SHELL-SHOCKED FANS WATCH LYNX WIN THRILLER AT STINNETT!

The Lynxettes won their 10th straight District Championship 58-39. Marcia Shieldknight netted 30 points, to lead the winners to the championship.

The Spearman Lynx teams won 4 games at Stinnett Tuesday night and two of them were barnburners. The Spearman B girls won an easy game against the Stinnett B girls, the Spearman boys won a thriller 46-45. The Spearman A girls won the district championship for the 10th time in a row with a 58-39 win! But the big story of the night, was the 1 point 52-51 win that the Lynx A team played.

Officials from both Spearman and Phillips schools will have to meet after the Friday night Dalhart-Spearman game to decide on a location of the play-off game for the boys. The game will be definitely played next Thursday night, probably at Berger, Perryton or Pampa.

But, the big story of the week, was the way the Stinnett Rattlers "played the claws" off of the fine Spearman Lynx. And, it was not a situation of over-confidence on the Lynx. Although the Lynx made many mistakes, it was a case of the Rattlers just being super-sensational. The Rattlers led the Lynx the entire game until the last 1.23 seconds when the game was tied. With 3 seconds left in the

game, the Lynx forged ahead to win 52-51.

The Lynx were in foul trouble from the first 7 minutes on. If there was a star of the game, it had to be Edgar Womble, reserve sophomore who played his heart out.

Lynx fans will not have to be reminded that another big hurdle still lies ahead of this fine Lynx team. The Dalhart Wolves will come to Spearman on this Friday night and they almost upset Phillips at Phillips last week! So, you bet your bottom dollar that the Lynx will be playing for keeps. They snatched this win from the Rattlers as a "brand from the burning fire" and they want to win this district championship. Local fans are urged to attend this game Friday night and back these Lynx teams. Remember if the Lynx win this one Friday night, they will play Phillips next Thursday night to determine the district championship!

The bi-district foe of the Lynxettes will be Wellington. The game site will be determined at a later date.

Highest Scoring Lynxettes

Three Spearman basketball players were named by Coach Weese this week as his highest scoring girls. Phyllis Patterson-1961-65, had a total of 2297 points. In her freshman year, Patterson averaged 2.5 points per game; as a sophomore, Phyllis averaged 18.5 points per game; as a junior 21.6; as a senior 22.7. Phyllis played all 4 years and did not miss a single game.

Barbara Wilde scored a total of 2237 points, from 1963-65. As a freshman, Barbara averaged 2 points per game; as a sophomore 8.1; as a junior 22.6; as a senior, 25.4 points per game. Marcia Shieldknight the leading scorer with 2811 points; 1965-69-Freshman average, 7.4; sophomore 15 points; junior 26.4; In 31 games to date, she has averaged 28 points per game. Marcia is the highest scoring player that Coach Weese has had in the past 11 years.

Coach Weese stated that his Spearman teams have won 301 games and lost 67. The above 3 girls have totaled 7,345 points to date.

Grassland Destroyed By Blaze

A roaring grass fire Sunday afternoon on the Gus Renner road, 20 miles north of Spearman, is said to have started on the exhaust of a coyote hunter's pickup.

The fire, which began in heavy grass and weeds, destroyed over a half-section of over-out land before it was brought under control by fire departments from Spearman, Dover and the Hitch Grain company.

Many volunteer fire-fighters fought the blaze for four hours before it was extinguished.

This blood program is a service established through joint efforts of the Red Cross, the local medical profession and the hospital, in order to provide a dependable supply of whole blood to meet the needs in this community, or of individual donors and their families wherever they may be hospitalized.

Tax Increase Would Be Needed

The Public School Education bill, proposing many changes, is now before the Texas Legislature. The big city schools are playing for big stakes and regardless of what many think, the big cities of Texas have the majority vote. If they can agree among themselves, they can pretty well swing the vote in favor of the education bill.

The issue on the school front will be between city and rural forces. If such a bill does pass, the rural schools will lose much of their state fund receipts and in order to carry on their school program, as proposed by the State committee, taxes will HAVE to be increased. As an example:

The projected budgeted receipts for Spearman Independent School District for THIS year total \$977,440.00 IF the State Legislature votes in

favor of the bill, the district's total receipts for 1969-70 would be \$1,074,369 and for 1970-71 would be \$1,155,033.

A 24% increase in local taxes for 1969 and another 9% increase in 1970 would be necessary to meet these requirements and make the proposed changes as recommended by the education committee. The Spearman School District would lose \$96,150.00 in State Revenue each YEAR for the next two years.

Those interested in the school situation from the small school standpoint had better not become complacent.

Expansion Plans Announced

Ladies of the Hansford County Farm Bureau, (director's wives) have worked for the past two years at various projects to raise \$1,000.00. This week their goal was reached and the money turned over to Hansford Hospital to be used in the purchase of new equipment for the Coronary Intensive Care Unit.

Just recently S.M. Anderson, hospital administrator, purchased badly needed coronary equipment consisting of two closed circuit television screens and cardiac monitoring machines. This allows nurses at the station to be constantly in touch with heart patients in the intensive care unit and to monitor their every heart beat. This new equipment also up-dates Hansford Hospital's efficiency next-to-none in the area. The plant is becoming one of the best-equipped hospitals in the Panhandle.

In accepting the thousand dollar donation Monday Anderson said that he and the board of directors were extremely grateful. "The money fits in very well right at the present since the hospital is in the process of forming a

master expansion plan for the future," the administrator said.

Anderson said the Board of Directors would meet next Monday with an architect from Kansas who would assist them in formulating plans for hospital expansion.

"If this county grows as the experts say it is going to, we want to be ready for it," he said. Anderson said they would draw up plans for enlarging X-ray facilities, intensive care units, emergency rooms plus a four-doctor clinic, etc.

Anderson said they knew of two physicians who were very interested in moving to Spearman to practice. One of these is Dr. Stephenson, a Perryton doctor who used the Hansford Hospital extensively several months ago. He is now attending a two-year specialized school for Radiologists and plans to practice in Spearman following his training. The other M.D. might move here soon if he could find housing.

"We need more M.D.'s in this area," Anderson said, "and our plans for the future (hospital) are designed to entice the best physicians available."

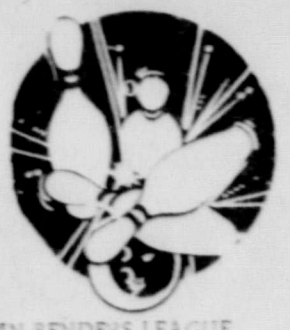

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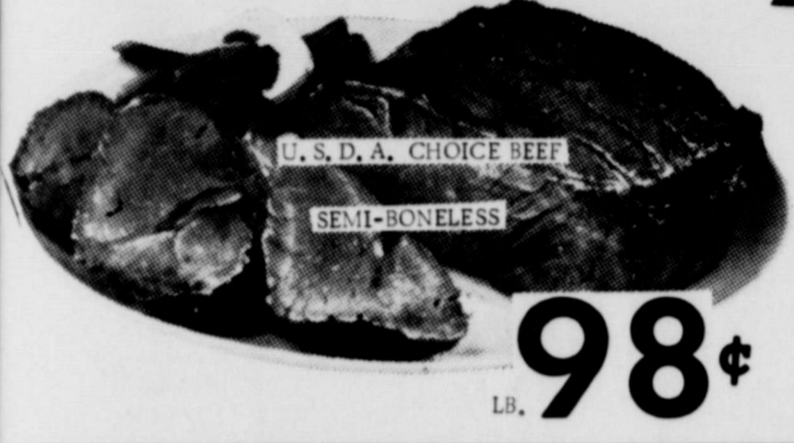

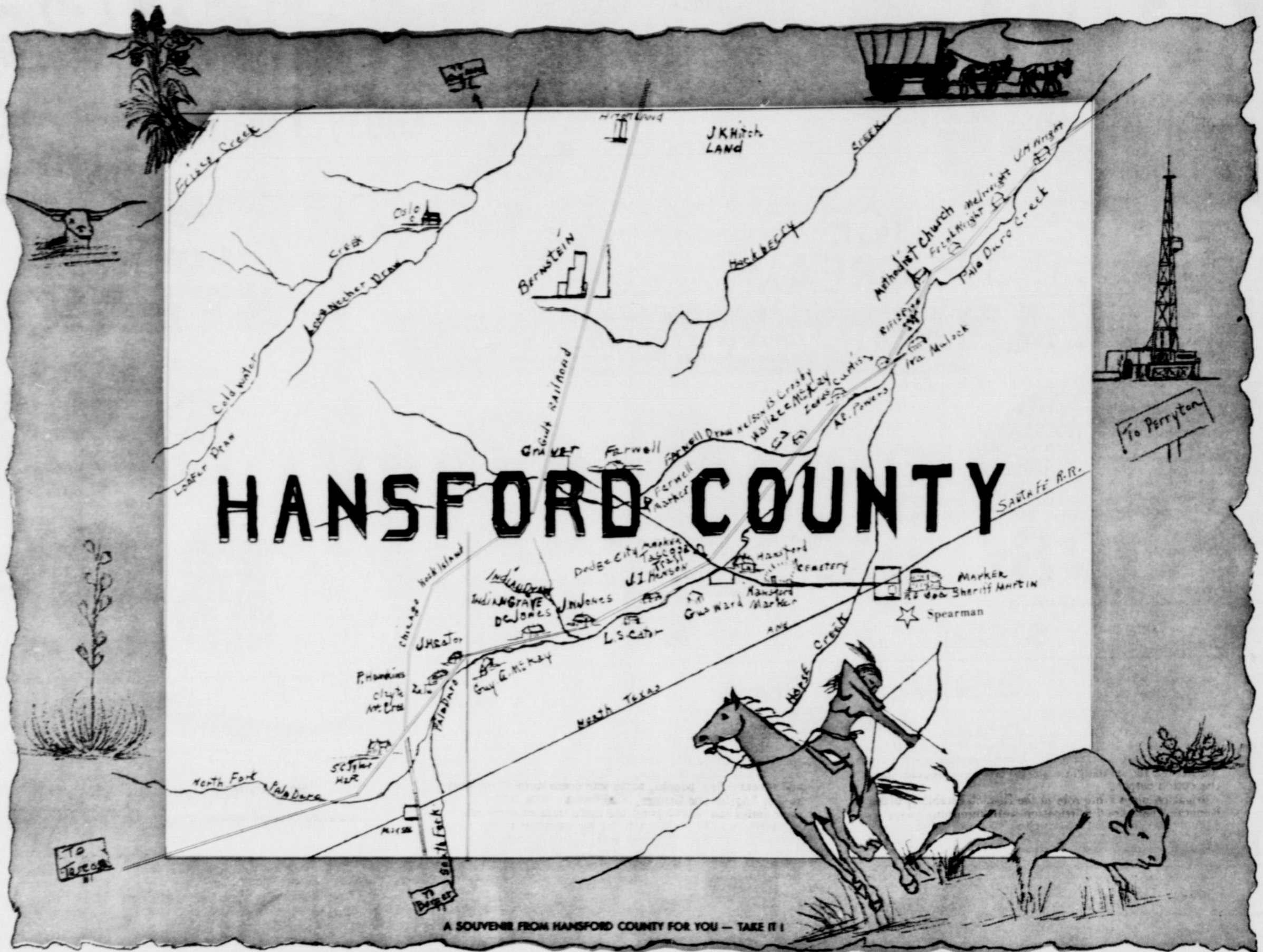

GROW WITH SPEARMAN

HANSFORD COUNTY

Hansford County was formed from Young and Bexar Counties. It was created August 21, 1876, but was not organized until March 11, 1889. The first settlers located on the headwaters of the Palo Duro Creek. A. J. L. and James H. Cator, who were buffalo hunters, established a camp and in 1873 built Zulu Stockade, the first building north of the Canadian River. Zulu became a stagecoach stand on the Tascosa Trail, and in 1880 became the first post office in Hansford County. All of the first settlers established their homes up and down the Palo Duro Creek.

The first town in the county was Farwell, established in 1880. A 200 ft. hand-dug well supplied the town with water. (Marker Hwy, 282 & 15)

The first settlers' homes were dugouts. Ranching was the primary occupation and in 1900 after the enactment of the Homestead Law, farmers came and the economy of the county changed from ranching to farming and ranching. These people settled on the plains and established communities, schools, and post offices.

The first school in the county was located at Farwell. The first church, a Methodist organization, known as Huff's Chapel, was located Northeast of Hansford, and was built in 1906.

When the Santa Fe Railroad built in the county in 1919, the terminal was Spearman. Spearman became the county seat in 1929.

In 1928, the Rock Island Railroad came through the County and the towns of Hitchland, Gruver, and Morse were established.

The first gas wells were drilled in the Northwest part of Hansford County.

Hansford County, the central County in the northern tier of the Texas Panhandle, has an altitude of 3,105 feet. The average rainfall is 19.7 inches; average temperature 55.4; average maximum 70.7 degrees; average minimum 42.1 degrees; length of growing season 185 days; the low humidity and good wind motion prevent the high daytime temperatures from being uncomfortable and the high elevation allows rapid cooling at night. January is the coldest month.

Agricultural products consist of small grains and sorghum (ranks second in wheat production in the State) castor beans, alfalfa, dried cabbages, experimental vegetables (very favorable) and corn. Numerous elevators provide ample storage for all the grain and a cotton gin provides for the cotton output.

Irrigation plays a big role in the financial stability of the County. There are 791 irrigation wells furnishing water for 200,000 acres (half of which are planted to grain sorghum). There are 225 miles of underground irrigation pipe line. Gifford-Hill Western, located on the west edge of Spearman manufactures all the pipeline materials need-

ed for underground irrigation for miles around. The annual agricultural income is \$25,945,000.00 and there are 30 to 40 thousand head of cattle in feed lots. The first irrigation well was drilled near Old Hansford in 1931.

Beautiful churches in the county represent all the leading denominations--both Protestant and Catholic. Plentiful school buildings, including a new \$1,250,000.00 windowless high school, adequate facilities and qualified teachers afford a good education for our youth.

As Texas celebrates its 100th anniversary as an oil-producing State, Hansford County shares in the development that made the Lone Star State the No. 1 energy source for a booming American civilization. In 1886 Lyne T. Barrett drilled the first well near Nacogdoches at a depth of 106 ft. The search for oil and gas has spread to every county in the state and today Hansford County is one of 210 which produces oil and gas. Barrett and other pioneer oil men left a legacy for our county that can be measured at approximately \$14.7 million a year.

Some of the major industries directly connected with the oil and gas and located in Hansford County are: Baker-Taylor Drilling Co., Northern Natural Pipeline Co., Northern Natural Gas Plant, Skelly Plant, Michigan-Wisconsin Plant, Phillips Petroleum Plant and Junior Luzby "Cats" Earth Moving. Payroll is \$4,500,000. It is the center of the Anadarko Oil and Gas Basin.

Three hundred acres, adjacent to a paved highway and with utilities already provided, have been set aside for industrial sites.

There are two banks in the County, one hospital, four doctors and two dentists; Pioneer Nursing Home; Veterinarian Hospital and Clinic; Hansford Plainsman, semi-weekly newspaper, Spearman Reporter and Gruver Leader, Both weekly; Radio Station KBMF-FM. Eighty per cent of the homes are owner occupied and the average price is \$10,000 to \$17,000.00.

Hansford County has 521 miles of county roads of which 189 are paved.

Spearman is known as the "Mule Capital of Texas" because of its traveling muleskinners.

The Rolling Plains Mule Train, Inc. is an all mule wagon train even down to the scouts who ride mules and who help direct traffic and perform many other jobs. It is made up of about thirty families, fifty mules, twenty wagons, and seventy-five people, some who come from as far away as Los Angeles and Grimes, California, who bring their mules and accompany the mule train on some of its long trips. The mule train also has members from three foreign countries and its enthusiasts represent many vocations, including farmers, ranchers, oil-field workers, merchants, and other professional people.

The Mule train was founded in 1963 as a non-profit organization and is known as the good will ambassador of the cities it represents. The train has traveled many thousand miles on busy highways to the places it has been invited to take part in western celebrations and other important occasions. Some of these events include the Fort Worth Livestock Exposition; the re-dedication of old Ft. Richardson at Jacksboro, Texas; Ft. Belnap at New Castle, Texas; and the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association at Graham, Texas which was formed under the "Old Oak Tree," in 1877. The wagon train also went to Muleshoe, Texas to the unveiling of "Old Pete," the only statue to a mule in the world. They took part in the dedication of the "Cowboy Hall of Fame," in Oklahoma City, and the Dodge City, Kansas celebration.

The mule train group has met and become acquainted with Governors and Lt. Governors, Mayors, and movie stars. Among the movie stars they have met are Dean Smith, James Drury, "The Virginian," and John Wayne. The women-folk of the train dress in the 1870 tradition and these gals don't let the orney mules bother them as they harness, hitch, drive and care for them just as the men-folks do.

The Rolling Plains Mule Train boasts of having the largest selection of mules in the southwest. They have received publicity in many national magazines, in newspaper articles, and stories by the Associated Press and have been shown on TV from coast to coast on all of the major networks.

Committee Formed To Represent Rural Interests In School Program

AUSTIN--A statewide committee to represent rural landowners and those who enjoy living in the country during the expected struggle over school district consolidation in the current session of the Texas Legislature was announced here Wednesday.

The group, known as "The Little Red School House Committee", is composed of a cross-section of farmers, ranchers and rural landowners from throughout the state. Charles Schreiner III, a prominent rancher from Mountain Home, is chairman of the committee.

"We believe the forced consolidation of small school districts, as proposed in the report of the Governor's Committee on Public School Education, will go a long way toward destroying rural life as it is now enjoyed in Texas," Schreiner declared in a news conference at noon Wednesday.

Schreiner pointed out that the Governor's Committee recommends the forced consolidation of Texas' 1,218 school districts into a total of 353. "This would virtually wipe out 865 community centers, since most rural schools are the primary symbols of community identification," Schreiner said.

He refuted the claim that bigger school districts would automatically provide better education for students. "Merit is not an absolute guarantee of excellence," he said.

"The Little Red School House Committee has been formed to awaken rural landowners and residents of small communities to the unseen dangers of forced consolidation and to acquaint legislators in Austin with the feelings of the rural people of Texas," Schreiner said.

In addition to the erosion of rural communities following the closing of their schools, Schreiner said that other adverse effects would

include the bussing of students often many miles away; elimination or serious curtailment of many outstanding programs designed primarily for rural schools, such as vocational agricultural and vocational homemaking programs; the elimination of athletic teams from Class AA and below, with the resultant loss of identity for those communities and a decrease or entire elimination of a voice for the rural residents on school boards which will be centered in urban areas.

"The Little Red School House Committee and all its members certainly want to provide the best education possible for the young people of our state," Schreiner said. "But we don't believe that this proposed forced consolidation program, requiring the elimination of nearly 900 school districts in Texas, is the answer."

Whether anything has been done or not I don't know but I did hear the committee had purchased the land. Golf course construction and maintenance is big business in Texas--about \$15 million a year. During the past few years the number of courses in Texas has jumped from 275 to 424. Texas ranks 38th out of the 50 states in number of people per golf course. All these statistics give me the fever and I hope to be able this summer to do more playing than I've been able

to the past 2 years. Ever wonder why so many of the women take up golf? It's probably because the game offers them a perfect "tension releaser." ACCORDING to reports from the Department of Labor, we have stabbed ourselves in the back, so to speak. For years now we've preached to our offspring "go to college, get a white collar job." Within the next 10 years, they tell us, a college education will get you a good job if you are in the right profession! There will be a surplus of teachers, mathematicians, life scientists and college educated workers, but a great shortage of physicalists, dentists, engineers and physical scientists. There will be NO service-men. Our worship of the white-collars has and is defeating us. For now that our affluent society can afford the best, we lack the people to provide it for us, or to service it after we get it. We pay our respects to the skilled craftsman, but we desperately need men who can work with their hands. A skilled carpenter is increasingly hard to find and a mason nearly impossible. Every town in America is desper-

ately short of plumbers. By the same token we are desperately short of good cooks in our restaurants. Nobody wants to be a chef. The barber trade is having trouble recruiting men who want to take up barbering as a profession. Shoe repairmen are a dying breed. You simply can not find a good tailor for men's clothes. Painters and paper hangers are a thing of the past. Is it because we look down on manual work? Our society has long since denied the manual laborer any true social status--and this could be the reason he is a vanishing species. Giving such people more money is not the answer. Nowadays chefs, plumbers, painters--can command a salary many a junior executive would envy. And the reason many of them do is for the simple reason they CAN. They are a rare species. We now can see that we have a surplus of people who can work with their minds. What we NEED is people who can work with their hands!

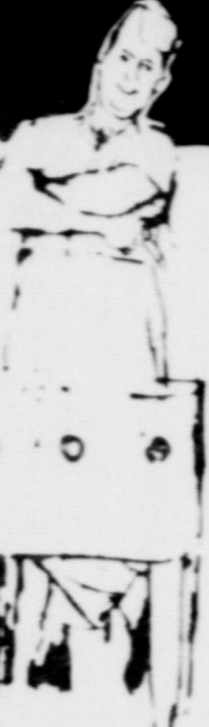

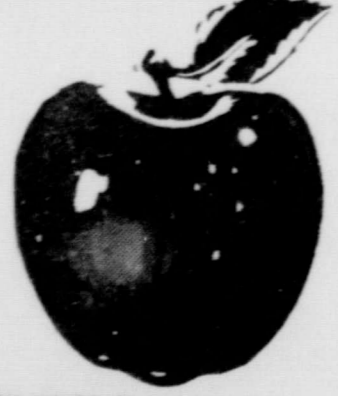

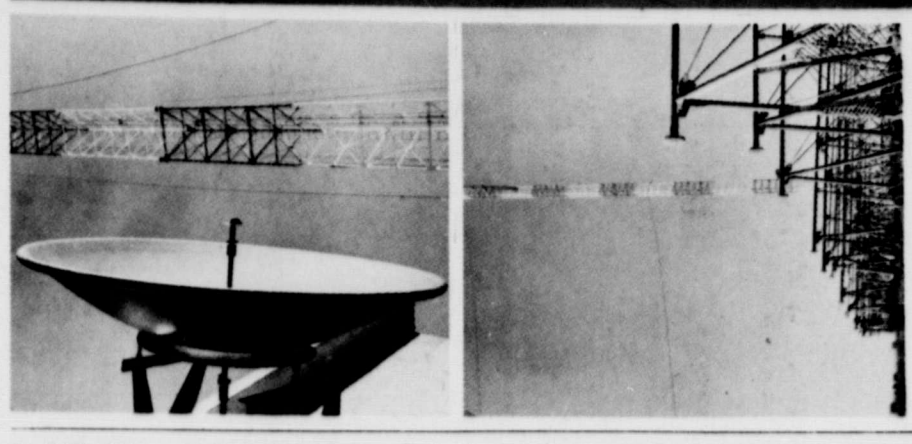

Completion of Texas' Tallest Tower Expected Soon

KVII: A POWERFUL NEW PICTURE



A third of a mile high, Texas' tallest tower climbs higher than the Empire State Building, the Eiffel Tower, the Washington Monument, the Astrodome, the Statue of Liberty, and the Grand Coulee Dam.

If current construction progress continues, the station expects to be on the air with the new tower early next month. The actual airdate is contingent upon weather conditions, especially ice and wind. For safety reasons, work must be halted when the wind reaches 20 miles per hour.

When the switch to the new tower is made, thousands of area viewers will see a dramatic improvement in the TV picture they receive from KVII. Bill Canady, Director of Engineering, put it this way, "People who've watched us through a virtual snowstorm, if they could get us at all, will see us as clear as a summer day when we go on the new stick."

The change will officially be marked on the air at KVII by the use of a new station identification symbol, shown in the center of this page. Looking somewhat like a western brand, it represents the vast empire that will be included in Channel 7's new coverage area.

Upon completion, the new tower will allow KVII to reach out over an estimated 9,000 square miles more than before. Many viewers who had been unable in the past to receive an acceptable picture from KVII will be able to do so by aiming their antennas toward the Amarillo tower. Picture resolution will be sharper, colors snappier and watch the station via cable systems or translators will see a marked improvement in picture quality from KVII.

The reason for the improved picture quality was explained by Canady. "A TV picture travels pretty much in a straight line. By going up higher, we get above a lot of the ground obstructions that caused interference before. That's why you can see a TV picture from the moon, but you can't get a picture from a tower 200 miles away. The taller tower gives us more 'horizon' to shoot at, increasing our coverage area substantially. In some cases, people who've not been able to receive any television will be able to get a picture on Channel 7."

The orange-and-white steel mammoth stretches 1,703 feet into the Panhandle sky above the Canadian River breaks. True to Texas tradition, everything about it is BIG.

Canady reviewed some of the specifications of the structure: "There will be 191 tons of steel in the tower, including the 6-ton helical antenna that bolts on top. The guy cables are 31,000 feet long. It took two-and-a-half tons of zinc to galvanize the thing to prevent rust. The base of the tower contains 73 cubic yards of concrete and four tons of reinforcing steel." Watching the iron-nerved workmen crawling nonchalantly through the high struts of the tower, Canady observed, "Without the headache ball to ride on, it'll take about an hour-and-a-half to climb the 120 steps to the top. Whoever does it had better be in good shape—and take a lunch!"

Not only is KVII's new tower the tallest in Texas, it is taller than the best efforts of many foreign countries, including France, England, Australia, Holland, Germany, Canada, Japan, Finland, Czechoslovakia, Red China, Hungary, Scotland, Ireland, and Wales. KVII's tower is only 360 feet shy of the tallest structure in the world—the 2,863 foot tower of KTHV-TV in Fargo, N. D.

His study of weather has taken him through four universities and numerous Air Force weather schools.

Hand-in-hand with weather goes agriculture—in Channel 7's area, at least. And the dean of Amarillo's farm and ranch broadcasters is KVII's Jack Tompkins. Graduating from Texas A&M, Tompkins gained practical experience as a county agent. Sensing a need for more and faster agr-business news for farmers and ranchers, Tompkins turned to broadcasting. He provides vital daily market quotations, important research developments, and up-to-date information about agricultural events in the area.

Sports Director Woody Van Dyke stands out as a distinct personality, calling the sports items as he sees them. More than a straight reporter, Van Dyke adds spice with his own outspoken, sometimes controversial views. In another article on this page, Van Dyke outlines plans for future sports emphasis on the station.

Experience? Depth? Like Bob Izard said, "It's a championship professional team all the way through." And according to the figures, that seems to be what viewers in this area have been waiting for.

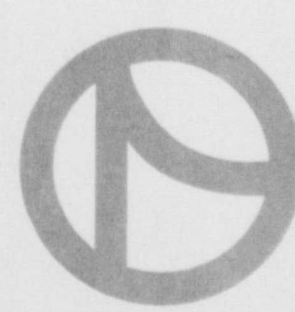

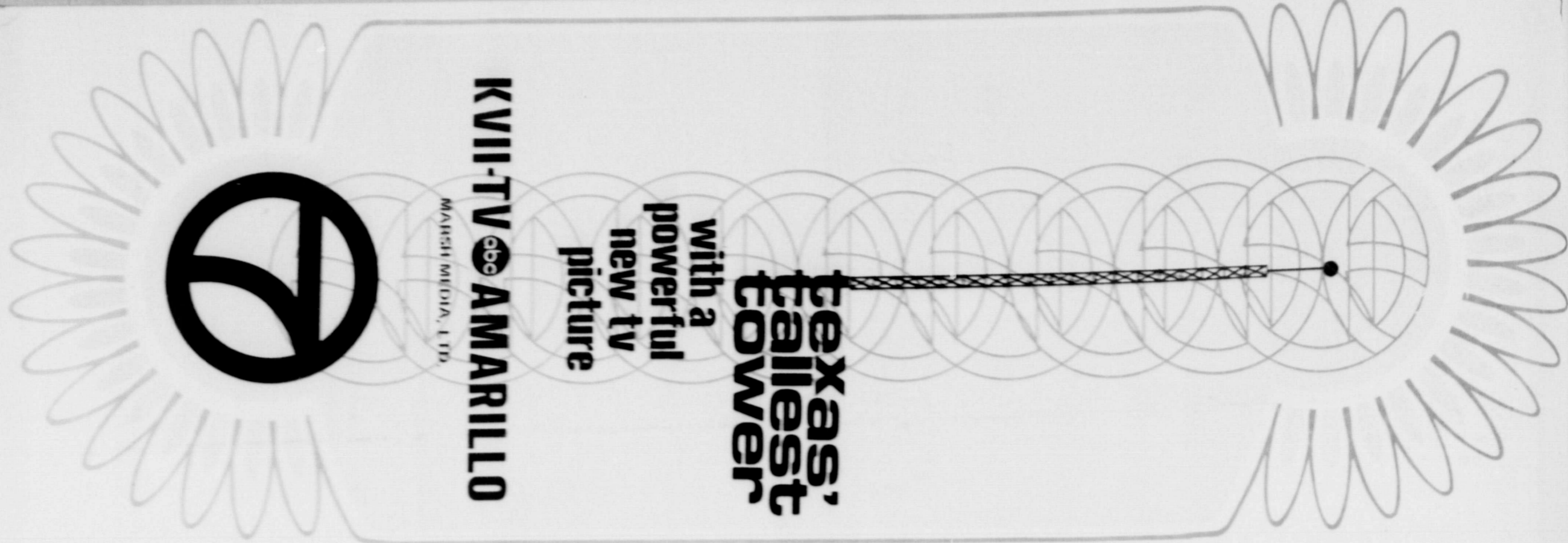
