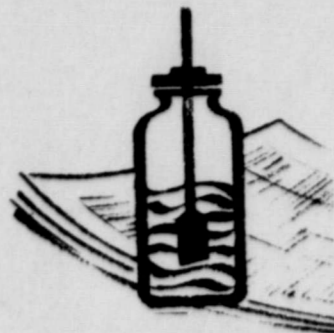

Lynx Look Sharp In Friday Scrimmage

Spearman's Jynking Lynx look sharp in the scrimmage against the Memphis Cyclones in the Spearman Friday evening. A capacity crowd of local fans got to the scrimmage, and it was rather pleased with the Lynx defense, as he had enough experience in the offensive backfield put together a fairly defense. The Lynx totaled 27 yards on the ground, but did not complete a pass, made only 7 yards all day.

The Lynx carried 12 times for 27 yards, average of 2.25 yards per carry. Cochran carried one time for 4 yards, field carried one time for 7 yards, Davis carried one time for 7 yards. Davis passed a total of 82 yards to Hutchison for 7 yards and Jenkins for 7 yards. Memphis passed 6 times for 12 yards, and the Lynx intercepted one of Memphis passes for a touch-

down. Memphis fumbled 7 times, lost the ball one time; Spearman fumbled 4 times, lost the ball one time.

Spearman attempted 14 passes, and completed 4 for 82 yards. The Lynx team was rather sharp on defense. This came as somewhat a surprise, to most observers. The front "four" on the Memphis team averaged 228 lbs. per man, and the Lynx defensive line continually broke through and tackled the passer and virtually disrupted the Memphis offense on several occasions.

Spearman will have another pre-season scrimmage this Friday evening. Injuries are beginning to hamper the Lynx but most all the boys will be ready for the Sunray game, September 13 at Spearman.

Sturdy Variety Wheat Yields Best In Testing

Wheat yields ranging from 30.6 to 60 bushels per acre were obtained from eleven varieties tested in 1968 despite a heavy hail on June 9. The hail seriously damaged the test through shattered grain and broken stalks, reducing all yields. However some varieties lost more than others. Sturdy wheat had a yield of 60 bushels per acre with Caddo next at 54 bushels. The Sturdy wheat was only 35 inches tall, had good standability and was one of the first varieties to mature.

Tascosa and Sturdy were the only varieties to rate "good" in the baking score. Comanche and Cheyenne rated about fair but six of the other varieties were rated poor and one very poor in the baking score. A three year average yield of seven varieties at the Foundation showed Tascosa with 57.5 bushels and Scout with 55.4 bushels per acre.

The eleven wheat varieties were planted on October 27, 1967 and were harvested on July 1, 1968. Fertilization consisted of 134 pounds of nitrogen and 60 pounds of phosphate applied preplant. All varieties were irrigated for germination and on April 8, April 29, and May 27 during the growing season. Grain sorghum was harvested from the experimental area 30 days prior to seeding the wheat.

Lloyd Langford, Associate Agronomist conducted the variety test at the High Plains Research Foundation, S. N. Vilms, Chief Chemist, Producers Grain Corporation conducted the chemical analysis and milling evaluation.

IMPORTANT REMINDER OF SURTAX PAYMENT

Everybody knows that the new surtax law raised the amount of income tax that you will pay (7 1/2% this year) by 10%. What a lot of folks don't know is that the rules for paying estimated taxes have also been tightened up. Most of us work for wages and our employers withhold income tax and social security tax from our wages and pay it to Uncle, and we don't have to worry about filing an estimated tax return. However, those folks who are self-employed or who have income outside of their pay check, do have a problem. This type of taxpayers have been required to file an estimated tax return in the past, but there were lots of good excuses that wiped out a tax penalty if you did not file and you met the exception. Congress decided to wipe out and tighten up these exceptions. If you are self-employed or if you have substantial income on which you have not paid any tax, you better review the amount of estimated tax that you are due to pay on September 15, or find out whether you have to file and pay because your good excuse is gone.

Spearman has received 1.58 inches of rainfall this through August 31, according to H. P. Cates local weather observer.

Total rainfall totaled 3.35 inches with .06 recorded on the 1st, .06 on the 10th, .12 on the 17th, .04 on the 18th, .90 on the 29th and .17 on August 31st.

On 9 days during August, temperatures of 100 degrees were charted with a maximum of 104 on August 11th. Three days later, on the 14th, the high for the day only 71 degrees with the month's minimum low of 54 degrees recorded the same date.

Over a 10 day period, 17 days during the month, temperatures in the 90's were recorded with 9 days recorded with 99 degrees.

Monthly rainfall totals by month for Spearman include: January, .65; February, .60; March, .28; April, 1.30; May 3.74; June 1.30; July 2.29; and August 1.58.

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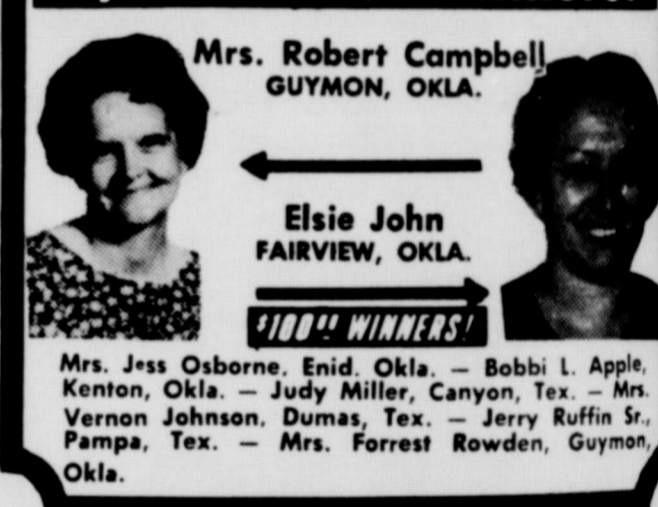

County Citizens Receive Record Cash Benefits

A record \$42,970.00 was paid in social security cash benefits to 600 residents of Hansford County for February 1968, according to Howard L. Weatherly, officer-in-charge of the Pampa Social Security Office.

February was the first month in which increased benefit rates provided by the 1967 amendments to the Social Security Act were payable, Weatherly noted.

Nationally, monthly benefits to more than 24 million men, women and children exceeded \$2 billion. 2.2 million receiving benefits were disabled workers under age 62 and their young dependents. About 3.4 million beneficiaries were young widowed mothers and their children. Weatherly said that a total of about \$19 billion has been paid to orphaned children and their mothers

since January 1940, when monthly survivors benefits first became payable.

Most of the changes in the 1967 amendments provided for protection for younger people. Children are now eligible for benefits based on the earnings of an insured mother who has died or is entitled to retirement or disability benefits. Previously, the mother needed to have worked for at least one and a half years in the last three before retirement, death or disability.

The amount of social security covered work required for payments of disability benefits to workers who become disabled before age 31 has been reduced substantially--for those below 24 to as little as a year and a half.

Widows of insured workers can get monthly benefits as early as age 50 if they are unable to work because of severe disability which began not later than 7 years after the death of their husband or after the end of their entitlement to benefits as a widow with a child in her care.

In the county, 102 children of retired, deceased or disabled workers received \$5,582.00 for the month of February. These payments continue monthly until the child is 18 unless some terminating event occurs. If the child does not marry and continues school full time, the payments do not stop until age 22.

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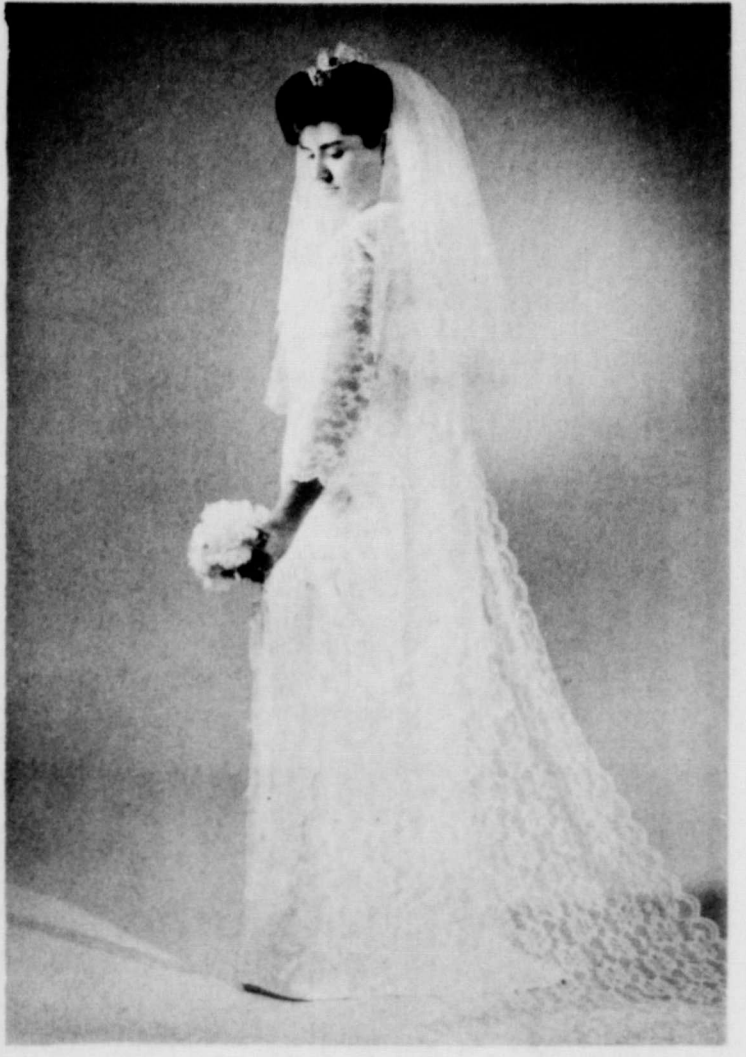
