Farmers Start ACP Sign-Up January 2nd

Ellzey D. Vanderburg, County office manager for USDA Stabilization & Conservation Service, said in a letter this week that Hansford County farmers will start the first ACP sign-up Thursday,

January 2, 1969. Hansford County has received \$69,093,00 allocation for conservation practices in 1969. There will be a thousand dollar payment limitation per person per farm. The allocation will be divided into three equal periods, with two-thirds of the allocation set up for the first third, and the second and last third being equally divided. This will be based on first come, first served basis, as in the

Vanderburg also reminded Hansford farmers that the final date to file an applica-tion for the transfer of cotton allotments is December 31, 1968. These cotton allotments may be transferred to farms outside the county but cannot be transferred from one State to another.

December 2 through December 6 has been announced as the period for conducting by mail the 1969 cotton marketing Quota Referendum. Voting instructions, along with ballots will be mailed to each known eligible voter November 29, 1968.



TAX MAN SAM SEZ: The Commissioner of Internal Revenue gives these statistics on mathematical verification of individual tax returns in his Annual Report Summary for the Fiscal Year 196

- 65.4 million returns were mathematically verified; - 3.9 million returns required correction

- 2.4 million were taxpayers errors that caused the taxpayer to underpay his tax. IRS collected \$207.5 additional millions from these folks. However,

- 1.5 million made errors in favor of the government, and Internal Revenue refunded \$94. 3 million to these taxpavers who had cheated themselves out of almost \$100 million through their own bad arithmetic.

This may not prove that most taxpayers would flunk grammar school arithmetic, but it seems to prove Internal Revenue's repeated warning: 'Check it again -- carefully -before you mail it." That dollar you save will be your



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
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KEN WILMETH TAILWATER PIT -- Why let tailwater get away when it can be turned into profit? How much water can be saved by installing a tailwater system? It is estimated that from a 1,000 gallon per minute well, where tailwater is allowed to get away, that 20% of the water will be lost. This means that 200 GPM runs out of the field. With a tailwater return system 65% of this water can be reused. An additional acres of land per season or 40 acres per year can be watered. It is estimated that average increase of wheat and milo will be about \$65.00 per acre. A pit 120' x deep will be large enough to give storage for tailwater from a 1,000 GPM well. some advantages besides the above are: fewer shutdowns, better job of watering, and less labor. SCHOOL BUS SAFETY RULES

AUSTIN--Ten suggested safety rules for unloading and loading school buses are being sent to superintendents across the state by the Texas Education Agency

These safety rules were drawn up with one objective: to cut the number of accidents involving school buses on Texas city streets and country roads.

The need for greater school bus safety is underlined by the accident statistics, Richard M. Cummins, Agency director of school transportation, points out.

Four children have already been killed this year in accidents involving school buses, all of them little tots in the first three grades," Cummins adds.

School buses were involved in a total of 209 accidents during 1967-68, including eight fatalities and 48 injuries, according to Department of Public Safety records. Nearly half a million child-

ren ride school buses 481, 475 miles each school day in Texas, travelling along 7, 755 routes from big city neighborhoods to the scattered farms and ranches. A total of 399, 040 of those daily miles are ridden on surfaced streets or highways while the remaining 82,435 extend along dirt roads.

One key safety suggestion zeroes in on young children, recommending that school bus drivers escort children in the first three grades across streets and roadways at all times. Other rules detail safe methods of boarding the school bus, discharging pupils who live on the right-hand side of the road or across the highway, how students should cross the highway to meet or leave the bus in safe areas, use of flasher lights, and backing (more importantly, not backing) the bus when delivering students.

Good Food Buys For Holidays

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. New crop citrus fruits, many from the Texas valley area, are adding holiday spirit to local markets, reports Gwendolyne Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing special-

Grapefruit supplies are increasing and price is decreasing. Oranges, tangerines and tangeloes are on the market.

Green-skinned Fuerte avocados are begging to come in with more reasonable prices, according to Mrs. Clyatt, a specialist with Texas A&M University. Since the new crop is large, avocadoes should be plentiful this

Due to limited supplies, apples are not inexpensive but oceasional bargains are

in sacks of smaller apples. Most of these are the right size for eating out of hand and are as flavorful as the large fruit. Mrs. Clyatt reports best

vegetable buys in carrots, celery, cabbage, cauliflower, turnips, rutabagas, broccoli, sweet potatoes and dry onions. Beef supplies are ample, but she expects no price

changes in the near future. Chuck and rib roasts are currently featured. Figured on a cost per serving basis, boneless roasts often cost no more than the bone-in roasts and are easier to serve.

Turkey prices are up a bit as demand increases. Fryers are featured in many markets as good protein choice.

Egg prices are on the upward trend again as holiday baking and extra cooking gets underway, however, good values in large size grade A eggs are available, Mrs. Clyatt says.

Keep Records Of **Medical Costs**

COLLEGE STATION-Premiums paid on health insurance policies usually can be deducted -- up to a point.

According to Doris Myers, Extension home management specialist, deductions of insurance premiums as a medical expense are limited to payments which cover medical care. This means any money paid for the diagnosis, cure, treatment, or prevention of disease, for malfunctions of the body or for transportation primarily for and essential to medical care, she explains.

Premiums paid for insurance covering reimbursement for of limb or loss of time resulting from sickness or accident are not deductable, Mrs. Myers says. Premiums on insurance that provides only for reimbursement of prescription drug costs are deductible.

The Extension Service specialist at Texas A &M University advises keeping records of all medical costs. One never knows at the beginning of the year if such cost will be large enough to justify itemizing at income tax time.







Governor Bradford thought it fitting to celebrate and give thanks for this good fortune. A formal invitation was issued to Massasoit, grand sachem of the Pokanoket Indians, to join in a feast of Thanksgiving. Massasoit accepted, arrived with 90 of his followers, and stayed for 3 days of feast-

Thanksgiving days following harvests later came to be celebrated throughout the New England colonies, but on different and varying days. George Washington proclaimed Nov. 26, 1789 as the first national Thanksgiving day in honor of the new Constitution. But the custom; continued to vary widely among the states -kept alive only by the proclamations of local govern-

It was a woman -- Sarah Josepha Hale, however, who first suggested that Thanksgiving should be a national patriotic holiday. She was the editor of the popular woman's magazine called "Godey's Lady's Book," and for almost 20 years she campaigned through editorials and letters to the President, governors and other influential persons. Finally, Sarah Hale was able to win support of President Abraham Lincoln. In the third year of the Civil War, he believed that he Union had been saved. He, therefore, proclaimed a national day of Thanksgiving to be celebrated Thursday, November 26, 1864. So Thanksgiving Day became an annual observance.

Today, as in 1864 and 1621, it remains a holiday that Americans await with hearts of gratitude for bounty, family, and many, many other blessings.






