Lynx Head For Dalhart In Show-Down Game!

Spearman's Lynx team will head for Dalhart early Friday afternoon, and the game which quite likely could decide the district championship will be played at 7:30 p.m. Friday at the Wolves Stadium in Dalhart.

There is no way to compare the two teams, except the Wolves will have the size-court advantage, and the Lynx will have to play catch-up football to defeat them on their home field. But, sports fans, look at the statistics of the last Lynx game.

The Lynx literally shredded the Stinnett Rattlers in their homecoming game Friday night. After crowning their very new queen, Hazel Lester, the fired-up Lynx ran away with the game.

Leading 7-0 at halftime, the Lynx came out in the second two periods and hammered away at Stinnetts defense to chalk up 14 first downs, and over 300 yards during the last half.

It was a great deal of the credit of Spearman's success in the defensive play, and the time again the Lynx played the Rattlers on their feet down tries. Playing their best game of the year, new members born for the Lynx, Womble, Grayson, Lemons, Whitefield, Flores, McCall, Pool, Upchurch, Ballard, Wilmet, Cummings, Jackson, Brown, Larson, Loveday, Lusby, Lyon, and Butkirk, Archer, Schroeder and Donahue made the difference for the thrilled homecoming crowd.

In fact, in the last half of the homecoming game Stinnett was able to gain only 24 yards, as the Lynx gained over 300 yards.

The entire first half of the homecoming game saw the teams playing rather evenly, but in the second half, the Lynx was beginning to show its power, both on offense and defense. But, the big difference in the first half, was the Lynx's quarterback Womble, who led the Lynx to the 15 yard line before being out of bounds.

Pool and Lyon alternated in the 15 to go in for the Lynx. Womble promptly added the extra point, to take the Lynx to a 14-0 lead.

The Stinnett team threatened to score two times in the ball game, on almost identical drives. One time the Rattlers drove to the 4 yard line and the big Lynx drove them back, took them on downs just before the half ended. Early in the fourth quarter the Snakes got another penetration, only to see the Lynx slam them back to the fourth down and take the ball over.

Following the halftime ceremonies where the bands put on an outstanding homecoming show, the Lynx literally took over the game! The Rattlers kicked to the Lynx starting the 3rd quarter, and the Lynx returned the ball to the 37, Lyon, Pool and Womble blasted the ball down to 32 yard line. With a bit of trickery, quarterback Womble handed the ball to Whitefield, who snake-hipped through the entire snake team for a TD. Womble missed the conversion attempt.

The Lynx kicked to the Rattlers, and after two plays, a jarring tackle caused a fumble, and Loveday recovered for the Lynx on the 41. Moments later, Gary Pool twisted into the end zone for 23 yards and another touchdown. Pool shook off two would-be tacklers on this fine scamper. Womble again kicked the extra point.

The Rattlers came back strong in the fourth quarter, and drove to the Lynx 15, only to have the hustling Lynx line stop them cold and take over.

This seemed to inspire the Lynx team. They gained a total of 107 yards in four plays, but due to three penalties, were only able to keep 32 of these yards. With the ball on the 47, Womble pulled a keeper, and dashed 29 yards for a first down, with another penalty. The Lynx finally drove the ball into the end zone, with Pool going the last yard for the TD.

Pool nabbed a Stinnett pass late in the game, and probably would have scored, but one of his own men scrapping for the ball knocked him down.

The Lynx were penalized so much, we couldn't keep up with all of them, but they did lost about 75 yards on one series of plays late in the game, and were penalized more than 100 during the game unofficially.

In the meantime, Dalhart is still the team in the district to beat! Dalhart and Phillips have already eliminated a scrappy Panhandle team, and the entire burden of the district race, will be on the Lynx shoulders at Dalhart Friday night.

Remember the kick off is at 7:30 Friday at Dalhart. Plan to attend, and back your Lynx team.

Winter Near

Old Man Winter inched a little closer into the Panhandle area Sunday as a Canadian cold front slid into the region blanketing the country with heavy clouds and almost constant rain and drizzle.

October is the month for maize harvest, but very little of the grain has been cut. Farmers continue to watch the overcast skies and listen for a favorable word from weather forecasters. Fields have been too wet to enter for the past two weeks and although the wet weather has not yet damaged the grain, a hard freeze would cause most of the crop to "fall."

The month's rainfall as recorded by the official rain gauge totals 1.14 inches as of three o'clock Tuesday, Oct. 28. .42 was recorded Oct. 12; .40 Oct. 23; .08 fell Oct. 24 and .15 on Oct. 27. By Tuesday afternoon .09 had been recorded.

Deposits In Bank A Record

An all-time high for deposits in the First State Bank was reached this month when figures on deposits and loans were released Tuesday as the comptroller of the currency called for a report of conditions as of October 21, 1969.

Deposit figures in the local bank have broken all records with each quarter's report thus far for the year. With another harvest now underway it is expected that deposits will continue to increase during the last quarter which ends in December. This should be a record year for currency on deposit at the First State Bank.

The bank reported deposits of \$12,006,692.79 as of October 21. This is an increase of \$893,730.00 over the previous record of \$11,112,961.95.

Area banks all are reporting an increase in deposits. Bankers attribute the local deposit increases to the continued growth of the city and a healthy local and area economy.

DR. GREGG RE-ELECTED TO A A G P

KANSAS CITY, MO. --Dr. Damon Donald Gregg, 720 South Roland has been re-elected to active membership in the American Academy of General Practice, the national association of family doctors.

Re-election signifies that the physician has successfully completed 150 hours of accredited post-graduate medical study in the last three years. Members become eligible for re-election at the end of the third year following their election to membership. The Academy, the country's second largest national medical association, is the only national medical group that requires members to keep up with medical progress through continuing education.

The Academy, founded in 1947 and headquartered in Kansas City, Mo., has been instrumental in the establishment of a new primary medical specialty in family practice. The new specialty is expected to increase the numbers of family physicians available to serve the public in the future. The Academy's post-graduate education program is the foundation of eligibility for family doctors now in practice who apply for certification in the new specialty.
