



Let Me See ... by Sysil

"For I was hungry and ye gave me meat; I was thirsty and ye gave me drink: I was a stranger and ve took me in; Naked and ye clothed me: I was sick and ye visited me..." this passage of scripture in Matthew is so typical of Mrs. R.B. Archer. This Spearman lady who has dedicated her life to the special ministry of helping others, is one woman who is truly loved by all. No matter what their station in life, she treats all men as "her brother" which is the fruit of a true Christian.

The first time I ever saw Mrs. Archer, to know who she was, was on the occasion of the death of a child cousin of mine. Mrs. Archer called in the home of my grandmother to pay her respects and help in anyway she could. As a child, this made an impression on me because she was a stranger to me and I marveled that she could be concerned over our tragedy. Down through the years she has visited my family on other such occasions and each time her very presence seems to lighten the hearts of the bereaved. Being a woman of many sorrows herself, she knows how to help you share yours. The majority of Spearman citizens can relate to you this

same experience. I cannot find it in my heart (nor scripture) to believe that in Heaven we will be rewarded according to our "works." The way I see it, the reward there will be the same for everyone--eternal life. BUT --- IF it could be that we will receive special favors for deeds done on earth than Mrs. Archer will receive so many --- and being the kind of woman she is, she will share them with all

of us! Last Thursday she celebrated her 73rd birthday. I pray she has many more for I don't know what we would do without her.

Boy-how time does fly! A few weeks ago someone asked me how long Mrs. Lula Womble had been teaching Kindergarten. I said I thought it had been 6 or 7 years. She is my next door neighbor and I should know. But it seems I didn't, for last week she celebrated her 19th year and registered her second generation Kindergarten pubil. I simply could

not imagine it. Had a letter to the editor this week from a fellow who

had a gripe about the Spear-man school not giving ex-cused absences for students to attend the Tri State Fair in Amarillo. He said if all other area schools did the same he wouldn't feel so hard toward the local school. In the letter he stated he thought Spearman had one of the best schools in this area. I did a little checking on area schools. Stinnett and Perryton schools do not give excused absences for students to attend the fair.

The reason for this is, the law states that students must attend aminimum of 175 school days per year. After all the holidays are scheduled, plug the allowed days for bad weather when buses cannot run, the schedule winds up being a very tight one. Also, schools receive State money on the basis of the average daily attendance. To let students off to attend the fair would

result in a money loss too. Heard many people state that they felt the school needed classrooms worse than it needed a new football field since the high school students were already using the main hallway for study

I talked with Principal Kenneth McKay about the study hall business and he said they had enough empty class rooms for study halls, but that the majority of the students like the hallway study hall because it provided more of a lounge atmosphere giving students an opportunity to help themselves to ice cream bars or cokes and makes rest rooms more accessible. He said the hall was large and spacious with outside windows and was just wasted area during the day. Using the area for study hall was an experiment to begin with, now Mr. McKay feels the students would not change. They like it.

I talked with a few students about the study hall space. Some liked it, some didn't. Those in study hall during the 12:05 lunch period do not like it. They say the lunch line makes too much noise for study during this period.

Anyway you look at it, our school is growing each year. Each week since school began August 25, more students have enrolled. We are only a few students away from triple-A.
