted while in session except by a call through the school office.

Joining the PTA and attending meetings give a parent opportunities for meeting school personnel and working more closely with them.



in jail for cheating on your income tax. However, there's not a large number of people who actually end up behind bars as a result of tax fraud. This doesn't mean that it has become advisable to start cheating on your income tax. Internal Revenue does not undertake the investigation of fraud against a taxpayer lightly. Before they present a tax fraud case to the Justice Department and finally to the Grand Jury, and the Judge and the Jury, they must be able to prove that the taxpayer was tuilty of cheating on his taxes, and that there was a deliberate intent or malice aforethought involved. It's not unusual to read that the jury found, after trial of a taxpayer, that he was not guilty of criminal fraud. However this taxpayer still must pay his taxes and civil fraud penalties and interest. Those taxpayers who manage to escape detection even though Internal Revenue has all types of records and sources available to them ften wish that they had pa the additional tax so they

These included (1) wheat and barley variety performance studies, (2) a combination fertilizer-irrigation test, with the addition of a simulated grazing study which was insitgated by the doubtful economics of wheat for grain alone; (3) wheat stubble burning followed by soybeans and grain sorghum, tilling the stubble followed by both

crops, and leaving the stubble with no follow crops for comparative effects on soil composition and structure; (4) a study on young cotton using dead wheat stubble as a protective measure, with the wheat stubble and weeds being controlled by herbicides; and (5) fall planting of some new varieties of barley.



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
