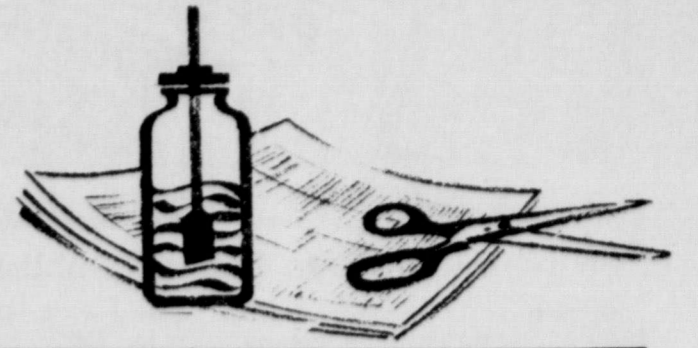

Lynx Seek Homecoming Victory From Gruver

Pep Rally Tonight

Friday night will see the Spearman Lynx tangle with Gruver Greyhounds, treacherous offensive team. The Gruver team, coming off three impressive victories and one loss will be pointing for their 4th triumph. The 1-A school has met only AA competition thus far this season. The Lynx will arrive for their 4th victory. They lost to a mighty Canyon team by the slim margin of 2 points.

Friday night is also homecoming night at Lynx Field, and the student council at Spearman High has been busy all week with plans which have been carried to completion by a spirited Cheerleaders organization.

Pre-homecoming activities began for SHS students Tuesday with a 10 o'clock spirit rally in the auditorium. Wednesday was "grieve day" when all students wore black in "mourning" for the Gruver Greyhounds (who would surely be the losers of Friday night's contest.)

Thursday (today) is Lynx approval day when team members and coaches will be treated with home baked cookies. Tonight, beginning at 7:45 p. m., a snake dance will form in front of the Post Office, marching all the way out to the high school where a giant pep rally and bonfire will conclude the day's activities.

Another pep rally will be staged the last period of Friday afternoon when cheerleaders will be leading the yells designed to fire the fighting Lynx with an abundance of spirit prior to the annual county championship game.

The football boys have selected a slate of five Queen candidates from which they

will choose the 1968-69 Football Queen and crown her in pre-game ceremonies scheduled for 7:45 Friday evening.

Kick-off time at Lynx Field is 8 p. m. There will be a homecoming dance following the game. The "Undertakers" will furnish music till 12:30. Admission will be \$1.50 per person.

Bryan Rites Tuesday

Funeral services for Joseph Lewis Bryan, 81, early day Panhandle farmer and school teacher who died Saturday night at Hansford Hospital, were held at 10 a. m. Tuesday from the First Methodist Church in Spearman.

The Rev. Jimmy Tidwell, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Perryton officiated. Burial was in Ochiltree County cemetery by Boxwell Brothers Funeral directors.

Mr. Bryan was born in Cooke County and came to the northeastern Panhandle area in 1911 from Dewey County, Oklahoma. The 1911 trip took four days in a covered wagon.

He had taught school in Balco and Dewey County, Oklahoma, many years before his retirement from teaching in 1938. The last school in which he taught was the McMillian School in Ochiltree county. Mr. Bryan retired from farming and ranching in 1946. He farmed extensively in Hansford and Ochiltree Counties.

He was head of a third generation teaching family. His daughter, Mrs. Norman Crum teaches at Perryton and a granddaughter Mrs. Jene Burkhardt teaches at Vernon. Survivors includes his wife, Maudie Bryan of the Spearman home; sons, Leland of San Diego; Lester of San Francisco and Wayne of Tulsa, Oklahoma; daughters, Mrs. Norman Crum of Perryton and Mrs. Bill Anglin of Denver, Colorado; 16 grand children, 12 great grand children and two brothers: W. C. Bryan and A. E. Bryan both of Perryton.

Pallbearers included Marvin Jones, John Hardy, Gus McLain, Dr. Damon Gregg, Ray Phelps, John Colliard, Jack McWhirter and Carter Crawford.

Glenn Truax Dead At 72

Funeral services for Glenn Truax, 72, were held Wednesday in the First Christian Church in Gruver with graveside military rites being conducted by American Legion Post.

Mr. Truax died Monday in Wichita, Kansas, his home for the past several months. The deceased was well known throughout the Panhandle area where he taught school and directed bands in Shamrock, Perryton, North Texas State College at Denton, Waka, Groom, Morse and Gruver. He made his home in Gruver many years where he taught music at the Truax Music Studio.

He was a past president of North Texas Band and Orchestra Association. He began his musical career on a farm near Cherryvale, Kansas, his place of birth, with the study of violin at age 10.

Following WWI when he played in a band by order of General Pershing, Mr. Truax graduated from Kansas State Teachers College. After college he taught school and organized or taught bands in many places.

Survivors include his wife, Helen; daughters Mrs. Arlene Meek of Yukin, Okla., Mrs. Jean Holland of Gruver, Mrs. Kathy Carey of Borger; a brother, Orma of Perryton and 6 grandchildren.

All articles should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard, or strong double faced corrugated fiberboard. 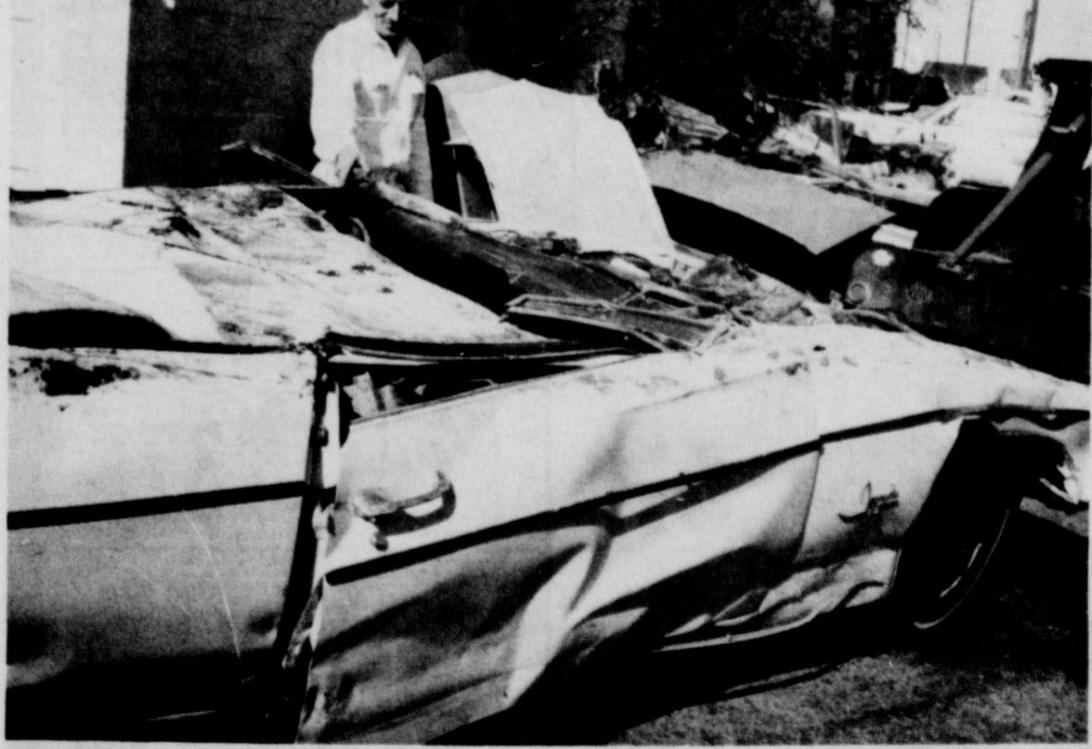

Scribner's wrecked vehicle was not discovered until 8 a. m. the next morning when James Ayers of Gruver crossed the bridge, noticed the missing guard rails and spotted the yellow car barely visible in a clump of yellow sunflowers.

Ayers investigated the wreck and rushed on into Morse to summon aid. It took workers some 45 minutes with blow torches to free Scribner from the crumpled auto.

He was brought to Spearman where a doctor treated him for a broken thumb and released him.

Lynx Grab Easy Win From Stratford

SPEARMAN DROPS STRATFORD FRIDAY NIGHT 19-0
The Spearman Lynx made a tremendous comeback after the loss to Canyon by beating Stratford 19-0 Friday night. The Lynx defense proved itself turning out a fine performance in all four quarters. In the first period neither team scored. Stratford had the ball first of the second period with second down and eight yards. The lynx held

them and Stratford kicked from their own 42 yard line. Donalane Whitefield took the punt on Spearman's 28 yard line and ran it 72 yards to Spearman's first touchdown. Mike Davis added the extra point to give Spearman a 7-0 lead.

Spearman then kicked off and Stratford returned the kick 8 yards. A Stratford fumble with the lynx recovering on the 30 yard line of Stratford gave Spearman excellent scoring position. Halfback Bobby Smith then ran 30 yards for a touchdown with nine minutes left in the first half. Mike Davis' conversion attempt failed.

The third period was all Spearman with a drive of 56 yards and again Bobby Smith scored behind great blocking from 4 yards out. The run attempt for 2 points failed. Stratford tried to move the ball but Spearman was always there. In the fourth period, Stratford lost 46 yards in one series of plays as the gun sounded to end the game.

Final score was Spearman 19, Stratford 0.
