Sorghum Growers Should Be Alert For Greenbugs

Sorghum growers should be on the alert again this year for the pesky and destructive greenbug. This tiny pest which sucks the juices from the sorghum plant and did such widespread damage in the Sorghum Belt last summer is back at it

in many areas. If there are greenbugs in your fields be prepared to spray -- but do so only after you have positively identified

them. Unless you're certain you have the greenbug you might be destroying beneficial is scheduled in the Astrodome, insects by spraying. There are several other insects--primar-

> resemble the greenbug. Some key identifying characteristics of the greenbug are: length of about 1/16 inches, a general light green color with a dark green stripe down the back, green legs with black tips, and black cornicle tips (the cornicles are two small tubes at the rear of the body). There are both winged

and wingless greenbugs. The greenbug feeds under leaves and near the ground. In contrast, the corn leaf aphid which is similar in appearance to the greenbug, but lacks the dark green stripe down its back, usually feeds in the

whorl on new growth. If you do identify a greenbug infestation, how do you decide whether its severe enough to spray?

Texas A&M, Oklahoma State, Kansas State and the University of Nebraska all offere these general tips:

1. If plants are up to 6 inches high, spray when there is visible damage with colonies of greenbugs on lower leaf surfaces.

2. Beyond 6 inches and up to pre-boot, spray before any entire leaves are killed. 3. From pre-boot on, spray

when greenbug numbers are sufficient to cause death of more than the two lower, normal-sized leaves.

For spray materials, Wayne Fowler, agronomic education director for DeKalb AgResearch, Inc. reports that the most frequently recommended chemicals are Diazinon, Malathion, Ethyl Parathion, Phosdrin and Systox.

Fowler says the Diazinon and Malathion can be applied as a ground spray but he advises that the other three are highly toxic and should be sprayed from the air. He warns against using the methyl form of Parthion because of potent ial damage to the plants.

After a first spraying farmers should keep a close watch on their plants and be alert to a reinfestation says Fowler. It may be necessary to spray again. If another application is required, be certain the chemical can be used a second time in a season. Some materials are labeled for one spraying only.

Be certain to check with your local extension personnel or your seed dealer on any

questions regarding greenbug infestation and spraying. Such natural enemies of the greenbug as lady beetles, lacewings and certain wasp species, normally keep green-

pecially watchful.

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

And of course, the group will visit the cities, castles, and cathedrals now popular for their histroical assocation with the great Protestant Reformation under the leadership of Martin Luther.

Dr. Bob Jones, III, vice president of the university and tour director, accompanied the students and faculty on the trip. Upon reaching Paris, those taking part in the Euro-

Even the novice homemaker can feel confident about preparing scrambled eggs. Success comes quick and easy.

Regardless of how many eggs are scrambled, allow one tablespoon milk and a scant of salt for each egg. Add pepper as desired. Use only enough fat to cover the bottom of the

skillet lightly.

Mix eggs, milk, salt and pepper with fork or beater. Mix thoroughly if a uniform yellow is desired. Heat fat in skillet just hot enough to sizzle a drop of water. Keep in mind that for cooking eggs, as in cooking most protein foods, low heat is best.

Pour in egg mixture. As mixture begins to set at bottom and sides, gently lift cooked portions with a spatula so that the thin, uncooked part can flow to the bottom.

To assure best texture and appearance, avoid constant stirring. Cook until eggs are cooked throughout but are still moist and glossy - about three minutes.

Add a gourmet touch to scram bled eggs with some of the fol-

lowing ideas.

1. Lightly brown sliced mushrooms in fat before adding eggs. 2. Add finely cubed or shredded cheddar cheese when eggs begin to thicken.

3. Add pinch of favorite

herb as poultry seasoning, mar-joram, chives or minced pars-4. Add drained pineapple

chunks when eggs begin to thicken.

5. Lightly toast chopped nuts in the fat before adding egg mixture.

6. As mixture begins to thicken, stir in chopped meat such as bacon, luncheon meats, frankfurters, or chipped beef,

Noting that the Russian scientists recently have been able to contain plasma heated to ten million degrees for onefiftieth of a second, Dr. Robson said that "one-fiftieth of a second may not sound very. long, but compared to the containment of only one-ten-thousandth of a second attained in

ternity. By profiting from Russian achievement and by using techniques familiar to University of Texas scientists in the new center for plasma physics and thermonuclear research being built here, we feel that we can double the temperature and triple the time

The source of the hydrogen bomb's energy is nuclear fusion," Dr. Robson told his listeners. "This is the joining together of the nuclei of light elements to form heavier ones, and is unlike nuclear fission which derives energy from splitting the nuclei of heavy elements in atomic re-

" In fusion research, we are attempting to control this ener-gy release for the generation of electric power. Ordinary water, which is abundant, cheap and virtually inexhaustible, contains deuterium (heavy hydromonths. Those payments must gen), the basic fuel for nuclear





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
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
