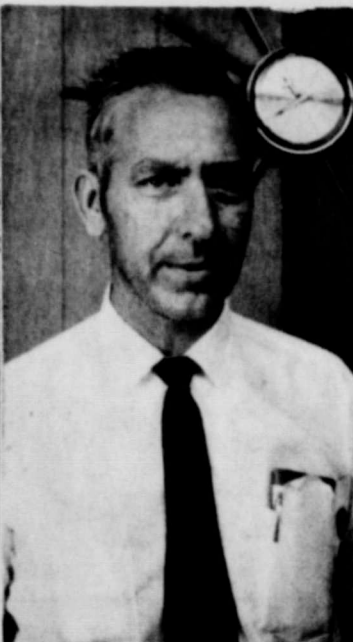

Voters will go to the polls Saturday April 5 to cast ballots for school board members and city aldermen.

Both elections will be held in the Junior High school building with the polls opening at 8 a. m. and closing at 7 p. m.

All registered voters are eligible to participate. Two places are up for grabs in the School Trustee election with five candidates on the ballot; in this order: Hershel Jones (Incumbent), Dr. Wesley Garnett, Bill R. Partridge, Dr. Harold B. Rinker and Bradford M. Beedy. Those elected will serve 3-year terms.

Hershel Jones is employed by Excel Chevrolet-Olds. Both Dr. Garnett and Dr. Rinker are local practicing Veterinarians. Bill Partridge is associated with Cates Mens & Boys Store and Brad Beedy is owner-manager of Beedy Furniture Company.

Names appearing on the official ballot for the City Alderman election are in this order: Bob Skinner, J. K. Hicks, Clarence A. Pettitt and E. J. Callaway. Terms are expiring for Skinner, Hicks and Callaway. All are asking for re-election to two-year terms.

1¢ City Sales Tax In Effect

Sales tax collections jumped to four percent in Spearman Tuesday morning when the 1 percent city sales tax voted last fall went into effect, adding to the present three percent state tax collections.

Spearman city officials expect to add about \$25,000 annually to the city till. They base these estimated collections on a county-wide figure of the actual state tax collection of 2 percent.

Merchants will remit the total four percent tax to the state comptroller's office, just as they always have the state tax, and the city will then receive its share from the state office.

Of the total city tax each quarter, the comptroller's office will withhold two percent for book-keeping, plus a reserve temporarily for returned checks, etc.

Several other Texas cities have the tax going into effect on April 1 and Spearman will be one of 327 cities in the state having a sales tax. This represents slightly over 80 percent of the state population.

City sales taxes will now be collected by Spearman, Borger and Plainview in this area, with others apparently on the verge of adding the optional tax to ease burdened city budgets. New Mexico, Kansas

and Oklahoma all have sales taxes, with at least Oklahoma having city sales taxes optional.

Naturally, there is expected to be some confusion at the beginning of the new program in charging and collecting the tax. The city sales tax will cover only those items which were taxable under the 3 percent state tax.

The four percent sales tax begins with a one cent tax on a 13 cent purchase with four increments for each dollar: 13-37¢, 1¢; 38-62¢, 2¢; 63-87¢, 3¢; 88-\$1.12, 4 cents.

Many Texas cities who previously voted the one percent city sales tax have expressed a "pleasant surprise" over the revenue for their first quarter of participation in the sales tax.

City officials said Spearman would receive its first collections check from the state for the April-May-June quarter in late August or early September.

Science Students Win Amarillo Fair

To quote the master of ceremonies at the awards ceremony Friday, "It was Spearman night at the Amarillo Science Fair". Competing with students from 26 panhandle counties, Spearman youngsters received four of the top five awards.

Heading the list of winners was Devorah Jackson who won the expensive trip to the International Science Fair to be held in Fort Worth, May 5-9. There she will join another representative from Spearman, Kandy Vaughn, who won this same award at the Panhandle State Science Fair. In addition to this honor, Devorah won the Navy Science Cruiser award and this summer she will fly to San Diego to enjoy sightseeing and a three-day cruise aboard a

navy ship. The alternate Navy Cruiser award went to Mark Massie who also received a third place in the boys physics division. The top place in the boys physics division was won by James Lemons, who followed up this performance by winning second place in the district UIL science contest Saturday. James will now compete in the regional UIL contest at Lubbock.

The winner of the Amarillo Rotary Club award was Kandy Vaughn who also placed first in the girls chemistry division. Kandy will receive a 10-day expense paid visit to New Mexico State University where she will participate in the Junior Engineer and Scientist Summer Institute.

Also placing well in their divisions were Randy

Weston who took an honorable mention in boys chemistry, and Jim Jenkins who received an honorable mention in the boys mathematics division.

In addition to these awards, a slide rule was presented to Mr. Frank Butcher, the teacher of these fine students, in recognition of outstanding achievement in the science teaching field.

This is the third consecutive year for a Spearman student to win the Navy Cruiser award, and also the third straight year in which the Rotary Club award has been won by a Spearman youngster. Better still however, is Spearman's record of having sent four students in two years to the International Science Fair--an almost unheard of accomplishment.

Let Me See ... by Lybil

In an interesting story told by Donald E. Wildmon, he recalls how Yuri Alexeyevitch Gagarin, the first human ever to enter space, was killed when the plane he was piloting crashed. He died as he lived among his fellow Russians--a hero. The report said he "sacrificed his life to save a peasant village." Most of us remember Gagarin by the fete he pulled in the year 1961. The date was April 12. He rode his spaceship Vostok I on a trip around the earth and returned safely. He was 27 years old, and made history before he had reached middle-age. When he was buried, he was buried with the hero's funeral on the Red Square in Moscow. People turned out in droves and they wept as they sang his praises. His death was a national tragedy.
Remember what Gagarin said during that first trip of mankind around the earth? While spinning around up there he sent back this message: "I can see no God." His intention of course was to disprove the belief of millions of people that there is a Creator responsible for this race and space. His words did little to dispel the Christian's belief in the Almighty.

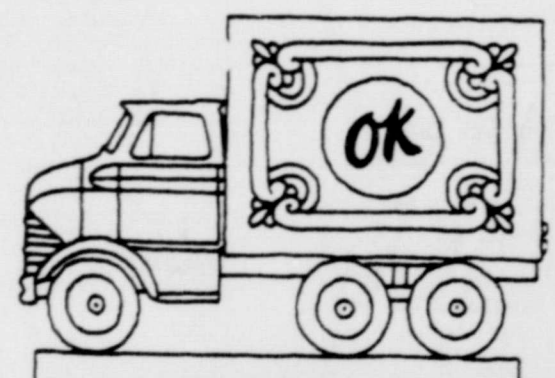

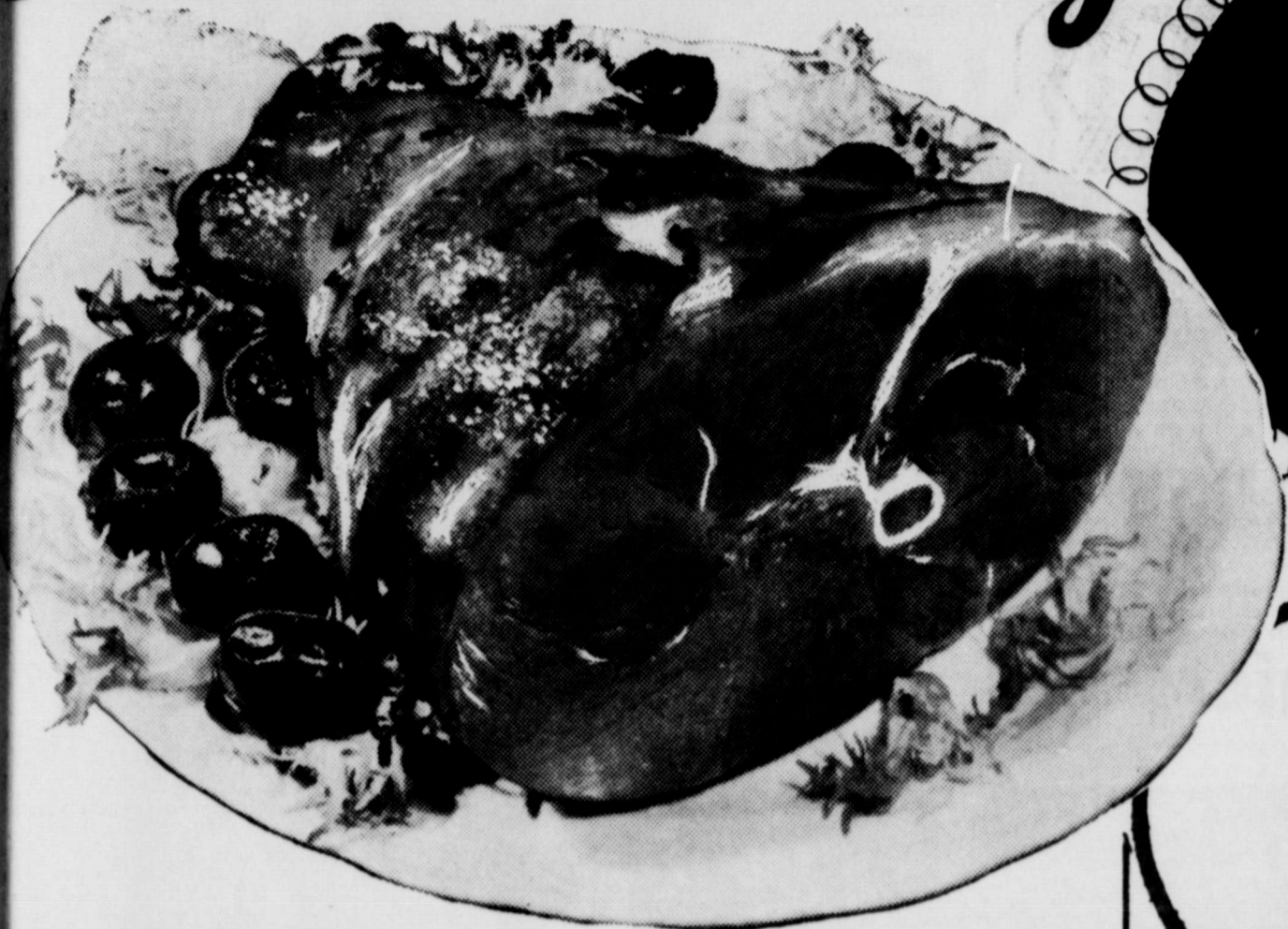

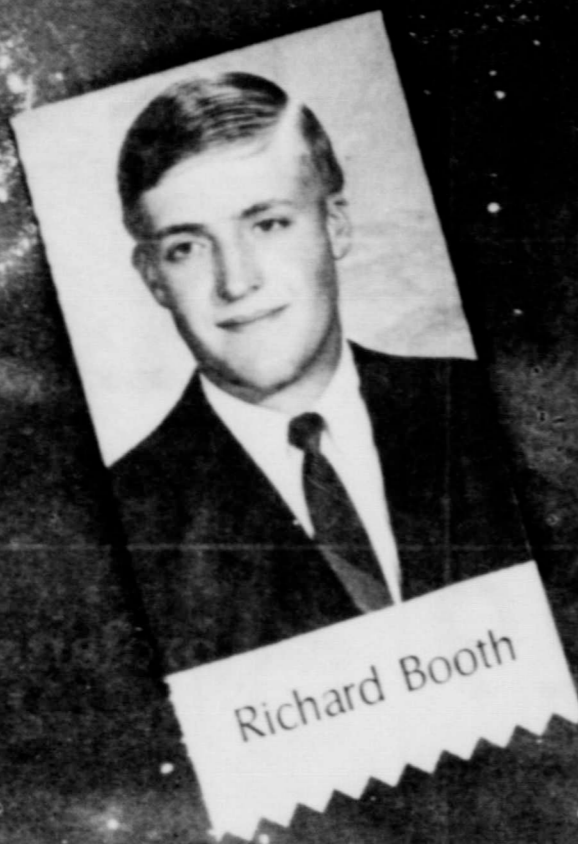

DRIVERS 'USED SPIRITS' EVEN IN GRANDPA'S DAY

AUSTIN, --Drunk drivers who cause accidents have been on the American scene for some 65 years, the Texas Safety Association noted today in commenting on the long-needed and recently-proposed legislation designed to remove Texas drunks from the state's highways.

As early as 1904, the Quarterly Journal of Inebriety reported drunk drivers were at fault in at least 19 of 25 fatal accidents involving "automobile wagons."

"A careful inquiry showed that in 19 of these accidents the drivers had used spirits within an hour or more of the disaster. The other six drivers were all moderate drinkers, but it was not ascertained whether they had used spirits preceding the accident," the Journal noted.

It was also reported that in the 25 fatal accidents, 15 persons occupying the wagons were killed outright, five more died two days later and three other persons were killed. An additional fourteen persons were injured, some seriously.

In illustrating the "new danger," the publication cited the following incident:

"A recent race between the owners of large wagons in which a number of gentlemen took part, was suddenly terminated by one of the owners and drivers, who

persisted in using spirits. His friends deserted him, and in returning to his home his wagon ran off a bridge and was wrecked."

The Journal predicted that "with the increased popularity of these wagons, accidents of this kind will rapidly multiply." It also concluded that "inebriates and moderate drinkers are the most incapable of all persons to drive motor wagons," and that "the precaution of railroad companies to have only total abstainers guide their engines will soon extend to the owners and drivers of these new motor wagons."

Although the drunk driver problem was identified as early as 1904, it was not shown to be serious until about 1924, the Safety Association explained.

Since then, every competent investigation has demonstrated that excessive use of alcohol is a major source of highway crashes and as a result, some 31 states now have laws requiring chemical tests for intoxication. Texas is not yet one of the states requiring chemical tests although Texas studies show that drunk drivers contribute to more than one-half of the state's highway deaths. One 10-year study shows that as many as 68 per cent of the Texas drivers killed in one-car accidents are drunk when they die.

The Texas Safety Association, which recently endorsed Governor Preston Smith's traffic safety program featuring the use of chemical tests to determine degree of driver intoxication, reports, however, that three major bills have been introduced in the current session of the Texas Legislature to provide for chemical testing of suspected drunk drivers.

They are Senate Bill 71, Senate Bill 74 and House Bill 26. All three propose legislation to authorize the use of breath tests to determine alcoholic content of the driver's blood after he has been arrested for allegedly driving an automobile while intoxicated. The driver may request another type of chemical test, such as the blood or urine test, but if he refuses to submit to a chemical test of some type, his driver's license may be suspended.

Breath testing is favored by eight out of 10 persons. A simple test of a person's breath can quickly determine whether or not he is too intoxicated to drive safely. is legally sober or ill. The Safety Association is calling for public support of breath test legislation. Senate Bill 71 was introduced by Sen. Charles Wilson of Lufkin. It has been referred to the Senate Committee on Jurisprudence. A committee substitute for Senate Bill 74 has been reported out favorably by the Senate Committee on Jurisprudence. The substitute bill deleted reference to the presumptive level of .10 per cent blood-alcohol as the legal level of intoxication.

Drinking driver problems, as well as occupational, home, school, and recreational safety needs, will be among the topics discussed in some 47 safety sessions scheduled for the 30th Annual Texas Safety Conference March 30-April 2 at the Rice Hotel, Houston.

The Safety Association sponsors the Conference which is the largest safety gathering in the Southwest and one of the largest in the nation.

Liberal, Kans. Mental Health Center Open

The first comprehensive mental health center in Southwest Kansas is now in operation, according to Dr. Guy Scott, Director of the Southwest Guidance Center in Liberal, Kansas.

Dr. Howard Williams, Director of Community Mental Health Services under the Kansas Mental Health Authority, announced that the Liberal Clinic had been given this new designation at a meeting last week of directors of the various mental health centers serving the state.

With the opening of the Day Center on March 3, the Southwest Guidance Center met the federal requirements to be designated a comprehensive center. A small federal grant enabled the Day program to begin operation, said Dr. Scott.

Additions have been made to the staff throughout the year with the Day Center program in mind. The professional full-time staff now consists of two psychologists, two social workers, and one psychiatric nurse. The part-time staff is made up of two staff psychiatrists, an activities therapist, and a counselor. The professional staff are supported by a full-time clerical staff of three.

NEW MAILING ADDRESS FOR WAGE, EXCISE TAX RETURNS

(Dallas, Texas)--Northern Texas employers filing wage and excise tax returns with the Internal Revenue Service should now send them to Southwest Service Center, 3651 S. Interregional Highway, Austin Texas 78740, instead of the district office.

Envelopes addressed to the service center are included in the tax-forms package mailed to employers.

Mr. Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for Northern Texas, said that mailing tax returns directly to the service center will save the government several million dollars a year in shipping and handling costs. Congress enacted the direct mail requirement in 1966 and IRS is introducing it in stages.

Currently, the requirement applied to employer's wage and excise returns. Forms 941 and 720 in Northern Texas. Railroad retirement tax returns

CT-1 and CT-2 also should be sent directly to the service center.

The new mailing requirement will not disturb the relationship existing between the taxpayer and local IRS offices

Other items on the plentiful list of the U. S. Consumer and Marketing Service include peas, canned and frozen beans, blackeyes and baby lima beans, onions, rice, dry

beans and peanuts and peanut products.

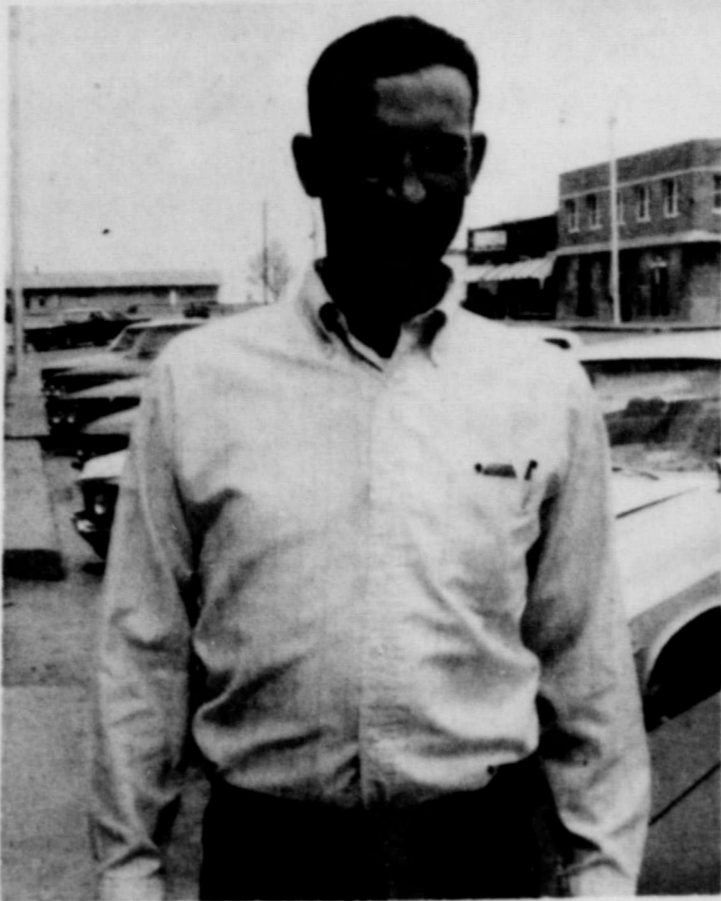
Last year's rice production broke all records and ran 13 percent above 1967. Estimated dry bean production figured at 17.7 million hundredweight, or 16 percent more than last year. At present, pinto beans are in best supply but others include pinks, blackeyes and baby lima beans.

TAX MAN SAM SAYS: The Internal Revenue Service computer is a meticulous machine. If the computer has to have a schedule or a form to support some statements it doesn't hesitate to ask for the missing documents. The IRS error report coming from the computer center in Austin points out that many North Texas taxpayers have started an un-

wanted correspondence session with the computer. The computer needed such forms as Schedule B, Schedule C, Schedule D, Form 2440, "Statement to Support Exclusion of Sick Pay," and Form 3901 "Moving Expense Adjustment."

Most folks don't like to write to a computer, so we recommend that you re-check that tax return. Make sure that all required supporting schedules or statements are attached.

Price Supports Telephone Bill

Panhandle Congressman Bob Price supported a rural telephone financing bill approved by the House Agriculture Committee. The legislation, if approved by the House and Senate, will establish a bank to provide new supplemental financing from private as well as federal sources, for rural telephone systems.

The legislation is intended primarily to bring funds from the private money market into the rural telephone program to augment the present Rural Electrification Administration (REA) two percent loan money. Eligible private companies as well as cooperatives would obtain loans from the REA bank.

Before approving the measure, the committee adopted an amendment which would bar loan applicants from receiving direct (2%) REA loans if their net worth amounted to 20 percent of assets. It was argued that these companies did not need the direct loan, but should not be prohibited from participation in the REA program.

Under other provisions of the bill, these borrowers could obtain loans from the REA bank at rates of not less than 4 percent. Price voiced a hope that the measure would not meet the same fate as an almost identical bill which the committee approved last year. That bill, after winning a 23 to 5 passage in the Agriculture Committee, died in the House Rules Committee with the adjournment of the 90th Congress.

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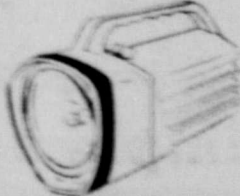

Helpful Hints From Me To Thee

SOMETHING SPECIAL FOR EASTER
Grape Chiffon Pie-This special pie says Spring! The light and creamy filling has a so-good grape flavor--and a pretty pastel purple color. The pie shell can be fancy--or a simple baked pie crust. The pie will still be something special.

GRAPE CHIFFON PIE
9-inch pie pan lined with lady fingers*
1 package (3 oz.) lemon flavored gelatin
1/4 cup sugar
1/8 teaspoon cinnamon
1 cup evaporated milk
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 cup bottled grape juice

To make pie shell, first split lady fingers. Then cut off one end so that remaining pieces are about 2 inches in length. Stand these pieces up around inside edge of a 9-inch pie plate. Cover bottom of pie plate with remaining pieces. Now to make the filling. In a small saucepan heat grape juice to boiling. Add lemon gelatin, sugar and cinnamon and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Cool, then chill until gelatin just begins to thicken. (Gelatin should look like unbeaten egg white). Meanwhile, pour evaporated milk into a clean ice cube tray and chill until ice crystals have formed around the edges of the milk. Chill bowl and beater also. When gelatin just begins to thicken, turn icy cold evaporated milk into cold bowl and beat until foamy. Add lemon juice and whip until evaporated milk is stiff and will hold a peak. Folk in gelatin mixture lightly but thoroughly. Turn into lady-finger lined pie plate; smooth filling evenly. Chill until set, 2 to 3 hours. Before serving--if you wish to decorate pie--make a small nest of coconut in center of pie and fill with small candy Easter eggs. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

*A baked pastry shell, or a pie plate lined with vanilla wafers, or a crumb shell made of vanilla wafer crumbs or graham cracker crumbs may be used.

ANOTHER DESSERT IDEA
This grape chiffon pie filling is good as a "dessert in-a-dish". Chill the filling in a bowl until it is set, then spoon it into serving dishes.

ANOTHER IDEA: 1/2 cup marshmallows (either miniature or cut-up large marshmallows) may be folded into the bowl of filling before it chills and sets.

TIPS ON GELATIN--In a recipe where other ingredients are to be mixed with gelatin, it is important that the gelatin be just beginning to thicken. Usually we say this is when the "gelatin looks like unbeaten egg white." Which means the gelatin is still soft and sort of "runny". If the gelatin has thickened almost to the point of setting, it will set up at once when it comes in contact with the cold whipped evaporated milk and there will be bits of firm gelatin which are not able to be smoothly mixed in and the mixture will not be evenly smooth and creamy.

WHIPPING EVAPORATED MILK As it comes from the can, evaporated milk is rich and creamy. It will whip easily when it is icy cold. The simplest way to chill evaporated milk is to pour the amount called for in the recipe into a clean ice cube tray. (Never dilute evaporated milk to be whipped) Put it in the freezing compartment until ice crystals have formed in the milk--that is, until it is partly frozen. Turn into a cold bowl and beat rapidly with a cold beater. If evapora-

lemon juice is added to "stabilize" it. Usually, 1 tablespoon lemon juice is beaten in for every cup of evaporated milk measured before whipping. Lemon juice, as in this recipe, also sharpens the fruit flavor.

Since evaporated milk is used undiluted for whipping, this means that foods prepared with evaporated milk are double-rich in all the nutrients of whole milk. Evaporated milk is low in cost.

ted milk does not whip stiff, it can be re-chilled and whipped again--it will not turn to butter. Evaporated milk will whip very stiff. Evaporated milk triples in volume when whipped. Whipped evaporated will not stay stiff for a long time unless an acid ingredient such as

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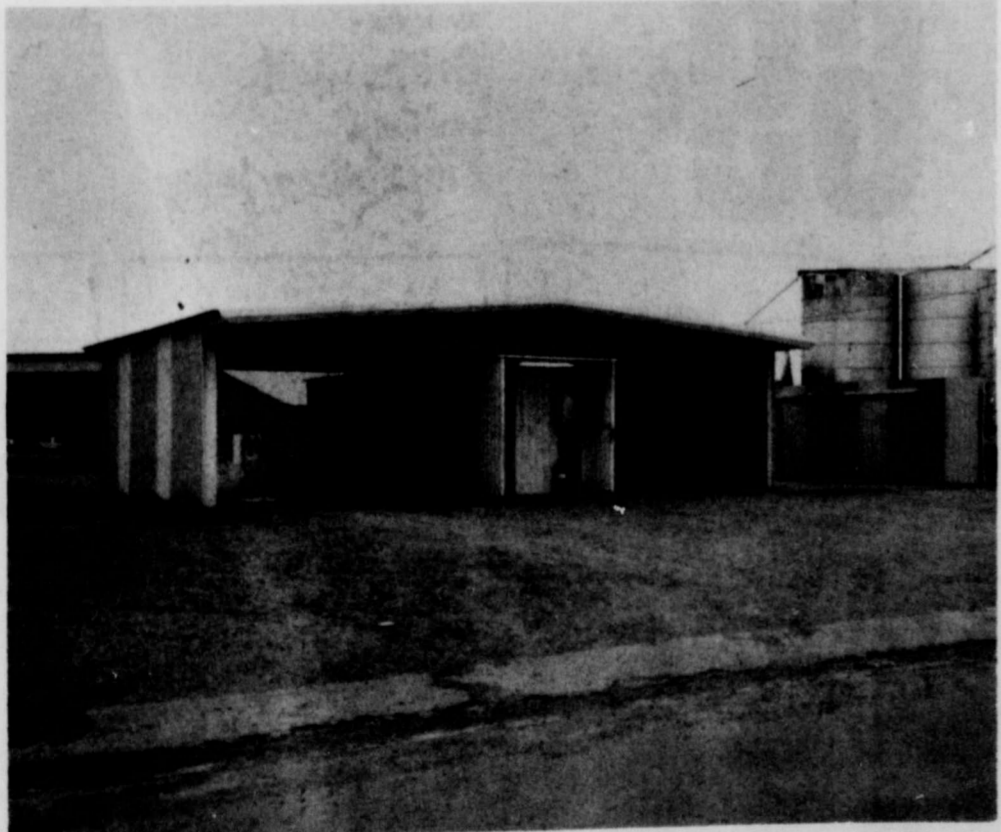
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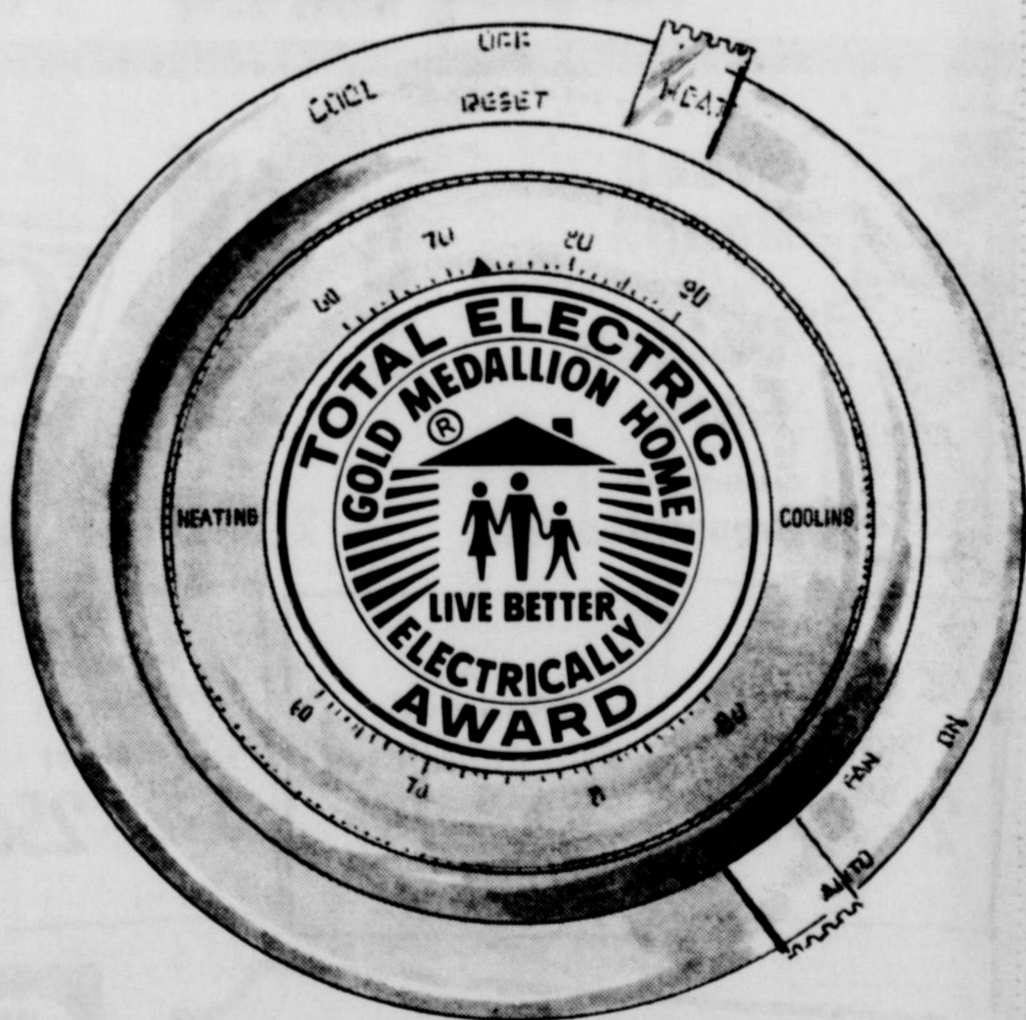

Pork Research Study Underway

Economics of limited pork production for small operators will be studied in the swine research project initiated this past week at High Plains Research Foundation.

The pork research study indicates the amount of interest that has been generated in pork production on the High Plains area. "And it is hoped that through this study, area bankers and other lending-agencies can establish guidelines for advancing necessary financing to aid small area farmers obtain more profit from their sorghum crops," Dr. Tom Longnecker, Foundation Director said in announcing

the study project.

The two-fold research study will collect economic data on the operation of the portable, slatted floor pens being constructed by several area firms; maintaining a disease-free environment in a semi-enclosed area and comparison of a feeding ration using the by-products of grain sorghum as a base compared to a straight grain sorghum base ration.

The study will be conducted in two raised, slatted floor pens, one 50-head capacity and a 25-head pen, furnished for the study by the Hamby Company, Plainview, and Central Supply Company, Borger. Purpose of the raised slatted floor is to aid in maintaining sanitary control.

The pigs, 75 head, are from the Jimmy Dean Pig Parlor SPF herd. On date of receipt, they averaged 40 pounds each and were about nine weeks old. The pens are divided

to hold 25 pigs each and, with removable panels on three sides, can provide protection from winter weather. For the summer months, the panels are removed and sprinklers installed under the roof will provide cooling for the feeders.

A problem in controlling disease is to maintain strict patrol of persons visiting the project. This is being accomplished by an electric fence around the perimeter of the area.

Feeding and watering equipment for the study is furnished by Feeders Equipment and Supply, Plainview. Feed for the study is furnished by Harvest Queen Mills and Feeders Grain and Milling Company, Plainview.

Dr. Longnecker said the study was developed to see if a small farmer could increase his grain sorghum profits by feeding pigs in a small operation.

Longnecker said farmers should be able to increase

potential sorghum profits \$40 to \$60 per acre on all grain fed through swine. However, there have been two problems already seen. "One", Dr. Longnecker said, "is the problem of obtaining disease-free hogs and the second problem would be maintaining disease-free operations."
